# Here's how Momence students got wired

School district roars into the 21st Century with Chromebooks, iPads

Four years ago, Momence schools were nearly ghost towns for modern technology. Teachers were using overhead projectors, wireless Internet was spotty and students were accustomed to pencil and paper.

Now, the schools are wired to the digital realm. About 90 sixth graders are carrying Chromebook laptops. Smart boards have replaced chalkboards. Wireless Internet is available throughout each

building, and mobile devices are replacing stationary computer labs.

It has been a transformation geared toward preparing students for college and careers, particularly by personalizing and diversifying education.

"Society is becoming digital, and we need to get our students ready for their future," sixth grade English teacher Heather Morgan said. "We are preparing them for jobs that will exist a few years from now, and they are already developing skills I did not have when I was in college."

This year, Momence Junior High initiated the school district's one-to-one device program, which distributed Chromebooks to all sixth grade students. The program has been so successful, it will extend to seventh graders

next year.

Students are able to bring the devices home and own them after four years. During enrollment, the school district charges \$100 total per year for a device and accessibility to online textbooks for each student.

Issuing Chromebooks has cast the school district in a relatively small, but expanding light on the national education stage. According to a 2013 online survey by Project Tomorrow, about one-third of students grades 6-12 have access to school-issued mobile devices.

However, the nonprofit education organization anticipates more school districts will become digitally advanced within the next few years. It projects about 47 percent of United States middle school

students will take tests online by 2017, which is a 15 percent increase from 2013.

But for the time being, technology has changed Momence's educational outlook for the ages. It has made school officials reflect and wonder what their education would have been like with Chromebooks, iPads, smart boards and the Internet.

"When I was in school, I remember my parents getting excited about buying me an encyclopedia set," said Gary Miller, superintendent of Momence schools. "Now, I don't think many students know what an encyclopedia is. Information is at their fingertips, and teachers can tailor their lesson plans because of technology."

# Plane makes emergency landing on Route 17

A small airplane landed on Illinois Route 17 on Saturday night near Bonfield after running low on fuel while flying from Kansas to Indiana.

The plane landed cleanly around 10:15 p.m. near the intersection at 8000W Road.

"It was a picture-perfect landing," said Herscher Fire Chief Alan Ramsey. "Nobody was injured and there wasn't any damage. A few people just pushed the aircraft off into a grassy area to clear the roadway."

The pilot, Quinn Bowers, a flight instructor from McPhearson, Kan., told The Daily Journal he was on his way to Goshen, Ind., to see his best friend graduate from Goshen College, a Christian liberal arts institution in the northern part of the state. He was piloting a 1979 Beechcraft Musketeer, a single engine prop airplane he had borrowed from a fellow pilot.

He told The Daily Journal he lost an engine after miscalculating fuel and was attempting to reach Greater Kankakee Airport on a glide. But he lost altitude too quickly and was unable to see the airport in the dark. Moonlight eventually revealed the strip of highway below where he could land.

"I don't know the area. I've never flown over it before," Bowers said. "I'm thankful everything turned out as well as it did."

After landing he was assisted by fire and law enforcement personnel. The airplane was towed to Koerner Aviation and given some fuel. He then landed at Greater Kankakee Airport and topped off his fuel tank before departing.

Kankakee County Undersheriff Mike Downey said the miscalculation in fuel appears to be the cause of the premature landing. Illinois State Police troopers initially investigated the landing, and the Federal Aviation Administration will investigate further.

"Fortunately nobody was hurt, but it's not every day that you see a plane landing on a highway," Downey said.

Bowers said he didn't make it to Goshen in time for the graduation ceremony, but was able to visit with some friends.

"I got to see some of the friends I wanted to see," Bowers said. "It wasn't a total loss."

# 'School funding fix could take years'

# Q&A with new state superintendent

SPRINGFIELD — The state's new superintendent of schools believes the formula to distribute state aid to Illinois schools is flawed. But, unlike lawmakers pushing for an overhaul this spring to divert more money to poorer downstate schools, he thinks finding the right solution could take several years.

Tony Smith, 48, begins his tenure at the Illinois State Board of Education on May 1. He was Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner's sole recommendation to the board before it chose him this week, but the former superintendent, of Oakland, Calif., schools said he has his own views on charters, funding equity and teacher unions.

A former professional football player, he played briefly for the Green Bay Packers and San Francisco 49ers in the early 90s but turned to a career in law and then education and teaching after being injured. He most recently oversaw a nonprofit organization focused on early childhood education.

He spoke to The Associated Press this week. Here are edited

Q. What are your views about fixing Illinois' outdated school funding formula?

A. We have to figure out what is a real fair way to talk about school funding. I don't know that that conversation will get resolved in a year or two. But it's one that must happen.

Q. The governor hasn't said if he supports the latest proposed overhaul, which would steer more money downstate rather than distribute it equally. Do you?

A. There's a deep kind of belief people hold that equal is fair. I don't think that's accurate. In a time and place where there's such (education) inequity, choosing to distribute things equally doesn't really do anything to interrupt that inequity, and we have to take that as one of our primary missions.

Q. You were the only candidate considered for this position while past superintendents were chosen through more extensive national searches. Do you have concerns about how you'll be received?

A. The things that I talked about and believe in, I think that's why I had a chance to interview with the

state board. ... We talked about the notions of inclusion and belonging and why there's a chance to build on the leadership that's in

districts across the state.

Q. The governor is an ardent supporter of charter schools. Your record on them is somewhat ambiguous. Can you clarify your position?

clarify your position?

A. We have to do everything in our power to create as many public school options as possible. And some of those places are in district public charter schools in places where they've been doing great. But a school that's not serving kids, when it's not a quality place, that's where we have to take action. I've been part of determining closures for charters.

