# Winter slaps area with storm after warm spell

## First came ice, then came the flooding

Monday’s brutal introduction to winter left in its wake at least 20 accidents, flooded roads and at least 1,000 residents without power through midnight.

While today’s forecast seems far more subdued — 34 degrees and only the slightest chance for rain — that wasn’t the case across this area and most of northern Illinois.

“Believe it or not, we’re in better shape than the rest of the state,” said Chad Gessner, Kankakee County’s emergency management director. “They’re getting walloped, especially down in the south, where flooding killed five people. It’s manageable up here.”

There were at least 20 accidents throughout Kankakee County. State workers also had been dealing with accidents on Interstate 57 and Illinois Route 1 near Grant Park.

The Kankakee County Sheriff’s Department was backed up with accidents. It sent administrators out in the field to help keep up.

As the weather warmed, the icy conditions turned into flood concerns. The

Snow, ice and sleet pounded northern Illinois on Monday, causing wrecks, flooding and road closures. Despite a bit of relief in the coming days, the area is under threat of rising water.

National Weather Service issued a flood advisory for the Kankakee River at Momence until 6 p.m. Friday. The river also flooded across Birchwood Lane in Aroma Park. That has Gessner praying for warmer and dryer conditions.

“If that river freezes over at flood stage, we could have an ice jam problem,” he said. “This hasn’t been in our winter game plan, but we’ll revert back to our spring game plan.”

In Wichert, a family was left stranded when the bridge to their home got swept away, on County Road 10000 East at 2400 South. Firefighters assisted them.

Ditches along County Road 4000E were flooded from Bourbonnais to the

Manteno Golf Club, prompting flash flood warnings. Water also covered parts of St. George Road and Skyline Road, while fallen trees blocked off roads in Momence.

About midnight, ComEd reported more than 1,000 residences in Kankakee County still were without power. Several wires fell down throughout the county.

In Iroquois County, the Illinois Route 1 viaduct north of Milford was closed as of 1 p.m. County Road 41 bridge north of Stockland was also closed. There was standing water on 2120E north of Woodland and Blue Bell Bend Road in Watseka.

## Coach resigns amid assault allegations

Yorkville police investigate, but no charges have been filed

The Herscher High School wrestling coach accused of assaulting six students at a Yorkville hotel earlier this month during an overnight tournament trip, resigned on Monday night — though he has not been charged with a crime.

David Murphy, 29, who also taught social studies at the school, submitted his brief letter of resignation through his attorney, said school Superintendent Rich Decman. Herscher school district’s board of education approved his resignation by a 4-2 vote, with Joe Powers and Pat Daily voting against accepting it.

“Based on what we’ve been told about the case, I felt termination is more justifiable than a resignation,” Powers said. “As a school board member, it is my duty to protect the kids and make sure they are safe. A resignation isn’t enough to assure that.”

The board met in closed session for two hours before reaching a decision during the special meeting. Though he couldn’t comment about the ongoing criminal investigation, Decman said he is disappointed in how long the process has taken so far.

## How 2 recruits kept in touch and got married

Cortney Adams and Danny Carmona enlisted in the Army together, pledging to protect the United States. On Sunday, the young couple

from Iroquois County made a vow to each other. They got married.

The newlyweds hadn’t seen each other in nearly six months before they got married. Cortney, 18, from Watseka, was stationed in South Carolina, and Danny, 20, from Ashkum, was stationed a state away in Georgia.

They were in basic training together for two weeks in South Carolina, but were unable to see each other since they were in different units. Tested by the military, their love for each other stayed strong. After all, those six months repre-

sent about one-third of their relationship.

“You have your drill sergeants and peers telling you, ‘It’s dumb. You need to be done with them. They don’t care about you,’” Cortney said. “But in my heart, I knew Danny cared about me. I knew he loved me.”

“A lot of relationships don’t survive in the Army,” Danny added. “Soldiers get letters from significant others, but they often end up breaking it off. We’re stronger than that.”

The couple corresponded through letters after they enlisted in June. Around

facts about this incredibly wacky weather

Warm Christmas morning

For many cities in the South and East, temperatures Christmas morning were more than 10 degrees above the average high for Dec. 25. This also was the case in the days leading up to Christmas.

Warmer mornings than afternoons

During the first phase of the widespread December warmth, several Northeast and Midwest cities set daily record high temperatures in the morning rather than in the more typical afternoon time frame when it usually occurs. This happened four mornings in a row Dec. 12-15.

Latest first snow

Buffalo, N.Y., saw its latest first measurable snow (0.1 inches or greater) of the season on Friday, Dec. 18. Before 2015, the latest first measurable snow there was more than two weeks earlier: Dec. 3, 1899.

NYC record

The persistent December warmth may give New York City its longest stretch of days without dipping below the freezing mark (32 degrees) at Central Park.

6,000 temperature records set

Another way to look at the mild December is the number of record warm temperatures set so far this month. According to preliminary data from NOAA's National Centers for Environmental Information, at least 2,646 record daily highs were tied or broken across the U.S. during the first 20 days of December. An additional 3,728 record-warm daily low temperatures have been set during the same time period. Those two figures added together mean we've seen 6,374 warm temperature records set so far this month, with many more on the way. By comparison, in the first 20 days of December, we saw just 146 daily record lows and 135 additional record cool highs.

Behind the scenes at the 66th annual KHT

Cars were sliding off roads across Illinois as an ice storm cooled off a warmer-than-average December. Some area residents were dealing with power outages and others faced threatening floodwaters.

But at the Kankakee High School gym, the 16-team, four-day Kankakee Holiday boys' basketball tournament tipped off, just as it has for the past 65 years. And while the eight opening-round games played out as planned, that doesn't mean all of it was calm in the tourney planning office.

"I was ready to panic" said first-year KHS athletic director and tournament director Ronnie Wilcox. "I was thinking with the weather forecast we might have to cancel the first day. But I got emails out to all of the coaches and warned them about getting on the road early.

"And we only had one team run into problems. The Thornridge [High School] bus was in a traffic jam on [Interstate] 57, but they made it," he said. "Its still keeping the fans away, but we're getting through it."

Of course, Wilcox said he isn't really content with just surviving this year: He has bigger plans for the holiday tradition.

