

Neil White Visits Thacker Mountain Radio September 26th with *Stories from 125 Years of Ole Miss Football*

To commemorate 125 years of **Ole Miss football** history, the **Nautilus Publishing Company** has published Stories from 125 Years of Ole Miss Football, a collection of stories and photographs that don't fit the typical "sports book" model.

Editor and Publisher **Neil White**, said, "We didn't want to repackage the same stories that have been repeated through the years. Every interview began with a simple question: Tell us a story most people don't know about."

White and his team of contributors—including Rick Cleveland, Billy Watkins, Robert Khayat, Jeff Roberson—interviewed more than 100 former players and coaches, as well as children, grandchildren, and widows of former Rebels. Some of the stories uncovered by the contributors include:

- The 1907 coach who got players drunk at halftime
- The season Archie Manning intercepted four passes
- The former Ole Miss player who was banned from the NFL . . . for life!

- The ten greatest Ole Miss NFL players IN



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
Square Books Jr Welcomes Young Adult Author Brittney Morris with Debut Novel *Slay*

Debut author **Brittney Morris** engrossingly explores the intersectional issues of social justice, community, and diaspora that will resonate with anyone who has questioned who they are and where they fit into the world in *Slay*. This powerful young adult novel follows fierce teen game developer Kiera Johnson as she battles a real-life troll intent on ruining the *Black Panther*—inspired video game she created and the safe community it represents

for Black gamers.

By day, seventeen-year-old Kiera Johnson is an honors student, a math tutor, and one of the only Black kids at Jefferson Academy. But at home, she joins hundreds of thousands of Black gamers who duel worldwide as Nubian personas in the secret multiplayer online role-playing card game, SLAY. No one knows Kiera is the game developer, not her friends, her family, not even her boyfriend, Malcolm, who believes video games are partially responsible for the "downfall of the Black man."

When a teen in Kansas City is murdered over a dispute in the *Slay* world, news of the game reaches mainstream media, and *Slay* is labeled a racist, exclusionist, violent hub for thugs and criminals. Even worse, an anonymous troll infiltrates the game, threatening to sue Kiera for "anti-white discrimination." Driven to save the only world in which she can be herself, Kiera must harness what it means to be unapologetically Black in a world intimidated by Blackness.



Drawing from her experience navigating being the first Black graduate from her high school and the only Black at her place of employment, in a feature with *Publishers Weekly*, Morris said: "I wrote Slay for Black teens who live between worlds as I did, who feel pressure to be one version of themselves at work or school, and only get to be themselves among people who share their experiences."

Brittney Morris is the founder and former president of the Boston

University Creative Writing Club. She holds a BA in economics. Brittney spends her spare time playing video games, slaying at DDR, and enjoying the Seattle rain from her apartment. She lives with her husband Steven, who would rather enjoy the rain from a campsite in the woods because he hasn't played enough horror games. INGREDIENTS Cake

- 1 cup butter ½ cup cocoa
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 large eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 cups AP flour
- 1 dash salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cups pecans (optional)
- 4 cups mini marshmallows

CHOCOLATE FROSTING

- 1 (16 ounce) package powdered sugar, sifted 1/2 cup milk
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1/4 cup softened butter

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350°F.
- Lightly grease a 9x13 inch pan.
- Melt the butter in a medium saucepan.
- · Add the cocoa and stir.
- Remove from the heat.
- Pour butter mixture into a mixing bowl and add sugar and eggs.
- Mix until blended.
- Add the vanilla.
- Mix in the flour and salt.
- Stir in the pecans.
- Put batter into prepared pan and cook for 35 minutes or until done.
- Remove from oven and sprinkle with marshmallows.
- Cool in the pan on a wire rack.
- For the frosting: Combine all of the ingredients and mix until smooth. Spread frosting on cooled cake.
- If your frosting is too thick, add more milk.

Alali Farm

Name: Alali Farm, run by Schuyler and Jane Oliver Dickson, their ten month old twins Dot and Aila, and Steve and Debra Dickson.

Hometown: Schuyler was raised in Canton and Jane Oliver in Greenwood.

What brought you to the area? We were living in Jackson and looking to start a farm around there. But we found a piece of land in Houlka, Miss., that checked all the boxes we were looking to check, so we bought it and moved this way.

Are you a full time farmer? Yes

How did you get started in agriculture? My parents had, for a long time, a pretty big garden in their side yard in Canton. When we moved back to Mississippi after grad school, we started farming a few raised beds in my yard. Each year it grew a little bigger. Each year we tried out something new.

What's a day on the farm like? It depends on the day. Most days, we wake up around five or six, go through our morning routine—my wife's a yoga teacher and I have my MFA in fiction writing, so we both have an hour or so of our morning practices. I'm usually out in the field around 8, where we are weeding, pruning, stringing tomatoes, building infrastructure, picking, or whatever else needs done. My wife and mom are inside testing recipes or shelling

or rearing babies. Usually, I'll come in around supper and eat, help get the girls to bed, and then try to get some reading in if I can keep my eyes open.

Local Folks

What's the best thing about working on your farm? Hands down, the best thing is being able to spend more time with family. I can just go inside, get some water and see my wife and girls whenever I want to. My parents live here, too, and being able to be around them and have my girls grow up next to their grandparents is a blessing.

