If you are looking for the departments of Social Sciences and Human Services, try D179 just around the coroner at the base of the main stairs.




For those looking for 2C art — it's in the basement. The photo lab for developing negatives is on the first floor. I wonder why?


The new wing has a total of 28 classrooms, seven of which re for computers, five new computer labs, and 50 new faculty offices.

# The Piano Lesson



#### **Final Examinations Notice To Faculty** and Students

In order to be consistent in scheduling final exams both onand off-campus, the following statement will also be placed in the Prospectus. I invite any suggestions on how we may improve this communication.

A final examination is expected in each credit course at Parkland College. Final examinations for all courses with last regularly scheduled class meeting during the week of April 29 - May 6 are to be given during final exam week (May 7 - 11) according to the official published schedule. Final examinations for all courses with last regularly scheduled class meeting prior to the week of April 29 – May 6 are to be given at the last regularly scheduled class meeting. For all other courses, final examinations are not to be given early during regular class periods.

Any requests from faculty to alter scheduled final examination times or dates must be reviewed and approved by the Department Chair and the Office of Academic Services.

In courses where a final examination is not appropriate as determined by the department, an educational alternative scheduled during the week of final examina-

tions is expected.
Students: These official college guidelines were established to more fully insure that you receive the full set of instructional class periods for which you paid and to which you are entitled and that you have the appropriate amount of time to prepare adequately for your final examinations. If your final examination is given earlier than scheduled, please contact your Department Chair or the Office of Academic Services in A116 at ext. 2687.

Three final examinations scheduled for the same day may be considered a conflict. Conflicts may be resolved by arrangement with the faculty of these courses.

## It's Here and It Looks Goofy

This is what \$100 million buys you these days: A goofy-looking thingamabob big enough for a solo standing rider. Think lawnmower without the blades or pogo stick

with giant wheels.

This is "IT," codename
"Ginger," whose rumored existence created a bonanza of buzz when it leaked out about a year ago. Now it's official and its New Hampshire inven-tor insists "IT" will revolutionize short-distance travel by filling the vacuum between walking and driving. Who knew there was a vacuum?

Dean Kamen, Ginger's father as it were, is no mad scientist. He's a serious inventor. Among his 100 or so patents are the portable dialysis machine, the first insulin pump, the heart stent that Vice President Dick Cheney is currently using and a wheelchair that climbs stairs - initially codenamed Fred. (Get it? Fred and Ginger?)

He has serious backers who helped finance the \$100 million development costs of the Segway Human Transporter, the official name of this device. The Segway has a top speed of about 17 mph. It gets its stability from a gyroscope, making it virtually impossible to knock over, and its power from a battery. Riders control speed and direction by shifting their weight.

The consumer model will sell for \$3,000 and a heavy-duty industrial model for \$8,000. The U.S. Postal Service and National Park Service are already ordering up some and companies are exploring its use for getting around warehouses, factories and sprawling corporate campuses.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has ruled it isn't a vehicle. If that's the case, riders need no insurance and no license and "IT" can travel the sidewalks.

off each other and propel each other backward? What happens when it rains? Or snows? And are we really ready for the kind of revolution that adds more wheels to our sidewalks? # Champaign Public Library Receives Gates Grant

The Champaign Public Library will be able to significantly expand its free public access to computers and the Internet thanks to a \$30,680 grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

The grant, announced last week, will allow the Library to add four public access computer workstations at its Douglass Branch Library and half a dozen new workstations at the Central Library next spring. The computers will provide free Internet access plus a variety of software applications and games.

The grant will be a boost to the Library's recent initiative to improve service to Champaign's Spanish speaking population, too. One computer at each location will have Spanish keyboard, Spanish language Internet interface and other applications in Spanish.

The grant is part of the Gates Foundation's \$250 million commitment to the U.S. Library Program, designed to help bridge the "digital divide" by bringing computer access and digital information to public library patrons in low-income communities across the country. The program defines these communities as those with a poverty rate of at least 10%. Champaign Public Library is one of 6600 libraries reached thus far.

#### The Powerful Delusion of "light" Cigarettes

While you're thinking about possible holiday gifts, instead of looking in a catalog, you might want to take a look at a recent report from the National Cancer Institute.

The report tells us that Americans of all ages - and especially women and girls - bought the idea that if you smoke "light" or "low tar" cigarettes, you're doing the next best thing to quitting. But the report makes it clear that it's just a delusion - light cigarettes are "safer" for the machines that the government uses to test them, but not for our mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, sons or daughters who smoke.

