Domestic-Partnership supporters won a major victory May 23 when computer giant Hewlett-Packard Co. announced that it would offer health care benefits to the domestic partners of its employees as early as next year. The move makes the company, with more than 108,000 employees and revenues of 31.5 billion, one of the largest ever to extend such benefits to its gay workers. Pay attention to when they effect this policy, aaaaaand you know who to buy your computer stuff from!

That has been the opinion of the vast majority of people, even those from large urban areas, since the epidemic began.

Lesbians do get AIDS, but theirs is a story that isn't often told. A lot of the lesbian specific AIDS/HIV information out there is word-of-mouth; because of their marginalized place in the world, those lesbians who are infected or affected by HIV have trouble finding the kinds of education, information, and support services that some gay men and straight people now take for granted.







# **Mary Lou Dietrich**


Considers deconstructing gender part of the process of waking up from the story of her life. She lives in the woods.

#### What are "Code Words"?

Code words are a discreet way of stating "she's a lesbian" or "he's gay" without actually saying it. While some straight people may be aware of the implication of terms such as "a friend of Dorothy's," "musical" and "Lebanese," few know the hidden meaning of phrases like "Looks like rain," "A half pound of Swiss, please" and "I'd like a receipt."

# What is the significance of the color purple in gay culture?

Purple is the color of royalty, supporting the popular theory that homosexuals descend from a long line of nobility.

### What is the meaning of the rainbow flag?

The rainbow flag represents the concept that gay, lesbian and bi communities are composed of people from all backgrounds and experiences. Now if we could all work as closely together as the stripes in the flag, we'd really get somewhere.....

### What is "outing"?

"Outing" is when you promote gay pride and visibility by publicly announcing that a famous person (who is earnestly hiding his or her sexual orientation) is queer, thus producing an angry, ashamed and fearful role model for gay youth everywhere. Still, when the target is a massively anti-gay senator who's been cruising boys in bars for years, outing can be irresistibly satisfying.

# Why do some lesbians, bisexuals and gay men use the word "queer" to describe themselves?

Because it's a whole lot simpler to say "queer community" than "lesbian, bisexual, gay and transgendered community." We're activists and we don't have time to be messing around with long, awkward terminology.

# Are lesbians and gays born that way?

No, we are conceived that way. Consider it an act of divine intervention.

Not only that, but for lesbians it's often organic.
