Simian Sketches Jackson Forte

Simian Sketches is an exploration and admiration for four different species of simians. The first movement is a characterization of the siamang gibbon, capturing their distinct vocalizations. The second is an inspection on the daily cycle of the western lowland gorilla, with the form of the piece outlining their day-to-day routine. The third is a caricature of the capuchin monkey, with their expressive faces and body language as the basis of the musical material. Lastly, the fourth is a take on the violent nature of the rhesus macaque, with a through-composed form and rough texture exemplifying this.

Three Pieces for String Quartet

Bryson Chaudhary

Three Pieces for String Quartet is a multi-movement work that centers on different styles of music. The first movement is straightforward and contains traditional motivic development. The second nmovement centers around different textures and creating movement through those textures. The third movement has four different themes that are all played in the beginning and then through the course of the music, each theme is developed and transformed.

Ripple Grey Montoya

Ripple delineates the evolution of a parent-child relationship as the family experiences the introduction of a new parental figure and is slowly transformed into a reduction of the original bond. It divides this journey into three phases preceded by a prelude.

Descuidado Andres Fierro

The genesis for *Descuidado* comes from a wide variety of ideas about mental health and the state of our emotional being, specifically at a time in history when we could hardly interact with our own world. I aimed to trail that state of mind, drifting from sentiment to sentiment while keeping some continuity in the wandering of the music. It finds itself yearning to resolve in some way or another but doesn't have quite enough pull to decide which direction to take alone. All that said, the ending looks to perpetuate that continuing uncertainty and present the notion that, perhaps, it's not such a bad thing after all.

Through the House of Hades

Tyler Fraser

Through the House of Hades was conceived from my deep love of Greek mythology. Hades' realm, the Underworld, is divided into three territories, each of which houses a different type of dead. The first and deepest down, Tartarus, is an eternal prison for whom Hades considers to be the worst of the worst. The cello begins this piece on the open C string, setting a dark tone and implying the C minor key. The second region, Asphodel, is subject to debate on what people it housed, and this section begins with a waltz that uses harmony that isn't strictly to major or minor. Finally, Elysium, is where Hades housed the most honorable mortals, usually warriors that died in battle. To reflect this in the music, I modulate to a major key, eventually tying the piece together with motives from the first section.

Experimental Sketches (for Piano)

Benjamin Davidson

Experimental Sketches (for Piano) is a set of 4 sketches for piano that makes use of purely extended techniques mixed with normal piano playing. With each new sketch a new kind of technique is introduced and is reused throughout the duration of the set. Throughout the score there will be various graphics that represent different techniques and collections of pitches played inside the piano. The intention of this piece is to explore different ways to write for piano with limited pitches and instead using a mix of extended techniques such as, plucking the strings, slapping the strings, strumming the strings, and scraping the strings to name a few. This first set of sketches I plan to be part of a much bigger set of sketches with a different collection of techniques and pitches. This piece is to be performed at a tempo set by the performer and will be performed from score as to make the performance as seamless as possible.

Four Duets Thomas Yamada

Four Duets consists of four distinct and unique short pieces that can be played as a set or individually. Each brief musical episode is about two minutes long. The composition explores different musical styles: a march, nocturne, waltz, and an unexpectedly solemn finale.

Duet for Clarinet and Bassoon

Bryson Chaudhary

Duet for Clarinet and Bassoon was written as a two movement contrasting work where each movement focuses on one of the instruments as the lead. The first movement is slow and expressive that features the clarinet in the lead, while the second movement is fast and energetic and is led by the bassoon.

Aiko Tyler Fraser

Aiko is a work inspired by Inio Asano's dark coming-of-age masterpiece, "Oyasumi Punpun". The piece reflects the life and evolution of its female lead, Aiko. The piece begins with jovial textures and moods, reflecting Aiko's childhood. But as the piece develops, the harmony becomes darker and the rhythms more intricate, creating a feeling of unease as Aiko navigates through the challenges of life.

Forgotten Woods

Sawyer Livsey

Forgotten Woods is heavily inspired by the music featured in video games, and it's the first piece I've written for strictly percussion. This piece got its title from the texture of sounds created by the marimba and glockenspiel together, giving the feel of a strange or unfamiliar forest, thus the title Forgotten Woods.

Into the Darkness Thomas Yamada

Into the Darkness was composed of the idea of adventuring into mysterious and unknown locations. It reflects this with the primary use of the two instruments' low registers. The marimba cello duet is a suitable combination with similar tone colors and timbres. Low register marimba tremolos, combined with hairpin dynamics, help shape the ominous quality. The cello adds emotional texture to the sound, creating a piece fitting its name.

Meadowlarks Jovanni Ferrer

Meadowlarks is the opening song of a song cycle titled 'Sara', where each piece is set to the poetry of Sara Teasdale. It is a sparse and dreamy recollection of a morning in April, where meadowlarks chip and fly above.

Waterlilies Jovanni Ferrer

Waterlilies is the 3rd song in the 'Sara' song cycle. It describes recollection of lost love and friendship, and how tainted memories are better forgotten.

Chaparral Alexander Elliot Miller

Chaparral is a duo for alto saxophone and classical guitar, commissioned for the 2020 California tour of the Duo Montagnard, the duo of Joseph Murphy and Matt Slotkin. The word "chaparral" itself refers to the vegetation, mostly short shrubs and bushes, that cover much of the dry, open and undeveloped inland Southern California territories. The shrubs themselves are dry, fast growing and burn easily, making them particularly prone to California wildfires. Covering approximately 5% of the state of California, I named this piece Chaparral in honor of the Duo Montagnard's tour through the southern California region.

ABOUTTHEDIRECTOR



DR.SEANHEIM is professor of music in the Hall-Musco Conservatory of Music at Chapman University, where he teaches courses and studio lessons, directs the Music Composition/Theory program, and conducts the New Music Ensemble. He also teaches courses in ethnomusicology and creativity in the University Honors program. His work as a composer, which frequently involves interdisciplinary elements, re-ects the

techniques and aesthetic of his own western tradition as well as principles and musical elements from numerous cultures. His most recent works explore human interconnectedness with environment/place by means of a musical language that increasingly re ects the intrinsic voice of nature.

Heim has received numerous awards, honors, and commissions from many prestigious institutions including: the Fromm Music Foundation at Harvard, the National Endowment for the Arts, New Music USA, the ASCAP Foundation Rudolf Nissim Prize, the Wang-Fradkin Senior Professorship at Chapman University, and most recently Visiting Professor at Western Sydney University. His discography includes releases on Sono Luminus, Eine Klang, and Capstone Records. He is the director of curriculum for the Nirmita Composers Workshop and serves on the board of the Savong Foundation.
