FROM THE DEAN

Among the works of art in Booth Library is the image of a monk, high up in the west side of the library's Marvin Foyer. This stained glass window is especially striking and beautiful as is highlighted on the front cover of our Annual Report. Monks are advocates for libraries: they are frequent readers and historically worked as scribes to preserve history and share knowledge — all in an effort to serve others. Such a mission has ongoing relevance today.

It was such a pleasure to serve as the Acting Dean of Booth Library Services during the 2022-2023 academic year. Our librarians and staff bring innovation, professionalism and a deep commitment to serve all who request our assistance.

This year, we were pleased that a number of faculty librarians attended professional research conferences. Kirstin Duffin and Todd Bruns attended the Association of College and Research Libraries conference held in Philadelphia. William Schultz participated in the annual meeting of the American Library Association Conference in Chicago. Steve Brantley and Amy Odwarka also attended the University of Illinois' Faculty Summer Institute. Other library faculty attended online conferences, seminars and workshops, which reflect the library's ongoing desire for and commitment to professional development.

We also implemented a number of new student programming activities, such that our students better understand the library's resources and how we can foster student success. These activities included a library "scavenger hunt," structured study nights with a buddy, the creation of a new library student advisory group, and we purchased vintage video games to help students relax during finals, among other activities.

We also partnered with our campus residential living learning communities to bring other groups of students into the library, and we continued our partnership with the Athletics Department as the West Reading Room serves as a de facto study hall



for our student-athletes.

Our Center for Student Innovation (CSI) hosted a range of technology training workshops, and the CSI itself became an increasingly popular location for class meetings, university board meetings, and student group gatherings. We anticipate that the CSI's impact will only grow stronger in the years to come.

After a national search this academic year, we are delighted to welcome Brian Keith as our new Dean of Library Services, effective July 1, 2023. Brian comes to EIU from the University of Florida, where he served as a faculty member and associate dean. A short biography of Dean Keith is on the following page.

Dean Keith has a wealth of experience in libraries, including an impressive record of library scholarship, innovation in patron services, grant writing, and digitization of library resources, along with the effective use and transformation of spaces within libraries.

This year we also resumed welcoming our former colleagues for a holiday reception. Many of our former colleagues remain connected to the library and also support us in varying ways. We are always grateful for their ongoing interest in the library.

In addition, we continue to receive financial gifts and support from many others. Please know that all of your gifts make a difference and provide us with new opportunities to make our library a better place. LIBRARY LEADERSHIP Brian Keith named Dean of Library Services

After a nationwide search, Eastern Illinois University selected Brian Keith to lead Booth Library as EIU's Dean of Library Services.

"I am beyond excited to join the incredible team at Eastern Illinois University," Keith said. "The University's profound commitment to scholarship and student success are passions I share, and I value the opportunity to further enhance EIU's reputation for excellence across Illinois and beyond. I am extremely impressed with the accomplishments and passion of the Booth Library team, and honored to have the opportunity to contribute to their continued success and positive impacts for the EIU community."

"We are pleased to welcome Brian to Eastern Illinois University and eager to see how his transformative leadership style will enhance the Booth Library experience for our students, our faculty, and for our diverse communities," said President Jay Gatrell, who was Provost at the time of the announcement.

Keith joined EIU on July 1, 2023, after 17 years with the George A. Smathers Libraries at the University of Florida in Gainesville. His service at UF spanned several progressive administrative and library faculty roles, including his latest position: University Librarian as Systems Analytics Librarian and Co-PI on Revitalizing the Digital Library of the Caribbean, a grant awarded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. He served as Associate Dean (2012-22), Assistant Dean (2009-12), Assistant Director (2008-09), and



Program Director (2005-08). Keith's career highlights include strategic planning and goal setting, organizational development and culture change, envisioning and establishing library services and operations, and space design and renovations. He was responsible for launching a variety of new programming models with a focus on the libraries as co-educators and partners in research. Common to these accomplishments is a deep commitment to diversity, equity, accessibility, and inclusion. Keith has robust experience in critical areas like fundraising, budget management, and team building across campuses and curriculums. As a first-generation college student, Keith worked to position students to succeed in establishing the academic foundation for a good life. As a library faculty member, he cultivated broad advocacy around academic and research libraries and their evolving contributions in higher education and society, helping to foster collaborative

opportunities and inspiring the use of emerging and innovative technologies to achieve library and more overarching university goals.

