

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Voluntary Prayer Passes House

Champaign- Rep. Rick Winkel praised House action today that overwhelmingly approved a bill that permits students to voluntarily engage in student initiated prayer.

"House Bill 4117 sends the right kind of message to both persons with deeply held religious convictions and those who ardently support the right to be left alone," Winkel said.

Winkel said he co-sponsored the bill so that there would be no question that students in public schools are allowed to voluntarily engage in student initiated prayer.

"It means exactly what it says," Winkel said. "Those who want to find some subliminal agenda can search every nook and cranny of the bill and in the end, they find nothing other than what the bill says – students can voluntarily engage in student initiated prayer – something I believe thay could have done anyway, but others, for some reason, believed was somehow illegal or wrong."

Winkel said the bill had absolutely no affect on the current ban on prayer in school that is in any way endorsed or sponsored by school officials. In addition, it does not require any student, school official or teacher to join with students in prayer and does not permit prayer in school settings that the courts have found to be coercive.

"The U.S. Supreme Court recently has allowed student initiated prayer at school events," Winkel said. "This bill very simply allows students in public schools to voluntarily engage in student initiated prayer. The bill ran into some opposition in Committee, but I trully don't understand why anyone would have a problem with the bill."

The event will take place at the City of Champaign Public Works Department located at 702 Edgebrook Drive in Champaign. The event is open to all Champaign County residents. Non-County residents will be required to pay a \$5 participant fee.

Materials that will be accepted include: computers, laptops, monitors, keyboards, cords, cables, printers, copy machines, adding machines, scanners, answering machines, pagers, Citizen Band 2-way radios (CB's), VCR's, computer mice, facsimile machines, shred-

ders, modems, microwaves, calculators, and other miscellaneous computer, home or office equipment. Items that will not be accepted include: televisions, telephones, cellular phones, and large appliances such as dishwashers, clothes washer, dryers, stoves, or refrigerators. Computer monitors will be accepted but there will be a \$2 fee collected for each monitor. Individual pieces of equipment weighing more that 60 pounds will not be accepted at this collection. However, arrangements can be made to deliver the equipment to another site.



Keeping Everyone Safe

Springfield - The arrival of spring traditionally signifies the beginning of outdoor activities including walking, jogging, and bike riding. As temperatures rise and ays get longer, many people begin sharing the roadways with drivers. Motorist should use extra caution when approaching a pedestrian or person operating a bicycle or other device propelled by human power. The following tips are offered for drivers when approaching a person on a bike or walking on the road:

- Slow down and be prepared to stop.
- · Be aware of cyclist and pedestrians by scanning each side of the road ahead.
- · Keep both hands on the steering wheel and be prepared to take evasive action in case of a fall.
- · Be aware of traffic on the road with you. If you do have to stop suddenly or turn off the road, do not drive into their lane of travel.

Drivers are not the only ones responsible for keeping walkers and bikers safe. The following tips are for anyone sharing the road with cars and trucks:

- · Cyclist must obey all traffic laws when riding on a roadway.
- · Walkers should be on the left side shoulder of the roadway.
- · Cyclist should never ride more than two abreast and should not impede traffic.
- Just like drivers, walkers and bikers must yield the right of way to emergency vehicles.
- · Any bicycle operated after dark must be equipped with a lamp on the front which will emit a white light visible from at least 500 feet away, and a red reflector or red light on the back.
- · Pedestrians walking after dark should wear light colored or reflective clothing.

Last year in Illinois, 189 pedestrians and 18 bicyclist lost their lives as a result of crashes with motor vehicles.



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

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

Lady Cobras going strong halfway through the season

The Parkland College softball team stands at 19-12, 11-5 at the midway point of the 2002 season, just about where Head Coach Chuck Clutts figured they'd be.

"I thought we'd be a little better in the conference then we are (five losses), but we are about where I thought we'd be," said Clutts. "Overall, we're doing real well. We've got nineteen victories already and we've proved that we can play with the best in the nation."

The Lady Cobras got the chance to do just that last Friday, stealing a victory in game two of a doubleheader with Kankakee, the #1 team in the NJCAA.

