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Anniversary brings back memories of attacks

Across the land, Monday brought back memories of that awful morning five years ago: the crisp blue sky above Manhattan, the silver planes streaking into tall buildings, the flames, smoke, dust, horrified faces, people running, firefighters and police officers struggling, the fear, grief and death.

That day marked the end of America's innocence; the grim realization that our nation no longer is protected by its broad ocean ramparts, that enemies can strike our homeland at any time. Americans everywhere recalled on Monday where they were when the planes struck and the towers fell. Bells tolled, bagpipes wailed, flags flew at half-staff.

After an emotional tour of crash sites at New York, Shanksville, Pa., and the Pentagon, which will be forever linked by Sept. 11, 2001, President Bush called for national unity in the struggle against terrorism.

"Our nation has endured trials—and we face a difficult road ahead," he said in a prime-time TV address from the Oval Office, according to prepared remarks issued before the speech. "Winning this war will require the determined efforts of a unified country. So we must put aside differences, and work together to meet the test that history has given us." Earlier, at a memorial service in New York, relatives of the 2,749 people lost there stood in the void that was created when the buildings collapsed and paid tribute to the victims. They clutched pictures of their loved ones, sobbing quietly as their names were read in a four-hour ceremony.

Blocks away, on a spectacular late-summer morning remarkably like the one that ended in tragedy five years before, the president and first lady Laura Bush joined a group of firefighters for moments of silence at 8:46 a.m. and 9:03 a.m.,

the times when the first aircraft, then a second one, slammed into the twin towers of the World Trade Center.

A few hours later, the Bushes stood in a rainy field in Shanksville, where a third hijacked plane crashed as passengers fought back against the terrorists. Again, the

weather mimicked conditions five years ago. Relatives of the victims from United Airlines Flight 93 wept as the president sought to console them.

"Their actions have ennobled our lives. Their death has enriched our lives. Their courage has demonstrated that which we are all capable of," the Rev. Paul Britton, a Lutheran minister, told the crowd. His sister Marion died on the flight.

At the Pentagon, Bush's final stop, the president wiped away tears after placing a wreath in honor of the 184 passengers, crew members and people in the building who died when American Airlines Flight 77 smashed into its west side.

Lt. Col. John Jessup, whose office was destroyed in the attack, skipped the ceremonies,

attack, skipped the ceremonies, choosing to mark the day with quiet

reflection Jessup said he lost 23 co-workers and friends five years ago. He helped colleagues escape his office until the billowing black smoke stopped him.

He still has survivor's guilt, but said he knows that God "isn't done with me yet." He said he was back at work the day after the attacks.

"Because I'm a soldier," he

said.

America's memories of that fateful day were mixed Monday with reminders that life changed then.

Jittery officials diverted a United Airlines plane bound for San Francisco to Dallas when an unclaimed BlackBerry was found aboard. New York's Penn Station was evacuated briefly because of a suspicious package.

Osama bin Laden's deputy, Ayman al-Zawahri, warned in a new video that Persian Gulf countries and Israel would be al-Qaida's next targets.

In Afghanistan, a planned moment of silence by American troops was disrupted by a rocket attack from resurgent Taliban fighters that sent the soldiers scrambling for cover.

And fighting continued in

"This struggle has been called a clash of civilizations," Bush said, according to his prepared remarks. "In truth, it is a struggle for civilization."

Five years on, the aftereffects of Sept. 11 remain inescapable. Public buildings resemble fortresses. Air marshals ride planes. Police patrol subways. Billions of dollars are being spent on security, yet nearly half of Americans fear another terrorist attack, pollsters report. People say they're more cautious, suspicious of others, wary of public transportation.

Yet life went on Monday.

Astronauts worked to finish the International Space Station orbiting 270 miles above Earth. Meteorologists monitored Hurricane Florence in the Atlantic. "Monday Night Football" competed with the president for TV viewers' attention.

Even Congress put politics aside, briefly, holding a memorial ceremony on the Capitol grounds at dusk. The Marine Corps Band played and top Republicans and Democrats spoke. But no one expected the bipartisan spirit to last.

On Tuesday lawmakers will return to battle over how to balance the rule of law with the war on terrorism, defining the rights of detainees facing trial in special military courts.

In his prepared remarks, Bush said the attacks brought out the best in Americans by exposing them to the worst.

"On 9-11, our nation saw the face of evil," he said. "Yet on that awful day, we also witnessed something distinctly American: ordinary citizens rising to the occasion, and responding with extraordinary acts of courage."

