LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Have you been on a Zoom call today? If not, depending on your situation and work environment, it is likely you met recently with someone on Zoom to participate in a class, or a webinar, or to discuss work-related topics. Zoom, and other platforms, has enabled many of us to somewhat adapt to major changes in 2020, prompted by a pandemic, racial unrest, and the resulting economic consequences. But 2020 has also highlighted the differences many rural communities face with respect to broadband connectivity, health care, and a myriad of other social and physical resources. And all this occurred during a census year which has lasting impacts over a decade.

The Southern Rural Development Center (SRDC) has been assisting other organizations and groups as they pivot to virtual meetings while we continue to work on the emphasis areas identified by our Technical Operations and Advisory Committee (TOAC) and Board of Directors. These include rural broadband and digital literacy, heirs' property, retail workforce development, local foods, economic development, and racial understanding. This annual report summarizes some of the accomplishments of the Center and our 30 Land-Grant University (LGU) partners in the 13 southern United States and territories.

As I complete my fifth year as Director (and two as Interim Director) of the SRDC, I have learned a great deal about the rural South and the Land-Grant Universities that serve the region. The genesis of the Land-Grant system in 1862 is still relevant today as scientific inquiry and rapid information technology combine to address age-old (disease) and emerging (climate change) issues. "Reimagining a Rural Vision" is a theme that captures a future for rural communities where constraints are navigated, and opportunities embraced. A future different from the past but generated by current and future resources and plans. The SRDC stands ready, in conjunction with our LGU and other partners, to be a part of this future for every southern rural community.

Although 2020 has been a challenging year in many respects, it has forced us to realize the importance of coordination, collaboration, and science. We at the SRDC are fortunate to serve you and, on behalf of our Board and TOAC, look forward to a new decade of prosperity for rural America. COMING TOGETHER FOR RACIAL UNDERSTANDING



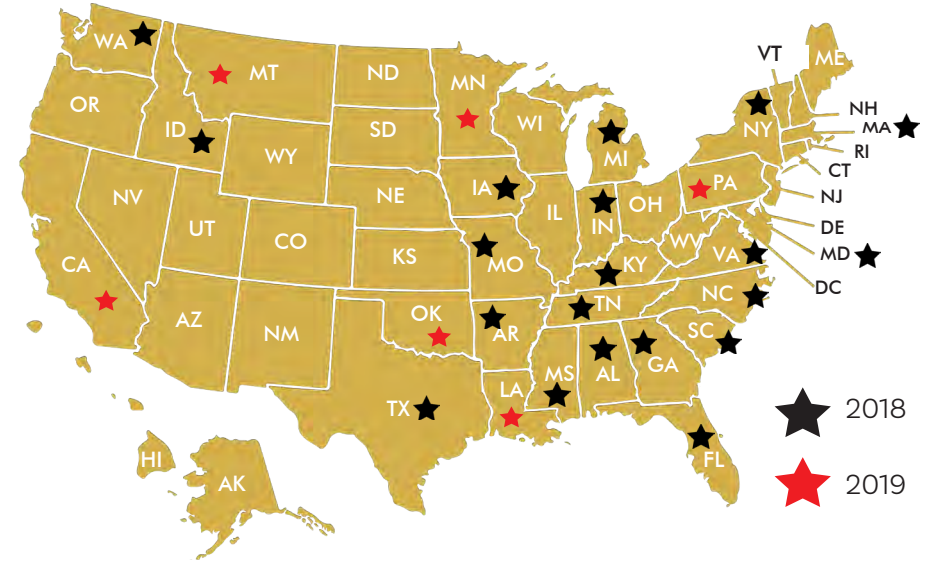
Coming Together for Racial Understanding has now been underway for two years with many thanks to the Extension Committee on Organization and Policy for launching this important work. To date, this support has helped to conduct two train-the-trainer events with a total of 26 states participating (August 2018 and October 2019). Each of the trained teams was tasked with working to expand the

pool of trained Extension professionals first, believing in the importance of doing our own work before launching into community efforts. As we moved through the end of 2019 and into 2020, these states are turning the corner to launch dialogue efforts within communities. While COVID-19 caused unexpected delays and retooling, teams are making progress. Below is a quick summary of key accomplishments.

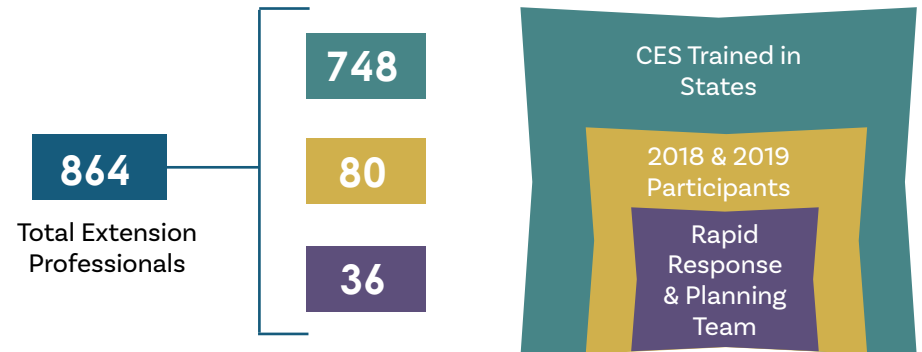


- 26** states that have sent training teams

SOUTHERN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT IMPACT STORIES



ENTREPRENEURSHIP & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Alabama A&M University is working with youth and adults to link interests with career choices and goals via the Career Countdown program that has reached over 4,000 participants to date.