Since smokers are addicted to the nicotine in cigarettes, they just puff more or harder or smoke more "light" or "low-tar" cigarettes in order to get the nicotine they need.

The message is clear: If you're a smoker, the best gift you can give your loved ones is to quit. And if you're not a smoker, the best gift you could give is to help prevent our children and grandchildren from ever starting to smoke.

One out of every four Americans smoke, so chances are someone you love is a smoker - and probably they are one of the 90 percent of American smokers who smoke "low-tar" or "light" cigarettes. Women and girls are especially likely to smoke these so-called safer cigarettes, and advertisements are often targeted to them, urging them to switch if they don't "choose" to quit.

It's a clever strategy, perhaps based on research showing that young women are more easily addicted to nicotine than young men and therefore find it harder to quit.

Smoking is a foolish choice that people make, whether they are male or female. But when they are hoodwinked into thinking that they are smoking a safer cigarette, by the most persuasive ads that money can buy, we need to stop thinking about smoking as just an individual decision. And, when those ads are targeted at young women, it's especially underhanded because women who smoke don't just risk their own lives but also the lives of their children and the well-being of their families.

Smoking-related heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women. Lung cancer kills far more women than breast cancer, and recent research shows that even breast cancer is

linked to smoking. In addition to causing the deaths of 160,000 women each year, women who smoke are more likely to be infertile, have miscarriages, give birth to dangerously small babies, and have infants that die from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

What better gift, for those of us who smoke or who don't want our loved ones to smoke than to finally take this public health tragedy seriously? Most smokers started smoking as children or teens, not understanding that the nicotine in cigarettes is more addictive than heroin or alcohol. And, if we continue to look the other way when children experiment with cigarettes, thinking its just a rite of passage, and ignore the power of billions of dollars of advertising aimed at persuading teens and young adults to smoke, we will continue to mourn the unnecessarily premature deaths of 400,000 smokers and ex-smokers every year.

That's why, in addition to giving up smoking ourselves, supporting the efforts of others to quit, and telling our children that smoking is unacceptable, we need our government's help

Now that government scientists have told us that light cigarettes are no safer than other cigarettes, what will they do about it? An obvious solution would be to ensure that future cigarette ads don't mislead consumers, and that the meaningless terms "light" and "low-tar" can no longer be used.

Those terms have already been banned in Europe and Canada. But, to make these and similar changes in the United States, we need the FDA to regulate tobacco the way the FDA regulates the terms "light" for margarine and cream cheese.

FDA has no authority to do that. We need a new law to enable the FDA to require tobacco companies to prove claims they make about "safer" cigarettes. Without such a law, unsubstantiated claims will continue to be made, and our friends and family members will suffer as a result.

Giving up smoking and preventing smoking are the best gifts we can give to our friends and family. Personal will power is essential, but it's not enough. We need the help of government to fight the power of misleading advertising, and finally overcome the delusion that smoking can be safe.

#### Some Popular Hoaxes Scientists Have Debunked

The scare: Heroin overdose from discarded needle.

The truth: Internet rumors that a Texas child died of an overdose after being stuck by a needle found in a playground were investigated and found to be a hoax. "A needlestick injury such as that mentioned in the story would not lead to a large enough injection to cause a drug overdose," says the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The scare: Hantavirus on soda cans.

The truth: An e-mail claiming a stockroom clerk became infected with potentially deadly hantavirus from exposure to dried rodent droppings contaminated with the virus is false, says the CDC. "This is a variation on an old hoax involving rat droppings on soda cans of various brands," said CDC spokeswoman K.D. Hoskins.

The scare: Deodorants and breast cancer.
The truth: Despite online warnings, deodorants and antiperspirants do not cause breast cancer, says the CDC. "Scientists at the National Cancer Institute are not aware of any research to support a link between the use (of these products) and the subsequent development of breast cancer." The misinfor-

mation's original source is not known.

The scare: HIV spread through the air.

The truth: No, says the CDC. HIV can't be transmitted through the air, despite a story on the tabloid Weekly World News' Web site claiming the CDC had discovered a mutated version of HIV that could be transmitted that way.

The scare: "Klingerman virus."
The truth: There is no such thing, despite an e-mail message claiming people have been infected with it after opening gift packages delivered in the mail. The packages supposedly were marked, "A gift for you from the Klingerman Foundation." The e-mail is a hoax, says the CDC.


The scare: Tampons and asbestos.

The truth: Unfounded Internet rumors suggest U.S. tampon manufacturers add asbestos to their products to promote excessive menstrual bleeding in order to sell more tampons.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration says it has no evidence of asbestos in tampons.

