Financial Aid online application is simple

Press release

The official, free, federal web site to apply for financial aid online is www.fafsa.ed.gov. If you're ever asked to pay a fee to file your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), you're on the wrong web site. You should never have to pay to apply for financial aid.

Following are the basic steps in applying for financial aid on-

More detailed information can be found on the government web site.

1. Before beginning to complete your FAFSA online:

—Apply for a PIN (if you don't already have one) at the federal web site.

—Gather all documents needed to complete the application. A list of what is needed can be found on the federal web site under "Before Beginning a FAFSA."

2. To complete your FAFSA online:

—On the federal web site (www.fafsa.ed.gov), select "Filling Out a FAFSA" and follow the on-screen instructions.

—When you've completed the entire application, review your answers carefully, and make any necessary changes.

—If you and your parent (if parental information is required) are using a PIN to sign the application, make sure that has been done.

-If you are going to sign a A-170.

paper copy and send it in, make sure you print the signature page.

—Submit your application by selecting the "Submit my FAFSA Now" button.

Once you've submitted your FAFSA, you'll automatically go a Confirmation Page that shows your confirmation number and estimated Expected Family Contribution (EFC).

Print a copy of the Confirmation Page for your records. If you don't get a Confirmation Page with confirmation number, your application has not been submitted.

3. FAFSA Follow-up:

—You'll either receive a paper Student Aid Report (SAR) in the mail about two weeks after you submit your FAFSA.

Or, if you put a valid e-mail address on your application, within five days you'll receive an e-mail with a link to view your SAR information online.

—When you receive your SAR, review all of your answers to make sure they're right.

If you estimated financial information on the FAFSA, compare your answers to tax returns or other records, and correct any answers that are wrong.

The good thing is that there are many places in the Champaign area that accept donations for all sorts of common house-

Clothes. We all have too many clothes, most we never really wear. While cleaning out your closet this spring, consider donating your clothing to different organizations. Scot Free Clothing Exchange, The Salvation Army, Salt and Light Ministries and Goodwill Industries accept all types of clothing donations. The Center for Women in Tran-

sition accepts women's and children's clothing donations, in addition to toys and other household items, the Round House accepts children's clothing donations and the Times Center accepts men's clothing donations.

Once you have cleaned out your closet, it is now time to clean up the rest of the house. First stop, the office area. While cleaning out your desk, you find more batteries, most being dead, than you have ever seen at one time, but before throwing them all away you should think about donating them to a recycling center. The Illinois Student Environment Network (ISEN) has many places around town to drop off those old batteries including their facilities, Strawberry Fields, University YMCA, Common Ground Food Co-op, Anita Purves Nature Center and Phillips Recreation Center.

In addition to all those batteries, you find that you have a variety of computer components all over the place, some you do not even remember what they are or do. Mack's Twin City Recycling accepts all types of computer part donations and also accepts scrap metal (as does Marco Steel.)

You have just finished cleaning your office, smiling from a job well done, until you realize that you really do not like that table in the corner. It would be a waste to throw it away since it is still in good condition, so what do you do? Borrow a friend's truck and take it over to Empty Tomb, Inc, where they accept all types of furniture donations, Before heading out to tackle the garage, you decide that the bathroom closet and cabinets could really use a good cleaning. As you go through and start throwing away expired medications, you come across one of the old thermometers. You mercury have been thinking about getting one of those digital thermometers, but before you throw that old thermometer away you might think about taking it to the ISEN facility. If you donate a well-packed mercury thermometer, they will give you a digital thermometer, and who would not like to save a few extra bucks?

Now that the house is clean, it is time to get rid of all the junk that makes your two-car garage into a one-car garage. There are several places around town where you can drop off motor oil and car batteries for recycling. Advance Auto Parts and AutoZone accept both, while NAPA Auto Parts accepts car batteries and Jiffy Lube accepts motor oil. Old tires can be dropped off at Kirby's Tire and Service Center, Tire Barn Warehouse and Tommy House Tire Co. While old paint can be properly disposed after adding sand or kitty litter and allowing it to completely dry in a well-ventilated area, you could also consider contacting a local church or shelter to see if they have any need for the paint.

