CHUCK SHEPHERD'S NEWS OF THE WEIRD

In August, a Roman Catholic bishop in the Netherlands, Martinus Muskens, suggested that Christians start referring to God as "Allah" as a way of relieving world tensions. "Allah is a very beautiful word What does God care what we call him? It is our problem." A priest in Rome said Muskens' intentions were good, "but his theology needs a little fine-tuning." Muskens said he spent eight years in Indonesia, where Catholic priests used "Allah" during Mass.

Government in Action!

•Bookkeepers Wanted: (1) Pentagon investigators discovered in August that a small South Carolina company fraudulently collected \$20.5 million in shipping costs, including one invoice of \$999,798 for sending two washers (cost: 19 cents each) to a base in Texas. According to Bloomberg News, the Defense Department was said to have a policy of automatically and unquestioningly paying shipping bills labeled "priority." (2) The Senate Finance Committee found in April that more than 450,000 federal employees and retirees owe back federal income taxes (totaling about \$3 billion), including almost 5 percent of the employees and retirees of the U.S. Tax Court.

•Bureaucrats Being Bureaucrats: (1) About 30 Iowa school districts had their funding applications for preschool grants tossed out in September, the state Department of Education said, because the paperwork was not double-spaced, as required. (2) In August, the Palestinian Authority admitted that, after Hamas violently split from the government in mid-June, civil servants nonetheless failed to act quickly and thus in July continued to pay the salaries of about 3,000 Hamas security officers (who were formerly PA employees, but who by then were fighting the PA).

•JaneBalogh,66, was informed in September that she will not be prosecuted for defrauding elections officials in Seattle, despite having illegally registered her dog, Duncan M. MacDonald, to vote. Balogh, protesting how easy officials have made it for people to vote illegally, put her home phone account in Duncan's name, which is all the proof required for registration, then signed him up, and when an absentee ballot arrived, she went public about her scheme. However, despite the public confession, Duncan continued to be sent official absentee ballots for the two subsequent election cycles.

Police Blotter

•Just Say No: In September, police in Hertfordshire, England, stood fast under criticism for their program of placing posters around the area reading, "Don't Commit Crime." Said a police spokeswoman, "If stating the obvious helps to reduce crime or has any impact at all, we will do it." (The police also installed signs at gas stations: "All Fuel Must Be Paid For.")

•People Who Are Messes: (1) Tommy Tester, 58, minister of Gospel Baptist Church in Bristol. Va., was arrested in July after he allegedly urinated at a car wash, in front of children and police officers, while wearing a skirt. (Police said alcohol was involved.)(2) Catherine Delgado, 35, was arrested in Annapolis, Md., in August after she appeared, smudged with fudge, in a hotel lobby around midnight with "large slabs of fudge bulging out of her pockets" (according to a Washington Post story). A police officer later checked a nearby Fudge Kitchen store and found the door inexplicably open and a large display quantity missing from the front window. (Police said alcohol was involved, along with fudge.)

News That Sounds Like a Joke

At about 9 p.m. on Aug. 23, a fire broke out in the Comedy Zone nightclub in West Knoxville, Tenn., right in the middle of an act in which a hypnotist had just placed 10 audience members into a trance. However, despite an "everyone for himself" attitude that typically marks such emergencies, the 10 hypnotized subjects somehow managed to make it out of the club safely.

People With Too Much Money

The adolescent offspring of some well-to-do parents are serious art collectors, according to a September Wall Street Journal report, and their interest appears not to be motivated solely by parents' strategies to shield income from the tax collector. Ms. Dakota King, 9, for example, owns 40 pieces and specializes in animals and "happy colors." Ms. Shammiel Fleischer-Amoros, 10, who admitted, "Tm really scared, but Daddy told me I have to negotiate," succeeded in getting \$200 knocked off of a \$3,200 sculpture she really wanted. An 11-year-old last year "waved a paddle" to win a \$352,000 Jeff Koons sculpture.

Obsessions

Just when Internet newspaper sites appear to be gaining ground as replacements for printed editions, a 70-year-old woman identified only as Maggie told the Edmonton (Alberta) Sun in September that her paper edition of the Sun is a crucial part of her daily diet, literally. She eats it, in strips, and has, she said, for the past seven years because it tastes good. "I can't explain it," she said, and it was only when she recently experienced a blockage of her esophagus, and doctors found a ball of paper, that she revealed her obsession. Doctors cited by the Sun said that except for the blockage danger, newspaper eating is not unhealthful.

Least Competent Criminals

Too Puny for a Life of Crime: Keith Bellanger, 20, failed in his attempted burglary in Duluth, Minn., in September when homeowner Wayne Boniface, age 69, walked in and beat him up so thoroughly that Bellanger had all his clothes ripped off trying to get away. And in Bay Shore, N.Y., in September, a 32-year-old man wielding a tire iron, who was attempting to mug Bruce Ferraro, 74, on the street, was forced to abandon the job and run for it when Ferraro, after a struggle, took the iron away from him. (The mugger was captured by police nearby when his car stalled.)