He warned Americans to brace for a long struggle.

"America did not ask for this war, and every American wishes it were over. So do I," he said. "But the war is not over—and it will not be over until either we or the extremists emerge victorious."

Don't make the 9/11 victims a republican platform ■ The real stats behind the political agenda

We remember where we were, what we were doing, and how we were feeling when the tragedies of September 11th unfolded, just as the baby boomers remember the same explicit details of the event of JFK's assassination. In the case of the former, I was on my way to a Naval Warfare school in Point Loma, California. One of the building sentries was bellowing, "The World Trade Center was hit!" In the classroom, we flipped on the television monitor and, within five seconds of watching, saw the second plane

crash and explode. I forgot how to breathe. Professional sailors and marines were weeping openly as people on the television screen held hands and jumped to their deaths, avoiding a more painful experience of asphyxiation and/or burning alive. The panic was fetching and all-encompassing afterwards: the naval base shut down and barricaded at every entrance. I was given a weapon, a radio, and a bulletproof vest, and spent the next few days turning away trucks there were bringing our food. The Coronado Bridge—linking San Diego to Coronado-was sealed off. Ships were deployed to the Middle East. Friends were eventually sent overseas. One of them

campaigns, Money funds wars, businesses, and news corporations. Money separates the technology gap between those who have it, and those who don't. Contractors make up the bulk of defense spending-not the beloved soldier fighting overseas. Did you know that a specific hammer that can be purchased at Home

Halliburton-Dick Cheney's former affairis a benefactor of the monopolizing defense companies that otherwise used to be provided by men and women that enlisted to defend the constitution of the United States. The soldiers, sailors, and pilots worked for pennies on the hour. Some of today's contractors are reminiscent of the convicted war profiteers of Nazi Germany-the only difference being that today's profiteering is at the hands of a democratic government, and not from the roots of fascist lin-

Tobesuccinct, the same people that are dying overseas, missing their children growing up, losing spouses due to divorce, and who are continually suffering a barrage of mental and physical ailments, are being used as puppets in a Republican campaign. The Republicans are facing a crucial vote in a variety of major states, and could lose control of political battles that they originally won due to the factor of terrorism. "I will protect the country from terrorists," said President Bush. What if the real terrors are inside our borders?

Do you want hard facts? According to the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), 39,189 deaths occurred in the United States in 2005—all in motor vehicles. The U.S. Census Bureau reports that 12.6% of Americans still live in poverty, including statistically

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Dollars and Sense from FinAid■ Budgeting

Do you agree that doing well in school is important?

Do you agree that it's easier to do well in school if you don't have to worry about your money?

Making a budget--and sticking to it--will keep you from worrying about your money and let you devote your full attention to school.


To help you make a budget, print the Personal Spending Plan form from our website: http://www.parkland.edu/ss/financial/documents/spending-plan.pdf.

The 1st Step is to figure your Monthly Income.

- 1. Add all sources of income: wages from working, savings, parent contributions, financial aid grants, scholarships, workstudy, loans, and other sources.
- 2. Divide your total income by the number of months you'll be

in school. If you plan to use that money to support yourself during the summer also, divide the total by 12. The result is the most you can spend each month.

TIP: If you have funds that won't be received until a particular date, make sure you don't figure that money into your monthly income until you have the cash in hand.



The 2nd Step is figuring your Monthly Expenses.

- 1. Fixed expenses-like tuition and rent or dorm fees.
- 2. Books and school supplies.

\$500 per semester is the average cost for full-time students.

- 3. Best estimate of all living costs: food, utilities, toiletries, gas, parking, car insurance, car payment, laundry, travel expense (to go home for holidays), and entertainment.
- 4. Divide the total of all expenses by the number of months in your budget.

The 3rd Step is Reviewing the Results.

- 1. Is your income enough to cover your estimated expenses? If not, how can you either cut corners or add to your income through a part-time job or other means?
- 2. If your income is greater than your expenses, are you going to put the leftover funds in a savings account in case you have an unexpected bill?

Knowing how much you have to spend each month will help you decide if you can afford to have a car with you at school, how often you can eat out, whether

or not you can go to the movies, etc.

More Budgeting Tips

- 1. When big expenses hit that overwhelm your monthly income, see if you can spread the payments out over several months. Example: Some schools have tuition payment plans so you don't have to pay it all at once.
- 2. Don't use credit cards to "solve" budgeting problems! Credit cards should only be used for expenses you can pay back immediately. The interest you'll accrue on your charge is very high and adds up quickly.
- 3. Each month, review what you spent and how closely you followed your budget. Make any needed adjustments in your spending for the next month.