Another strong pitching performance by Alsup resulted in 10 strikeouts in game one, with Koets and Sara Perry leading the offense. Koets batted 3-4 with a double, a triple and 2 RBI's, while Perry went 2-2 with two walks, an RBI and three runs scored.

Game two was more of the same as Krista Kloth whiffed seven Springfield batters and Sarah Shonkwiller went 2-3 with a double and 3 RBI. Christie Wontland chipped in with three hits and one RBI for the Lady Cobras.

This past week also saw the Lady Cobras avenge a doubleheader sweep by Lakeland earlier this season by defeating them 3-2 in game one and 2-0 in game two last Sunday. Heiberger picked up the victory in game one and Alsup picked up the win in game two, striking out nine.

With the Lady Cobras in mid-season form it is not to early to start thinking about what improvements must be made to be successful come tournament time.

"We need to get consistent hitting throughout the lineup. We don't have that right now," explained Clutts. "We'll have 5 or 6 girls hitting and 2 or 3 not hitting, and that kind of hurts us a little bit. To win a regional you have to have consistent hitting."

One thing Clutts hopes does not change is the Lady Cobras pitching and defense, which has been just short of unbeatable as of late.

"Our pitching staff is doing a great job and our defense has been absolutely wonderful," said Clutts. "We have had three errors in the last nine games so you can't complain about that."

The Lady Cobras will play six consecutive home games beginning



Baseball Movies: Bull Durham hits a foul ball on DVD

Sorry, Sports Illustrated, you're wrong.

"Bull Durham" (MGM, 1988, \$24.98), which arrives on DVD this month, is not the best sports movie ever made. It's not even the best baseball movie ever made.

Baseball does serve as a backdrop to this movie, which is mostly about Susan Sarandon and her lust that surfaces when a new season nears. Each year, Sarandon picks out a baseball player from the local Durham, N.C., minor league team as her personal toy for the summer.

There is an appealing secondary storyline here. Tim
Robbins plays a young pitcher who has all the stuff to become a whiz in the major leagues.
The only problem is you never know if the ball will end up in the catcher's mitt or sail into the backstop.

So veteran journeyman catcher Kevin Costner, who once made it to the big leagues, goes to work with Robbins and mold him into an ace fireballer. Complicating the task is that Sarandon has chosen Robbins as her playmate of the season.

But the Costner-Robbins relationship is overshadowed by Sarandon's preoccupation with sex. If you were thinking about showing it to the kids, be aware that it also is littered with strong language. It's supposed to be a comedy, but I found only a few mildly amusing sequences.

The overrated "Bull Durham" is being released to coincide with the start of the 2002 major league baseball season (the real Opening Day was Monday). But here are some much better baseball movies on DVD that will get you primed for The Game:

-"The Natural" (Columbia Tri-Star, 1984, \$24.98) - Robert Redford plays the aging Roy Hobbs, who shows up in the camp of the New York Knights. As soon as he and his magical bat are inserted into lineup, the Knights begin to win.

-"61" (HBO, 2001, \$14.98) Billy Crystal directed this outstanding chronicle of the 1961
home-run race between
Yankees teammates Roger
Maris and Mickey Mantle.
Barry Pepper is a dead ringer
for Maris, and Thomas Jane
isn't bad as Mantle.

-"The Jackie Robinson Story"

(MGM, 1950, \$19.98) - Jackie Robinson plays himself in this absorbing film about the man who broke the game's color barrier. Out of circulation for years, the movie has been rescued beautifully restored.

-"Field of Dreams"
(Universal, 1989, \$19.98) - By
now everyone knows the
famous "Build it and they will
come" line. Kevin Costner is
the Iowa farmer who is told by
"a voice" to build a baseball
diamond on his property. When
he does, "they" do come,
including "Shoeless Joe"
Jackson. Non-baseball fans
won't get it.

-"Major League I & II"
(Warner, 1989, 1994) - So much
funnier than "Bull Durham."
Baseball fans still get a big
kick out of these two comedies
about the Cleveland Indians,
with a diverse group of characters including "Wild Thing,"
winning a division and then the
pennant. "I" is on VHS only at
\$12.98. "II" is on DVD at
\$14.98.

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
