Summer School in Session: Understanding Wine 101 The nine-week course will be taught every Wednesday at Stella

on the Oxford Square from June 6 through August 8.

Local wine lovers are in for a treat this summer, as Stella gears up for a nine-week wine-tasting course, Understanding Wine 101. Created and taught by the restaurant's co-owner Cindy Kirk, the course will begin on Wednesday, June 6, and take place from 6 to 7 pm each Wednesday through August 8 with the exception of July 4. Spaces are limited to 12 students per class; reserve your spot well ahead of time so you don't miss anything.

Each class will be conducted at Stella's bar and will focus on a different variety of wine, beginning with Chardonnay and covering several major styles

of white wines before tackling Champagne and then moving on to red wines. The price of each class will vary depending on the

number of wines tasted, anywhere from \$35 to \$60, and students will taste between four and six or seven labels in each class. For those who would like to attend all nine classes, the cost is \$350.

The idea for this course came about when one of the servers at Stella raved to her mother about Mrs. Kirk's server wine training, which is aimed to educate the restaurant staff so they can better advise guests who have questions about the wine list or need help selecting a wine. "One of the local servers was talking to her mom about

this, and her mother said, 'Oh my gosh, I would love this. See if Cindy would do this for me and my friends," Kirk said. "And that's how the idea germinated."

Overall, the main purpose of the course is just to have a good time and learn a few things about wine. "You can get a degree in oenology, and we're not going to go into the chemistry of it all," said Kirk. "I am going to explain some simple things like tannins and how winemakers use oak and [different] processes to flavor and come up with different styles of wine."

The first class will concentrate on Chardonnay, and guests will taste several different styles, including both oaked and unoaked wines as well as those that have undergone malolactic fermentation, which can give the wine a "buttery" characteristic. Each taste will consist of a 2 oz. pour, accompanied by some explanation by Kirk about the different processes involved in the making of the wine. By tasting the wines alongside each other, Kirk hopes that the winemaking concepts will be more accessible to her guests. "It's one thing for someone to tell you [about the processes]," she said. "If you're not tasting them side-by-side—an oaked versus an unoaked, or a malolactation versus a non-malo—they're just general concepts. But when you're tasting it side-by-side you really can get a deeper understanding."

The nine classes will cover Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Grigio, "other whites" including Viognier and Sémillon, Champagne, Pinot Noir, Merlot, Cabernet, and "other reds" such as Malbec and Syrah. Kirk says the most

> expensive class will be the Cabernet, at \$60, "but again that's six or seven wines, and some of these bottles are over \$100 apiece. So they're higher-end wines. In that class we'll be tasting Silver Oak Napa Valley and Silver Oak Alexander Valley side-by-side to see the differences."

So for anyone who loves wine and would like to learn more about how it's made, how to choose a wine to pair with a certain dish, or just taste some new varieties, Stella's Understanding Wine 101 class is sure to please and educate.

This would also be an excellent opportunity for local service industry workers to hone their wine skills and support another great local restaurant.

The NCAA Baseball Tournament Regionals are coming to Oxford

Should the SEC Tournament Champions Ole Miss Rebels win this weekend, Oxford will also host a Super Regional the weekend of June 8-10.

For the eighth time in program history, **Swayze Field** will play host to an NCAA Regional as **Ole Miss** baseball was announced Monday as the No. 4 national seed in the 2018 NCAA Baseball Championship.

The SEC Tournament Champion Rebels (46-15) will host No. 2 seed Tennessee Tech (48-9), No. 3 seed Missouri State (39-15) and No. 4 seed Saint Louis (38-18). Tennessee Tech and Missouri State will open the regional action at 2 pm on Friday, June 1, with Ole Miss and Saint Louis set for a 6:30 pm start that evening.

As a top-eight national seed, should the Rebels win their regional, they will also host a Super Regional the following weekend.

Ole Miss, ranked as high as No. 3 in the final polls going into the NCAA Tournament, is coming off its third SEC Tournament title run in history and its first since 2006. The Rebels fell in their opening game in **Hoover**,



Alabama, but reeled off four straight wins, culminating with a 9-1 drubbing of LSU in the SEC title game. They've won 11 of their last 13 games coming into the post-season.

Ole Miss has made the postseason for the 16th

time in 18 seasons during the **Mike Bian- co** era. All eight of the Rebels' regional host bids have come during Bianco's tenure.

The Rebels are one of 10 SEC teams to make the NCAA Tournament, tying a conference record, including one of four national seeds alongside No. 1 Florida, No. 5 Arkansas and No. 8 Georgia.



History Enthusiasts Mark Your Calenders for Off Square Books Events this Month

On Thursday, June 7, don't miss historian Joseph Crespino with his new biography, Atticus Finch.

It has been nearly three years since the publication of Harper Lee's once longdormant first novel, Go Set a Watchman, and the surrounding controversy in relation to its successor, To Kill a Mockingbird, the most beloved novel of modern American

literature. Both books, says Crespino, "became a kind of Rorschach test for the politics of race in the period that they were published."

Three years is time enough for the issue to have dissipated somewhat, and also time for Crespino to complete research on Harper Lee's central character, ". . . the orienting figure of both novels, that touchstone of decency and goodness itself, Atticus Finch," who was based on Lee's father.

