Description: Books are the most important part of this collection and these represent two major interests of David Donoghue, petroleum geology and Texas history. The Texana cover every aspect of Texas history and include some books described by Brother Joseph Schmitz as "very rare, choice collector's items." There is a list of geological subjects in the donor file. The slides were taken by Mr. Donoghue from the 1953 to 1958 during the travels of Mr. and Mrs. Donoghue to North Africa and to South America

Chain of Custody: The collection was received by Saint Mary's University in 1959 and in 1961 from Mrs. William Watson, daughter of David Donoghue and executor of the estate of David Donoghue. It was one of the earliest collections received. See donor file 1959.1.

Biographical Note: David Donoghue of Dallas graduated from St. Mary's in 1909 with a Bachelor of Science degree in geology. He later became internationally known as a consulting petroleum geologist. Many of his books concerned early oil exploration in Texas. Mr. Donoghue was a student of history and wrote several research papers, pamphlets and articles on the subject of petroleum. In 1950 he was elected president of the Tarrant County Historical Society. (*San Antonio News*, January 27, 1961: 4A)

Slides

Descriptive Note: The slides date from 1948 to 1958 and record travels to North Africa, Paris, and Iberian America. They feature natural settings, local culture, and petroleum installations. Scattered among them are some family vacation photos. The places depicted in the slides are not always named. The names appearing as captions on slide frames are noted below. Mr. Donoghue's interest in these places may have resulted from petroleum exploration. **Processing Note:** The slides in the David Donoghue Collection arrived in twenty-two Kodak boxes provided by film processers that held from 24 to 36 slides each. A few of the slides have notations written on the frames giving a place name and sometimes a date. Some of the slide frames were stamped with a date by the film processor. Not all the boxes were full. The slides in the small Kodak boxes were sleeved in the order they had in the boxes. Another group of slides arrived in a metal box also without subjects or dates. The slides in this box were sleeved in the order they had in the metal box. These sleeves are in Folder SC8 Donoghue 3 and 4. (L Scrivani, March 29, 2018)

The dates written on the slide frames range from March 1948 to July 1953. The subjects include: Caracas, Cartagena and other sites in Venezuela, Kingston, Port au Prince, Ciudad Trujillo, Bogota, and west Texas, as well as Saint-Germain-en-Laye. [Saint-Germain-en-Laye is a commune in the Yvelines department in the Île-de-France in north-central France. It is located in the western suburbs of Paris about 12 miles from the city center.]

Pamphlets/Near Print Items

Descriptive Note: The pamphlets divide into three subjects: Physical Sciences, Mathematics, and Texas History. Most of these are reprints of articles published in periodicals that were sent to Mr. Donoghue "With the compliments of the author." A few are his own authorship. Three exceptions to this description are listed below. Frank Dobie is heavily represented in those on Texas history.
