PCETV

Parkland College Educational TV

Parkland College has its very own TV channel. Did you know that? You've probably flipped past it on your way to ABC; there was something different on every time you clicked by, a credit to the channel's variety of programming. PCETV isn't just the bulletin board, it isn't just performance art, and it isn't just talking heads. But, because a few seconds in between flips isn't a very efficient way to get to know PCETV, I'm going to tell you a little bit about everything the channel encompasses.

For starters, PCETV comes in on channel 9 in Champaign, Savoy, and Urbana, through Insight Communications. In Gifford, Ludlow, Paxton, Rantoul, and Thomasboro, the channel is no. 10, through Mediacom Cable. Also, if you have Heartland Wireless Cable, you can check it out on channel 50. In the future, those in St. Joe

and Philo will, hopefully, also be able to tune in.

PCETV has been around for 15 years; originally it was shared with the school district, and was used strictly for teleconferences. In 1994, however, PCETV got its own channel, and has used it to support Parkland's mission ever since (if you're not familiar with Parkland's mission, check your catalog). A very dedicated staff works very hard to make things happen, a staff that includes Mike Colter, Drew Renick, a student crew, several interns, and last but not least, Station Manager Barbara Gladney, with whom I had the pleasure of interviewing for this article.

As I said before, PCETV has a very wide variety of programming. Some of the things you're likely to find on the channel are studio shows (filmed in Parkland's very own studio), student productions, imported programming (which has a very wide variety unto itself), telecourses, and of course, the bulletin board. An installment of a show (particularly studio shows) will run for about a month or two, to ensure that people have a chance to catch each episode. This means you can typically expect a new installment of each show about every two months.

There are currently four studio shows running on PCETV, with a fifth in the works. The newest show, "Job Story," is hosted by Margot Williams, and deals with everything job-related. If having a job is part of your future plans, you might want to check this show out. The next episode focuses on childcare/early child education.

While "Job Story" is still relatively new, "Parkland Report" is on its 80th episode, as we speak. "Parkland Report", hosted by Tom McDonnel, is an half-hour long, and deals with happenings at Parkland College. The show has an interview format; this month Tom will be talking to Marsh Jones and Kathy Lewis about virtual learning. "Parkland Report" has covered and will cover a wide array of topics, and Barbara Gladney assures me, "We're always looking for ideas."

Another studio show centered around Parkland and its community is the aptly titled "Parkland Community Forum." This program is all about community outreach. Host Louise Allen (who just did her 50th show) lords over content that deals with human society, Parish Nurse Programming, poison prevention control, and the interviewing of new judges, to name a few topics.

The fourth studio show is called "Live and Learn."
This program is a supplement to the Live and Learn magazine you've seen around Parkland College. Topics are selected from the magazine and then expanded on, to create an half-hour program. This month's installment covers the 20th anniversary of the Parkland Art Gallery, and features Denise Seif, Jamie Kruidenier, Chair of Fine Arts Dave Jones, Don Lake, the founder of the art gallery, and David Leake as host.

The new studio show in development is called "Surrounded by Science." David Leake and Heidi Luszler will come together to form a co-hosting tandem, and the first show will be about evolution. Science certainly isn't new to PCETV, however, as there is also a science hour at 7 p.m. on Wednesdays. This is an hour of imported programming that deals with (duh) science, so if you're majoring in science or just like to play with chemicals, check it out.

If science isn't your bag, then PCETV offers international fare on Tuesday nights, with "Germany Live" and "Prismo". "Germany Live" takes the audience on a tour of Germany with each installment, and it's shown in both English and German. Watch the English version, and then find out how much German you've forgotten; the two versions air back-to-back. "Prismo" is another show dealing with foreign countries, and it comes in German, English, Spanish, and French.

Are you scared? Aching for some familiarity? Try
"Cultural Arts Showcase," another important show which
Barbara Gladney describes as "...a cultural Mtv." You'll
see familiar text blocks introducing each scene/video/performance; things you might see are scenes from classic
movies, scenes from ballets, and other assorted visual
arts performances. "Cultural Arts Showcase" runs Sunday
morning and Sunday afternoons.

The imported programming introduces viewers to many different topics; there is a lot of programming to choose from. "We try to run things that PBS might air, that meet Parkland's mission," says Program Manager Gladney. Everyone loves PBS. Imported programming is sometimes requested by faculty members; occasionally lectures and honors conventions will air, and sometimes plays, though most are copyrighted.

In addition to studio shows and imported shows, PCETV also features student programming, such as Parkland basketball games (on delayed tape), a program called "Parkland Magazine", and "Sham Jam", a musical show. My eyes lit up when Mrs. Gladney told me about the basketball. If you're a sports fan, your eyes should light up as well.

Another PCETV studio show is "For Art's Sake", which has run 47 installments thus far. This show, hosted by Denise Seif, contains videotapes of art programs at the Parkland Art Gallery, amongst other things.

The most familiar aspect of PCETV is probably the bulletin board, which runs in hour segments time to time, where space needs to be filled. Announcements, promotions, and press releases are displayed on the bulletin board, and if looking at stationary text doesn't ding your bell, the audio behind the bulletin board is provided by WPCE, Parkland's very own radio station.

"We're always trying to improve our programming," says Program Manager Gladney. She stresses an attempt to become more and more professional. The station has just invested in a teleprompter, though they're still in the "playing around with it" stage. But seriously folks, is there anything more professional than a teleprompter? I've seen it, and it's neat-o.

There are things I've left uncovered due to time and space restraints, but hopefully I've given you an idea of just what PCETV has to offer. The crew is working very hard to bring the Parkland community a medium that it can benefit from, and Barbara Gladney will tell you, from the studio shows to the student programming and fulfilling Parkland's mission, "It really is Parkland's channel."

Gallery to feature local artist

From November 1 through December 7, 2001, the Parkland Art Gallery will present the "Lewis and Clark Trail Project." The exihibit will feature Bloomington artist Kenneth Holder. During the last five years he documented the landscape of the Lewis and Clark trail on canvas, painting more than five hundred pictures in that time.

During his travels Holder painted what he saw: the vast prairies and the rugged mountains, as well as the cultivated fields, bridges, and dams that reflect the changes that have occurred since Lewis and Clark made their expedition some two hundred years ago. Holders' goal of documenting what he saw was not unlike what Lewis was called upon to do for Thomas Jefferson, when he accepted the challenge of exploring the new territory of the Louisiana Purchase. Holder though, is not documenting unknown territory but the passage of time and history of this land. His selection of subject matter, vantage points, and the use of canvas shapes give his images a contemporary interpretation of these historical locations.

Kenneth Holder is a professor emeritus

at Illinois State University. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts at Texas Christian University and his Master of Fine Arts from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Through exhibiting this series of works Holder hopes to keep alive the recent interest in the story of the two explorers and the enduring value of the lands they documented.

Kenneth Holder will provide a gallery talk at 7 p.m. on the evening of the reception, Thursday, November 15, 2001.
