Dear Mr. Temianka,

it was very good to hear from you so soon. I am much pleased that you wish to put a piece of mine on one of your programs. Since it is more convenient for you to stay within the limits of the string ensemble, I would suggest to use one of the three works I have written for string orchestras (Symphonie Elegy, Brazilian Sinfonietta, and Symphonie Piece). The Elegy has been done here a few times, if I remember it correctly. Personally I would recommend the [[underline]] Symphonie Piece [[/underline]] Op. 86. Although it is an earlier work (written in 1939), it is quite interesting and unusual in various respects. I have conducted it repeatedly in Europe and found it very much alive each time. It will take about 12-15 minutes, I believe. It is controlled by Schott and Universal Edition jointly and in this country probably available through Schott (It has not been performed in this country, as far as I know.)