"It's in the works to bring the tournament back to the old Abe Lincoln Gym at the King Upper Grade Center," he said. "We're talking about making some improvements over there: Some new bleachers; redoing

the floor; getting some new backboards; and some other projects.

"Our plans are to fund it with tournament proceeds and some alternate sources," he added. "We're not going for district funds."

Wilcox noted the new location would have room for about 1,000 additional fans. He also remarked that "this gym is underappreciated."

"I think with the improvements we're looking at, this could be one of the top 10 high school gyms in northern Illinois," he said.

Meanwhile, though, he said he has to focus on the games at hand, and all of the behind-the-scenes jobs left to accomplish.

"We're going to have some good games. BBCHS [Bradley-Bourbonnais Community High School] has a good shot at winning its third title in a row. They're very good. And a team you might not have heard of, Seton Academy [in Chicago] ... you might see them win it all at state tournament time."

Wilcox' focus though, is not always on the gym floor; where a former head coach might be expected to prefer spending his time.

"I am just so fortunate to have the great group of volunteers who are part of the tradition here. We have more than 100 people, doing everything from concessions to stats and even making sure that we're streaming these games and getting them on local cable TV.

"This is a big job, even without the headaches the weather is causing."

Investigation slowed by lack of cooperation

The victim of a Christmas Day shooting in Pembroke Township remains hospitalized, and the investigation is stalling because potential witnesses aren't talking.

The 25-year-old man was shot at least five times as he walked down the 13900 block of East County 3000S Road at about 11:22 p.m. Reports indicate he had just left a party.

Ken McCabe, chief deputy for Kankakee County sheriff's police, said the victim will recover but suffered serious injury.

He said the investigation has been slowed by a lack of cooperation.

He did not rule out that the shooting could be related to a Dec. 19 shooting that sent a man to the hospital. Brandon J. Brewer was arrested in Indianapolis last week as the alleged shooter in that incident. Brewer is fighting extradition.

Friday's shooting also could be related to the Nov. 28 murder of Zennia Brooks-Young, 83, of Hopkins Park.

Van Dyke expected to enter plea

Chicago cop charged in 2014 fatal shooting in court today

CHICAGO — A white Chicago police officer charged with murder in the 2014 fatal shooting of black teenager Laquan McDonald is expected to enter a plea today.

Veteran Officer Jason Van Dyke faces six counts of first-degree murder and one of official misconduct in the 17-year-old's death.

Public outcry has been furious since a dashcam video was released last month showing Van Dyke shooting McDonald 16 times.

The teenager, armed with a knife, was veering away from officers when Van Dyke opened fire.

The footage sparked days of street demonstrations, the forced resignation of Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy and a broad federal civil rights investigation of the police department's practices and how allegations of officer misconduct are handled.

During the weekend, Chicago Police shot and killed two other people, a 55-year-old woman who was

shot accidentally and a 19-year-old man whom police have said was "combative" before he was shot.

The department will not say how many officers fired their weapons or what the two people were doing before they were shot.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel, who has been the target of heavy criticism and calls for resignation since the McDonald video was released last month, is due to return this afternoon from a family vacation in Cuba.

The six students — four girls and two boys who are between the ages of 16 and 18 years old — filed restraining orders against Murphy in Kankakee County Court on Dec. 17. They filed the orders after an incident that allegedly took place late Dec. 11 at the Hampton Inn in Yorkville, where the wrestling team was staying for a weekend tournament.

According to court documents, Murphy brought alcohol into a hotel room, then kissed and inappropriately touched

the girls. Both boys, who allegedly tried to intervene, said the former Marine grabbed them by the throat and threatened them.

Murphy allegedly apologized to the girls the following day, telling them he was "just being affectionate," according to a description of the incident in one of the restraining orders.

Herscher school officials suspended Murphy, who worked at the school for four years, after being informed of the allegations on Dec. 16. At the time, they said he wouldn't be involved with the school until the situation was resolved.

Yorkville police continue to investigate the allegations.

Additional road closures were likely. Iroquois County Emergency Management Agency Director Eric Ceci said drivers should take care not to drive into any flooded roadways, as the submerged path may be washed away or the vehicle could become stuck or swept away itself.

The Iroquois River is at 17.29 feet, and is expected to rise to 22.2 feet by Wednesday. Minor flood stage is 18 feet, and moderate stage is 24 feet. A flood warning was issued for Chebanse through Friday afternoon.

Sugar Creek in Iroquois County is at 21.11 feet, and is expected to rise to 22.5 feet by this morning. Minor flood stage is 18 feet, and moderate stage is 22.

In light of the five fatalities caused by flooding in southern Illinois, the state's emergency management agency reiterated "turn around, don't drown" in a conference call.

"If you see flooding, don't try to drive through it," Gessner said. "It's unsafe and it could be deadly. The state's already had five people die from floods after the storm struck."

## Was 2015 worse for the world than last year?

A recent poll found 57 percent of Americans saying this year was worse than 2014; mass shootings weighed heavily as the most important events

NEW YORK — Mass shootings and attacks weighed heavily on the minds of Americans in 2015, according to a new poll that found most believe this year was worse for the world than last year.

A look at the key findings of The Associated Press-Times Square Alliance poll:

PREOCCUPIED  
BY MASS SHOOTINGS

Americans say the most important events of 2015 were a string of mass shootings, including the attacks in San Bernardino, Calif., and Paris, plus Islamic State group atrocities.

Fifty-seven percent of those polled say this year was worse than the last year for the world as a whole, up from the 38 percent asked that question a year ago. Only 10 percent believe 2015 was a better year than 2014, and 32 percent think there wasn't much difference.

Americans also are much less likely than they were a year ago to believe the current

year was better for the United States — only 17 percent compared with 30 percent a year ago. Thirty-seven percent think this year was worse for the country than last year, and 44 percent don't think there was much difference.

On a personal level, fewer than a third (29 percent) believe 2015 was better for them than 2014, and 21 percent feel it was worse, com-

pared with 15 percent in 2014.

Interviewed separately from the poll, Jason Pruitt, a 43-year-old corporate pilot from the Detroit area, said security concerns were a factor in deciding whether to take his wife and daughter along on a Christmas trip to New York.

"We were thinking about not coming this year because of everything that's going on," Pruitt said. But they went ahead "because when you change your life,

the terrorists win."