Keith's approach to library management and leadership is further strengthened by grants totaling over \$2 million, extensive professional services, and national and international contributions to industry conferences and presentations. His scholarly accomplishments include five books and numerous book chapters, refereed journal articles, and conference papers. His leadership was recognized with the national SirsiDynix-ALA-APA Award for Outstanding Achievement in Promoting Salaries and Status for Library Workers.

Keith is also an experienced college instructor, having taught a course on information science and intellectual freedom through the UF Honors Program. He earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology and an M.B.A. from the University of Florida in 1994 and 1996, respectively, and an additional master's degree in Library and Information Science from the University of Washington in 2016.

Joining Keith in Charleston are his wife, Elizabeth, and their children, Isabel and Benjamin. Elizabeth will continue her role as an information technology executive in the private industry. Izzy will be a freshman at Charleston High School this fall and Ben will be an occasional visitor as a freshman at Florida Polytechnic University.

AWARDS and RECOGNITION

Annual report, newsletter earn PR awards

Booth Library was the recipient of two awards in the 2023 PR Xchange Awards Competition. The national competition recognizes the Reports/Strategic Plans category, very best public relations materials produced by libraries in the past year.

Over 215 entries in print and electronic formats were submitted from over 100 institutions, including public, academic, school, state, and special libraries. Entries were evaluated by a jury of 15 virtual judges.

Booth Library won awards for its FY22 Annual Report in the Advocacy/Fundraising/Annual and for the library newsletter, NoteBooth, in the External Communications category.

Submissions were assessed based on the quality of content, format, design, creativity, and originality. The jury, which included a group of talented marketing professionals, graphic designers, librarians, and visual artists, were very impressed

by the innovative work submitted by these libraries.

Winning libraries were honored at the PR Xchange Event on June 25, 2023, at the American Library Association Annual Conference in Chicago.

The PR Xchange Committee is charged with coordinating the annual awards competition, under the direction of the Awards and Scholarships Subcommittee of CORE, a division of the American Library Association.

EXHIBITS and DISPLAYS Zella Powell, Ona Norton featured in exhibit

Booth Library presented a special exhibition, Women of Distinction: Zella Powell and Ona Norton, during the fall semester of 2022. The former Douglas Hall on the EIU campus was recently renamed to honor these women with strong ties to the university and Mattoon and Charleston communities.

Zella Powell is believed to be Eastern's first Black graduate, Class of 1910. Zella and her family were from Mattoon, and her granddaughter, Stephanie Wright-Griggs, created an exhibit about Zella titled Picture Perfect: Zella's *Traveling Scrapbook* that features many photos of Zella's childhood, in addition to keepsakes such as a scrapbook and diary. These were on display as part of the library's exhibit.

Ona Norton is best known for helping to house Black students beginning in 1950. Norton herself

Booth wins ILA Atkinson Memorial Award

Booth Library was the recipient of the Illinois Library Association's 2022 Hugh C. Atkinson Memorial Award for Interlibrary Cooperation, which is awarded annually for sustained activity and contributions having a lasting impact on librarianship.

In 2021, EIU's Booth Library was awarded a grant from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity's Illinois Broadband READY program. The library received \$44,000 to create a digital literacy program for the Southeast region of Illinois. With the grant funds, a digital literacy coordinator was hired to create curricular materials related to digital literacy for all ages - from elementary school students to retirees.

With proper feedback, the digital literacy coordinator successfully created a robust

DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

ACQUISITION SERVICES

Acquisition Services is responsible for ordering and receiving materials selected for the library's collections, managing the book and materials budget, and receiving and processing gift items. The department purchases materials in various formats, both print and electronic. Materials are acquired through multiple methods, including direct payment, subscriptions, and gifts from donors and institutions. In addition, **Acquisition Services** supports the work of the

CATALOGING SERVICES

Cataloging Services creates and maintains bibliographic records and provides metadata for physical and electronic resources owned by Booth Library. This unit also prepares resources to be accessed and borrowed directly by our patrons. The foundation of this work is to accurately describe these resources and to provide additional terminology and organization to make them easily discoverable not only to EIU students and other local patrons, but to remote students and researchers worldwide through services such as interlibrary loan. Resulting from its work, Cataloging Services processed approximately 6,600 physical items, and participated in the loading, metadata creation, and accessibility of tens of thousands of electronic resources.

