"Be Kind to Animals" is more than just a saying to students in the Veterinary Technology Program here at Parkland. These students have a respect for animals and a concern for their well-being that extends far beyond a pat on the head or a few treats here and there.

"The Veterinary Technology Association offers students the opportunity to share and expand new concepts in the field of veterinary medicine, recognize and be aware of job opportunities, promote educational advancement, assist in continuing education, and benefit from social and recreational growth," states the club's website.

The Vet Tech club here at Parkland is a student chapter of the North American Veterinary Technician Association. The club was named Club of the Year in 2004 and 2005 by Parkland's Inter-Organizational Council, and is very active both here on campus and out in the community.

The club is open to anyone enrolled in the Vet Tech program here at Parkland, and lets those busy students relax in what the club's treasurer, Jessica Hood, described as "a family-like environment. It provides an environment for the students to feel comforted and supported."

Britney Strode, the club's vice president, said that the club "helps students become aware of our profession, and also alleviates the stress of everyday life." She also said that the best thing about being a member of the Vet Tech club is "meeting new people, making friends, and helping out the community in any way possible."

Over 20 members of the club meet every other Thursday from 11am to noon in room L111. At their meetings, members discuss upcoming events, fundraisers, public education projects, and the Vet Tech program in general. The meetings also give freshmen a chance to ask questions about anything that they might be having trouble with.

"We learn more about our chosen profession and get to put our skills to use," said Marc Boyd, president of the Vet Tech club. "We want to increase awareness of the role of veterinary technicians on the animal health care team."

There is a tutoring program in place for freshmen in the Vet Tech program as well. Sophomores volunteer their time to work with students who are new to the program. "We help them with anything they need, even if it is personal issues that they need to vent," said Strode.

Vet Tech also participates in a wide

variety of activities. Directly related to their program of study, members provide animal physicals at the Champaign County Humane Society, and talk to students from kindergarten to high school about the Vet Tech program and what it is that they do.

Getting off campus, club members also get the chance to forget about their classes for a while by going bowling, skating, or to the movies. Most recently, they went out for a night of rollerskating, and went out to a bonfire night at in Hindsboro, where members roasted marshmallows, had a hayride, and rode a horse named "Sis."

The secretary of the Vet Tech club, Melissa Rafac, said that the best part of being a member really is "getting away from the stress of school and class and hanging out together."

Previous activities have included trips to Eli Lilly and the Exotic Feline Rescue Center, donating food and gifts for needy families during the holidays, informational booths at the Pet Expo and U of I Veterinary Medicine Open House, sponsoring guest lecturers, publishing an annual Parkland Vet Tech Yearbook, and maintaining an informational bulletin board about animal-related issues in the L-wing. There is also scholarship money available to Vet Tech students. The due date for applications is November 15, so get moving soon to qualify.

Crime-fearing female pedestrians in Tokyo can soon protect themselves with fashion designer Aya Tsukioka's skirt that opens into a realistic-looking (except made of fabric), full-size vending machine that she hopes thugs will pass right by. It's one of several fanciful crime-avoiding creations of the genre that Japanese inventors are noted for, according to an October New York Times dispatch. Another, the "manhole bag," resembles a sewer covering when laid on the ground but can hold a person's valuables, again provided that the thug passes it up. Yet another is women's wraparound sunglasses that are extra-dark so that even shy, eye-contact-avoiding females can stare unobserved at potential perverts in trains to guard against the ubiquitous groping.

More Things to Worry About

•As several sightings were made around Washington, D.C., of dragonfly-looking bugs hovering in the air at political events, government agencies were denying that they had released any tiny surveillance robots, according to an October Washington Post investigation. "I look up and I'm like, 'What the hell is that?" asked a college student at an antiwar rally in Washington. "They looked kind of like dragonflies or little helicopters. But ... those are not insects." Several agencies and private entities admitted to the Post that they were trying to develop such devices, but no one took credit for having them in the air yet.

Air Safety: (1) Nepal Airlines, which was having technical trouble with one of its two Boeing 757s in August, announced that it had fixed the problem by sacrificing two goats to appease the Hindu sky god Akash Bhairab. (2) As passengers boarded a Vueling Airlines flight from Madrid, Spain, in June, they noticed that 29 of the 32 rows of seats on one side were out of service, but they could hardly have been comforted by the captain's announcement that "(W)e have a safety problem with the door at the front. Don't worry, it's only a safety problem." (No incidents were reported on the flight.)

SchoolSecurity:(1)MJSafety Solutions of Danvers, Mass., has developed a \$195 bullet-proof backpack for students, using a lightweight, police-equipmentquality panel, and is seeking approvals from school boards to promote them, according to an August Boston Herald report. (2) Britain's Bladerunner company has developed student jumpers and blazers lined with knife-resistant Keylar, starting at the equivalent of about \$260, according to an August BBC News story.

•In August, representatives of New East Britain province in Papua New Guinea formally begged the forgiveness of the Fiji High Commissioner for incidents in 1875 when PNG tribes killed and ate Fijian missionaries who had come to spread Christianity. (In fact, the PNG spokespersons pointed out that "forgiveness" was a major tenet of the Christianity that PNG came to accept from the missionaries.)