Crespino's previous books on Southern politics and race, combined with his discovery of much unused or unknown research material, bring tremendous scholarship and insight to our understanding of Harper Lee and Atticus Finch.

We have been here before. On Wednesday, June 13, Pulitzer Prize-winning, #1 New York Times bestselling author Jon **Meacham** helps us understand the present moment in American politics and life by looking back at critical times in our history when hope overcame division and fear.

In this timely and revealing book, The Soul of America, with clarity and purpose, Meacham explores contentious periods and how presidents and citizens came together to defeat the forces of anger, intolerance, and extremism. Our current climate of partisan fury is not new, and in The Soul of America Meacham shows us how what Abraham Lincoln called "the better angels of our nature" have repeatedly won the day. Painting surprising portraits of Lincoln and other presidents, including Grant, Theodore Roosevelt, Wilson, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Truman, Dwight Eisenhower, and Johnson, and illuminating the courage of such influential citizen activists as Martin Luther King, Jr., civil rights pioneers Rosa Parks and John Lewis, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, and Army-McCarthy hearings lawyer Joseph N. Welch, Meacham vividly brings to life



In Atticus Finch, Crespino draws on exclusive sources to reveal how Harper Lee's father provided the central inspiration for each of her books. A lawyer and newspaperman, A.C. Lee was a principled opponent of mob rule, yet he was also a racial paternalist. Harper Lee created the Atticus of Watchman out of the ambivalence she felt toward white southerners like


him. But when a militant segregationist movement arose that mocked his values, she revised the character in To Kill a Mockingbird to defend her father and to remind the South of its best traditions. A story of family and literature amid the upheavals of the twentieth century, Atticus Finch is essential to understanding Harper Lee, her novels, and her times.



and the isolationist work of America First in the years before World War II; the anti-Communist witch-hunts led by Senator Joseph McCarthy; and Lyndon Johnson's crusade against **Jim Crow**.

Each of these dramatic hours in our national life has been shaped by the contest to lead the country to look forward rather than back, to assert hope over fear—a struggle that continues even now. While the American story has not always—or even often—been heroic, we have been sustained by a belief in progress even in the gloomiest of times. In this inspiring book, Meacham reassures us, "The good news is that we have come through such darkness before"—as, time and again, Lincoln's better angels have found a way to prevail. 📆





Sanctuary

Last week I left a minister speechless. It wasn't intentional. He only asked me a simple question and I answered him as honestly as I could. But he didn't know what to do with my reply.

Some background here...

Forty years ago I was a seminary student, training to be a minister through music and youth work. For ten years that's what I did fulltime. I continued to work in church music and youth ministry on a part-time basis off and on until about ten years ago. I also went back to

school and became a Licensed Professional Counselor, which is the way I now make my living.

There was a young woman who was in the youth group of my first church who died at the age of 47 a couple of weeks ago. I attended her funeral and afterwards the family asked me to stay for lunch with them. That's where I meet the pastor who officiated at the service. He did a 🗓 good job for the most part.

There were six of us at the table. We ate and talked and got to know each other a bit. When the minister was leaving he asked, "Where do you go to church, Randy?" With nary a thought I said, "On The Balcony above City Grocery." He looked bumfuzzled. "Do you know City Grocery?" I asked. He said he did. I continued, "I call it the First Conversational Church of the City Grocery Balcony'." Now he was the proverbial deer in headlights. He spoke not a word as he turned and left.

I looked at an old friend and said, "I hope I didn't offend him. I didn't mean to. He just asked me where I went to church and I told him."

So let me explain...

I'm not against organized religion per say. There is much good in it and I have had many good experiences in churches. I just don't do it anymore. As my spiritual beliefs evolved I was growing more and more uneasy about saying what I truly believed in the context of religious institutions and the fallout thereof.

A few years ago I went through an extremely tough period which left me flat on my face in the mud – more broken than I had ever been before. When I began to pick the pieces back up, there was one thing I decided to leave behind - the mask I'd been wearing.

The Balcony became a refuge for me. As I made more and more friends I began to realize the joy of the freedom of being my authentic self

> without fear. The Balcony became holy ground for me.

The vast majority of people I meet on The Balcony are open, friendly, caring, and lacking in pretense. And what I experience on most Balcony days is love. Pure and simple. And love is the heart all of the world's major religions.

Hardly a day on The Balcony goes by that I don't meet someone new or deepen my connections with those I now consider

family. They've seen me through some major ups and downs. They've cried with me and they've laughed with me. Sometimes they laugh AT me. I'm happy to laugh along.

From my crow's nest I get to see the flowers bloom and the rain fall. I get to swelter under the scorching sun and huddle against the piercing winds of winter. I see people in all states of life: young, old, happy, sad, sober, and overserved. And through all of this, of all Balcony dwellers, I am most greatly blessed.

So I go to the First Conversational Church of the City Grocery Balcony - every chance I get. Like the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) we don't have a pastor or a priest or a rabbi or an Iman or a Zen master. Love and kindness are the top things on the menu there.

(We don't pass the offering plate either, but we do make sure we tip well.)

...and that's the view from The Balcony. IN