If you would like help making a budget, the Financial Aid advisors are available to help you on a walk-in basis Monday through Friday from 9:00-11:30 A.M. and 1:00-4:00 P.M., unless otherwise posted.

Facebook issues and concerns

Ben F. may have changed his relationship status to single, but, really, does every one of his friends on Facebook need to be informed of it in a headline at 4:35 in the morning?

Yes, this week, the hangingall-our-laundry-out-there generation got a little too much face in its Facebook as the popular Web site added a feature that, like a personal news ticker, chronicles every online move they and their friends make.

"It brings Facebook stalking to a whole new level," said Chris Favilla, 21, as he sat on a leather couch outside the Phi Delta Theta fraternity on Locust Walk on the University of Pennsylvania campus Thursday, where the already-epic Facebook news-feed controversy was a hot topic.

Nine million students hang out online on Facebook, each with his or her own Facebook "wall" of pictures and posts. The new feature allows users _ leaves them no choice, really _ to find out what friends have been doing through "news feeds" and "mini feeds" that appear on their page automatically.

All day, every day, every last little blip in their online lives _ who posted on whose wall, who made a new online friend, who woke up tired _ like a personal CNN for every one of their designated friends.

"It's so extreme," said Mike Carley, 22, a Penn senior from Los Angeles. "I don't really need to know my friends at USC are going to a party. It's really too much information. A bunch of people don't care whose wall I posted on at 3:45 a.m. What if I reject a friend request, will it say that too? That's ugly."

So upset are users about the changes that as of yesterday more than a half-million of the sites' 9 million users had signed petitions against the change, or joined online groups against Facebook (actions which, of course, were instantly logged on all their friends' walls).

A Web site called A Day Without Facebook (http://daywithoutfacebook.blogspot.com) is calling for a mass boycott of the network on Tuesday _ which, given the addictive nature of the site, would be an impressively harsh protest strategy.

But Facebook users _ many of whom reject the more open-to-all MySpace _ feel betrayed (Facebook is the No. 2 social networking site after MySpace, owned by News Corp.) Facebook originally limited its membership to college students, but four months ago spread to the military, nonprofit organizations, and some corporations.

"What was so great about Facebook was that it was not as blatantly put in your face what everyone was doing," said Mary Calderone, a freshman at Penn. "MySpace was so stalkerish. People are joking and calling it MyFace now."

All this information was already available, but most of it was hidden deep within users' walls, accessible really only to people who had the idea to check out, say, how many friends had posted on someone's wall.

Now, the news feeds automatically let users know when their friends have added photographs, changed their lists of favorite movies, or taken someone off their friends list because of a breakup. And stuff like: "Five of your friends have posted on Meghan's wall." (Should you? Do you really need to know that?)

This made personal news travel faster _ and more awkwardly _ through their network of friends than a lot of Facebook fans were ready for.

"I absolutely hate it," said Nawad Maalouf, 19, a junior at Penn. "I don't want every detail out. It used to take some effort to stalk someone. Now the stalking just comes to you. You see if people have declined invitations, updated their relationship status, written on other people's walls."

But isn't sharing information the whole point of Facebook.com? That you can know all about people _ when they're online, who their friends are, what music they're into _ before you've even gone out for coffee?

Amanda Lenhart, senior research specialist with the Pew Internet & American Life Project, said the controversy underscores "the imperfect ideas" that users have about how their material is being used.

"All the things they are making public are things that are already public. What is also

important is that Facebook took away a measure of their control."

The changes also brought up some serious privacy issues: Maalouf said she had friends who had accepted invitations to gay events who did not necessarily want their sexual orientation broadcast to a vast network of casual acquaintances.

Then again, the whole nature of what is a "friend" which on Facebook means you have authorized a person to hang on your online wall may be at the heart of the controversy.

"On Facebook, you only have

one kind of friend," said Pew's Lenhart. "It assumes this intense level of friendship for everyone on the network. People can't do things that might not noticed. What Facebook has assumed is that everyone cares. And they don't."

The fury of the backlash led Facebook's founder, a former Harvard University stunamed Mark Zuckerberg, to post an e-mail assuring the angry crowd that the company was "listening to all your suggestions about how to improve the product."

Heheadlined the post, "Calm down. Breathe. We hear you."