Recurring Themes

Some Americans continue to prefer to "do it themselves" to get rid of pests on their property, with tragic results. In June, Mike Harstad of Jamestown, Calif., attempting to eliminate a wasps' nest with a can of Pledge and a cigarette lighter, ultimately burned down his mobile home and contents and destroyed an outbuilding. a truck, a boat and a trailer. In August, a Whitehall, Pa., man, William Sekol, 82, attempting to destroy a yellow jackets' nest beneath a storm sewer grate in his front yard, put a dried tree over the grate, doused it with gasoline, and lit it (supposedly to suffocate the yellow jackets underneath). However, some gasoline ran into the sewer, where its fumes combusted. In the resulting explosion, Sekol's mustache and eyebrows were singed.

Undignified Deaths

Surprisingly Complicated: A 24-year-old woman in Lawrenceville, Ga. (in July), and a 59-year-old woman in Lincolnton, N.C. (in August), were killed after failing to negotiate driver's-side devices allowing them entrance to, respectively, a gated parking lot and an automatic car wash. The Georgia woman had leaned out her window to insert a card into the gate-opening machine when her car lurched forward and pinned her head between the car and the door. The North Carolina woman had reached out her open car door to punch in a code for the wash when her car lurched forward, similarly pinning her head. (Police in both cases said that the cars should have been in Park.)

Years of Evolved Tradition

Thanksgiving-or Turkey day-is a time of heartwarming traditions acted out year after year by North American citizens everywhere. Such traditions might include: eating a large meal with your family until you are forced to loosen a notch in your belt, then watching the NFL with a six-pack, or playing games such as football or poker.

'I believe in the three F's of Thanksgiving: Family, Fun, and Football" said Sam, a resident of Champaign. But where you may ask did these traditions come from?

Most of these traditional meals include the prize Turkey but for some in the southern regions of the United States they serve what is known as a Turducken. This dish is comprised of de-boned turkey stuffed with a de-boned duck, which is then stuffed with a small de-boned chicken leaving only the small gaps which are filled with a highly seasoned breadcrumb mixture or sausage meat, although some versions have a different stuffing for each bird.

These meal traditions are falsely believed to have originated from the historical meal between the pilgrims of the Plymouth Colony and the Wampanoag Indians in the autumn of 1621. Although turkey, cranberry sauce, and pumpkin pie were not served at that historical meal, these dishes continue to be spread on the table ever year-but the origin of this common thanksgiving feast is unknown.

Canada celebrated this holiday long before we did. For them Thanksgiving begins the second Monday in October and lasts three to four days depending on the region. The history of Thanksgiving in Canada is derived from an explorer, Martin Frobisher, who tried to find a northern passage to the Orient. In the year 1578, he held a formal ceremony to give thanks for surviving the long journey. Canadians also have a meal with

family but serve theirs on any of the three to four days of celebration.

The origins of the American holiday began November 1863 with the country divided in civil war. President Lincoln, prompted from letters written by Sarah Josepha Hale, proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day, to show our gratitude to God for the blessings bestowed upon a nation in chaos.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and voice by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union." said Lincoln in his proclamation.

So here we are 144 years later enjoying the traditions that evolved from a number of both facts and myths. So what can we be thankful for this year? A loved one returning from the war in Iraq? A break from our daily routine of work or school? Getting the opportunity to eat a meal other than Ramen and Diet Coke? Whatever you are grateful for, Thanksgiving has and will be the day to partake of its goodness. So Parkland, go forth and enjoy the weekend.

If you're looking for some delicious dishes to add to your Thanksgiving menu, here are some mouthwatering recipes courtesy of students Bridget Taylor, Briana Stodden and a few tasty tips from yours truly.

Bridget Taylor's Homemade Noodles

"The recipe itself is so special to me since my mom is the one who makes it, but it is also, special because as a family we make it together [Taylor and her sisters help cut the dough into strips] and always have fun having flour wars with each other!"

Ingredients

2 c flour 1 egg plus 3 egg yolks 1 tsp salt ½ c water plus ¼ tsp water

Instructions

Sift flour into a pile and create a well in the center of it. Mix in eggs and salt. Add the water to the well one-tablespoon at a time until everything is incorporated. The dough should be stiff, but easy to roll. Roll out the dough and cut into strips.

Let the strips of dough dry for two hours. Bring three quarts of salted water to a boil and add the dough strips. Boil for five to seven minutes. Season however you like and enjoy!

Taylor also advises readers to, "Always give yourself plenty of time to cook everything. It is no fun being stressed about cooking on Thanksgiving." It's important to remember

It's important to remember if you want your Thanksgiving feast to run smoothly, preparing foods like your deserts and side dishes in advance will allow from a stress-free holiday. If you're more comfortable with making everything the morning of, organizing ingredients the night before can also work to your advantage.

Briana Stodden's

Hellmann's® Potato Salad

"We make this every year at Thanksgiving and my mom's sweet pickles just make it to die for. I guess it's special because it reminds me of my family and I've really never found a potato salad that tastes better."

