Nothing exciting to do this weekend? Want to escape from the mundane, even for one night? Well, this Saturday night, Jan. 24 at 7:30 pm, the Prairie Ensemble, C-U's awardwinning chamber orchestra, will present Funny Business. Though you may have not even realized that C-U has a chamber orchestra, or are not really even sure what a chamber orchestra is, the Prairie Ensemble have been performing in our area since 1996.

The mission of the Prairie Ensemble is "to make first-rate music fun, approachable, and affordable for everyone." It certainly is affordable. Tickets to events are \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors, and \$5 for children and students. (High school music students get a two-forone deal on tickets!)

The featured event this Saturday, "Funny Business," should prove to fulfill the Ensemble's mission of "fun" music. According to the season brochure, Funny Business will feature the oratorio "The Seasonings" by P.D.Q. Bach, a fictitious character billed as the "last and least" of the sons of the great Johann Sebastian. P.D.Q. Bach uses traditional instruments as well as the slide whistle, kazoo, and a fog horn in "The Seasonings." As

if that isn't enough entertainment, Funny Business will also include compositions of Joseph Haydn, Jean Francaix, George Antheil, and a halftime surprise.

Parkland alumnus and former Prairie Ensemble Board member Larry Nelson has been fascinated with the Ensemble for some time. "What attracted us to the PE right away is what Music Director Kevin Kelly does for his audience, and that is: he talks to you. He precedes each piece with stories and explanations," Nelson said.

"Sometimes it's anecdotal remarks, often times humorous, about the composer. Or he will set the stage for the piece historically, letting you get a feeling for what was going on at the time the piece was written - perhaps world events had influenced the composer, or maybe he had just split up with his wife, or maybe he was trying to one-up another composer. Sometimes he will just talk about the piece itself and what is going on in it-- and not with technical musical gobbledygook, but with explanations that any ordinary human can relate to," Nelson added.

The aforementioned Kelly was honored in 2002 with an award for "Meritorious Service in Orchestral Conducting."

Kelly shared why students would want to attend a concert of classical music rather than the same tired Saturday night fare.

Students might want to try it just because it's new and different and not what

Dr. Erwin Hoffman, music professor here at Parkland, is set to retire at the end of the current semester. Dr. Hoffman, who insists on being called Ernie, has been teaching at Parkland for 34 years.

Dr. Hoffman received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in music from the University of Nebraska before attending the University of Northern Colorado to earn his Doctorate. He then taught high school band for nine years, and

He is the director of the State-Street Strutters; a band that plays ragtime tunes in retirement homes each Tuesday night. Dr. Hoffman plays the piano, tuba, and French horn.

young by being exposed to the culture of young people and the adaptation that results.





## Parkland regional high school academic competition

Parkland College will host the regional competition for Academic Challenge sponsored by WYSE (Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering). Teams from eight area high schools will be tested in math, English, chemistry, physics, biology, engineering graphics, and computer science. The event is scheduled for Tuesday, February 13, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Parkland College gymnasium. WYSE is affiliated with the University of Illinois. The following schools will send representatives: Champaign Centennial High School, Heritage High School, Monticello High School, Tolono Unity High School, University Laboratory High School, Atwood-Hammond High School, St. Joseph-Ogden High School and Mahomet-Seymour High School. The top team from each school-size division will advance to the sectionals at Eastern Illinois University. School-sized divisions 700 and 1500 will compete on March 2. School-sized divisions 300 and unlimited will compete on March 4.

The state finalists will compete at the University of Illinois April 19-22.

## Natural Sciences Department announces spring workshop

The Institute for Science Education and the Natural Sciences Department of Parkland College is proud to announce a series of public workshops for the spring. Teachers can receive professional development recertification credit (CPDUs) for most of the following offerings.

WILL meteorologist and Parkland earth science instructor Ed Kieser will offer two workshops in February. First, Kieser will discuss the challenges of forecasting in central Illinois and the different types of weather we experience in "Central Illinois Weather," offered on Saturday, February 7from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. One week later, on February 14, Kieser will present "Severe Storms," a workshop focusing on tornadoes, downbursts, derechos, hail, and lightning, as well as storm prediction and storm safety. Both workshops include a tour of WILL's meteorology center and studio. The cost is \$29 per person for each session

Misconceptions about biolog-

ical evolution will be explored in "Evolution: The Myths and the Realities," a workshop offered by Parkland biology instructorMary Severinghaus on March 16 and 18 from 6: 30-8 p.m. Find out how these misconceptions can create unnecessary distrust of scientists by nonscientists and what scientists really mean when they discuss human evolution.

Join Parkland earth science instructors Dean Timme and Bob Vaiden for two geology field trips this spring. Participants will venture to Rock State the Starved Park area on April 17 for a workshop entitled "Canyon Development Along the Upper Illinois River Valley." The workshop runs from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. and transportation will be provided. On June 5 a second workshop, called "Sand Dunes and an Ancient River Valley," will take participants west to the Havana area to see land sculpted by glaciers, water and wind. The cost for each workshop is \$29.

Planetarium will offer several sessions this spring for Scouts working on merit badges. Girl Scouts can get help with their "Sky Search" badges by attending one of two workshops taught in the planetarium dome on either April 6 or April 15 from 7-8:30 p.m. The cost is \$4 per scout, including materials. Boy Scouts may attend one of three Astronomy Merit Badge seminars held from 7-9 p.m. on May 5, May 13, or May 18. The cost is \$5 per scout. You must preregister to attend any of these workshops. ## #6 ICC pounds #21 Parkland men

In a game of spurts, the #6 ranked Cougars of ICC pulled away in the second half for an impressive 75-56 rout of #21 Parkland in Champaign on Saturday afternoon. ICC (11-3 1-1) built a 17-point first half lead only to see the Cobras (12-4 1-1) close the game to three points on several occasions. Parkland trailed just 42-29 with 12:39 remaining before ICC hit back to back three pointers to expand their lead to 48-39 and Parkland could get no closer

Freshman Jon Edmison hit a half-court jumper with 0.1 seconds to go to lift Parkland to a come from behind 73-70 victory over CCCI rival Lincoln Land on Saturday afternoon. Trailing 66-61 with just 3: 51 remaining, Parkland tied the game at 66-66 on a lay in by Maurice Mobley and a 3pointer by Erik Young. After Lincoln Land went back ahead, Edmison stole a pass and went the length of the court to slam home a dunk to tie the game again. The teams traded buckets and the Loggers had the ball working for the final shot before the Cobras recovered a loose ball with just 1.0 seconds remaining.

Following a Cobra time-out. Erik Young threw a baseball pass to center court where Edmison heaved the game winner that spun around the rim before going 5 feet in the air and falling through the net for the game winner.

Edmison had a game high 17 points for Parkland (13-4 2-1) and was joined in double figures by Young who had 13 and Chris Bunch and Maurice Mobley who added 12 each. Lincoln Land (7-9 0-3) was led by Phil Hickey who had 14 points. Parkland will return to action on Wednesday night when they travel to Mattoon to play Lake Land at 7:30.
