ARTHUR HONEGGER'S KING DAVID

In 1920, French dramatist René Morax authored a four-hour biblical stage drama on the life of David. Inspired by structures of Hindu theatre, he wrote many short scenes that would be executed in rapid succession. Morax wanted incidental music between scenes throughout the play; however, he completed the play in December, 1920 with only six months until the work's scheduled premiere. When several composers declined Morax' request to compose the music because of the time constraints, he asked conductor Ernest Ansermet and composer Igor Stravinsky for their recommendation. Both of them recommended then twenty-eight year old Arthur Honegger (1892-1955), a Swiss native composing in France.

Honegger agreed without seeing the libretto and with only two months to write twentyseven movements of music. He completed the music for *Le roi David* in nine weeks and, unable to even review or revise it, sent it to be immediately rehearsed for the June premiere. He identified Bach and Stravinsky as the composers whose musical style most influenced his composing of *King David*. Stravinsky's influence is noticeable in his polymetric and polytonal movements, and Bach's by his use of counterpoint, *turba* choruses, and a chorale-like melody.

Le roi David was an immediate success, and public admiration for the music impelled Honegger and Morax to revise it as a concert work. Honegger re-orchestrated the music for full orchestra, and Morax reduced his four-hour stage drama to a dialogue of about fifteen minutes that would link the musical movements. Edward Agate freely translated this narration into English and adapted it with additional text from the Bible; since then, performers have likewise judiciously adapted the dialogue to better communicate the biblical drama to audiences while preserving its authenticity.

A beloved cornerstone of twentieth-century dramatic choral works, *King David* is considered part of the great oratorio lineage extending from Handel through Mendelssohn, Liszt, and Walton. — *Ryan Kelly*