Q. The governor talks about taking on "government union bosses." How do you plan to work with the state's teacher unions?

A. How do you get to the right kinds of agreements that honor the hard work of teachers, and recognize that this is first, foremost and always about the well-being of children? I think there are many who I've worked with in union leadership who shared the same values.

Q. You have a background working with high poverty, urban districts in California.

How will you get to know the needs of rural schools in Illinois?

A. As a young person, I grew up in different types of districts so I have a rural and an urban experience as a student. ... I've got to get to know the rural communities here and what they need in order to serve their children.

Q. How does one go from football player to school super-intendent?

A. I was going to play football and be a lawyer after I was done. I got a job in a law firm, and I really didn't like it. I was sharing that story with the director of the athletic study center at the (University of California-Berkeley) and she talked me through some of the things I did with teammates

— studying and tutoring with students at some of the local high schools. She said, 'That's what a teacher does.'

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

# **World War II Memorial makes final tour stop**

A scale model of the National World War II Memorial is now bound for the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., where it will be put on permanent

Sixth grade teachers have organized their courses through Google Classroom, an online website that enables them to email students and post assignments, in addition to video links. Other programs, such as Digidu, have enabled teachers to customize their lesson plans for individual students.

"With a few clicks of a button, I can take a lesson plan I prepared and adjust it for my [special education] students," said science teacher Jen McDermitt. "I can simplify lesson plans so every student gets what they need, and they feel equal."

The results thus far have been compelling. Teachers have noticed their students are becoming more engaged in learning and taking more ownership of their education. Rather than waiting for answers, students have learned to research effectively using the Internet.

"I used to look around the classroom and see some students with blank faces. Sometimes they would be bored," said English teacher Jamie Bleyle. "Now, they seem much more excited and engaged. They are more creative and take more pride in their work."

Bleyle tries to incorporate technology into her lesson plans as much as possible because it is "the language of this generation." She often has her students divide into centers and complete website research projects, known as "webquests."

Math teacher Ryan Drenth uses mobile devices to visualize math problems. He also uses game-based learning to make math more appealing.

'We still use paper and pencil to solve problems, but these devices have allowed me to manipulate problems in ways that students will learn how to solve them,"

Cutting back on paper usage and updating textbooks also has been a perk on the Chrome Books. Morgan has her students read from online textbooks, and McDermitt modifies her science textbook through Digidu.

McDermitt said her hardback science textbook is 14 years old. With Digidu, she can create her own online textbook that students can highlight in and translate from English to Spanish.

"We need this technology to give our kids an edge in the job world," McDermitt said. "Technology is their niche. It helps them guide the way they learn. It is not the magic wand, but it is an effective way to get them engaged and prepared for the future."

# Chanute museum plans to close over finances

A Rantoul museum that catalogues the history of a longclosed Air Force base and houses dozens of planes plans to

close at the end of the year. Leaders of the Chanute Air Museum in Rantoul say they can't afford to stay open, The News-Gazette in Champaign reported.

The museum on the former Chanute Air Force base 15 miles north of Champaign opened in 1994, soon after the base's closure. It receives financial support from the Village of Rantoul, but village officials say the town can no longer afford the bills.

"This was not an easy decision for anybody," said Nancy Kobel, the museum board's president.

Village administrator Jeff Fiegenschuh said the airport's annual utility costs of \$350,000 contributed to even more sizable yearly losses. The museum had a monthly operating budget of \$10,000, half of which covered

rent payments to Rantoul.

"The airport was losing money," he said. "We have a fiduciary responsibility to our tenants and the airport and the residents."

The departure of a sporting goods manufacturer and another tenant that leased an airport

hangar hastened the closing. Curator Mark Hanson said

the museum's 30 military planes are on loan from the federal government. He expects the military will try to find new homes for the planes.

The museum's collection also includes archival photos and documents, books and magazines, military uniforms, aircraft instruments and tools.

# Bill would allow students to opt out of state tests


SPRINGFIELD — As new standardized tests tied to the Common Core standards spark debate around the country, the Illinois Legislature is considering a bill that lays out exactly how students can opt out of the state assessment tests.

Democratic Rep. Will Guzzardi's measure, backed by the Chicago Teacher's Union, would amend the school code to allow students to choose not to take the test if they have a request in writing from a parent or guardian.

The legislation comes after Chicago Public Schools initially refused to implement the Partnership for Academic Readiness and College Careers tests in all of its schools and the state board of education threatened to withhold its funding. CPS ultimately administered the tests.

Though the tests are considered mandatory, many students around the state still are not taking them as critics question their difficulty and real benefit to students, as well as if the data collected from them ultimately will be useful.

'They're doing it right now today. The only thing that this bill will change is to create clear, concise rules about how that will happen," he said.

Meanwhile, Gov. Bruce

Rauner's education secretary warns that the bill could increase the number of students not taking the test and could prompt the loss of as much as \$1 billion annually in federal funding.

In a memo to lawmakers this week, Beth Purvis noted the state has entered an agreement with the U.S. Department of Education that it will test 95 percent of public school students in third through eighth grade and high schools in order to receive funding for low-The PARCC tests are tied third- and eighth-graders and income students. Purvis said the message read.

high school students, and a reduction in federal funding for the state is a "possible consequence" of not meeting that threshold.

'While this administration understands concerns that parents, educators and lawmakers have about how students are evaluated, (this bill) is the wrong vehicle through which to address these issues and has the potential to significantly disrupt the education of Illinois'

children," Purvis wrote. Still, Guzzardi called the administration's position on the issue "preposterous" and said he believed the loss of federal funding wouldn't occur, as states have not yet been financially penalized.