What are you most looking forward to this season? The biggest thing I look forward to is helping people get fresh, nutrient-dense fruits and vegetables on their tables and in their bodies. Most of my favorite times in life have taken place around food and a table, whether that has been with friends or family, so to be able to contribute in a healthy, sustainable way in bettering this community's social and physical health is rewarding. If people ate more fruits and vegetables with people they loved, a lot of the problems in this country would start to solve themselves.

What's your favorite crop? Jane Oliver loves basil (in a way that, if I wasn't so secure with myself, I might find threatening). I like orange glo watermelons.

What's your favorite music to farm to? This week, I've been listening to Paco de Lucía's "Concierto de Aranjuez." The Rich Roll podcast is great. And you can never go wrong with a Grateful Dead live album.

Ever dug up (or found) anything interesting? Nothing too interesting. Old horse shoes, a rabbit statue, Hernando de Soto's kneecap.

Name an uncommon vegetable that people should **try:** Kohlrabi, especially in soup!

Is there anything you'd like to see change about the way food is consumed in our community? I would like to see people eat a more whole-foods, plant-based diet. Right now in the US, the top two killers, heart disease and cancer, are both largely caused by the standard American diet. And both are largely reversible by switching to a whole food, plant-based diet. Even one day a week of eating only locally grown legumes, whole grains, fruits, and vegetables would go a long way in building better health and a better environment.

Name one piece of equipment you could not live without: We do our best to not be reliant on any type of machinery here, but if I had to answer, I'd say my two-wheeled ho.

Tell us one thing you've learned that you didn't know when you first started farming: I've learned to try to mix idealism with practicality. Idealism is great and all, but it sometimes hindered me early on from getting things done. Perfect is the enemy of good, as they say.

Our arts scene is vibrantly stagnant. We have a home for MFA students, publishing authors, creative writing professors, and bright eyed undergrads—but one sector is hungry for community. The non-university workshop environment for nonstudents is nearly nonexistent. The inclusive creative growth of literature has not been available for the 22-45 year olds of Oxford until the last year and a half. But sadly, many still aren't aware that are two new literary focused environments welcome to all ages and backgrounds and completely free to attend.

The Oxford Comma is a creative writing workshop group that meets every other Monday at The Coop, located on the fourth floor of the Graduate Hotel. The group welcomes anyone wanting feedback on their creative writing, and happens to be run by me. It was originally started by my friend **Savannah Suttle** before she relocated to Seattle. I felt that Oxford needed what the workshop provided—a safe place to find others who want to read creative work—instead of begging friends and family to do so or enrolling in a full-fledged university course.

With the death of **Rose Room** (an indie music series in a house on Pierce Avenue), and the recent demise of Freddy's Basement (a similar, indie music, house-show scene), my friends Mattie Thrasher and Katherine Flannagin were facing a problem that The Oxford Comma also faces. Their literary + art show program, Quasar, that meets monthly, had not only outgrown their house with attendance, but faced pressing issues like expenses and their impending graduation from Ole Miss. If they didn't come up with a sustainability plan, Quasar would pass on just like Rose Room and Freddy's Basement.

Mattie, Katherine, and I knew that sustaining The Oxford Comma and Quasar for the long run would not be doable without the help of others. We formed a committee of our active members and set to work applying for a grant with the Mississippi Writer's Guild with the intent of requesting funds to be used to host an open house reception to welcome curious potential members in Oxford and surrounding areas. In addition, Yoknapatawpha Arts Council has supported our endeavors with providing guidance, venues, and publicizing our events. Through our host of other sponsors like The Edison and Wonderbird Spirits, we are able to offer craft gin distilled in Taylor, Mississippi, inside of a fantastic venue as well as host the 2019-20 Grisham Writer in Residence January O'Neil as our keynote literary offering. We are inviting you to an evening of hors d'oeuvres, literature, music, and art in an open environment where you can learn what Quasar and The Oxford Comma bring to the community. Please bring friends, family, workmates, you name it.

Returning a Pet to a Shelter

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I am a disabled senior citizen with two beautiful dogs. Recently I was told that I need to move from my apartment to an assisted living facility that doesn't allow pets. There is no one to take my dogs. Will a shelter take them in? What will happen to them? —Michael G., via email

DEAR MICHAEL: The first thing to do is reach out for help. You're making a huge life transition and should find out what options you have. Contact your city's senior services department, the United Way or the AARP for assistance. Tell them your dilemma. Ask if there are assisted living facilities available that will allow your pets to stay with you.

If you cannot take your dogs with you, contact the shelters in your city or region. Explain your situation, and that you must surrender your pets. Not all shelters are able to accept surrenders, but all of them can give you information on other places to call for help. When you find a shelter that will accept your dogs, the shelter will probably schedule a day and time for you to come in.

You'll bring your dogs, in carry-cages if possible, and will fill out a surrender form. There will probably be a fee for surrendering them. If you need assistance filling out the form, or if you cannot afford the fee, tell the shelter as soon as possible. Once surrendered, the shelter will do its best to find a new home for your dogs.

Thank you for thinking of your dogs during this stressful time and making sure they're cared for no matter what happens. I wish you the best.
