Parkland Professor Runs for Champaign City Councilman

The City Council in Champaign consists of the Mayor and nine City Council members. Five members represent (and are elected by) a district and three members are elected at large. The members serve double duty as Champaign City Council members and as members of the Champaign Township Board of Trustees. Once elected, each member has a term of four years. The elections are held in April of odd numbered years (though a run off will occur in February if there are more than twice the number of candidates for a position) and are staggered (meaning that roughly half of the members are elected every other year). This year the Mayor and the three Council Member at large positions will once again be up for vote. One of the individuals on that ballot for Council Member at large will be Parkland College's own Professor Ken Urban.

Professor Urban was born in Staten Island, New York and attended Stuyvestant High School in Manhattan, graduating in 1980. He worked primarily in computer programming in the New York metro area until returning to school fulltime in 1990. During that interim he married (1987) and currently has three children from 22 months to 6 years old. Ken graduated summa cum laude from SUNY Albany with a Bachelors of Science degree in 1991. He then received a graduate assistantship to the College of William & Mary that culminated in him obtaining a Masters of Science degree with the 400th graduating class in 1993. Ken was brought to

Champaign when both he and his wife received an assistantship to grad school at the University of Illinois.

In his time in the Champaign area Professor Urban has been a teaching assistant, research assistant, and a visiting lecturer with the Computer Science Department at the U of I. He has received his MCS from the U of I. Since 1996 he has been with Parkland College. Professor Urban is an Associate Professor in the Computer Science department, the Program Director for website programming, and the chair of Parkland College's Diversity Committee under the Parkland College Association.

When it comes to issues Ken has some very definable stances. On human rights he supports unions, a living wage for workers, gay and lesbian partnership benefits, repeal of the frivolous "Constructive Possession" laws (19 and 20 year olds can get fined up to \$300 dollars legally for being at "arms length" from a beer when in a bar even though they may be in a crowded bar legally), affordable housing, and a citizen police review board. In environmental issues he supports city recycling, sustainable energy, energy independence, bike pathways, and public transportation. On economic issues he supports a commitment to daytime family activities downtown, high technology growth, and sustainable growth. In cultural issues Ken supports library expansion and local artists.

The following are a list of questions I asked Ken and his answers: "What do you feel is the most important issue to be address in the Champaign area by the city council? Why?



Why is the political process important to students?

It should bring some more visibility to Parkland. I love to talk about how much I love my job to groups I'm campaigning to.

The writer of the piece was mistaken on a few points that I feel could be cleared up. First of all, I would like to say that the writer gets props for reviewing the album and actually giving it a chance, because in today's society so many people are only affected by the mainstream, and the MTV music that all other genres get pushed to the wayside; however in saying this I would like to put in a few notes. The indie-rock world has been a major up and coming scene for many years now, and in contradiction to what was said Dashboard Confessional and Jimmy Eat World were not the first to turn the emo-scene into something larger than just the indie world. To quote the official website of the band, www.takingbacksunday.com, "The band has an eclectic past, listing influences ranging from Modest Mouse, Lifetime and Fugazi to Quicksand, Nirvana and the Who. Taking Back Sunday's sound echoes bits and pieces of all of the aforementioned acts, but truly brings forth a style that is 100% their own. Dear June,

I am really worried about my best friend. She is getting really thin and isn't eating very much at all. She seems so distant from me. I've tried to get her to tell me what is going on but she just tells me she's fine. Whenever we go out she always says she's not hungry even if we've been shopping all day. Do you know what she might have? I've never heard of anyone who has just stopped eating. If this is a problem, do you know of any places here in Champaign where she can get help? And if what she has is a problem how many other people get it or is it really rare? Thank you for your help.

Dear Concerned Friend:

Your friend is fortunate to have a friend who genuinely cares about her welfare. Anorexia (the loss of appetite) can be caused by a number of things including side effects of some medications. However, what you're describing could be an eating disorder which would professional require treatment. Anorexia nervosa is a disorder of severe self-imposed dieting. It affects teenage girls most often and can sometimes be triggered by stress or anxiety. Symptoms include refusing to eat, extreme weight loss, a distorted body image (thinking she's fat when she is actually very thin), a preoccupation with food, low self-esteem, and excessive physical exercise. Treatment usually involves nutritional counseling, individual psychotherapy, and family therapy. If untreated, the illness can lead to major health problems. Impoundment To Beign For Unpaid Parking Violations

URBANA-The City of Urbana is reminding residents that beginning February 3, 2003, anyone with repeat unpaid parking violations who ignore the City's collection processes may face impoundment of their vehicles.