Rauner's office has been actively lobbying against the legislation's passage, and the Chicago Teachers Union sent an email blast Thursday encouraging members to call their legislators to support the bill.

# Screens are wrecking your sleep

### These companies say they can help

Let's take two points as givens. First: You know you shouldn't be staring at a laptop or phone in the hours leading up to bedtime. Second: You're doing it, anyway.

As appealing as good rest is, it often loses out to lastminute emails from don'tleagues and the Web's endless supply of ridiculously cute cats. For this, we pay dearly, both with our Zs (studies have long linked the glare of devices to poor sleep), and our workplace performance.

When it comes to screens and slumber, I long ago switched into damage-control mode. There are software and gear-based solutions that promise to mitigate the effects of late-night phone, e-reader and laptop sessions without forcing you to quit cold tur-

To understand how, some (quick!) science: When you look at a bright screen, its glow essentially tricks your brain into thinking it is daytime and you should be awake blue wavelengths that LCD and alert. "Because of the screens send their way. To three to four billion years of evolution of light during the day and darkness at night, our body clocks are not expecting light at night," said Randy Nelson, professor and chair at the Department of Neurosci-

ence at Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

The culprits here are special cells in your eyes that sense light and then tell your brain to suppress the production of melatonin — a hormone that makes you sleepy. But, as Nelson explained

to me, these cells have a secret that you can use to your advantage: They don't respond to all light equally. While the cells mostly shrug off red and orange lights, they are seriously sensitive to the reduce the effect of digitally produced light, all you have to do is minimize how much blue reaches your baby blues.

One solution I've been using lately is a lightweight piece of free software called f.lux. For me, the filtered screen considerably eases the eye strain of looking at a laptop at night. After a few weeks of using f.lux, I barely noticed it was on. Since I first downloaded the software about a year ago, I've grown rather attached to it as a must-have piece of programming.



#### **Quake-aid need acute** in Nepal capital

KATHMANDU, Nepal — Shelter, fuel, food, medicine, power, news, workers — Nepal's earthquakehit capital was short on everything Monday as its people searched for lost loved ones, sorted through rubble for their belongings and struggled to provide for their families' needs. In much of the countryside, it was worse, though how much worse was only beginning to become apparent.

The death toll soared past 3,700, even without a full accounting from vulnerable mountain villages that rescue workers were still struggling to reach two days after the disaster.

Udav Prashad Timalsina, the top official for the Gorkha district, where Saturday's magnitude 7.8 quake was centered, said he was in desperate need of help.

There are people who are not getting food and shelter. I've had reports of villages where 70 percent of the houses have been destroyed," he said.

DAUPHIN ISLAND, Ala. — Coast Guard crews searched for five people missing Sunday after recovering two bodies following a powerful weekend storm that capsized several sailboats competing in a regatta near Mobile Bay.

One body was discovered after Saturday's storm and another Sunday morning, said Major Steve Thompson, director of the Alabama Department of Public Safety's Marine Patrol Division.

Authorities said crews used boats and planes to search the Alabama waters, including areas near Dauphin Island where anxious family members have gathered at a Coast Guard station awaiting updates. Red Cross volunteers and an ambulance also were at

#### McCain renews push to end **CIA control of drone strikes**

WASHINGTON — Sen. John McCain renewed his effort to end the CIA's control over U.S. drone strikes after an attack on an al-Qaida compound in Pakistan

of U.S. military operations, it makes sense for such airstrikes to be managed by the nation's armed services rather than by spy agencies, the Arizona Republican said Sunday o CNN's "State of the Union."

McCain, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, acknowledged his bias in seeking to give the Defense Department greater control, adding the military has "the capabilities and the equip-

ment" that the Central Intelligence Agency lacks to conduct effective drone strikes.

The accidental killing of two hostages in a January drone strike was disclosed last week. It may force Congress to revisit an issue that in the past had become a turf battle among lawmakers, with intelligence committees favoring the CIA and defense committees backing the Pentagon.

#### Officials say heavy rains kill 37 in northwest Pakistan

PESHAWAR, Pakistan — Heavy rains and strong winds tore through northwest Pakistan on Sunday, uprooting trees, collapsing buildings and killing at least 37 people, officials said.

The storm also injured more than 200 people, Information Minister Mushtaq Ghani said. Winds reached up to 75 mph, said Lutfur Rehman, a local disaster management official.

"It was very unusual. It took people by surprise," Rehman said. Pakistan typically experiences such rains during its monsoon season in June and July.

An emergency was declared at all local hospitals in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, where Peshawar is the capital, Ghani said.

The rain started Sunday afternoon and caused heavy damage to the region's infrastructure, city commissioner Munir Azam said. All flight operations at the Peshawar airport were suspended because more rain was expected overnight, he said.

BALTIMORE (AP) — A night of violence gave way to a day of mourning Sunday for a man who died after sustaining serious injuries while in the custody of Baltimore police.

Over several hours on Sunday afternoon, a steady stream of mourners filed into the Vaughn Green East funeral home for a wake for Freddie Gray, the 25-year-old black man who died a week after an encounter with police left him with grave spinal injuries.

Mourners passed by Gray's silkdraped, white coffin where he lay dressed in a white shirt, black pants, white sneakers and an all-white Los Angeles Dodgers baseball cap.

Above the lid to the coffin was a floral arrangement and inside the lid was a pillow with a screen-printed picture of Gray flanked by doves and the quote, 'Peace, Y'all" at the bottom edge.

Mourners also gathered outside, and some held up signs.

Melissa McDonald, 36, who said she was Gray's cousin, wore a shirt with "Freddie Forever" printed on the back. She described her cousin as a nonviolent

"He didn't deserve to die the way he did," she said.

