

## **Email etiquette?** point, click, delete

**Fwd: Fwd: Urgent, VIRUS ALERT!**

Everyday email users around the world log into their email services to thousands, if not millions of messages with subject lines very similar to this one. To someone, this subject line was deemed appropriate, but to the receiver, it is a reason to ignore and delete the message. What if the email was valid though? What if a friend had accidentally sent the user a virus and now the user is left unknown of this fact?

That is where email etiquette, which is captured under the phrase "netiquette," becomes important. Though unknown to most computer users, certain standard protocols apply to both email and online communication. Of course, like standard etiquette, many people tend to ignore these protocols.

Perhaps the most important point to remember with email etiquette is to keep the message concise and short. Think of an email as a statement, like a message left on an answering machine. As a result, realize an email is never completely private, regardless of security measures taken. Between malicious users who may intercept the message, to companies who monitor their employee's email usage, an email message is never completely confidential.

Also, email should be complete and informative. It should address any questions posed in previous communication and ensure it covers any questions raised within the email message itself. The message should be grammaticality correct and have proper punctuation as well.

Even within personal emails, the message should be concise, informative, and correct. Of course, given the deluge of personal email being sent around the globe, the quality of personal

email varies greatly. Some are merely a quick greeting, with very little composition, while others are practically a minuteby-minute account of a person's

In both cases, the email should have a greeting, a message that is well written. Another trap email writers fall into is the use of "emoticons," such as smiley faces made out of punctuation marks. Besides emoticons, the use of abbreviations made common through the Internet, such as "LOL (Laugh Out Loud)" and "TTYL (Talk To You Later)," should be kept to a minimum. One main reason for keeping the usage of these two items to a minimum is the simple fact that the receiver of the message may not have a clue what they mean.

Following proper "netiquette," the usage of these two items should be sparse, whether it be an email or an online chat. In fact, when engaging in communication over the Internet, it should be handled just as normal communication. One would not expect a smiley face in the middle of a loan application, and a teacher certainly would not appreciate reading a paper submitted with "LOL" at the end of a sentence.

The idea of context and usage being dictated by the current situation is an important concept to remember. While emailing a friend, it might be perfectly fine to not follow "netiquette" and write a very fractured and structurally incomplete email. Yet when contacting a teacher, or a prospective employer, email etiquette is important. Writing efficiently and effectively, whether it be an email or resume, can make an impression that is not easily changed.

## **International travel safety** information for students

As the time approaches for summer break, many college students are getting ready for that much anticipated trip abroad. Most will have a safe and enjoyable adventure, but for some the trip will become a nightmare. A number of vacations are ruined by one or more of the following: drugs, alcohol, and disorderly behavior

Each year, more than 2,500 American citizens are arrested abroad-about half on narcotics charges, including possession of very small amounts of illegal substances. A drug that is legal in one country may not be legal in a neighboring nation. Some young people are victimized because they are unaware of the laws, customs, or standards of the country they are visiting.

Besides drugs, alcohol can also cause trouble for U.S. citizens traveling abroad. Students have been arrested for being intoxicated in public areas, for underage drinking, and for drunk driving. Some young Americans go abroad assuming that local authorities will overlook such conduct. Many believe that they are immune from prosecution in foreign countries because they are American citizens. The truth is

that Americans are expected to obey all of the laws of the countries they visit, and those who break these laws sometimes face severe penalties, including prison sentences.

Disorderly or reckless behavior is also to be avoided. In many countries, conduct that would not result in an arrest in the United States constitutes a violation of local law. Being arrested is not the only misfortune that can occur on a foreign vacation. Young Americans have suffered injury or even death from automobile accidents, drowning, and falls, in addition to other mishaps. While these accidents are sometimes chance occurrences, many are caused by alcohol or drug abuse. Sadly, other Americans have been sexually assaulted or robbed because they have found themselves in unfamiliar locales or are incapable of exercising prudent judgment while under the influence of drugs or alco-


Other hidden safety issues are of major concern as well. Because standards of security, safety and supervision are not the same in many countries as they are in the U.S., many young persons have died after automobile

accidents, after falls from balconies, after falls into open ditches, by drowning in the ocean as well as in hotel pools, and in watersports mishaps, among others. In some countries, the water sports industry is not carefully regulated. Unlicensed operators have been linked to assaults, and a number of Americans have been killed or injured by the improper use of jet-skis and other personal watercraft. It is crucial that young Americans be aware of these risks as they are enjoying their time abroad.

Young Americans traveling abroad should remember that reckless behavior while in another country can do more than ruin their vacation; it can land them in a foreign jail, cause them to suffer physical harm, or worse. It is possible to have a safe and fun trip if they avoid risky behavior and become familiar with the basic laws and customs of the country they plan to visit before they travel.



## PC Democrats: young people working for change

The Illinois primary election was held two weeks ago, with John Kerry easily winning the Democratic primary for President. David Gill won the US House primary with seventyfour percent of the vote, and Barak Obama won the Senate primary with 53% of the vote. The Parkland College Democrats endorsed all three candidates, and they will work hard to get all three men elected in November.

Some members of the organization attended the Obama victory party in Chicago and met with the man they feel is our future Senator. According to Scott Redenbaugh, President of PC Democrats, Obama is "an incredible individual who really understands the problems of Illinois and the US." Redenbaugh added that "the senate election is going to be the most focused-on election (besides) the presidential election, because it is likely

to decide which party controls the senate."

In the face of a slow economy, lack of jobs, and war, and after four years of Republican-controlled politics, Redenbaugh believes that America is ready for a change. "I believe that America is growing tired of the Bush presidency. We are tired of being lied to. We are tired of a president who says one thing and does another. Tired of not having a job. Tired of being less safe against terrorism.'

The PC Democrats believe that Kerry is the man who can beat Bush for many reasons. "He has a wealth of foreign policy experience that we need, and that frankly the president didn't have when he took office," Redenbaugh said. "Kerry has spent 19 years in the senate helping ordinary Americans...and Kerry actually fought in a war. I know we can trust him with America's soldiers.'

The PC Democrats are faced with a challenge in getting young people interested in voting. According to the U.S. Census, during the 1996 presidential elections, 32% of people 18-24 years old voted. The turnout was even lower for the 2000 Bush/Gore presidential election. Only 29% of 18-24 year-olds voted. No wonder youth feel that politicians ignore their issues. Redenbaugh agrees that there is a correlation between youth voting statistics and lack of representation. "Our issues aren't brought up often, mainly because of our non-par-

ticipation," he said.
"I can tell you that if students really want things to be different they can't just protest, they can't just talk, they have got to walk, they have to vote and they have to get involved. The Parkland Democrats is there for anyone that wants to get more involved