·Medical student Wes Pemberton was scheduled to be officially measured in October in Tyler, Texas, for his upcoming spot in the Guinness Book of World Records. He told KLTV that he has a leg hair 5.0 inches long, surpassing the incumbent record of 4.88 inches. Pemberton said that his prize hair is growing amidst other normal-length hair, and that he has been treating it with conditioner to keep it strong for the measuring.

Leading Economic Indicators

A new condominium development in New York City, near 11th Avenue and West 24th Street (with prices starting at \$6.25 million), features in-unit garages, allowing the resident to drive into the En-Suite Sky Garage System at street level and be lifted to his own unit. Guests and residents who don't own cars will just have to use the ordinary elevators.

Spectacular Errors: (1) The Kuala Lumpur phone company Telekom Malaysia acknowledged in April that it mistakenly sent a bill for the equivalent of \$218 trillion (that's 218 followed by 12 zeroes) or 806.4 trillion ringgit. The account was for the late father of Yahaya Wahab, whose final bill should have been the equivalent of \$23. (2) Jayantibhai Patel, 57, was arrested in Foster City, Calif., in October after admitting that he smacked his father in the head with a hammer, requiring his hospitalization. Patel told police that he wanted the father to be put in a nursing home, but was under the impression that only a hospital could assign him to one, and thus, he needed to get him into a hospital.

News That Sounds Like a Joke

·After some mild bickering during a delivery at a Wal-Mart in October in Indiana County, Pa., according to police, a Pepsi Cola route man allegedly repeatedly punched a Coca-Cola route man in the face. (2) Reuters reported in September that a 50-yearold man who bought two large sausages at a butcher shop in Mannheim, Germany, returned shortly afterward to have them wrapped for a flight to Dubai. On inspection, the butcher found that the man had stuffed each sausage with an anatomically correct latex dildo, for smuggling into Dubai.

People Different From Us

In September, Matt Wilkinson admitted to KGW-TV of Portland, Ore., that he had been in a coma for three days recently and nearly died after he decided to stick his pet Eastern diamondback rattlesnake into his mouth while drinking with some buddies: "Me, being me, I put his head in my mouth." A doctor told the station that Wilkinson barely made it to the hospital in time because his airway had nearly swollen shut from the venomous bites. Wilkinson said that the incident was "kind of" his "own stupid fault."

Least Competent People

·Coast Guard officials said they rescued Louis Pasquale, 35, near Freeport, N.Y., in September as he was towing his disabled 35-foot fishing boat back to port 20 miles away by dragging it behind an inflatable boat he was paddling against the current. (He had covered about 100 yards in three hours.) (2) In August in Middlesex Township, Pa., two men from Virginia, who were on the job for a moving company, were detained by police for public intoxication in a motel parking lot, fighting over the question of whether Virginia is north or south of Pennsylvania.

-Don't Criminals Need to Keep a Low Profile? (1) Community activist Steven Myrick, 41, was convicted in October of a rape in Torrance, Calif., that had gone unsolved for seven years. Myrick had called attention to himself during a public housing demonstration in which he mooned police officers and was arrested (and a subsequent DNA test tied him to the rape). (2) Vincent Scheffner, 63, a municipal parking-meter worker in St. Paul, Minn., was under investigation at press time on suspicion of theft after a local credit union reported that he had been regularly depositing, for the last year, enormous amounts of coins into his account.

Mandy Bailey, who lives in a suburb of Phoenix, is the mother of conjoined 1-year-old girls and wanted to take them to a family reunion in Maryland. She called Delta Air Lines to make sure the girls could ride for free on her ticket. Group targets credit card marketing on campuses

CHICAGO—As a college student, Brett Thurman isn't one to pass up free food.

So during the first few weeks of school, when the University of Illinois-Chicago student spotted a coupon on campus for a free sandwich at a particular Subway on a certain day, he snapped it up.

When Thurman and his classmates rolled into the off-campus shop to get hooked up with a hoagie, however, they were greeted by more than the counter help.

Arepresentative from a credit card company was on hand to seal the deal for complimentary food—but only after students signed on the dotted line for a credit card.

While the University of Illinois-Chicago already prohibits credit card firms from marketing on campus, "the industry is trying to find its way around this," such as by enticing students to places like Subway, the student government president

Thurman was among the speakers during a teleconference Wednesday organized by the U.S. Public Interest Research Group. The consumer group is spearheading an 18-month proj-

ect to educate students about credit card practices and urge colleges to adopt such credit card marketing principles as prohibiting gift giving on campus, regulating such passive marketing as posters and flyers, blocking access to student lists, and increasing financial education for those unsophisticated about money matters.

To be sure, there's evidence that college students already are becoming savvier about credit cards.

According to a 2004 study by Nellie Mae, a student loan company, 76 percent of undergraduates have credit cards, down from 83 percent in 2001. Over the same time period, the average outstanding balance on undergraduate credit cards was \$2,169, down 7 percent from 2001.

