


### Mapping the Threat Environment of San Diego's Elected Officials

Targeted threats and the perpetration of physical violence against elected officials have been increasing steadily around the world. Democracy cannot function without individuals serving in elected governance. The presence and growth of threats and harassment undermines community cohesion, further undermining our ability to address our collective challenges.

# **A Problem for Democracy**



Of those who reported never being threatened or harassed:

52% believe threats & harassment against elected officials are a central issue

48% reported witnessing threats made against other elected officials

of all respondents believe that either all or most elected officials get threatened or barassed elected officials get threatened or harassed





#### **How Did We Do This?**

This mixed-methods project surveyed 328 elected officials in San Diego County, including school and community college representatives, city council members, mayors, and the board of supervisors. Additionally, a literature review, key informant interviews, traditional media review, and social media review were conducted.\*

#### **What's Next?**

Forty-five percent of respondents think we need new solutions to handle the problem. In May-June 2023, we will host community conversations around San Diego County to discuss findings and explore solutions. Our full report will include recommendations for how we should move forward as a community.

# Why Are Demographic Differences Important?

If targeted attacks are successful, under-represented individuals are likely to leave public office, undermining efforts towards inclusion.