### Baltimore cleans up after Saturday protests

BALTIMORE — Glass shards glinted in the Sunday morning sun on the sidewalk outside the 7-Eleven in Baltimore's Inner

"We are closed today 4/26/15. Sorry for the inconvenience," said a makeshift sign taped to cardboard on the door where the glass had been shattered.

Above the door was a softball-size hole in the glass storefront.

It was a scene at a number of downtown businesses Sunday — recovering from the damage incurred during Saturday night's demonstrations, held in protest of death of Freddie Gray. The 25-year-old died April

19, a week after sustaining a spinal cord injury while in police custody.

The demonstrations turned violent Saturday, with several arrests made, police vehicles damaged and storefronts vandalized.

Inspecting the damage at the 7-Eleven, a worker for the Downtown Partnership of Baltimore said the smashed glass struck him as oddly random.

It looked like the path of a tornado — one store was hit but the surrounding ones, including a Dunkin' Donuts and Royal Farms convenience store, were left untouched.

The worker declined to be named because he said he was not authorized to speak publicly. Inside the 7-Eleven, a manager declined comment.

#### **Corinthian Colleges to** close remaining schools



# What's listeria and how is it traced to ice cream?

WASHINGTON — New technologies account for one way that the government is tracking a life-threatening outbreak of listeria linked to Blue Bell ice cream prod-

Texas-based Blue Bell Creameries recalled all its products last week after listeria was found in a variety of the company's frozen treats. The massive recall followed several smaller recalls as health officials across the country rapidly worked to track the outbreak, which is linked so far to 10 listeria illnesses in four states, including three deaths.

The investigation has been helped by technology called whole genome sequencing, which maps all of an organism's DNA. While the sequencing has been a staple of medical research, it has only recently been used regularly to track listeria outbreaks. With help from that technique, federal and state officials realized the outbreak was not just a recent event the ice cream had likely made people sick since 2010.

Questions consumers may have about the outbreak and how it's tracked:

What is listeria? Listeria is a hardy bacteria found in soil and water that can be tracked into a plant or carried by animals. It can be very difficult to get rid of once it contaminates a processing facility, partly because it grows well in refrigeration. It is commonly found in processed meats, unpasteurized cheeses and ucts contained high amounts unpasteurized milk, and it is sometimes found in other foods as well — listeria in cantaloupes was linked to 30 deaths in a 2011 outbreak.

What has been recalled?

As of Monday, Blue Bell

of its products. That follows more limited recalls of Blue Bell products made on production lines in Texas and Oklahoma after the ice cream was linked to deaths and illnesses in Kansas and Texas. The company issued Monday's recall after two samples of chocolate chip cookie dough ice cream tested positive for listeria.

#### How did they link the illnesses to the ice cream?

The first indication of listeria contamination in Blue Bell products came in January, when the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control collected samples from a Blue Bell distribution plant as part of a random sampling program. The South Carolina officials had no reason to suspect the ice cream was contaminated, but they found that two of Blue Bell's prodof listeria. South Carolina notified the Food and Drug Administration, which began an investigation that led to Monday's massive recall.

#### What else did they find?

Testing in Texas and

ice cream has recalled all Kansas found more contaminated samples that could be linked to illnesses in those states. The CDC also found past cases of listeria illnesses that could be linked to the Blue Bell products using whole genome sequencing.

#### What is whole genome sequencing?

Whole genome sequencing maps all an organism's DNA, instead of just part of it, as other tests do. Dr. Robert Tauxe of the CDC says it has enabled health officials to get better results when trying to link a person's listeria illness to a particular food. Government investigators take stool or blood samples from patients and use the tests to link them to strains of the pathogen listeria in this case — found in the food.

Tauxe says the whole genome sequencing gives officials hope that future outbreaks can be tracked faster and more accurately.

#### What are symptoms of listeria?

When a person contracts the disease, it can cause fever, muscle aches, gastrointestinal symptoms and even death.

Am I at risk? Listeria generally only affects the elderly, people with compromised immune systems and pregnant women. It can cause miscarriage, stillbirth and premature labor for women and serious illness or death in newborn babies. Healthy, younger adults and most children can consume listeria with no ill effects or only mild illness.

#### How did this happen?

State and federal inspectors still are investigating the outbreak and have not released a cause. In past outbreaks, contamination has been the result of dirty equipment or unsanitary conditions in a plant.

Blue Bell says it is expanding its cleaning and sanitization system, beefing up its employee training, expanding its swabbing system by 800 percent to include more surfaces and sending daily samples to a microbiology laboratory for testing. The 108-year-old company said it also will test all prod-

• Check servings and calories. Don't assume one package equals one serving. Look at how many calories are in each serving and give your child the proper serving size.

• Buy foods low in sodium. Children ages 1 to 3 years should consume less than 1,500 mg of sodium each day

· Look for foods and drinks low in sugars. Sugars can be listed as sucrose, glucose, high-fructose corn syrup, corn syrup, maple syrup or fructose.

· Cut out soda and juice. This will reduce empty calories from added sugars. · Give your child water and milk. Milk has a

lot of nutrients that your child needs to stay healthy. · Make sure your lifestyle is healthy, as well. You'd be surprised by how much your child notices when watching you. Your child is more likely to eat

healthfully if you do. The good news about commercially produced foods for infants and toddlers is that manufacturers are required to tell you the contents of their foods on the Nutrition Facts label. Spend a little time examining

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

#### Silver loses its luster



growth expectations. Meanwhile, other investments in the United States have been faring better in recent weeks, as stock and bond futures have been gaining value, making silver less appealing in the near term.


Conversely, some silver investors are eager to buy the metal as it nears \$15 per ounce, a price that has held the market numerous times in the past few months.