THREE EVENTS  
SHARE THE TOP SPOT

Of those polled, 68 percent listed mass shootings in the U.S. as very or extremely important news events this year, including the one in San Bernardino that heightened fears of domestic terrorism, plus shootings in Charleston, S.C.; Roseburg, Ore.; and Chattanooga, Tenn.

Close behind, at 64 percent, were the Paris attacks that ushered in 2015, targeting Charlie Hebdo and the Jewish market, then the Bataclan concert hall and other city sites in November.

And third, at 63 percent, came the Islamic State group's various far-flung atrocities.

"At this point, I'm numb to all of it," 32-year-old J.P. Fury, working in a food truck in Times Square, said. "This is nothing new. Every week there's a new shooting somewhere in America, and there's a new terrorist attack somewhere around the world."




Poll: Violence dampened 2015

of blacks in encounters with police that sparked "Black Lives Matter" protests in Baltimore and Chicago.

Another 44 percent rate the deal reached to curtail Iran's nuclear program as important, and nearly as many (42 percent) Europe's migrant crisis.

Only 40 percent said the presidential race was important to them, with the Paris climate change conference right behind (at 38 percent), followed by the Supreme Court's legalization of gay marriage (36 percent) and the Cuban-U.S. thaw (30 percent).

RINGING IN THE NEW YEAR

Most Americans plan to celebrate New Year's Eve either at home (48 percent) or at the home of a friend or family member (20 percent). Nine percent plan to be at a bar, restaurant or organized event, and less than a quarter (22 percent) don't plan to celebrate at all.

A majority of Americans (56 percent) will watch the New Year's Eve events in Times Square, and 95 percent of those will see it on TV.

Those findings were similar to the past two years.

# Meadowlark Lemon, key Harlem Globetrotters member, dies at 83

Long before athletes tweeted, and in-your-face dunks and tackles could be shared by millions instantly, Meadowlark Lemon became one of the most popular sports personalities in the world.

His dazzling basketball skills and slapstick humor were a key attraction for perhaps the most famous basketball team ever, the Harlem Globetrotters. He became known as the “Clown Prince of Basketball,” appearing before presidents and kings and portraying himself in television programs, movies and cartoons.

Lemon “just had a great joy,” Los Angeles Clippers coach Doc Rivers said Monday.

He died Sunday in Scottsdale, Ariz., at the age of 83. The cause of death was not known, said Brett Meister, a spokesman for the Globetrotters.

Meister said Lemon had been scheduled to fly from his Scottsdale home to Chicago to take part in taping an ESPN special as part of the Globetrotters' 90th anniversary tour.

Lemon spent 24 years with the Globetrotters, joining the team in 1954 and acting as ringleader and showman-in-chief during the team's heyday through the 1960s and '70s.

Lemon and the Trotters toured more than 100 countries, introducing the sport to millions who never had

before seen a basketball thrown through a hoop and breaking down cultural and racial barriers along the way.

During Lemon's early days, the all-black Globetrotters' influence was no less in the

United States. The team showcased the talents of African-American players such as Reece “Goose” Tatum and dribbling wizard Marques Haynes at a time when the fledgling National Basketball Association was largely white and lacked the razzle-dazzle of America's first show-time team.

The Globetrotters played exhibition ball, mixing theater and sports. But they were also seriously competitive, especially in the early years. Their victory in 1948 over the Minneapolis Lakers helped put the NBA on the map.

Many have speculated that Lemon might have been a huge NBA star had the league been more welcoming to black players.

By the time Lemon departed the Globetrotters in 1978, the NBA was far more integrated, and a more aggressive athleticism was helping it gain worldwide popularity. Lemon's basketball chops would influence Michael Jordan and other greats.

The Globetrotters' street style was something that helped draw fans to their games.

“I remember my dad taking me to Chicago Stadium and getting to see him (Lemon) and Curly Neal and the whole group,” Rivers said. “Then I

get back home and I'm sitting in the backyard and I'm doing the ball-spinning-on-my-finger thing.”

Famously, Wilt Chamberlain joined the Globetrotters for a year in 1958, fresh out of the University of Kansas. But there was no question of who had the starring role.

Lemon was an entertainer, smack-talking through games, chasing referees with water buckets and teasing spectators with similar buckets of confetti. The teams' usual foils were the mostly white — and hapless — Washington Generals.

But Lemon backed the comedy up with jaw-dropping half-court hook shots and no-look behind-the-back passes.

“Meadowlark was the most sensational, awesome, incredible basketball player I've ever seen,” Chamberlain said during an interview with The Associated Press before his death in 1999. “People would say it would be Dr. J (Julius Erving) or even Michael Jordan. For me, it would be Meadowlark Lemon.”

The late Los Angeles Times sports columnist Jim Murray described Lemon as “an American institution whose uniform should hang alongside the Spirit of St. Louis and the Gemini space capsule in the halls of the Smithsonian Institute.”

Meadowlark Lemon was born on April 25, 1932, in

Wilmington, N.C. His given name was Meadow Lemon III, according to his website, but he legally changed his name to Meadowlark in the 1950s.

He started out playing football at local playgrounds. When he was 11, according to his website, he saw a newsreel about the Harlem Globetrotters and was taken by their slick showmanship, which was accompanied by their signature tune “Sweet Georgia Brown.”

At the time, he wrote that his family was so poor that he practiced by rigging a makeshift hoop with an onion sack and coat hanger. He used an empty Carnation milk can as a ball. After a boy's club opened nearby, he finally got to handle a real basketball, practicing his shots for as many as 18 hours per day, he wrote.

In April 1952, the Globetrotters received a letter from Lemon asking for a tryout, according to the team's Web page. While serving two years in the Army, he played a few games on an overseas tour for the team and owner Abe Saperstein gave Lemon a chance.

He was inducted into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in 2003 as well as the International Clown Hall of Fame. An ordained minister, he worked as a motivational speaker until his death.

