talented people who teach here. The reception will give the community a chance to mingle with the art faculty and learn what has inspired the work they are exhibiting.



Retail addition through subtraction

Over the years, Wal-Mart has grown and changed to stay on top of the retail market. Like many businesses, as the years passed and the company expanded, changes where made to their stores. Most notably, would be the morphing of Wal-Mart into super centers, which was basically adding a grocery store to their stores. These "super centers" were meant to give potential customers an all-in-one experience, to make the trip to Wal-Mart the only one needed.

The format has been adopted by other retailers, many of whom are trying to duplicate Wal-mart's perceived success. Wal-mart and its super centers have become a dominating addition to numerous cities.

Indeed, Wal-Mart has succeeded in many ways. Yet, as the company has grown, so has their desire to build their super centers, regardless of where or at what cost.

Recently, the Champaign-Urbana community was given notice of Wal-Mart's new plans for this area. Wal-Mart intends to relocate and expand their Prospect location into a super center, and then build one more super center in eastern Urbana.

For Wal-Mart, the deal is perfect, as they saturate a smaller market with 3 stores. For the community though, one could wonder as to how beneficial these new super centers will be

Currently, Wal-Mart has one super center in the area, located in Savoy. Another smaller Wal-Mart is on Prospect Avenue. That location is woefully outdated and undersized. Its relocation and expansion is more easily justified.

In Urbana though, the decision to build a super center seems more a tact to take over the community than to help it. Indeed, even having a super center in Savoy has altered Urbana's look. The local IGA closed, citing decreasing sales, which were linked directly to the opening of that super center.

For Wal-Mart, the closing of the IGA was a boon, as it is one less competitor for its new store. Overall, the retail market in Urbana has taken its lumps. The city has lost Bergner's and K-Mart in the last few years. So, it would seem Urbana needs a retail presence like Wal-mart.


Yet Wal-Mart doesn't stop when it is ahead. Their strategy is to saturate a community and take over the market. In a smaller area like Champaign-Urbana, the market is not that big. For example, as far grocery stores go, the area boasts a small number of options.

The closing of IGA seems to be a notice of the beginning of a new era in Urbana and Champaign As Wal-Mart adds to the area, the local businesses will suffer. In this smaller area, the already limited options for groceries could shrink further.

In adding Wal-Mart, addition will end up subtraction. Not just because of how Wal-Mart takes over a market, but in how as a company they expand and grow. The over saturation of this are will lead to less options for the consumers.

But a recent article in the News-Gazette about Rantoul's 150th anniverary mentioned that Bondville was also considered before the base opened in 1917.

And several years later I taught at Rantoul Township High School for 14 years and still I never heard that tale.

I wonder how different our lives would be today if Bondville had been chosen. Would Seymour be another Thomasboro? Would there be a "Bondville High School"? Would there have been two airports, one "onbase" and another civilian airport, Willard? Would Illinois Route 10 be four lanes? Would there be a golf course near Seymour? Do you ever let your mind wander like that?

Well, there are just some things that we will never know. But I must chat with Katy Podagrosi (former mayor of Rantoul) about that some time.


Katy, by the way, is a good friend of mine. My first re-membrance of her, I think, goes back to the Peoples Cafe in Rantoul. When I taught there, many times it made no sense to drive back to Champaign and then turn around a couple of hours later to return to the school for a ballgame or other school event. So, I would go "uptown" and have dinner at People's. Katy was a waitress there. And then a short time later, she joined the editorial staff of the Rantoul Press. Along with teaching classes, chaperoning bus trips, and selling tickets for basketball and football games, I was the unofficial school photographer. I believe my title was Public Relations Director. Whatever it was, I took pictures for the yearbook, the school newspaper, and for weekly and daily papers in the area. And that branched off into a "stringer"

for the Champaign-Urbana Courier and later the News-Gazette. Later, the job description included writing the script for the weekly high school radio show on WRTL. It was a good thing that I was younger then. After any of the above events, hours would be spent in the darkroom processing film, making prints,

at Taste of Champaign last month?

The picture in today's column shows the clockworks that for years chimed the hours in Urbana. The clock itself turns the hands on four faces. I had no idea that is the way it works.

Lightning hit the clock tower a few years ago, erasing a land-

writing, cutlines, and delivering the finished products to the papers. Many, many nights, I would finish at 3 in the morning, grab a couple hours of sleep, get up, take a shower, dress, have breakfast and be in the classroom by 7:50. When friends and students ask me how I did it, I tell them the story of my 5th grade teacher in Mahomet, Mrs. Gladys Clapper. She told us that if we slept 8 hours a day, we had wasted one-third of our lives. She also told us we could rest in the cemetery later. She lived to be over 90 years old, 95 or 96, I think.

But I think one is either a morning person or one is not. My trouble is I want to stay up all night but still get up at 4:30 or 5 in the morning. How many sunrises have you seen lately? Or do you even know what time the sun is coming up these

DID YOU see the Champaign County Court House clock display mark in the county seat. But a committee has been formed, the Citizens' Clock Tower Committe, whose intent is to restore the historic courthouse tower as a symbol of Champaign County.

To achievbe this goal, the now shortened tower will be extended upwards to 123 feet once again. We are told that one wll be able to see the Clock and Bell Tower for miles, even from parts of I-74.

Plans call for the reconstruction of the original belfry so that the historic courthouse bell can be once more heard chiming the hours of the restored courthouse clock. Finials, gargoyles and stone details will again ornament the tower, as they did when it was first erected. A sophisticated, modern lightning protection system will be installed to shield the historic landmark building from damage.

The restored clock is now displayed in the lobby of the new Courts Building, awaiting its re-







And this time, I will go out to the great Salt Lake. I have to see



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
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
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

The junior varsity league containd the same six schools as the varsity league and also had teams from St. Joseph- Ogden and Paxton-Buckley-Loda.

It has been a wonderful summer for the Parkland volleyball program. The athletes have had a large amount of community exposure and involvement.
