

## Weight stigmatization and disordered eating in obese women: The mediating effects of self-esteem and fear of negative appearance evaluation(Article)

**Objective** The aim of this study is to examine whether self-esteem and fear of negative appearance evaluation are significant mediators in the association between weight-related self-devaluation and disordered eating. **Method** A sample of obese Canadian women ( $N = 111$ ,  $M$  age = 40.9,  $SD = 10.2$ ) completed the Weight Self-Stigma Questionnaire (WSSQ), the Rosenberg Self-Esteem Scale (RSES), the Fear of Negative Appearance Evaluation Scale (FNAES), and the Eating Disorder Examination Questionnaire (EDE-Q). **Results** Self-esteem mediated the relationship between weight-related self-devaluation and restraint and weight concerns, whereas fear of negative appearance evaluation mediated the relationship with weight, shape and eating concerns. **Conclusion** Since, for obese women, self-esteem and fear of negative appearance evaluation are likely to maintain disordered eating, they should be more frequently taken into

consideration by researchers, health professionals and public policy stakeholders.