# Population decline symbolic of state’s woes

Moving vans serve as no-confidence vote

Moving on out seems to be popular when it comes to Illinois. Data gathered by the U.S. Census and reported by the Illinois News Network shows Illinois had 105,200 more people leave in the last year (2014) than move in. Some of that is offset by the number of births in the state and by immigration into the state from foreign countries. Even when you add that in, Illinois still was one of a handful of states, seven in all, that actually shrunk in terms of population. In fact, the decline in Illinois was greater than that of the other six states (Connecticut, Maine, Mississippi, New Mexico, Vermont and West Virginia) added together. We are, sadly, No. 1. The two states with the greatest growth are Florida and Texas. Climate is part of their advantage. Note, though, that neither has an income tax. Combined, they grew by more than half a million residents. If you look at the United States Census, you will find some positives and negatives about Illinois. The value of homes, the per capita income and the rate of home ownership are all better in Illinois than the national outlook. On the negative side, we have fewer young children. That’s not a good sign. In the same way, people are deciding to leave, they also are deciding not to start a family here either. Illinois is currently in the throes of a budget crisis. How serious this is may depend on your outlook. If you are an employee of state or local government, or receive services from the state, the possible end of your paycheck, or benefit, is indeed, a crisis. If you are a taxpaying private citizen, the impact on your life is way, way less. And the eventual solution, in the likely form of more taxes and fees, is no walk in the park for you.

How Illinois will solve its budget problem is yet unknown. Gov. Bruce Rauner would like a comprehensive package of reforms to boost business. The Democratic Legislature says the discussion begins with a tax increase. Enthusiasm for a tax increase is minimal. On the other hand, change is often challenging and unpleasant. But the statistics point to one clear conclusion. Illinois is not headed in the right direction. The status quo is in a slow drift downward. It is time for change; time to try a change. People are voting with their feet and their moving vans. They are voting to leave.

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

# Can we set the world’s temperature?

WASHINGTON — On climate change, curb your enthusiasm. It’s not that the recent international conference in Paris didn’t take significant steps to check global warming. It did. About 200 countries committed to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions. The goal of limiting warming to 2 degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit) from preindustrial times was reaffirmed. The trouble is, what’s being attempted is so fundamentally difficult, even these measures may be wildly unequal to the task. What’s being attempted, of course, is the wholesale replacement of the world economy’s reliance on fossil fuels (coal, oil, natural gas) for four-fifths of its energy. To be sure, the shift is envisioned to take decades, four or five at a minimum. Still, the vast undertaking may exceed human capability. Hence, a conundrum. Without energy, the world economy shuts down, threatening economic and social chaos. But the consequences of climate change, assuming the scientific consensus is accurate, also are grim — from rising sea levels (threatening coastal cities) to harsher droughts (reducing food supplies). It’s useful to split the discussion into two parts. On the existence of human-driven warming, I accept the dominant scientific view, mainly because I’m not technically qualified to dispute it. But I have doubted that, without major breakthroughs in energy technology, we can do much about warming. The addiction to fossil fuels will triumph. Paris confirms that view. Rather than show how much progress we’ve made, it demonstrates how little maneuvering room we have. Consider some estimates from IHS, a consulting company. In 2012, it reports, the world generated 45 gigatons of greenhouse gases, up 50 percent since 1990.

Without new policies, that total would rise to 60 gigatons by 2030, IHS projects. But the national pledges made in Paris would hold the 2030 total to 50 gigatons. That’s good news, right? Well, not exactly. Limiting global warming to 2 degrees Celsius would require that emissions in 2030 drop to 35 gigatons, reckons IHS. So, even with the Paris pledges, we’re about 40 percent above the goal. Moreover, IHS thinks some pledged cuts won’t materialize. They are political gestures or depend on unproven technologies. There are no enforcement mechanisms. Renewable energy — mainly wind and solar power — is supposed to rescue us. Quite likely, it won’t. True, renewable energy is expanding rapidly in the United States. In the next two years, the solar industry expects to double its installed American capacity. In 2014, wind generation was up 51 percent from 2011, according to government figures. Moreover, costs are said to have fallen sharply. The wind industry puts its decline at 60 percent during the past four years; the solar industry reports a 70 percent drop since 2009. But these achievements need to be qualified. For starters, renewables’ rapid growth comes off a tiny base. As a result, wind supplied only 4.4 percent of U.S. electricity in 2014. Solar’s contribution was smaller, about 1 percent; for 2020, the industry’s target is 3.5 percent. Global figures are lower: The Economist magazine puts renewables’ share of world energy production at 1 percent. The fact that wind and solar are heavily subsidized in the United States, through tax breaks, suggests recent cost reductions haven’t yet made renewables competitive with other energy sources.

Another handicap is physics: Wind and solar generate electricity only when the sun shines or the wind blows. They need backup power supplies. This hasn’t been (so far) a big problem in the United States, because we have many “base” power plants — typically fueled by coal and natural gas — that can provide backup. Developing countries are another story. Seeking to reduce their poverty, they need more bulk power, says Robert Bryce, an energy expert at the Manhattan Institute. They have favored coal. Despite Paris, we haven’t acknowledged the difficulties of grappling with climate change, whose extent and timing are uncertain. We invent soothing fantasies to simplify matters. The notion the world can wean itself from fossil fuels by substituting renewables is one of these. The potential isn’t large enough. Actual choices are harder. For example, Bryce argues only an expansion of nuclear power could replace significant volumes of fossil fuels. But greater reliance on nuclear poses its own dangers, including: the disposal of atomic waste, operational accidents and the vulnerability to terrorism. It’s true technological breakthroughs could change this. We know what’s needed: cheaper and safer nuclear power; better batteries and energy storage, boosting wind and solar by making more of their power useable; cost-effective carbon capture and storage — making coal more acceptable by burying its carbon dioxide in the ground. We have been searching for solutions for decades with only modest success. We need to keep searching, but without meaningful advances, regulating the world’s temperature is mission impossible.

