



The independent media movement is here! The newest addition to the community opened its doors recently on west Main street in downtown Urbana. Known as the IMC, or Independent Media Center, the not for profit organization exists to promote 'an independent, collectively run, community based (forum) for topics underreported and voices underrepresented in the dominant media. All contributors (to the IMC) are volunteers. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to (participate) by submitting articles,' volunteer hours, ideas, donations, and enthusiasm to the Collective. The local IMC is part of a national and international movement which seeks to give individuals and private groups within local communities an avenue to express themselves in a variety of ways. There are opportunities for volunteers to work in all forms of media from the Public i, a monthly newspaper, to the worldwide web, to planning and organizing and participation in special events held regularly at the Iindependent Media Center.

On several recent visits to the Independent Media Center, a number of activities were on going. There were people discussing world events, local happenings; some were perusing the large number of magazines available free of charge, while others were lounging, enjoying a variety of beverages and snacks sold at the Center. One evening a poetry reading and discussion was held; a group of people were involved in planning for the Center through the established forums: arts, community, environment, government/politics, human rights, labor/economics and media.

Larry Keller, an IMC volunteer remarked, "Our local Center is a focal point for those who want to provide alternative news." While many IMC are only Web based, Champaign -Urbana is fortunate to have a location where people can meet. Within the IMC movement, the traditional gatekeepers are replaced with editorial boards, small groups of individuals volunteering from the community. This is critical to the movement because, "the IMC gives each person the ability to decide what is news," said Brian Hagy.

Korinna Lepeley, an IMC visitor came to use the computers available to the general public. While there, she noted that the West Main street location is sustained through grants, charitable donations, community involvement and its volunteers. 





The first step to recovery is admitting you have a problem. When it comes to academic difficulties, many students are hesitant to ask for help. Daud Nagda, a second year Computer Science student, echoed these sentiments, "Going to someone, other than somebody else in my class, is usually the last thing I do when I'm stuck on a problem," Daud said.

The reasons behind this plague of appre-

hension are varied. Many students fall victim to general social anxiety. Others aren't sure where to go for answers, although there are entire departments dedicated to providing student support. The final, and often most prominent culprit, is laziness, though I just don't feel like writing anything about that.

For those willing to overcome the daunting forces of shyness, confusion and laziness, there are plenty of tutoring resources available on campus for free. This article focuses on the broadest programs available to students of all majors. Yet, for each specific major and course there are a number of alternatives for academic assistance.

One successful program is The Peer Tutoring Program in X-109 & C-150. In this 1 - on - 1 type program a student can ask a tutor to assist him/ her in understanding certain aspects or topics taught in a specific class. Directed by Omar Adawi, the program focuses mainly on classes with low retention rates such as Math, Physics, Chemistry & so on. Just pass by the Peer Tutoring Lab in X-109 for more information.

There are also other good resources of information such as the Learning Lab. The Lab is situated in C-150 and provides, as Paula Boyd calls them, "individually tailored guided independent study courses of 1 - 3 credits in Math, Reading, Writing, Study Skills, and Basic Computer Skills". One of the most encouraging things about this program is academic life, but in the end, it's up to you.



Drop by the writing center which provides 1-on-1 writing support from the Parkland College English Faculty. This is a completely walk-in service, so no appointments and no hassles. Be sure to drop by the Writing center in X-109 if you need any assistance in writing.

Sometimes you are sitting at home possibly doing some homework and you realize that you don't really understood an important topic. You look at the clock it's 10:00 p.m. What can you do? Luckily there are Online Student Support Systems such as Classmate, the online Tutor, which is a statewide online tutoring center that provides 24 hour tutoring in Math, Chemistry, Physics, English and more. You can access Classmate at http://orca.parkland.cc.il.us.

Every student should know there are alternatives to using classmates or professors for help, and each student needs to be aware of exactly what those alternatives are. Don't miss out on those higher grades just because you were shy, confused or just plain lazy. Parkland is doing its utmost helping you succeed in your

Representative Johnson Enthusiastic **About New Farm Bill**

Tim Johnson (R, 15th Dis.) was enthusiastic about the new farm bill that was unanimously approved and will go into effect in 2002, and some but not all his audience at Parkland on Wednesday night seemed to share his opinion.

One resident said the bill, which is still awaiting approval by the Senate, will "dilute the delivery system" although Johnson replied that the bill is still a work in progress and a numberof amendments probably will be added to it.


Johnson voted to normalize trade with China, and he also was in favor of normalizing trade with Cuba. However, that proposal was rejected.

He recently introduced a bill to help Paxton residents prevent a casino from being built nearby. Rather than eliminate the right of the Miami Indian tribe to seek compensation, this bill would wave soverign immunity on the part of the federal government and allow district action against the U.S. for monetary compensation. Johnson said this bill allows justice to prevail where there is a claim but will not give the tribe the right to take land from individual

Johnson recently returned from a trip to Israel sponsored by the Champaign and Chicago Jewish Federation. He said he left feeling sympathetic and came back feeling empathetic toward the Israelis. He said he feels Israel is being targetd by Palestinians who want to wipe out the Zionist state and that U.S. support is warranted.

He thanked his staff and suppoerters, saying he could not have mde it through the last eight months without their help.

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
