Parkland offers Kiswahili classes

Kiswahili, spoken by over 50 million people (some sources say as many as 100 million), is the most widely spoken African language. Beginning January 26, Parkland will have added a few more speakers to that total.

Kiswahili, often referred to as simply "Swahili", is different from most other African languages in that it is nontribal, and is used for intranational communication, especially in Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi,

Eastern Zaire, Northern Zaire, Northern Malawi, Northern Mozambique, northern Zambia to as far as Somalia, as well as by some people in Congo, Southern Sudan, the Comoros Islands, Northern Malagasy Republic, and the Persian Gulf states. The language is a mix of African, Persian, and Arabic languages, and the word "Swahili" means "coast". The exact time of this language's origination is unclear, but it is known that Kiswahili was spread throughout the world

originally by traveling merchants and later by Christian missionaries.

Teaching Kiswahili Parkland will be Leonard Muaka from Parkland's Department of International Education. The class, Beginning Kiswahili 1, will be an afternoon discussion/ lecture format class worth four credit hours. It will meet from four to six on Mondays and Wednesdays. Registration for this class is still open.

Out with the old, in with the new

On January 22 and 23, the college center was filled with books and magazines marked "free" by the Parkland College Library. No Parkland student could've missed the display, not only because there were so many books and magazines,

but rarely can a college student pass up and offer deemed "free".

Why were these books so generously given away? Were they old? Decrepit? Diseased? Of course not, this was merely the end result of a library process called deselection, or more commonly known as "weeding"

"The Parkland College Library had not been extensively weeded in over 10 years," explained Anna Maria Watkin, Library Director,

weeding process is a long, extensive process incredible amount free library books of time and effort

by many Parkland Library employees. Parkland's zines that are outdated, under circulated, or no longer appropriate for courses offered at Parkland College. Weeding is not a process in which books are devalued. In many cases, updated versions or other materials with more current, accurate information replace the books sold or given

"The only types of books we do not weed are literature and art books," informs Watkin. Most of the books given away last week were related to Economics, Business, and

tremely important.

Social Sciences, which have Library employees. Parkland's faced vast changes in the past few decades. "We also don't weed books from special collections that are unique to our library. For example, the clock and watch collection, though no longer course related at Parkland College, is circulated from our library to all parts of the nation."

Parkland The College Library contains over 121,000 items and during the past year, January through December, 2003, 4,304 books were weeded. In that period, they added 3,286 books. It is obvious that without weeding, space would be quite limited. However, space is not the only concern. The books offered in the library also contribute to Parkland's accreditation, which is exment increases and in turn, more programs are offered.'

On exciting endeavor that the Parkland Library will soon be facing, is the conversion to the Illinois Library Computer Systems Organization (ILSCO). Parkland will not actually undergo changes until August of 2004, but as of February 2, 2004, Parkland student I.D. cards will be accepted at over 60 ILSCO libraries. This will provide an incredible resource for students.

The library staff works hard at meeting the interests and needs of all Parkland students and faculty. They are always open to suggestions and requests which can be filled out at the suggestion box at the library, or online at www.parkland.edu/library.

a limited number of exhibiting artists provides audiences an opportunity to see a body of work by each artist, allowing a more comprehensive view of the artist's personal style.


Co-curators Berti and O'Donnell will provide a gallery talk at 7 p.m. on

The artists they invited all create functional pieces yet vary in their approach to, and the aesthetic embellishment

of, their work. Each artist has achieved true personal voice in his or her artwork and has been able to create surface decorations and patterns that relate to the ceramic ware's functional use. February is national Black History Month, and Parkland has planned a feast of African-American cultural education.

Black History Month was started in 1926 as Negro History Week by the famous black writer/historian Carter G. Wilson. Wilson is known for his works edifying blacks instrumental in building our country and for his philosophy of history summed up by his famous quotation: "Those who have no record of what their forebears have accomplished loose the inspiration which comes from the teaching of biography and history."

Marva Nelson, from the English and Critical Studies Department, and Donna Tanner-Harrold, an advisor, are co-chairs of the committee that plans Parkland's celebration of BHM. (See above for a listing of events.)

Nelson, who mentioned that

Black History Month is the shortest month of the year, said she was especially excited about the Black-American Literature Read-In—held in the Flag Lounge in the College Center on Monday, February 2nd. Cynthia A. Biggers, of the English and Critical Studies department will be coordinating Parkland's participation of the nationwide event. (Don't tell Cynthia but some of her colleagues are planning surprise recognition for her.)

The read-in is not just a celebration of accomplishment but also it is intended to encourage literacy. Held between 11-1 p.m. whole classes are encouraged to attend as well as individuals. Participants can bring something to read or just watch. Biggers will have selections ready for anyone who wants to participate but doesn't have any material.

Black History Month approaches, and Parkland has a celebration menu worthy of the longest BHM since 2000 (the last leap year).

Increased security measures underway at Parkland College

On Monday, January 12, 2004, the first day of spring classes, many of Parkland College's students, faculty and staff were victimized in a burglary scam that spread throughout campus.

Wallets, purses and other personal items were stolen from five different office areas of the building. The suspect was reported to be posing as an outside contractor; either as an electrician or maintenance person and was able to gain access to several offices in six different areas of the college.

Approximately five incidents of theft were reported in this specific incident, with a total loss value of under \$100.00

Public Safety, along with the cooperation of the Champaign Police Department, has identified the suspect and is working towards making an arrest.

Due to the seriousness of these events, Public Safety is working towards making Parkland College a safer place. In a campus-wide e-mail, Von Young, Director of Public Safety wrote the following, "For the past two months, I had been working with a department of the college concerning this very issue. We were in the process of implementing an identification program prior to the incident on Monday (January 12).

Public Safety is immediately taking steps to avoid future campus security issues. Firstly, "any outside contractor hired by the college that will have outside personnel in the college for business or service, will be required to register with Public Safety. We (Public Safety) will maintain a log of all such visitors and will issue them a Dept. Of Public Safety 'vendor' badge."

The second step that will be taken is that members of the Physical Plant will be required to wear a college-approved uniform so that they will be easily recognized as Parkland employ-

The last step being implemented at this time is that employees of the Campus Technology Department will be required to wear visible identification so as to provide reassurance that they are Parkland employees.

Hopefully these changes along with employee cooperation will establish a safer environment for all who attend Parkland College. Young wishes to encourage all Parkland students, staff and faculty to call Public Safety (2369) if any occurrence ever seems out of place. It will take a combined effort to truly make Parkland College a safe campus.