# Will GOP convention be brokered?

Unlikely, experts say, but not impossible

WASHINGTON — ’Tis the season — no, not THAT season. It’s that point in the presidential election cycle when speculation starts swirling that the primaries won’t produce a clear winner and one of the parties’ big nominating conventions will dissolve in chaos. This time, it’s the Republican side of the race that’s looking particularly unsettled. After a crazy year in which Donald Trump’s ability to stay on top in a supersized pack repeatedly has confounded the conventional wisdom, the what-if chatter is wilder and louder than usual. What if no one gets a majority of delegates in the primaries and caucuses? What if Trump leads the delegate count but party elites want to derail his route to the nomination? What if delegates to the Cleveland convention deadlock on multiple votes and then try to turn to someone completely new, perhaps House Speaker Paul Ryan??? Ridiculous, says Ryan. Silly, says Republican Party Chairman Reince Priebus. “I don’t think that’s going to happen,” Trump said. Veteran politicians agree such scenarios are unlikely. The outlook will clarify once people start voting in

February, they insist. But, they also acknowledge the chances of an unsettled outcome are higher than usual in the current unconventional political environment. Ben Ginsberg, the lawyer who served as counsel to the Mitt Romney and George W. Bush presidential campaigns, says that because this GOP election cycle offers three lanes of candidates instead of two — a “Trump” lane in addition to the traditional “establishment” and “conservative” lanes — “it becomes more likely that no one will have a majority of delegates.” “The odds are still really small,” Ginsberg continues, then offers this caveat: “I did say on the day before the 2000 election that there would never be another presidential recount.” This from the man who went on to play a central role in the Florida recount at the heart of the Bush v. Gore battle for the presidency. The large field of GOP candidates and Trump’s wildcard candidacy aren’t the only factors at play in speculation that the 2016 primaries could end in uncertainty. The GOP, in recent years, has been shifting to a more proportional way of allocating delegates from each state than the old winner-take-all approach. And that means the momentum Romney achieved after winning a couple of big states in 2012 “is just not going to be as likely” this time, said Mark Stephenson, a Republican consultant who handled delegate strategy for Scott Walker’s presidential campaign and worked on the Romney campaign in 2008.

Grunge art  
Machinist turns scrap into sculpture

David Trost is a machinist by night, running the Mazak horizontal mill during the late shift at Peddinghaus in Bradley. During the day, on his off time, he takes his 25-plus years experience in metal work in a different direction: Just Ain't Right Scrap Metal Art.

He calls it grunge art, sculpting with scrap metal he finds in junk piles and thrift stores — St. Vincent de Paul and the Salvation Army are some of his favorites. His philosophy? Making stuff that “just ain’t right.”  
At work, the 46-year-old keeps little smiley faces made out of bolts, sprockets and gears laying on his toolbox to fiddle with as the inspiration takes him. And at home in Bradley, in a back room off his kitchen, it’s easy to see the hobby has taken over.  
There’s a table covered with every kind of nut and bolt, metal casting and knob imaginable. Next to the table are shelves and window frames covered with the same. There also are six custom vintage bicycles (he owns 10 in all) — some with fixtures you’d expect to find, some you wouldn’t, like a tank made from Cadillac valve covers. A short walk out to the garage, where he does the welding, you’ll find more shelves and work bench tables covered with parts for soon-to-be projects.  
He gets his materials from all over: thrift shops, junk yards, leftover scrap at Peddinghaus, even trash left along the river at the Kankakee River State Park.  
“I don’t want to modify anything,” Trost said. “When I find the certain

... item, I’ll know it when I see it.” And he’ll wait until he finds just the right piece, so a sculpture can take anywhere from a month to six months.  
“Sometimes, it just comes together. Sometimes, I just got to step back,” Trost said.  
One of the things he’s made that “just ain’t right” is a bike he welded together from two women’s bikes. It’s stretched out and he rides it leaning back, almost like a recumbent bike.  
He created another bike that steers backward. (Turn it right, it goes left. Turn it left, it goes right.) That one he took to the Kankakee Farmer’s Market last summer. No one could figure out how to ride it, Trost said.  
His sculptures are pretty unusual, too. Like a bouquet of flowers made of bike chains and large, oversized gears. There’s a model motorcycle fashioned from recycled bike chains and a fuel filter, and a ship whose hull is made of shaped iron. He’s currently working on a large spiderweb-looking piece made of cut cranks and sprockets.  
“I never saw myself as an artist,” Trost said. “I guess it just worked out that way.”  
And he hasn’t really promoted himself as one. He sells to family and friends, or through word of mouth. He gives some pieces away, like the

bouquet of flowers to his mom. He even entered one sculpture in the American Institute of Steel Construction sculpture competition and won fifth place.  
So, where did the sudden urge to create come from?  
“My brother-in-law asked me that, too. I told him, ‘I don’t really know.’ About four years ago, I just started seeing things and putting things together,” Trost said.  
He credits a lot of his natural craftiness to his grandmother, who taught him to make bottle cap magnets or cars out of shampoo bottles as a kid.  
His love for all things bicycles

started then, too. He took shop classes to make bike parts in junior high school. He started working as a machinist through the career center at Kankakee Community College, working for Baker Manufacturing as a junior in high school. Then, in 1989, he began working for Peddinghaus, where he’s worked for most of the years since.  
“I keep myself occupied,” Trost said. “I don’t want to say [I make] something out of nothing. I am making something else out of something.”

# The best shows of 2015 are ...

With the clock ticking down to 2016, aren’t we due for a year-in-television roundup? I don’t even like reading those columns, never mind writing them. They often involve lists and rankings and other distracting, thought-avoiding gimmicks.

Simply put, “Fargo” season two is the best drama of the year. Epic and strange and yet deeply rooted in fully drawn human beings, it represented TV writing at its best and most novelistic. It’s also one of the first screen dramas in years, if not decades, to portray a Vietnam veteran as a thoughtful, three-dimensional character.

As in the first season, “Fargo” featured rogue males knee deep in ultra-violence, yet asked us to feel protective about a vulnerable female character at its every center: Molly Solverson (Allison Tolman) in the first season and her dying mother, Betsy (Cristin Milioti), in the second. As female characters at the heart of the gore, Kirsten Dunst and Jean Smart just might be battling it out come Emmy time.

“Fargo” avoided the big-show sophomore slump, one of the year’s unfortunate TV trends. The writing on “True Detective” careened from Dostoyevsky to bad Raymond Chandler. “The Returned” spun out of control. Even “Empire,” the ratings meteor of the year, saw many fans go from addicted to indifferent.

It has not been a great year for new comedies. Fox’s “The Grinder” is amusing, but only can go so far with its thin premise. NBC’s “The Carmichael Show” has its old-school moments. But for best comedy, I nominate British import “Detectorists.” In a year when many series, even the impressive “My Crazy Ex-Girlfriend,” seemed to be trying way too hard to get noticed, this bleak tale of two taciturn metal-detecting antique hunters (Mackenzie Crook and Toby Jones) remained beautifully understated and audaciously human in scale.