# **Enough damage done** by distracted driving

It's worth repeating: Put that cellphone down

It's becoming a common refrain but one that bears repeating based on a story that appeared in the most recent Weekend Edition of The Daily Journal.

Distracted driving is a serious problem, and despite laws intended to stop the practice, motorists just keep right on doing it.

On average, Illinois Department of Transportation data shows crashes that cause serious injury or fatality occur more frequently in Kankakee and Iroquois counties than other counties across Illinois. When officials are asked why, they cite distracted driving to be a cause on par with speeding, disobeying traffic laws, driving while impaired or driving in inclement conditions.

Just a few short years ago, it wasn't a problem, as cellphones and similar electronic devices didn't exist. The new technology has done marvels for improving communication and placing vital information at your fingertips, but that doesn't mean your fingers have to be on it all the time, especially when you're operating a motor vehicle.

Kankakee police have placed heightened focus on distracted driving and just last month handed out 31 tickets for violation of the law during an enforcement detail. Police Chief Larry Regnier said he believes the number ticketed during that crackdown represents just a sliver of those regularly violating the law but admits it's hard to prove.

But one thing that's easy to do is practice a bit of self enforcement. Use either a hands-free device as allowed by law or separate yourself from the device until you reach your destination. No phone call or text message is so important that you have to risk life or limb over it. If it is so crucial, you can pull over to

If everyone heeded the advice, the hunch here is that the trend toward higher than average serious crashes in these parts would dip substantially. Don't become a statistic. Do it for your safety and the safety of everyone else on the road.



# **Obama's Nixon doctrine: Anointing Iran**

WASHINGTON — In December, President Obama said he wished to see Iran ultimately become a "very successful regional power." His wish — a nightmare for the Western-oriented Arab states — is becoming a reality. Consider:

• Gulf of Aden: Iran sends a flotilla of warships and weapons-carrying freighters to reinforce the rebels in Yemen – a noncontiguous, non-Persian, nonthreatening (to Iran) Arabian state — asserting

Instead, the adminno intention of doing anything. Meanwhile, it exerts pressure on Saudi Arabia to halt its air war over Yemen and agree to negotiate a political settlement

involving Iran. · Russia: After a five-year suspension, Russia announces the sale of advanced surface-to-air missiles to Iran, which will render its nuclear facilities nearly invulnerable to attack. Obama's reaction? Criticism, threats, sanctions? No. A pat on the back for Vladimir Putin: "I'm, frankly, surprised that [the embargo] held this long."

· Iran: Last week, Obama pre-emptively caved on the long-standing U.S. condition that there be no immediate sanctions relief in any Iranian nuclear deal. He casually dismissed this red line, declaring that what is really important is whether sanctions can be reimposed if Iran cheats. And it doesn't stop there. The Wall

Street Journal reports that Obama is offering Tehran a \$30 billion to \$50 billion signing bonus (drawn from frozen Iranian assets) — around 10 percent of Iranian GDP.

 Svria: After insisting for years that President Bashar al-Assad of Syria "step aside," the U.S. has adopted a hands-off policy toward a regime described by our own secretary of state as an Iranian puppet.

• Iraq: Iran's Quds Force Commander Qassem Suleimani. director of Shiite militias that killed hundreds of Americans during the Iraq War and were ultimately defeated by the 2007-08 U.S. surge, operates freely throughout Iraq flaunting his country's dominance. In March. he was directing the same Iraqi militias, this time against the Islamic State — with the help of U.S. air cover.

This is the new Middle East. Its strategic reality is clear to everyone: Iran rising, assisted, astonishingly, by the United

Obama's initial Middle East strategy was simply to withdraw. He would enter history as the ultimate peace president, ushering in a new era in which "the tide of war is receding." The subsequent vacuum having been filled, unfortunately and predictably, by various enemies, adversaries and irredeemables, Obama lighted upon a new idea: We don't just withdraw, we hand the baton. To Iran.

Obama may not even be aware that he is recapitulating the Nixon doctrine, but with a fatal twist. Nixon's main focus was to get the Vietnamese to take over that war from us. But the doctrine evolved and was generalized to deputize various smaller powers to police their regions on our behalf. In the Persian Gulf. our principal proxy was Iran. The only problem with

Obama's version of the Nixon doctrine is that Iran today is not the Westernized, secular, pro-American regional power it was under the shah. It is radical, clerical, rabidly anti-imperialist, deeply anti-Western. The regime's ultimate — and openly declared — strategic purpose is to drive the American infidel from the region and either subordinate or annihilate America's Middle Eastern allies.

Which has those allies in an understandable panic. Can an American president really believe that appeasing Iran territorially, economically, militarily and by conferring nuclear legitimacy — will moderate its behavior and ideology, adherence to which despite all odds is now yielding undreamed of success?

Iran went into the nuclear negotiations heavily sanctioned, isolated internationally, hemorrhaging financially was even before the collapse of oil prices. After 17 months of serial American concessions. the Iranian economy is growing again, its forces and proxies are on the march through the Arab Middle East and it is on the verge of having its nuclear defiance rewarded and legitimized.

The Saudis are resisting being broken to Iranian dominance. They have resumed their war in Yemen. They are resisting being forced into Yemen negotiations with Iran, a country that is, in the words of the Saudi ambassador to the U.S., "part of the problem, not part of the solution."

Obama appears undeterred. He's determined to make his Iran-first inverted Nixon Doctrine a reality. Our friends in the region, who for decades have relied on us to protect them from Iran, look on astonished.