But U.S. PIRG believes college students remain vulnerable to pitches for low teaser rates because they're hemmed in by the high cost of higher education yet face peer pressure to live a flashy lifestyle when they're on their own for the first time. A missed or late payment, however, often creates a credit card trap with high fees and interest rates. And while the group believes that consumer-friendly credit card reforms might become more of a real-

ity in a Democrat-controlled Congress, so far Congress has done nothing, organizers said Wednesday.


The campaign, funded by the Ford Foundation, will include "counter-marketing" educational materials on 40 U.S. campuses, including University of Illinois-Chicago. Giveaways will include brochures and "Don't be a sucker" lollipops. The campaign also includes a new Web site, Truthaboutcredit.org, and research into credit card marketing practices.

The University of Illinois-Chicago prohibits credit card marketing on campus and does some financial literacy outreach, campus spokesman Bill Burton said Wednesday.

"We're aware that students can run into credit difficulties if they incur burdensome debts," he said. One credit card company cited during the conference call, Riverwoods, Ill.-based Discover Financial Services, said it stopped marketing on or near college campuses nearly a year ago.

"We share the interests of states, colleges and students to make sure students use their credit wisely and develop good credit histories, and are committed to providing the tools and tips to help them maintain good credit." Mark Scarborough, Discover vice president of acquisitions, said Wednesday. "We don't think there is a need to give away premiums since the core benefits of a Discover Card, including rewards, protection and control, are what students find appealing.'





New memorial gives blacks a recognition long overdue

HACKENSACK, N.J.-New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg, actor Avery Brooks and poet Maya Angelou joined several hundred people Friday to dedicate a new memorial at the city's historic African Burial Ground.

The memorial in lower Manhattan, on Duane Street between Broadway and Elk Street, marks the last resting place of an estimated 15,000 free and enslaved Africans in the 17th and 18th

The 7-acre burial ground was discovered in 1991 during the construction of the Ted Weiss Federal Building at 290 Broadway. The finding spurred a major effort by archaeologists from Howard University in Washington to learn more about the early history of New York's black population.

"For 200-plus years, the people who lay here lived in a state of historical invisibility, removed. from history books and the consciousness of the people of New York," said Howard Dodson, director of the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, a unit of the New York Public Library.

"This monument says that today this invisibility is over and that people will know that Africans not only lived, worked and died here, but were a central part of the making of this multicolored roses, were placed city and this nation."

Black women and men dressed as soldiers or Colonials from more than 200 years ago marched to the monument, singing old slavery songs, to begin the invitation-only 11 a.m. dedication. To honor their ancestors buried at the site, they walked to the heavy beat of African drums played by musicians dressed in the colorful traditional garb of the continent.

"We will always be free (because) no one can stop the earth's heart from beating," Brooks, the program's host, said in his deep baritone. "Become like a drum and stay free.'

The site was declared a national monument by President Bush last year.


"The African Burial Ground National Monument is the newest national monument in New York City, joining the Statue of Liberty, Governors Island and Castle Clinton," Bloomberg said. "It is a privilege to participate in this inspirational dedication that honors the contributions of the enslaved and free Africans who helped to establish the early Dutch colony of New Amsterdam-now New York."

During the dedication, Nana Kofi Opoku performed an African ceremony, pouring water onto the memorial while reciting the names of his ancestors. Later, 3-foot-wide wreaths, with at the monument's entrance.

New York Lt. Gov. David Paterson, who explained that 60 percent of remains found were children killed by violence, not disease, said that he was relieved the buried Africans were finally getting the respect they deserved.

"When I see this memorial, I think now I can die in peace," in the front row, in a stunned silence. She said it is important to remember our ancestors.

"Only a fool ignores his or her past, because the past has the shoulders that one stands on," Angelou said. "For the people who fell so disgracefully as slaves and former slaves to be ignored would cause our children even more anguish than they now experience.

said an emotional Paterson, who is African-American. "This is our Ellis Island."

The monument, which was opened to the public after the ceremony, is made of gray granite and includes a recessed circular viewing area with the gender and ages of some of the deceased and a world map etched into the floor. On the walls are cultural symbols. At the entrance are two 20-foot-high angled slabs of stone with water pools on each side that flow down into the circular chamber

Angelou read two harrowing poems about how slaves were sold-"Bid 'Em In" by Oscar Brown Jr. and "The Slave Auction" by Frances Harper, which kept the audience, including actor Sidney Poitier who was

"It is important that each (African-American) knows that we own this country because we've already been paid for," she added.

Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., who was instrumental in getting the monument built, couldn't make the event, but said Thursday it represents forgotten African-Americans all over the country.

"It is unknown where many of our African ancestors are buried in America," Rangel said. "As such, this final resting place is symbolic of all the unmarked graves of our ancestors."

to a good cause and give back to their communities.

Next spring, efforts will be focused on an organization that has made great contributions to young people in our community-the Don Moyer Boys and Girls Club of Champaign-Urbana. Unfortunately, the club's funding was drastically cut during the state's budget crisis and they received only a fraction of the money they were expecting-forcing them to compromise some of the activities they had planned for the year.

Tickets are still available in the college center, so get your tickets now!




Just so you know, safety is everyone's business