“Detectorists” was introduced on the Acorn service

and now is streaming on Netflix. Pounce. It’s a rare gem. And there isn’t a comic-book character or superhero in sight.

• Stephen Colbert hosts the “38th Annual Kennedy Center Honors” (8 p.m., CBS). Taped on Dec. 6 at the Kennedy Center Opera House stage, the gala was attended by the president and first lady. As usual, the recipients are drawn from both high art (orchestra conductor Seiji Ozawa) and popular culture, (actresses Rita Moreno and Cicely Tyson; singer-songwriter Carole King and movie director and producer George Lucas).

As is customary, some of the presenters and those who show up to salute recipients are as famous as those celebrated. Look for Steven Spielberg and Martin Scorsese to speak up for their friend and fellow 1970s movie wunderkind George Lucas. Also from that era, look for James Taylor to sing “Up on the Roof,” one of the songs Carole King wrote as a Brill Building composer; a good decade before she helped pioneer the singer/songwriter era of pop music with her breakthrough 1971 LP “Tapestry.” Cellist Yo-Yo Ma and conductor Itzhak Perlman salute Ozawa. Rosie Perez and Lin-Manuel Miranda applaud Moreno, and Karen Olivo performs “America” the song from “West Side Story” that Moreno helped popularize. Tyler Perry and Viola Davis will champion the career of Cicely Tyson.

NEW YORK — Keeping a to-do list or a schedule is much more than time management for a dedicated group of calendar keepers. They’re using colored pens and pencils along with scrapbooking materials like stickers and washi tape to track appointments, reminders and milestones.


Look no further than social media. The “planner community” likes to share photos of layouts and entries on sites like Pinterest, YouTube and Instagram, using hashtags like #plannernerd, #plannerobsessed, #plannerjunkies and #plannerlove.

The planners under discussion can be desk or pocket notebooks, journals, inserts into binders — any planning tool that can be decorated.

Erin Condren, of Los Angeles, introduced her LifePlanner in 2007, providing templates with a range of designs and fonts to customize a planner, and has turned it into a business at ErinCondren.com. She says there’s a market for “a colorful approach to not only scheduling every day but truly celebrating every day.”

Initially, she thought her customers would be “45-year-old women who couldn’t grasp digital technology, but that’s not the case.”

She especially enjoys watching her 14-year-old daughter, Kate, use her planner. “A Sunday night for her, she’s got everything color-coded. She’s got stickers that say, ‘Math exam!’ She’s ready to conquer the week,” says Condren.

Get creative to track appointments, reminders and milestones.

“To be honest, my community has taken it to a whole other level,” Condren says. “It’s inspiring me. I’m a little embarrassed to open mine.”

Katy Halliday, of Chicago, the mother of a 2-year-old son and a 3-month-old daughter, considers herself part of the planner community. She uses hers as a way to be artistic.

“I used to be in a choir, and that was my creative

outlet. This is something I can do at home with the kids, and it’s something for mommy,” she laughs.

Halliday keeps track of meal planning and nap times with stickers in her planner.

Juliette Perkins of Hampshire, United Kingdom, says she puts “a mixed bag” of entries into her planner, including schedules, hours slept, steps taken, meetings, appointments, parties and lists.

It’s also a way to connect with other people. Perkins is part of Facebook groups dedicated to the love of planning.

To get started, she advises, be conservative with supplies like colored pens and stickers.

“Try to avoid buying all the cute stuff you see,” she says. “If you buy too many stickers or too much washi early on, you’ll inevitably get overwhelmed.”

“The great thing is, there are no rules.”

# Mom worries that kids get attention only for their looks

**DEAR ABBY:** All children are beautiful to their parents. My three children are of mixed race and get a lot of attention because of it. The boys are aloof about random compliments they receive from strangers. However, I’m worried about the pressure it may put on my daughter to be “pretty.”

**DEAR MOM:** When someone exclaims that your child is beautiful, accept the compliment and say something like this: “Yes, my child IS beautiful, but more important, she is beautiful on the inside.” It will reinforce the message to your daughter that character is equally, if not more important, than physical beauty.

There have been times when I have packed up things to give to friends who have younger daughters than ours, or taken them to a resale shop. My mother then becomes upset that I’m not returning the items to her. She is saving them for my sister, who isn’t even pregnant yet.

While I have no issue with saving some things for a potential niece, my friends need these things NOW, and I feel strange essentially being obligated to return them. Is my mom out of line? It’s off-putting to receive a gift that comes with a return clause. -- **CONFUSED IN CENTRAL TEXAS**

**DEAR CONFUSED:** It appears your mother is not only a doting grandma, but also someone who is determined to get a double bang for her buck. Once given, a gift DOES belong to the recipient. Otherwise, it’s not a gift but a loan.

And yes, however well-intentioned your mother may be, she is out of line to demand that everything she has given be returned to her. (I mean, what will she do if your sister has only boys?)

### TSA officers can mandate full-body screening

Under a new policy for screening airline passengers, Transportation Security Administration officers at the airport can now require that you go through a full-body scanner even if you ask for a pat-down search instead.

The change in policy that began this month means that airline passengers can still ask TSA officers for a pat-down search instead of having to go through a full-body scanner that uses millimeter wave technology to disclose weapons hidden under clothing.

But the TSA officers now have to right to deny your request for a pat-down search “if warranted by security considerations.”

### Company to hold meeting on decade-old oil leak

The company responsible for a decade-old oil leak in the Gulf of Mexico will hold a public meeting next month to disclose details of its efforts to stop chronic slicks from forming off Louisiana’s coast. The Jan. 20 forum in Baton Rouge was a requirement of Taylor Energy Co.’s court settlement in September with environmental groups.

In 2004, waves whipped up by Hurricane Ivan triggered an underwater mudslide that toppled a Taylor Energy-owned platform and buried a cluster of its oil wells under mounds of sediment. Oil is still leaking at the site more than 11 years later, with slicks often stretching for miles.

### Man accused of killings may blame cough syrup

Attorneys for a doctor charged with aggravated murder may argue that their client was suffering from cough-syrup induced psychosis, which led him to kill his partner and toddler son in 2011.

The Seattle Times reports that 43-year-old Dr. Louis Chen is accused of fatally stabbing 29-year-old Eric Cooper and 2-year-old Cooper Chen, whose bodies were found inside the couple’s Seattle apartment.