The scare: HIV and unused sanitary pads.
The truth: Rumors that HIV can be transmitted through contact with unused sanitary pads are false, says the CDC.






# Hensley To Reunite With Former coach

Parkland College standout, Chandra Hensley, signed a national letter of intent to play volley-ball for Eastern Illinois University. Hensley, a 6' 1"middle hitter, averaged 3.28 kills and 1.97 blocks per game for the Lady Cobra's who finished 6th at the NJCAA tournament.

"Chandra is very athletic and has steadily improved in all of her skills. As her former coach at Parkland, I know she has an excellent work ethic and is a very coachable athlete," EIU coach Brenda Winkler said. Winkler led the Panthers to their first NCAA tournament appearance before bowing out to Arizona.

#### Men's Hoops

The Cobras participated in two tournaments over christmas break. Parkland defeated Bethel College 82-56 and College of Lake County 108-75 to sweep the competition in the Eastland suites classic. The Cobras were led by Vincent Brock who accumulated 10 points, 9 steals and 5 assist against Bethel. Fred Long led the Cobras with 25 points over Lake County.

On December 21st and 22nd the Cobras travelled to Chicago to participate in the Kennedy King Classic. Keith Parks led all scorers with 36 points to lead the Cobras to a 97-90 overtime victory against Robert Morris College.

In other action, Parkland defeated Malcom X for the second time this season. The Cobras were led by five players in double figures. Parks led the way with 23, Brock and Long dropped 13, Jason Williams had 12 and Jason Johnson chipped in with ten points.

Up next for the Cobras is a contest at Lakeland Thursday Jan. 10th.

#### Women's Hoops

The Lady Cobras started their break as well as they finished it. Jen Carroll scored 21 points to lead the Cobras to a 74-61 victory over Shawnee on December 8. Beth Burke added 16 points and Lindsay Stierwalt pulled down a career high 14 rebounds.

On December 18th the Lady Cobras defeated IVCC 71-60. The Cobras were once again led by Carroll with 19 points and 6 assists and Burke with 16 points and 10 rebounds. Dornita Thomas chipped in with 14 points for the Lady Cobras.

Up next for the Lady Cobras is a home contest with Kankakee on January 12.

#### Lady Cobras win in the desert

In addition to coming home with a sun-tan and a smile, the Parkland College Women's basketball team returned from Mesa, Arizona with their third tournament title of the season. The Lady Cobras breezed through the competition en route to a 3-0 sweep in the tournament.

South Mountain was the first victim of Parkland's wrath. The Lady Cobras jumped out to a 29-15 halftime lead and held the Cougars off for the 76-59 victory. Chandra Hensley scored 18 points and Beth Burke added 14 points and 9 rebounds to lead Parkland.

In the toughest contest of the weekend the Lady Cobras squared off against tournament host Mesa CC. Once again Parkland jumped out to a big halftime lead, 34-18, but had a little more trouble hanging on to this one. The T-Birds battled back, but the Lady Cobras proved too tough as they hung on for the 67-64 victory. The Lady Cobras were led by All-tournament selections Burke, with 20 points and 7 rebounds, and Jen Carroll, 15 points and 5 assists.

The final game of the tournament proved to be a mismatch as Parkland held Malcolm X to just 22.9% shooting from the field and 10 second half points. Darlene Tulua scorched the Hawks with 17 points on 8/10 shooting.

The Lady Cobras did more than just play basketball on the trip. The team left for Mesa Jan. 31st, giving them a few extra days of fun in the sun. The Lady Cobras enjoyed such activities as horse-back riding through the desert, mountain climbing and a little swimming. Other activities included a trip to the zoo, to the mall, and

a little game of lazer tag.

The Lady Cobras funded the trip themselves by hosting summer leagues and camps and by food vending at Parkland softball games. All of this and more was done to raise the necessary 8,000 dollars for the trip.

"I don't think there is any question that your team has to have pretty good family chemistry to make a trip like this," said head coach Tim Wulf. "And all it (the trip) does is reinforce it."

With a 13-2 record and the season halfway through, the Lady Cobras are putting themselves in position to make a spectacular run this season. Their family-like relationship and experiences this season is sure to give them some confidence heading into March Madness.

"It's tough to win games on the road, you're playing in other peoples gyms with their officials and you're not sleeping in your own bed," said coach Wulf. "If we were able to get to nationals, and we certainly have a shot, this trip is something we can refer to for confidence."