### Anyone remember how to write a check?

WASHINGTON — Writing a check always has been a fundamentally strange act. There's the fussy ceremony of writing out the amount in words and drawing the squiggly line across the remainder of the space, ostensibly to protect against a type of fraud — tampering with individual digits — that's quaint by today's standards. There's the questionable business of handing a complete stranger a document with your bank account and routing number printed plainly across it.

And of course, the memo line — an open invitation to humiliate your friends and leave passive-aggressive notes to your

Today, Americans are writing fewer checks than ever. According to the Federal Reserve's most recent study of how Americans pay for things, "the number of checks paid declined more than 50 percent since 2000." Meanwhile, electronic and card payments tripled over the same period.

As check use declines, we tend to forget the details of that strange ceremony of writing them. And naturally, we turn to Google to jog our memories. Falling check use has been accompanied by a rise Google searches for "how to write a check." Today, those searches are nearly five times as prevalent as they were 10 years ago. And each year, those searches peak in late August and early September — when kids are returning to college. Students living off-campus for the first time are likely facing the daunting task of writing their first checks, for electric bills, cable payments or especially for rent. As Bloomberg News notes,

checks still dominate the world of rent payments. "The rental market is huge and fragmented," Bloomberg writes. There are millions of landlords overseeing just one or two properties, and for these folks there's little reason to invest the money required to move to an electronic or card payment system.

Looking at the geography of check befuddlement, searches for "how to write a check" appear

to be clustered in the Northeast — Pennsylvania leads the pack, followed by Delaware, New York, Massachusetts and Hawaii. There are a lot of colleges in the Northeast, which fits the hypothesis of confused college kids driving the trend. But it doesn't explain why there are also a lot of people looking for checkwriting help in Oklahoma, or in

Overall we should be welcoming the trend of falling check use. They're cumbersome to write, and cumbersome to cash. They invite fraudulent behavior. And with the information contained on them, writing a check to someone is akin to giving them the keys to your bank account, and trusting that they won't help themselves to what's

But in terms of pure volume we're still writing a ton of checks — about 18.3 billion per year, according to the Federal Reserve. That's about 77 checks for every adult resident of the U.S. While the End of Checks may indeed be on the horizon, it's not quite here yet.

# White Sox take 2 from sparring partner

CHICAGO — David Robertson threw the first pitch of the afternoon and the last one. And the Chicago White Sox hoped it would go that way on one strange

Robertson got a win and a save as the White Sox won a pair of games against the Kansas City Royals. The day began with Avisail Garcia's two-out RBI single, sending Chicago to a 3-2 victory in the resumption of a game suspended by rain on Friday night, and it concluded with the White Sox rallying for a 5-3 win.

"[Robertson] starting off the day like he did and then finishing it off, it was nice," manager Robin Ventura said. "Good day when you get two wins in one day.

The White Sox and Royals were tied at 2 when Friday night's game was suspended by rain after eight innings. Robertson (2-0) was on the mound when they resumed, and the closer got three outs before Garcia drove in Melky Cabrera in the bottom half with his first career game-ending hit against Kelvin Herrera (0-1).

Robertson, who signed a \$46 million, four-year contract with Chicago over the winter, then returned for the ninth inning of the second game and got Omar Infante to bounce out with two runners on for his

"It's not really any different than going out and having a little flat-ground and playing catch before the game and coming back in," Robertson said. "You're throwing a little bit harder obviously with more intensity out there on the field, but I was prepared for it and thankfully I didn't end up throwing 30 or 40 pitches each inning.'

Alex Gordon hit a two-run homer for Kansas City, which won its first four games of the season against Chicago. Gordon, a four-time Gold Glove winner in left, also made a pair of nice defensive plays, including an outstanding leaping grab into

the stands on Micah Johnson's foul liner in the sixth.

'When I was going over I knew when I jumped I was going to jump in the stands," Gordon said. "I kind of had an idea of where the fence was and how low it was.

I just said I gotta make the catch here and that was it."

Kansas City right-hander Edinson Volquez (2-2) was charged with one earned run and five hits in 5 2/3 innings. The right-hander pitched at least seven innings and allowed three runs or less in each of his first three starts.

The White Sox had just one hit and trailed 3-0 before they pushed across five runs in the sixth. Third baseman Mike Moustakas committed a costly error on Jose Abreu's grounder, allowing Adam Eaton to score, and Conor Gillaspie put Chicago in front with a two-run single.

"It's a play I need to make. Ninety-nine out of 100 times I make that play," Moustakas said. "The one time I don't make it, they score five.'

John Danks (1-2) pitched six innings of three-run ball while improving to 8-1 with a 2.73 ERA in 18 career starts against Kansas City.



# **Busch goes** from courtroom to Victory Lane

Leads 291 laps in dominating Richmond victory

RICHMOND, Va. — Kurt Busch has spent time this year in a Delaware courtroom, then on NASCAR's sidelines as he served a three-race suspension for an alleged domestic assault on a former girlfriend.

Now he has made a trip to Victory Lane, where Busch hoped his victory Sunday at Richmond International Raceway will help him close one of the messiest chapters of his volatile career.

"Standing on the truth the whole time, that gave me the feeling of when I do get back to the car, it's going to be easy to focus, and I think I've shown that," said Busch, who still has a no-contact order against him that was issued in February by a Delaware Family Court judge. The judge ruled that Busch likely assaulted ex-girlfriend Patricia Driscoll in September.

The 2004 series champion dominated the rain-delayed NASCAR Sprint Cup race that was originally scheduled for Saturday night under the lights.

The Stewart-Haas Racing driver led a career-best 291 of the 400 laps on the 0.75-mile oval, outrunning teammate Kevin Harvick over the final dozen laps to end a 35-race winless streak.

Earlier in his return, he said he was trying too hard.