Chen’s defense team previously had indicated it would pursue an insanity or diminished capacity defense. But a motion filed in October suggests Chen had a buildup of dextromethorphan, a cough suppressant found in many over-the-counter cold medicines, in his system. The motion argues that the drug metabolized slowly in Chen, who is Taiwanese, because of his genetic makeup.

### East St. Louis ousts city manager after 4 months

The merry-go-round of East St. Louis city government continued to spin Monday as elected leaders jettisoned a city manager hired only after losing his April mayoral re-election bid.

Two city council members and current Mayor Emeka Jackson-Hicks voted Monday to fire Alvin Parks Jr. as the city continues to struggle with a nearly \$6 million budget shortfall. Longtime city employee Edith Moore was named interim city manager.

Police officers and other city employees have recently been laid off, including a public safety director who took early retirement from the U.S. Secret Service to work for East St. Louis.

### 1 dead, 4 others hurt in train-car crash in Chicago

Authorities say one person was killed and four others injured when a Metra train struck a car on Chicago’s southwest side.

Fire officials say five people were extricated from the car following the crash Monday afternoon and taken to an Oak Lawn hospital. One of the injured people later died.

Officials say no passengers on the train were injured.

# Japan apologizes over sex slaves

## \$8M fund will help Korean women forced to work in brothels during WWII

SEOUL, South Korea — An apology from Japan’s prime minister and a pledge of more than \$8 million sealed a breakthrough deal Monday in a decades-long impasse with South Korea over Korean women forced into Japanese military-run brothels during World War II.

The accord, which aims to resolve the emotional core of South Korea’s grievances with its former colonial overlord, could begin to reverse decades of animosity and mistrust between the two thriving democracies, trade partners and staunch U.S. allies. It represents a shift for Tokyo’s conservative government and a new willingness to compromise by previously wary Seoul.

A statement by both countries’ foreign ministers said Prime Minister Shinzo Abe “expresses anew his most sincere apologies and remorse to all the women who underwent immeasurable and painful experiences and suffered incurable physical and psychological wounds as comfort women,” the euphemistic name given the women.

Historians say tens of thousands of women from around Asia, many of them Korean, were sent to front-line military brothels to provide sex to Japanese soldiers.

It wasn’t immediately clear if Abe would be issuing a separate written statement or if it would be directly delivered to the 46 surviving former Korean sex slaves, now in their 80s and 90s.

The language mirrored past expressions of remorse by other prime ministers, although it

was seen by some in Seoul as an improvement on previous comments by Abe’s hawkish government, which has been accused of whitewashing wartime atrocities.

Another deciding factor was that the 1 billion yen (\$8.3 million) — to create a foundation to help provide support for the victims — came from the government, not private sources, something Tokyo has resisted in the past.

South Korean Foreign Minister Yun Byung-se said Seoul considers the agreement “final and irreversible,” as long as Japan faithfully follows through with its promises.

Later Monday, Abe called South Korean President Park Geun-hye and reiterated his apology. He said Tokyo would implement the deal and called the issue settled irreversibly. Park said she hoped the two countries will build mutual trust and open a new era in ties based on the agreement.

After phoning Park, Abe told

reporters that the agreement was based on his commitment to stop future generations from having to repeatedly apologize.

“Japan and South Korea are now entering a new era,” Abe said. “We should not drag this problem into the next generation.”

Park issued a separate statement saying the deal was the result of her government’s best efforts to resolve the sex slave issue, given its urgency. “Most of victims are at an advanced age and nine died this year alone,” she said.

“I hope the mental pains of the elderly comfort women will be eased,” Park said.

The initial reaction of former sex slaves was mixed. One woman said she would follow the government’s lead, while another vowed to ignore the accord because Tokyo didn’t consider the money to be formal compensation.

“Isn’t it natural to make legal compensation if they commit a

crime?” said Lee Yong-su, 88, according to South Korea’s Yonhap news agency.

Some in Seoul saw the deal, while not perfect, as an important step forward.

“If we brushed aside this deal, the comfort women issue would remain unresolved forever,” said Lee Won Deog, director of Institute of Japanese Studies at Seoul’s Kookmin University. “Elderly women would die one by one; South Korea and Japan would engage in history wars and find it harder to improve ties.”

### Iraqi troops advance in Ramadi; some IS remain

Iraqi forces backed by U.S.-led airstrikes drove Islamic State militants out of the center of Ramadi on Monday and seized the main government complex there, according to military officials, who said insurgents are still dug into pockets of the city west of Baghdad.

Ramadi, the provincial capital of the sprawling Anbar province, fell to IS in May, marking a major setback for Iraqi forces and the U.S.-led campaign. Ramadi and nearby Fallujah, which is controlled by IS, saw some of the heaviest fighting of the eight-year U.S. intervention in Iraq.

In recent months Iraqi forces launched several offensives to retake Ramadi, but all had stalled. Iraqi troops began advancing into some parts of the city earlier this month. But their progress was slowed by snipers, booby traps and the militants’ destruction of bridges leading into the city center.

### Watchdog: Israel plans more settler homes

An Israeli anti-settlement watchdog group said the government has quietly worked on plans to build more than 8,000 homes in a strategic section of the West Bank near Jerusalem.

### Iraqi army advances on Ramadi

The Iraqi military launched a long-promised campaign to retake the city of Ramadi, last week.

Peace Now said the homes are among more than 55,000 housing units at various stages of planning by Israel’s Housing Ministry.

In a report, the group said the 8,372 units are envisioned for the strategic area known as E1. The Palestinians strongly object to settlement of the area, saying it would separate a future Palestinian state in the West Bank from east Jerusalem, their hoped-for capital, and drive a wedge between the northern and southern flanks of the West Bank.

### Russian diplomat: Russia removes Iran’s uranium

Iran has moved closer to next month’s expected implementation of a landmark nuclear deal with six world powers by allowing Moscow to transfer most of its enriched uranium to Russia, a senior Russian diplomat told The Associated Press on Monday.

As part of the July 14 deal, Iran must ship out all except about 660 pounds of the close

to nine tons of low-enriched uranium it has stockpiled. Low-enriched uranium is suited to power generation but can be further enriched to arm nuclear warheads.