Under Ordinance 2002-11-131, if a vehicle is found to have ten or more unpaid parking violations against it, and the tenth violation is at least 60 days old, the registered owner of the vehicle will be sent a letter notifying them of the infraction. The vehicle owner has 45 days from the postmarked date to resolve the violations with the City of Urbana.

Once the vehicle has been impounded, owners of impounded vehicles may pursue three courses of action. First, the owner may pay all outstanding fees, fines, towing, and storage charges. Second, the owner may file an informal dispute notice with the Municipal Collector's Office within 72 hours of impoundment. Under this option, the owner signs an affidavit denying that there have been ten or more outstanding parking violations against the vehicle. The City of Urbana parking administrator will then determine the outcome of the dispute based on the affidavit and city policy. Third, the owner may request a hearing before the city hearing administrator. Under this option, the owner is offered a hearing in which he or she may deny before the hearing officer that there have been ten or more unpaid parking violations issued against him or her at the time of impoundment. In the latter two options, the vehicle shall remain impounded pending the outcome of the dispute and/or payment of the fines, fees, towing, and storage charges.

This ordinance was passed by the City Council in response to approximately \$30,000 of lost revenue annually from unpaid parking violations.

Activists for Peace to Flood Urbana City Council Monday Night in Support of Anti-War Resolution.

Activists for peace from Urbana will fill the City Council Chambers Monday night in support of Urbana Alderwoman Danielle Chynoweth's proposed resolution to prevent war against Iraq.

"We feel strongly that the predicted \$10 billion a month that will be spend on a war against Iraq is better spent at home in Urbana on education, health care, and job creation," said Ricky Baldwin, a member of the Anti-War Anti-Racism Effort (AWARE). AWARE asked Alderwoman Chynoweth to bring an anti-war resolution before City Council.

"War sucks money away from local and state governments," said AWARE member, Lori Serb. "The American people, most of the people of the world

and the residents of Urbana support a diplomatic solution, not war."

Alderwoman Chynoweth's anti-war resolution argues that the citizens of Urbana and its local elected officials have the constitutional right to petition the national government on this matter of grave concern to our community as part of the national and international debate now underway.

If passed, the resolution will be sent immediately to President Bush, the Pentagon, and federal and state governmental leaders.

AWARE has been demonstrating weekly against a war against Iraq since October on the sidewalks at the intersection of N. Prospect and Marketview Street. Attendance at last Saturday's rally was 85.

Local Anti-War Protests Still Going Strong

"I knew that I could never again raise my voice against the violence of the oppressed in the ghettos without having first spoken clearly to the greatest purveyor of violence in the world today-my own government." scheduled 3:30 ending time.

Phrenology, in a testament to the virtually limitless boundaries of the hip hop genre. The Roots' idiom is the proliferation of a more varied musical style, which touches on jazz, rock, hip hop, and even electronic music. What sets the Roots apart, however, is their usage of instruments within a live context more so than samsciousness, and integrity.

The Roots are a traditional band, consisting of eight guys whose genius lies in their ability to transcend genre within a hip hop context. Each track is extremely different from its prejazz norms, all the while adhering to the traditional emcee spark interest in the Roots' past

catalogue of music, a brilliant marketing ploy for a disk that has seen more publicity and public interest than any of its predecessors. To a newly-initiated Roots fan like myself, the DVD has rendered an interest in acquiring the band's past releases, the obvious desired effect by marketing executives at the Roots' label.

I honestly cannot find a fault with any track contained on the CD. Every song is as integral to the overall statement the Roots seek to make; i.e., social consciousness and paying homage to their predecessors with derivative musical artistry with a modern bent. The album flows much like other landmark hip hop albums, and surely will find its place in musical history, despite the band's relative cult status.



It started with NCAA sanctions handed down for violations from the Fab Five era, including a postseason ban for this year- something that didn't figure to affect this team, especially after an 0-6 start that included home losses to St. Bonaventure, Western Michigan and Central Michigan, and was capped by a throttling at the hands of Duke.

Head coach Tommy Amaker has led one of the most remarkable turnarounds in recent college basketball history, as Michigan has rattled off 13 straight wins following their dismal start. They have done it with a


mixture of old and new, as 6'7" senior forward LaVell Blanchard and 6'3" freshman guard Daniel Horton have led the way Blanchard is averaging 17.1 points and 7 rebounds a game, while Horton, perhaps the top freshman point guard in the nation, averages 16 points and 4.4 assists.

That 13 game streak includes a 6-0 start in the Big Ten, which Michigan will bring to the Assembly Hall Wednesday night, where Illinois has only lost once under Bill Self. The 13th-ranked Illini, led by All-American canidate Brian Cook and his 21 points and 8 rebounds per game, have some catch-up work to do already this season. Despite their surprising start(14-3 overall, 4-2 Big Ten), Self's squad is already two games back of Michigan.
