As such, we see our work as Editors, above all, as a programmatic task, in which discourse is seen as a space to analyze and propose political programs; to articulate liberatory ideas and practices; and connect past, present, and future. This issue took form during the 100th anniversary of the birth of Paulo Freire and the 90th anniversary of the birth of Augusto Boal. These figures stand out as authors, theorists, and practitioners, whose legacies continue to inspire and encourage generations of thinkers and doers. We also know that their legacies are also the legacies of the social, political, and artistic movements and freedom fighters that came before, during, and after their work, across the globe; and that the work of liberationist pedagogy and theater cannot be distilled to single figures. We celebrate Boal and Freire as a celebration of all those who struggle for liberation in the past, present, and future. By celebrating their legacies, we hope to foreground the pressing political, social, and aesthetic challenges that these legacies call us to confront.

As we worked on editing this volume, we witnessed popular uprisings of women, girls, and others, in Iran, who still struggle under the banner "Women, Life, Freedom." We publish this volume at the one-year anniversary of the most recent revolutionary movement in Iran. We witnessed Lula's victory in the Brazilian Presidential Election of 2022, as well as a potential coup encouraged by then-President, Jair Bolsonaro. We witnessed, among other acts of aggression, Israeli incursions into Al Aqsa Mosque and military invasion of Jenin Refugee Camp. We witnessed an attempted insurrection at the U.S. Capitol. We also continue to witness the effects of the Climate Catastrophe in the form of wildfires, floods, and more, all over the world. We know that these are dire times, and yet we also know that we stand on the shoulders of our ancestors,

who dealt with unspeakable odds themselves, and we work together, struggle together, resist together, and create beautiful community through solidarity across lines that seek to divide us: race, class, gender, ethnicity, language, nationality, religion, and more.

Knowing that the pen is one of the most valuable weapons against oppression, we aim to challenge capitalist methodologies that encourage cultural and social inequality; the mechanical production and commodification of knowledge; and hierarchies in the production of knowledge, performance practice, pedagogy, and yes - academic, peer-reviewed publication. PTO Journals shed light on diverse voices, topics, and practices from around the world, now in English *and* in Portuguese. This is a strong step toward a more active collaboration between PTO communities in the U.S and in Latin America.

We celebrate, and invite you to participate, in contributing to our journal's efforts to produce alternative, community-based, epistemologies and practices. We encourage contributions in all forms of writing and multimedia for our annual Journal publication, including: non-academic writing; reports on practices, events, projects, performances, etc.; book reviews; as well as commentary, provocations, ideas and reflections, in our new Continuing the Conversation section.