University of Arkansas is training and educating local businesses on how to sell to local, state, and federal agencies through their Arkansas Procurement Technical Assistance Center, which helped businesses secure over \$169 million in contracts last year.

Clemson University has reached over 6 million people with programs focusing on business planning, agritourism development, grant writing assistance, and creating planning curricula for local foods producers.



COMMUNITY VITALITY

Florida A&M University is building the capacity of local communities through educational programs focusing on community & urban agriculture, heirs' property and estate planning, rural prosperity and resiliency, and recidivism and re-entry.

University of Florida is working with **Florida A&M University** on the Community Voices, Informed Choices program to help communities solve complex issues that disrupt community cohesion.

University of Tennessee is enhancing community vitality through several funded programs that support broadband infrastructure, rural health, and increased farm profitability.

University of Kentucky worked with a local community to secure funding through the First Impressions program which focused on downtown revitalization, public art installations, an outdoor classroom, a community garden, and an artist-in-residency program.



QUALITY OF LIFE

University of Georgia and the Georgia Department of Community Affairs is providing funding for Georgia Initiative for Community Housing communities through Community Development Block Grants, low-income housing tax credits, and funding to develop safe, affordable rental housing.

Prairie View A&M University partnered with the General Land Office of Texas to assist those affected by disasters. They have been able to help homeowners secure USDA repair grants, 504 program funding, and USDA low interest mortgage financing.

Virginia Tech & Virginia State University are supporting racial justice through the Virginia Coming Together for Racial Understanding state team that launched a virtual dialogue series and delivered a professional development training to better engage youth in discussions about race.



LOCAL FOODS

North Carolina State University is supporting youth entrepreneurship and local farms through the Vacationer Supported Agriculture program that allows vacationers to buy local produce through an online market.

Texas A&M University worked with the "Better Living for Texans Program" to secure CDC Farm-to-School funding for the Rafaela T. Barrera Elementary school. The school has a garden and fruit orchard that put fresh produce into student lunches.

CONCLUSIONS

- Southeastern counties where minority groups make up a majority of the population have a significant amount of heirs' property
- Challenges in identifying heirs' property include:
 - Variations in terms used to describe the property
 - Differing data management systems from county to county
- Given the challenges, data analysis requires ample time and financial resources

BONNIE TEATER LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Bonnie Teater is a special individual to friends of the Southern Rural Development Center. For 30 years, she provided valuable support and day-to-day assistance to the Center as a member of its staff. She served as an inspiration to all because of the dedication she brought to her work and her passion for the rural development research and Extension outreach mission of the region's Land-Grant Universities. She currently is enjoying retirement in Kentucky.

The Lifetime Achievement Award is awarded on even number years and honors the superior work of an individual who has made an important contribution to the Extension Community Development area. Below is this year's recipient.

MARK PETERSON



Before retiring in March 2020, Dr. Peterson served as a Professor of Community and Economic Development at the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture Cooperative Extension Service.

Dr. Peterson began his career in Community Development as an Area Specialist with the University of Missouri Cooperative Extension Service. After 14 years he made the move to Arkansas where he served as the Interim State Program Leader for 4-H Youth Development, the State Program Leader for Community Development, and finally Professor of Community and Economic Development.

After moving to Arkansas, Dr. Peterson launched what is now called Breakthrough Solutions, a collaborative effort that involves community leaders and citizens in developing a community blueprint and action plan to realize their desired future. This program has been successful in 26 communities and regions since 2008 and has led to projects and initiatives valued at \$76.7 million. One such success was the group dubbed "Moving Manila Forward" in Manila, Arkansas. At the state level, Dr. Peterson served on the Arkansas Rural Policy Team which led to the formation of the Arkansas Department of Rural Services.

Dr. Peterson has been published in multiple community development journals and presented at numerous national conferences including the Community Development Society and National Association of Community Development Extension Professionals. He has also taught workshops in five different countries including the U.S. Ukraine Foundation where he created a strategic visioning toolkit for various Ukrainian cities.

RURAL RESILIENCY - HOW TO SUPPORT MENTAL HEALTH IN RURAL COMMUNITIES



Stress is a mounting problem, and rural and agricultural communities present some particular challenges to providing effective support. Both acknowledgment of stress and access to mental health resources is an important strategy in building rural resiliency. This webinar discussed the current state of rural mental health and how rural stress is becoming more pervasive and a subject of public discourse. This webinar also explored key partnerships in this work, some innovative ideas and initiatives happening across the South, and ways you can get involved.