'I think I might have been driving too hard, too much of a chip on my shoulder, so to speak," he said, adding that he realized last weekend that there is danger in driving along the line that separates effectively aggressive and overly aggressive.

One week later, he's already secured a spot in NASCAR's 10-race playoff.

'We're winners in April. It feels good," he said. "Plenty of time to do fun things to build the team up, get stronger, learn from all these races coming up and continue to go forward."

"Like [team owner] Gene Haas said: One win is great. I want four or five more."

Harvick, meanwhile, finished in the top two for the seventh time in nine races but said he had to rally after his car struggled on one set of tires and drifted back into the

The race looked much like the Xfinity Series event Friday night in which Denny Hamlin led 248 of 250 laps and only lost the lead during green flag pit stops. This time, there were actual green flag lead changes, but only two — when Busch passed Joey Logano after 94 laps to take the lead, and when Jamie McMurray passed Busch after 262 laps.

Busch regained the lead under caution and never relinquished it, beating Harvick to the finish by 0.754 seconds. The victory was the 26th of Busch's career and second at Richmond.

Jimmie Johnson rallied from a No. 36 starting spot to grab third. McMurray was fourth, and pole-sitter Logano, who led the first 94 laps, was fifth. Rookie Chase Elliott, making his second start in NASCAR's premier series, finished 16th.

McMurray's pass came during a series of green flag stops, and when a caution came out on lap 270, only three cars were on the lead lap, including Busch, who had just pitted. He stayed out, regained the lead and slowly pulled away from Justin Allgaier, who got up front because of the green flag

'We just had a really good car after 40 or 50 laps," McMurray said. "Really, for us to have a shot at winning, we had to have a long green-flag run at the end."

Harvick was closing on him in the final laps, but "just ran out of time," he said.

The day was especially disappointing for Hamlin, who grew up about 20 miles from the track and had a dominating Friday, qualifying second and leading 248 of 250 laps in the Xfinity Series race.

That, however, was before rain all day Saturday washed all the rubber off the track, and when the race began Sunday, Hamlin began fading immediately. He went a lap down after 236 laps and finished 22nd.

# **Rose wins Zurich** Classic for 7th **PGA victory**

### Ko takes Swinging Skirts for 2nd year in a row

AVONDALE, La. — Justin Rose birdied the final two holes Sunday to win the Zurich Classic.

Rose, who entered the week ranked ninth in the world, completed a 7-under 65 in the rain-delayed third round and closed with a 66 at TPC Louisiana for his seventh PGA Tour title.

The Englishman has won at least once in six straight seasons, the second-longest streak on the tour behind Dustin Johnson's eight straight.

Playing aggressively on a soggy course, Rose made six birdies in the final round and played the last 66 holes without a bogey. He finished at 22-under 266.

Rose's final two putts from 10 and 13 1/2 feet allowed him to hold off Cameron Tringale by a stroke. Tringale birdied the 18th for a 65.



# Russell's double sends **Cubs home** happy

21-year-old rookie ends first week on big note

CINCINNATI — Rookie ddison Russell finished his first week in the majors with his biggest

The youngest player in the National League doubled with the bases loaded on Sunday, and the Chicago Cubs held on for a 5-2 victory and a sweep of their rain-shortened series against the Cincinnati Reds.

The 21-year-old second baseman was in a slump when he broke the game open with his three-run double in the fourth inning off Anthony DeSclafani (2-1). Russell was called up on Tuesday and was only 2 for 19 with 11 strikeouts heading into that at-bat.

"I'm just understanding this whole process," Russell said. "It may be overnight, it may take a few games, it may take a few at-bats. I'm just trying to stay patient and stay with my approach and believe in my talent."

His teammates have seen enough to know that he has talent aplenty.

"Those are things he's going to be able to do more often the more comfortable he gets here," starter Jake Arrieta said. "He's had some at-bats where he looks a little, and the next time he comes up he has great swing at the ball."

Miguel Montero had a solo homer and a runscoring single off DeSclafani, who had a streak of 16 scoreless innings snapped.

Arrieta (3-1) pitched six innings after waiting out a 4-hour, 13-minute delay before the Reds called off Saturday's game because of persistent rain. The Cubs won the series opener on Friday night, 7-3 in 11 innings.

Arrieta gave up four hits, including Todd Frazier's solo homer, and struck out six. Hector Rondon gave up a hit in the ninth while earning his fourth save in five chances.

The Cubs are 10-7 under

first-year manager Joe Maddon, their best start since 2008 when they went 11-6. Chicago won the division that year under

manager Lou Piniella. Montero hit his 100th career homer in the second inning, ending the longest scoreless streak of DeSclafani's career and giving the Cubs a 1-0 lead.

The Cubs sent eight batters to the plate for four unearned runs in the fourth, set up by Frazier's fielding error at third base. Montero singled home a run, and the Reds intentionally walked Chris Coghlan with one out to load the bases and bring up the bottom of the

Arrieta struck out on three pitches, but Russell doubled off the base of the wall in right-center field for three runs. Russell was called up from the minors on Tuesday.

Arrieta retired the first  $11 \ \text{Reds} - \text{only two of}$  them got the ball out of the infield — before Frazier homered. Lance Lynn (1-2) allowed six runs on 10 hits in five innings.

The Brewers took a 3-0 lead in third after Logan Schafer reached on infield single that bounced off the back of Lynn and Gerardo Parra tripled. Cardinals right fielder Jason Heyward appeared to stumble on Parra's hit and left the game with left groin tightness, and was listed as day to day.

Lind then hit his third homer.

The Cardinals got a run back in the fourth when Jon Jay, who replaced Heyward, singled with two outs. Jay moved up when Lind mishandled a pickoff throw and scored on Jhonny Peralta's single.

