Blink 182; a review


On November 18, 2003 punk rockers Blink 182 released their 5th studio album self-titled Blink 182. While it is identifiably Blink they've dropped most of the crude humor and focused their energy elsewhere (which may be good or bad depending on what you like about them.)

have been a Blink fan since The Mark, Tom, and Travis Show-their totally inappropriate live album consisting of about forty tracks (only 20 of which are songsif you can call some of them "songs.") However, I admit that if I were to discover that disc now, I would not be nearly as attracted to it. I have grown up a lot since then and I wondered if I should even bother buying the new Blink release. I decided just to go for it.

I Fartynspelied as haudal rater frondman 10th DeLonge and drummer Travis Barker released a sided project self-titled Boxcar Racer in May of 2002, I knew there could be no turning back even under a different name.

The lead track "Feeling This" was an instant sngle, and may have been misleading. I like it, it's catchy, but it sounds like traditional Blink. It's like they had to get that commercial track out of the way before they could get into the serious stuff. For the most part, each track is a little less expected than the one before it.

The second track, "Obvious" also sticks to a predictable Blink chord progression, but it still




rocks. And Barker is all over the drums on this album, but, seriously, he must have broken some out of left field in the Blink ballpark. Bassist, Mark Hoppus sings a chilling hip-hopish intro on top of an acoustic rhythm: "Hello there/the angel from my nightmare/the shadow in the background of the morgue/the unsuspecting victim..." After that you don't know what to expect until DeLonge asks simply, "Where are you?" The descending lyrical pattern leaves you with the sense that that's all that needed to be said, but before you can completely process it he moves on. The rest of the song is dark and a screams of alienation, in the style of the Boxcar song "Watch the World."

If "I Miss You" came out of left field, then the next track, "Violence" just fell from the sky. I can't say I understand the lyrics, but I like it. The verses are sung, and spoken on top of each other. This is the song least-likely to get air time but it is the favorite of many fans.

"Stockholm Syndrome" is also a very violent song, fast-paced and full of DeLonge's vocal prowess. It takes awhile to get used to, but after 6 weeks, I like this song much more than I did when first I heard it.

After stretching the spectrum of Blink sound for the first half of the album, they spend the second half jumping around on it. I like this album more than any other Blink album before because they try new things: new chord progressions (thank God,) new vocal patterns/combinations, and new techniques. Also, Barker's drums sound better every recording. If you enjoyed Boxcar Racer, or like watching the evolution of punk music, I recommend Blink 182.



Some restaurants now serve olive oil, rather than butter, with bread. That's a healthier choice since the oil contains mostly monounsaturated fat instead of saturated fat. According to the University of California, Berkeley School of Public Health Wellness Letter, a study was recently done right here in Champaign where 340 diners in an Italian restaurant were served either a small dish of oil or the same amount of butter with a basket of bread. It was found that the diners actually consumed 26% more oil than butter per slice of bread because bread soaks up oil like a sponge. The diners using oil, however, ate 23% less bread than those using butter so ended up consuming 230 fewer calories. So,

Men knock off Danville, move into first place in CCCI

Parkland sophomore Maurice Mobley recorded his third straight double-double scoring 16 points and hauling down 11 boards to help lead #25 Parkland to an exciting 61-58 victory over Danville Area College. In addition to his points and rebounds. Mobley added four blocked shots and had two steals to help the Cobras hang on for the win. Teran Lee added 14 points while Chris Bunch scored 11 to help key the victory. Parkland led 60-53 late in the contest, but three consecutive missed free throws and a 3-pointer by Danville's

JD Clampitt cut the margin to 61-58. Following a Cobra turnover at half court with just 1.9 seconds remaining, Danville had one last chance to send the game to overtime but the shot came up short.

The win, coupled with a loss by Lewis and Clark, moved Parkland (16-4 5-1) into first place in the CCCI, just a half-game ahead of ICC and Lewis & Clark (who they play on Saturday in Godfrey). Following the Saturday contest, Parkland will host Spoon River at 7:30 on Monday night.