Yesterday, Facebook spokeswoman Melanie Deitch said the company was "aggressively evaluating" the change.

But she stressed that the news feed addressed main reasons people use Facebook, which is to find out what's happening with their friends." She said privacy controls were available to screen out information among categories of people

And she added that at least one of the signature Face-book interactions was still and would always remain private _ that nonverbal heyhowyadoin' known, affectionately, as "the poke."

■ Steve Irwin: every day (super) hero

Starting Friday at your local cineplex, you can see Ben Affleck's long-awaited return to the silver screen in "Hollywoodland," about the death of George Reeves.

Reeves, a veteran actor who can be glimpsed in an early scene of "Gone With the Wind," became most famous for playing Superman on television in the 1950s.

The superhero special effects were as worthless as hothouse tomatoes, but Superman is Superman, so it was stunning news among young boys in 1959 when Reeves apparently killed himself.

One of my friends said he heard Reeves had played Superman for so long he thought he really did have superpowers, so he jumped out a window. "Hollywoodland," I believe, will suggest a different explanation. But at the time, we all nodded.

That scene came to mind Monday when "Crocodile Hunter" Steve Irwin died, because I suspect Irwin in a real sense was a modern-day Superman to hundreds of thousands of fans making them just as stunned by his death as my pals and I were when we heard about George

OK, Irwin couldn't fly. But what he did seemed so exotically dangerous, so unlike anything viewers of "Crocodile

Hunter" could ever imagine acing reptilian critters like but a reason and a need. doing themselves, that he might as well have had superpowers.

Besides, unlike Superman, he did all those things in real life _ jumping crocodiles and wrestling them into a boat, picking up deadly snakes by their tails and dropping them in a bag _ as casually as we might put Frosted Flakes in a grocery sack.

Sure, Irwin was a hustler who loved the fact he virtually lived on camera. But unlike a fair percentage of celebrities, he actually did something to earn the attention.

That's another way in which he resembled Superman, I suppose, along with using his unusual skills for good, not evil.

While many respond to men-

In the end, alas, he died because he was not Superman and a barb from a stingray pierced his chest.

But I'll bet you two vipers and a 12-foot croc that somewhere a group of young boys who don't care about no stinking autopsy has already circulated a story much truer to the Steve Irwin legend. I'll also bet we don't wait 47 years for the movie.

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
StuGo candidates reach out

SIU Edwardsville leader apologizes over speech

Southern Illinois University Edwardsville Chancellor Vaughn Vandegrift apologized for not properly attributing comments he made during a welcoming address for Martin Luther King Jr. Day earlier this

"This was completely unintentional and not deliberate," Vandegrift wrote in an e-mail to faculty and staff on July 21. "Nonetheless, I take full responsibility for them and offer my apology to the university community for this incident.'

Much of his luncheon address, which has been taken off the university's Web site, came from other writings, another Web site and a White House proclamation. He said earlier that the speech was written by his staff.

The plagiarism allegation was raised by supporters of former faculty member Chris Dussold, who was fired in 2004 for allegedly copying another professor's teaching philosophy statement as part of his tenure review.

Dussold, who is suing the university, said the administration wanted him out for other reasons and used plagiarism as an excuse. His supporters _ calling themselves Alumni and Faculty Against Corruption at SIU have been examining speeches and academic writings by other faculty members and administrators to find examples of improper attribution or copy-

One of his supporters contacted the Tribune about Vandegrift's speech, and the Tribune contacted university officials earlier this week.

One part of the speech matched a passage in a 2003 proclamation from President Bush, while other parts included excerpts from the King Center Web site. Vandegrift attributed one quotation in his speech but did not suggest there was any outside source for these pas-

SIU President Glenn Poshard, who oversees the Edwardsville and Carbondale campuses, also has been criticized for using virtually the same university Web site welcoming statement as his predecessor. Earlier this year, Carbondale Chancellor Walter Wendler acknowledged that he unintentionally left out the source of an anecdote during a speech.

Poshard, in a 960-word op-ed distributed to newspapers near the campuses on July 21, made a distinction between plagiarism that is deliberately deceptive and that which is uninten-

"Neither chancellor's actions were intentional and neither had anything to personally gain by their remarks," he wrote.

Dussold's attorney called Poshard's comments hypocritical in light of the professor's fir-

"If he believes those things are not problematic, then he needs to reassess whether he is in the right position," said attorney Jeff Ezra of Collinsville, Ill.

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
