We remain inspired by the innovative prevention and response strategies our practitioner and research colleagues are administering as they work to support sexual violence victims in the time of COVID-19. At the Prevention Innovations Research Center, our work is moving forward as we carry on over Zoom or in masked socially-distanced meetings. Here are a few highlights:

- We hosted the Real Conversations Series this summer that resulted in thoughtful discussions between practitioners and researchers and engaging participant questions.
- uSafeUS® is being used on college campuses across New Hampshire; campus personnel are
 finding the technology platform enables them to support students regardless of their location.
 uSafeHS, our new high school healthy relationships app, is being piloted in eight NH schools.
 The team spent the summer working (over Zoom) with both a high school staff advisory board
 and student advisory board.
- Our seven PIRC interns are sharing their time, passion, and creativity on projects and are
 participating in a weekly class led by Jane and Caroline that challenges them to think about
 prevention in new ways.
- In collaboration with Dartmouth College, we are evaluating Dartmouth's 4 year Sexual Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) and we continue to serve as the evaluators for New Hampshire's

Rape Prevention Education (RPE) program.

COVID-19 has increased the challenge of getting sexual violence prevention and response resources into the hands of students. At the same time, isolation has increased the risk of sexual violence. To support campuses in their efforts, and in honor of DVAM 2020, PIRC is offering uSafeUS® at a special rate through the end of December 2020.



The uSafeUS app is available to college campuses at a reduced rate of \$1,000 annually.

In use at 24 colleges, uSafeUS helps protect students from sexual assault, relationship violence, and stalking.

We're excited to announce the pilot launch of <u>uSafeHS</u>, a new healthy relationships app for high school students! Funded by a grant from the National Science Foundation, PIRC has been working with a cohort of partner schools in New Hampshire to develop this groundbreaking app.

uSafeHS teaches students about healthy relationships and provides important resources and prevention strategies, putting a

powerful safety tool in the hands of high school students. It provides critical information and research-informed strategies in an easy to use format, allowing high school students to keep themselves and their friends safe.

Jennifer Griffith gave a talk to the SVRC entitled *Banking on Leniency: How Idiosyncrasy Credits Impact Responses to Sexual Harassment* where she presented a working paper applying the theory of idiosyncrasy credits to sexual harassment training.

Real Issues, Real Conversations

Conversations about preventing gender-based violence. Beginning this Spring, PIRC directors Jane and Sharyn worked with PIRC Fellows Nicole Fox, Tyler Jamison, LB Klein, and Joan Tabachnick to develop and coordinate *Real Conversations*, a series of virtual dialogues between researchers and professionals working to reduce gender-based violence. The PIRC team launched *Real Conversations* as COVID-19 was emerging, as a way to keep researchers and practitioners engaged from a distance.

Each of the four sessions explored a research topic chosen by a PIRC Fellow. Discussions focused on the real-world implications of

topics, and offered an opportunity for exchanging ideas and asking questions. 400 participants from the US, Canada, and Europe attended one or more session:

(1) Using the Social Norms Approach to Enhance Bystander Intervention with Alan Berkowitz, Ph.D, Independent Consultant, and Nancy Wahlig, MSW, LCSW, Director of CARE at the Sexual Assault Resource Center University of California San Diego; (2) Intergenerational Stories and Experience of Rescue During Genocide with Nicole Fox, PhD, Assistant Professor at California State University Sacramento, Division of Criminal Justice; (3) There Are No Simple Answers: Responding to the Complexity and Diversity of Those Who Harm with Joan Tabachnick, MBA and Rachel King, PhD, Title IX Coordinator, Curry College; and (4) Centering LGBTQ+ Students in Addressing Alcohol's Role in Campus Sexual Assault with LB Klein, MSW, MPA, PhD Candidate and Injury and Violence Prevention Fellow, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Social Work and Rachel Stewart, Ed.M., Director of Sexual Assault Prevention and Response, Connecticut College.

Meet Jennifer Griffith, PIRC Faculty Fellow



Dr. Griffith is an Assistant Professor of Organizational Behavior and Management at UNH, Director of the Modern Work Lab, and a Faculty Fellow at UNH's Prevention Innovations Research Center. She earned her doctorate in Industrial-Organizational Psychology with minor in Quantitative Psychology from the University of Oklahoma in 2013.


She teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in organizational behavior and human resource management at the Peter T. Paul College of Business and Economics at UNH. Her multi-disciplinary, mixed-method research focuses on cognition, social dynamics, and complex problem solving, frequently in

relation to leadership and most recently through a gender-based lens and in sexual harassment prevention contexts. Her work in these areas has been published in the Leadership Quarterly, Human Resource Management Review, Journal of Occupational and Organizational Psychology, Industrial-Organizational Psychology: Perspectives on Science Practice, Journal of Computer-Mediated Communication, and Computers in Human Behavior, among others.

Dr. Griffith has served in numerous positions guiding, conducting, and implementing research-driven interventions, including as a project manager on grants and contracts funded through the National Science Foundation and a US defense contractor; as a research consultant for two state-level governmental agencies; and as an affiliate research partner on organizational innovation and leadership development projects in the energy and technology sectors.