Even though some places

may not be able to accept everything you want to donate or may charge a small fee, it is always worth calling to ask, especially when you could help others by donating things they need or to help the environment by recycling. Soon you will be able to start your spring clean, and I hope you consider these places before you throw everything in the garbage:

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Former Parkland student opens massage studio in Urbana

Ricky Cummings, a former Parkland student, recently opened up his own massage business, called The Body Shop, at his home just outside of Urbana. He attended Parkland from August '03 -August '04, and then became nationally certified so that he could get his licensed by the state and practice massage therapy.

Cummings also has a career as a physical therapist, and he currently works at Lifelines Results. He studied at Parkland and then transferred to Northern Illinois University where he earned his degree in 1998. Cummings has been practicing physical therapy for the past six years, while also practicing massage therapy on the side. He went back to Parkland because of the law that Illinois recently passed, making it mandatory for massage therapists to be nationally certified before they could practice in the state.

For the time being, he is still working mornings as a physical therapist, while saving his afternoons to build his clientele at The Body Shop. He takes massage clients from the hours of 1:30-5:30 every weekday. He is trying to build his business to about 16-20 clients per week, so that he can work independently as a full time massage thera-

This, however, is only the first part of his goal. Cummings plans on one day building a place, possibly on his own property, where he can work as a massage therapist/physical therapist/personal trainer. He dreams that one day he can completely work for himself, so that he can be more concerned with his clients than with his productivity, unlike in his current jobs. He wants to create a place where he can solely focus on the outcome of the client.

Cummings is a highly recommended massage therapist, is extremely qualified and has lots of experience. Before the law was passed that required him to be certified, he was a massage therapist on the side and even helped to teach classes, giving him lots of experience.

He is very professional, and works well with those who may be apprehensive about getting a massage. He is very good at making his clients at ease, and explains to new clients exactly what he will be doing so that they can let him know if something makes them uncomfortable. 




ing space.

Of course, Hollywood has been on a steady landslide of a decline for quite a few years now, only pausing from time to time to exhale a gem of a beauty. But, if you're interested in digging past Jerry Bruckheimer, billion-dollar productions, and canned California plots, then you probably will find some promise this spring. I've put together a small selection from various genres for your reviewing pleasure. If you don't like them when they come out, don't blame me, cast your stones the studios responsible for your misfortune. But I'll bet you'd be surprised how well some of my picks turn out. Action/Adventure: Sin City [R], April 1-When I first met Robert Rodriguez (the director), in Texas, he had only recently completed El Mariachi, which went on to become a series success with Desperado. He certainly has an eye for dramain-bullets. Pair him up with

boxer Mickey Rourke, scar-ridden Bruce Willis, Jessica Alba as 'Stacy the Stripper', and Benicio del Toro as the antagonistic dirty cop, and you get Sin City, which is a feast for even the pickiest action gurus. Shot in black and white and highlighted with bright colors (like red lipstick on a sassy vixen), and filmed as if the movie were a moving graphic novel, this film will be a crust-breaker on the super stale bread of the action movie industry. Shakespeare: The Merchant of Venice [R], March 4 (at Board-man's Art Theater)—Haven't read the play? Succinctly-because Shakespeare's plots are never simple—a Jewish moneylender in 16th century Venice (Christians are forbidden in that profession) ventures beyond the Jewish quarter into intolerant areas of the city to ply his trade. Enter Antonio, a Christian merchant who is ever more isolated by his best friend Bassiano's desire to travel to win beautiful Portia's hand. Antonio, short of cash, but in good moneylender); Antonio promises a pound of flesh in return, should he fail to live up to the bargain. Shylock's daughter runs away with a Christian, Antonio goes into debt with Shylock, and thus brings us to the famous demand for a pound of flesh for payment.