Over the year, Cataloging Services has progressed in taking advantage of Alma functionalities, particularly in collaboration with Acquisitions and Collection Management to implement and leverage Alma workflows and capabilities with regard to e-resource management. Also this year, Cataloging worked closely with Circulation to develop and further refine other important procedures such as the workflow for lost/missing items as well as the process for installing book displays and exhibits. Cataloging Services has also been one of the primary operators in a major JSTOR deduplication project in which many print volumes of journal content that is duplicated in our permanent online JSTOR collection are able to be removed, helping to reduce obsolete clutter in our catalog and on our shelves. Cataloging Services has also worked with the University Archives over the course of the year to catalog a variety of hidden historical university publications, making them discoverable for our patrons.

DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

CENTER for STUDENT INNOVATION

The Center for Student Innovation (CSI) on the lower level of Booth Library includes three large areas: an Active Learning Classroom, a Design Lab with adjoining breakout rooms, and a Technology Checkout Station. The CSI is home to a variety of technology, including a podcasting studio, virtual reality lab, 3D printers, Google Jamboard, large computer monitors and a green screen, purchased with a grant from the Illinois State Library.

The Active Learning Classroom combines flexible furniture, mobile technology, and innovative teaching and learning programming. Use of the ALC encourages collaborations with partners across campus in all colleges. The Faculty Development and Innovation Center hosts a series of workshops and a Teaching and Learning Community in the ALC. The Technology Checkout Station provides laptop computers, webcams and other technology to students, who may check out equipment for a limited time period. Funding for much of the checkout equipment was provided through the Governor's Emergency Education Relief fund.

Renovation of the CSI space was possible thanks to a grant from the Charleston Area Charitable Foundation. Furnishings and additional technology were funded by private donors, and EIU Technology and Redden Grant programs.

CIRCULATION SERVICES

Circulation Services serves library patrons by ensuring items are on the shelf in the correct location and ready for checkout. The unit also manages course reserves, the off-site storage facility, donation pick-up, delivery of materials, incoming and outgoing bindery shipments, and mending. The Interlibrary Loan staff request items from other libraries and also sends requested items out to other libraries. Circulation staff are present all hours the library is open.

The Library Technology Services desk provides front-line support for a heavily used public computer lab, manages reservations for group study rooms, delivers DVDs, CDs, and other media to departmental offices, and manages media reserves.

COLLECTION MANAGEMENT SERVICES

Collection Management Services encompasses all collection development activities and oversight of federal and Illinois government documents. Over the last year, we selected general interest and reference materials, popular reading books, library science books, and graphic novels for purchase. In coordination with the subject bibliographers, we evaluated electronic resources for potential acquisition. In FY23, Booth Library began a subscription to Gale Research Complete, a large multi-disciplinary package that added many new full-text databases, ebooks, and digitized historical primary sources to our collections. Other additions include 2023 Springer ebooks and 140+ books acquired through a Workforce Development Grant from the Illinois State Library. We renewed our CARLI database selections, the core of our database offerings; continued participation in CARLI's member-funded ebook program; and collected and analyzed usage statistics for external reports and for subject librarians' use during the annual periodical and standing order review. Collection Management generates monthly reports on new e-resources for distribution to Booth faculty as well as specialized reports on library collections upon request. Department members also organized a number of displays promoting library materials.

DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

DIGITAL INNOVATION and SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATION

The Keep is the open-access institutional repository of Eastern Illinois University. It includes faculty and student scholarship, peer-reviewed articles and journals, awardwinning papers, historical images, video and audio files, administrative papers, and much more. Since its launch in November 2011, nearly 97,764 items have been added to the repository, resulting in 5,043,939 downloads to over 54,305 institutions in 235 countries around the world. Professor Todd Bruns, head of Scholarly Communication, manages The Keep.

In response to the State of Illinois Open Access Act, each EIU faculty member has a SelectedWorks profile page. The Keep now features individual SelectedWorks profile pages of 466 EIU faculty, representing every academic department at EIU. Every October, the Celebration of Scholarship, Creativity and Engagement booklet production and reception is the impetus for SelectedWorks faculty pages to be updated with full text and links to the published scholarship of the previous academic year. The Keep also functions as a platform for meeting State of Illinois code requirements for metadata and linking of selected content to the Illinois State Library, in tandem with the head of University Archives and EIU Marketing.