Mark Reynolds, who played last season for Milwaukee, cut the lead to 3-2 with his first home run to lead off the fifth, chasing Fiers.

The Brewers scored three times in the bottom half on doubles by Parra, Khris Davis and Elian Herrera, and an RBI single by Hector Gomez.

Catcher Cody Stanley, called up from Triple-A to take Wainwright's roster spot, made his major League debut as a pinch hitter to lead off the eighth and singled. He later scored on Matt Adams bases-loaded grounder.

Cardinals catcher Yadier Molina was out of the lineup for the second straight day as he recovers from getting hit by a foul tip on Friday. "He's feeling better, even though we just need to go ahead and take at least another day," manager Mike Matheny said. "He can hit, he can run, but squatting is the major issue right now.

Cardinals RHP John Lackey gets the start as the Cards return home tonight for a four-game series against Philadelphia after a six-game road trip. He is 1-0 with a 4.34 ERA in three starts.

#### Wainwright on 15-day DL, could be out much longer

St. Louis Cardinals ace Adam Wainwright is out at least 15 days because of an injury to his Achilles and left ankle. It could be longer, much longer — possibly even for the whole season.

Hurt while batting Saturday night in Milwaukee, Wainwright was scheduled for an MRI today that likely will reveal how long he'll be gone.

"Unfortunately, it is not great news," general manager John Mozeliak said in a video on the Cardinals' website. "Any way you slice it, he is going to be missed for a while and potentially losing the season is very

Several published reports said the Cardinals expect Wainwright to be out for the season. Manager Mike Matheny would only say the pitcher will be examined when the team returns to St. Louis.

"I don't like to speculate until you have the full information, but if you ask me how I feel. . . not good," Mozeliak told the St. Louis PostDispatch. "All those rumors floating around seem to have some validity to them."

The 33-year-old Wainwright was put on the 15-day disabled list Sunday. He was hurt while stumbling out of the batter's box after hitting a popup in the fifth inning at Miller

Several top pitchers in recent years have been lost for most of a season or all of it — Matt Harvey, Yu Darvish, Jose Fernandez and Zack Wheeler, among them.

But those were related to pitching, with Tommy John surgery the result. Wainwright had that same procedure and missed the 2011 season when St. Louis won the World Series.

This time, Wainwright got hurt hitting, a few days after Washington ace Max Scherzer injured his thumb batting. Those kind of incidents are likely to ramp up the long AL vs. NL debate on the designated hitter, as in whether it's worth having pitchers bat.

## Fight week begins with Pacquiao caravan to Vegas

\$100 grand for ringside seats to richest fight in history

LAS VEGAS — The last time Freddie Roach was on the interstate linking Los Angeles with this boxing capital, he was written up for going 140 mph.

Roach will be driving a lot slower today as part of a colorful caravan of hundreds of cars heading down Interstate 15 with Manny Pacquiao for his showdown with Floyd Mayweather Jr.

'Manny will spar on Monday for the last time and after that we'll break camp and everyone will go to their cars and trucks," Roach said. "The entourage used to be about 100 cars, I'd say there might be 1,000 cars this time."

Fight week is finally here, and even in a city known for the outlandish it is shaping up to be something special. The richest fight in history has spawned \$100,000 ringside tickets, hotel rooms going for \$1,600 per night, and a pay-per-view price just a nickel shy of a \$100

Even \$10 tickets to see the two fighters at the weigh-in are running as much as \$700 through online ticket brokers.

Everything is over the top for the megafight that was five years in the making. That includes the caravan that will bring Pacquiao to Las Vegas, featuring hundreds of cars and a custom bus wrapped in Pacquiao's image for some of the luckier members of

his entourage.

"I might have the fastest car," Roach said. "But if I get one more of those tickets I can't drive anymore. I asked the police officer, why do they make these cars so fast if you can't drive that way? I should have shut my mouth."

Pacquiao is scheduled to arrive at the Delano Las Vegas hotel at Mandalay Bay sometime early evening today following seven weeks of training at Roach's Wild Card Boxing Club in Hollywood. His arrival marks the unofficial kickoff to a fight week unlike any other in a city used to hosting the biggest fights.

So far it doesn't look like promoters underestimated the demand for the fight. The cheapest ticket on the StubHub website Sunday was \$5,245, while ringside seats were being offered for as much as \$106,950. Even tickets to watch on closed circuit at various MGM-

owned properties in Las Vegas — which originally sold for \$150 — were being offered at \$620 or more

Everybody will pay for a fight that will likely earn Mayweather \$180 million and Pacquiao \$120 million. Even Roach had to shell out \$70,000 for 20 tickets for family and friends, though he was able to get his at retail prices.

"My mother asked for four tickets and my mother gets whatever she wants," Roach said. "My brothers and sister all want to go. I'm happy I can afford to buy them tickets."

While Pacquiao will be arriving in town, Mayweather lives here and has been training at his own gym just west of the Las Vegas Strip. His promoter, Leonard Ellerbe, said Sunday that Mayweather will treat the week just like any other big fight he has been involved in.

"It's a typical fight week, business as usual," Ellerbe said. "Floyd is going to put on a spectacular performance, you can count on that.'

Ellerbe said he isn't surprised by the demand for anything to do with the fight, which will smash records for biggest gate and almost surely set records for payper-view sales.

"Everything is out of the stratosphere," he said. "It shows you the world wide appeal of this fight."

Roach can be forgiven if he speeds a bit on his way to town. A seven-time winner of the trainer of the year award by the Boxing Writers of America, he said Pacquiao guaranteed him a win last week so he would win the award for an eighth time.

"This will be my biggest win ever," Roach said. "This one really counts, it will be in the history books the rest of our lives. I think my guy is ready for it."