Ingredients

1 c reduced fat mayonnaise 1 tsp salt	
5 medium potatoes, cooked and cubed	
1/3 c chopped onion 1 tbsp vinegar ¼ tsp pepper	
1 c sliced celery 1 c sweet, diced pickles (a Stodden family touch)	

Instructions

In a large bowl combine mayonnaise dressing, vinegar, salt and pepper. Add remaining ingredient and mix well. Cover, chill for 30 minutes, and enjoy!

If you're short on time, Stodden also suggests using small, canned potatoes. "It tastes great and saves on cooking time," she says.

Juicy Tips

Turkey never turns our perfectly? For a failsafe mouthwatering Tom, brining him the day before makes for the juiciest of birds.

To brine is to completely submerge and saturate something in salt and water. Do you eat canned olives? Well, they're all hanging out in brine, as well. Now don't be alarmed, saltwater is not the only component of your brine. In fact, you can create flavorful Thanksgiving brine by simply adding your own herbs and spices. Here's how.

It's good to use a turkey weighing anywhere between 12 and 16 pounds. To your brine, you may want to add ingredients such as vegetable or turkey stock, sugar, allspice, onion, garlic, and oils. Just be sure to boil all of this together before adding lots of ice water (enough to immerse the bird).

Preparing your brine the day before is a wonderful idea because your fine, now featherless friend has time to tenderize overnight. The turkey should be thawed before soaking it in the bath (a deep pot with a lid will do). Store in a cool place like a refrigerator, cooler, or basement. Turn the turkey one time, about halfway through the process, which could be right before you go to bed.

Before officially cooking your marinated masterpiece, remove the bird from the brine, rinse it inside and out with cold water, and dispose of the liquid.

You can also infuse your turkey with holiday aromatics like cinnamon, rosemary sprigs, sage leaves, etc... Remember, the fresher your ingredients the more savory your turkey will be. These ingredients can all be placed inside the bird before cooking. Now it is ready to be roasted, deep-fried, grilled, smoked, or whatever your preference. Enjoy and have a happy Thanksgiving!

"Laughing Stock: Parkland Does Comedy"



November 11 marked the last curtain call for the Parkland Theatre's production of Charles Stock. 'Laughing Morey's The play also marked Thom Schnarre's third production for Parkland, and was noteworthy for being the first Schnarre-directed play not to feature major script changes. Many of the slight variances that could be observed in the performance were actually a product of the actor's interpretations of the characters, some fast-working scenery gurus, and the production staff's consideration for the audience.

With a play like 'Laughing Stock' which focuses around a fledgling New England acting troupe, it is very easy for the jokes to lose punch with theater novices. "There was definitely something to be gained from knowledge of theater with this comedy," said Thom Schnarre. Through the course of the play, the company goes through a summer repertoire of "Dracul: Prince of Darkness" (character Gordon Page's own interpretation of Dracula. changed just enough to avoid royalties), Shakespeare's "Hamlet", and "Charley's Aunt."

The play invariably hit a peak during the company production of Dracul—with Tyler Taylor (Rob Zaleski) as a very eccentric version of Dracula, and Tyler's lover Mary Tucker (Rachel Ladd) as Mina. As Dracula was the most universally known play of the set, it was the

most heavily emphasized and received the greatest audience response. To downplay the lesser-known plays in the repertoire, the Hamlet scene was diverted to only encompass 'backstage' and Charley's Aunt-the most blaringly obscure play of the three-was reduced to a mere scene in which Jack Morris (Zachary K. Lutz's character) plays the part of Charlie who plays the part of the old, widowed, Brazilian aunt he'd never met-in a dress no less, which is something all could appreciate.

Another minor change in the behaviors of the players stemmed from Thom's desire to bring out the 'love story' amidst the 'comedy.' The alcoholic stage manager Sarah McKay (Chris Taber), and director Gordon Page (Mike Prosise), fall in love for a second time by the end of the play in the original script by Morey, but Thom felt that he wanted it to develop more for the Parkland stage. Though the characters were never scripted to kiss, Thom revealed that his motive for this addition was to "bring out something the general public could enjoy."

'Laughing Stock' is typically a black-box production (meaning that there is usually not a physical set—only a black room, leaving the rest to audience imagination) but for Parkland's adaptation, a very large and convincing barn was built for the stage.

"Randi [Hard] and I wanted the full barn up, so we consulted with the set director...told them what we wanted and I couldn't have been more pleased with it," said Schnarre.

Of the cast, there were a few characters that stood out among the rest. Thom Schnarre speaks of their origins. The character Karma Schneider, played by theater major Megan Tucker, was an original cast member, but the interpretation of her character in the Parkland production came from the beloved gothic comic book character, Emily The Strange. The ditsy and always outrageous Mary Pierre, played by Rachel Ladd, was actually based on Sarah Jessica Parker's character in the popular television series, 'Sex and the City'. Charles A. Miericke's character, Craig Conlin was based on a mixture of Chris Farley's infamous 'motivational speaker' character and 'Milton,' the squirrelly pyromaniac of the movie 'Office Space.'

"Considering that the entire play was produced in only 29 days, and such a success, I am very pleased with how it went," said Schnarre.

"We averaged about two-hundred seats a night," he said; which was ironically about the capacity of the fictional playhouse.