The Keep hosts six academic journals, and highlights special collections such as collaborations with academic departments like the Stover-Ebinger Herbarium. Exhibit and conference events are hosted via The Keep, and this service was especially crucial during the COVID pandemic. The Keep hosted several online conferences, including the Making Excellence Inclusive RISE conference; the English department's Lions In Winter 2023; and the College of Education's I'll Teach in Fall 2022 and Spring 2023. In each case a unique event site was designed and set up for the conference, with special pages set up for registration, speaker biographies, and event schedules. EIU community connections are strengthened via The Keep, with projects such as the Fire for Effect Vietnam history collection, featuring interviews with former servicemen from Decatur, Illinois, and the Post Amerikan historical alternative newspaper digital collection project, in collaboration with the Bloomington Public Library. New content is continually added to these ongoing collections.

The Keep is an essential platform for promoting EIU student scholarship and publications. It features digital collections of the EIU yearbook The Warbler, the English department creative writing publication The Vehicle, and all Daily Eastern News issues going back to 1915. The move to all-digital depositing of theses in 2020 has made the process easy and safe for students. Forty-three theses were posted to the Master's Theses collection, bringing the total number of theses in the collection to 4,987. Among the most popular content, these have been downloaded 2,559,707 times around the world.

In the 2022-2023 academic year, the top downloaded items from The Keep were "The Development of Serial Killers: A Grounded Theory Study," a master's thesis by Meher Sharma with 229,258 downloads; "A Quantitative Study of the Source of Stress for First Generation Freshman Female College Students," a master's thesis by Amber Byrley with 55,083 downloads; and "Involve Me: Using the Orff Approach within the Elementary Classroom," an award-winning paper by Amanda Long with 39,172 downloads. The top faculty paper was "Ports of Slavery, Ports of Freedom," by Charles Foy, with 18,387 downloads.



DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

RESEARCH, ENGAGEMENT and SCHOLARSHIP

RES librarians provide support to students as they navigate the complex information environment available at EIU's Booth Library. Faculty librarians provide personal consultations, and are available through chat and e-mail 24/7. Over the last year librarians provided 144 one-on-one research consultations and taught information literacy in the library, through Zoom and in classrooms. More than 3,500 students received library instruction during FY23, in 330 sessions, and 2,215 research questions were answered by RES staff. The librarians continue to serve students with innovative and creative instructional methods designed to meet student needs.





The Ballenger Teachers **Center primarily serves** students and faculty in the departments of the **College of Education and** English. The center houses a collection of current preK-12 curriculum in each school discipline; kits that include educational games, reading assessments, literature circle books, and 3-D objects to aid instruction; puppets; an extensive juvenile literature collection, including information texts, picture books, middle level and YA fiction, and poetry; and audiobooks. During Family Weekend, BTC staff offered Family Reading and Legos at the Library activities on the Library Quad (pictured).

DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES & SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

University Archives & Special Collections are two distinct areas. The University Archives is the official depository for all university publications and records of historical and research importance. This includes university records transferred to the University Archives from departments across campus based on their retention schedules. Special Collections houses items that fall into categories that may include the following: Early imprints (United States and possessions, prior to 1801), books in limited edition of 100 copies or less, exceptionally fine books, expensive or collectible publications, and local history resources. Also within the University Archives & Special Collections framework is the Illinois Regional Archives Depository (IRAD), a state-owned historical and genealogical resource collection.

During the past year the University Archives & Special Collections provided research assistance both in-person and online to students, staff, faculty and community members. Assistance included aiding with archival research and responding to specific inquiries, including the history of technology on campus and queries about former students. Other notable queries during the last year included research into the sculptures that adorn the Physical Science Building and helping a researcher find information and photos related to Friederich Koch, Eastern's first music professor who served from 1899-1938.

Professor David Bell continued working on processing archival material documenting the history of The Little Theatre on the Square in Sullivan, Illinois. During the summer he processed scrapbooks that document the years 1957-1978. These will be uploaded into the Special Collections section of The Keep. The original scrapbooks, donated from Mr. Bell's personal collection of Little Theatre memorabilia, will be processed for archival storage and kept in University Archives.

Materials for addition to the archives collection were transferred from university departments and several donations were received from individuals. Donated or transferred materials included a 1917 class photo and diploma, two watercolor paintings by Lynn Trank (a former EIU faculty member), and several scrapbooks and photograph albums from the Office of Leadership and Engagement. The cataloging department processed and cataloged a number of items during the year for addition to the Archives stacks and Special Collections location.