How does one make Shakespeare interesting and fresh at the box-office to lazy Americans (as a whole)? Well, you can rewrite a play to fit a modern era (see: Romeo and Juliet), use thespians that have already made their mark (see: Kenneth Brannagh's Hamlet), or use actors that Americans love (see: Mel Gibson's Hamlet). In this case, Al Pacino is Shylock, Jeremy Irons is Antonio, and Joseph Fiennes is the lovestruck Bassiano. A new face, Lynn Collins, commands our attention as Portia. If it were not for the likes of Al Pacino's great monologues and powerful presence, and Jeremy Irons' masterful temperance and acting, I probably wouldn't venture near another Hollywood-izing of Bill Shakespeare's fine literature... well, at least for a long time to

Thriller: The Jacket [R], March 4-Directed by John Maybury, a man who has lurked in the shadows, making mostly academic and askew art films; he has a big serving on his plate with The Jacket. Adrien Brody portrays Jack, a military veteran that goes on a mental journey into the future, "where he foresees his death and is left with questions that could save his own life and loved ones."

Comedy: Assisted Living [NA], Feb. 4-The Grand Jury Winner at the Slamdance, Woodstock, and General Art film festivals, which basically meant the film was a new concept that captured a variety of audience members. Directed by Elliot Greenebaum, the story centers on Todd, a janitor at a nursing home, who smokes pot and interacts with the residents for his own amusement, until the day he is mistaken by an elderly woman as being her son. The movie was shot at a real nursing home, starring real-life pa-

In courses where a final exam is not appropriate, as determined by the Department Chair, an educational alternative scheduled during the week of final exams is expected.

If your final exam is given earlier than scheduled, please contact the Department Chair or the Vice President for Academic Services (351-2542, Room A117).

Three final exams scheduled on the same day may be considered a conflict. Conflicts may be resolved by arrangement with the faculty

trons and residents, lending an extreme sense of reality to the movie. I definitely feel good about this movie's gift.

Documentary: Watermarks [NA], Jan. 31-In 1909, an athletic club was founded by the Jewish community in Vienna, Austria, because they were prohibited to participate in Austrian athletics due to the "Aryan Paragraph". The club was called Hakoah Vienna, and it contributed some of the world's top competitors in its time predating WWII, most noticeably its female swimmers, who dominated competitions for years. This is a story of seven women who competed and won, then escaped Nazi genocide thanks to the Hakoah Vienna's supporters. The seven continue to swim to this day. Directed, written, and produced by Yaron Zilberman, this true story adds a personal visage to the Jewish women who forced themselves to be better competitors than their Aryan counterparts, even in the face of severe adversity, racism, and finally, genocide.

Docu-Drama: Hotel Rwanda [R], Jan. 31-Already being compared to the story of Schindler's List, this movie is focused on one man, Paul Rus-

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esabagina (Don Cheadle), who saved the lives of 1200 Rwandans that were part of a genocidal mission. Nominated for three academy awards (Sophie Okenedo, Best Suppt. Actress; Don Cheadle, Bést Actor; Best Original Screenplay), Hotel Rwanda still has huge shoes to fill. The Rwandan massacres are still little known or understood particularly to Westerners, and this movie has a lot of ground to cover in order to educate the audience to the effect of giving us a real understanding of the heroism demonstrated. To this day, Felicien Kabuga, the business man who funded a genocidal campaign, is wanted by several governments for trial. At the very least, this movie should educate and inspire, and even provoke more sentimentality to the plight of Rwandan racism and

Epic: Kingdom of Heaven [R], May 6-Amanenters awar, serving a king with no future, falls in love with a forbidden queen, and becomes a knight. He has to protect the city of Jerusalem from an overwhelming army commanded by Saladin, while trying to keep order within the city walls. A crusade epic directed by the craftsman himself, Ridley Scott (Gladiator, Aliens, Blackhawk Down), already lends excitement. Here's the

smashing cast: Orlando Bloom (Balian of Ibelin), Eva Green (Sibylla), Jeremy Irons (Tiberias), David Thewlis (a Knight Hospitaler), Liam Neeson (Godfrey of Ibelin), and Ghassan Massoud (Saladin). Much work has been put into the smell, feel, and visual beauty of this movie, and I'm sure it will even eclipse Gladiator as the new epic masterpiece.

What else?-Of course, everybody has their own delights and interests, and these movies are just the hors d'ouevres that coax the palate into things to come. Just be wary of the junk out there that will spoil your appetite, but that is another article for another day...