### 80 killed in Boko Haram attack in Nigeria






Boko Haram Islamic extremists struck the northeastern Nigerian city of Maiduguri for the first time in months Monday with rocket-propelled grenades and multiple suicide bombers, witnesses said. At least 50 people were killed and the death toll could go higher.

Another twin suicide bombing killed at least 30 people in Madagali, a town 95 miles southeast of Maiduguri, witnesses said. Danladi Buba said two women blew themselves up at a market near a busy bus station at about 9 a.m. Brig. Gen. Victor Ezugwu, the officer commanding in northeast Adamawa State, confirmed the attack but said casualties have yet to be established.


In Maiduguri, capital of neighboring Borno state, at least 30 were killed and more than 90 wounded in overnight blasts and shootouts, and another 20 died in a bombing outside a mosque at dawn Monday, said Muhammed Kanar, area coordinator of the National Emergency Management Agency.

# The customer review is broken

Validity comes into question

SEATTLE — Like many people, Jared Andrews finds online customer reviews frustrating and often unhelpful.

“There’s usually someone who absolutely loves the product and someone else who absolutely hates it, which makes you wonder if the person who loves it is also the person selling it,” said Andrews, 34, a database administrator in Seattle.

Andrews typifies the love-hate relationship American consumers have with customer reviews, which — for better and worse — have come to define the online shopping experience. People count on them to find the perfect Christmas gift and the best burger joint. Yet they hate navigating through anonymous reviews — including suspiciously over-the-top rants and raves — in search of meaningful insights.

Growing skepticism about the validity of online reviews is a challenge for companies like Yelp and Angie’s List, which have both lost favor on Wall Street. Waiting in the wings are heavyweights Facebook and IBM, as

well as startups like MunchAdo and Mona, all vowing to deploy new technology that makes reviews more useful and prevents unscrupulous businesses from gaming the system with fake ones.

When Yelp arrived in 2004, it was one of the first companies to build a successful business entirely around online reviews and apply the concept to the service industry. Today, the San Francisco-based company attracts 168 million monthly visitors looking for feedback about hair salons, taco shops and a host of other businesses.

All those eyeballs haven’t insulated Yelp, however. Amid growing competition for the local ads that generate about 45 percent of sales, the company cut its revenue forecast in late July, prompting a selloff that erased a quarter of its value. The shares have yet to recover.

Yelp is a prime example of what ails the online review business. The company has a history of controversy, from allegations of receiving payment to remove negative reviews and push up positive ones to misrepresenting its business to inflate the stock. Last month, Yelp won the dismissal of a lawsuit alleging it misled shareholders about expectations for growth.

After complaints early on that its reviews were unhelpful, the company has tried to curate them. Algorithms

sort the reviews into “recommended,” which appear front and center, and “not recommended,” which are hidden from view (though findable by clicking a conspicuously inconspicuous button) and don’t affect the rating. Consumers and businesses alike have griped about the filtering process — reviewers because they feel their opinions are being unfairly stifled; businesses because they feel misrepresented.

In October, South Park, the influential animated comedy series, satirized the growing tension between businesses and the site’s anonymous reviewers, who can tank sales with one scathing comment. In “You’re Not Yelping,” Cartman plays a Yelp reviewer trying to extort free Mexican food in exchange for a five-star review. Aping eateries in the show, some real-world restaurateurs have begun posting “No Yelper” signs in their premises.

### TOO MUCH POWER

Julie Markert, who owns an Oak Forest florist called Catherine’s Gardens, says the ability to obfuscate comments without clear standards and processes gives Yelp too much power to shape a business’s image. For her business, as many as 46 individuals’ opinions aren’t accounted for in the Yelp rating. Instead, 16 form the

basis of the shop’s 2.5 stars. Markert says she’s isn’t looking for 100 percent approval but wants a more balanced view of her business.

“To be fairly portrayed is really all you can ask,” she said in an interview.

Yelp says it helps small businesses get discovered by more people, helping them compete against chain restaurants with bigger marketing budgets. To make reviews more useful for consumers, the site now shows whether a rating is trending up or down — a way to gauge whether or not a given business is making changes based on reviewer feedback.


As Yelp struggles, others see an opportunity to improve the customer and business experience.

Facebook is experimenting with a feature that lets users search for local businesses, including nail salons, take-out restaurants and plumbers, and see results that include customer reviews and star rankings. The feature looks to add the credibility of reviews linked to someone’s social networking account as opposed to an anonymous profile.

The concept appeals to Markert, who says consumers using Facebook better understand the personality and preferences of the person offering advice and have more information than a one-off review can ever provide.

# Pay-as-you-go is a great way to go

It's not easy being a consumer these days. In fact, it can be downright confusing because of all the payment choices. First, you have your cash, your checkbook, credit and debit cards. And then, you have deferred billing, skip-a-payment, nothing down, no payments and/or zero interest till the next decade. See? Confusion, pure and simple.

Prehistoric consumers had it easy: Just one choice: chickens. They traded poultry for things they needed. The rules were simple: No fowl? No food, fuel, fun or futons for that matter.

Then, along came the invention of currency and that gave consumers a second choice — one that caught on quickly because folding a chicken to fit neatly into one’s wallet was rather messy.

A third option was both the day some unknown retailer came up with a payment plan, surely named in memory of the good ol’ chicken days: Layaway. You might be wondering what happened to layaway, anyway!

Not that long ago, every major retail store in the coun-

try allowed customers to buy merchandise on layaway. The item was placed in the back room and customers could take all the time they needed to pay it off ... interest free. And when they made the last payment, they took the item home.

Layaway was simpler and more upfront than credit card purchasing; there was a start and a finish. There was delayed gratification as well as a sense of responsibility and anticipation. With layaway, there were no surprises.

Without much notice, layaway programs started to disappear in the 1980s. Jumping on the consumer credit bandwagon, retailers convinced

consumers it was better to take everything home right away, avoid those annoying progress payments and then commence to pay for the next 15 or 20 years. Retailers did such a good job of convincing that layaway plans all but disappeared.

You’ll be happy to know that a good number of your favorite national chain stores have reintroduced layaway:

- Toys R Us/Babies R Us
- GameStop
- Kmart
- Sears
- Wal-Mart
- Burlington Coat Factory/Baby Depot
- Marshalls
- T.J. Maxx
- eLayaway (Online only)

While cash up front always will be the best choice, in your columnist’s humble opinion, making payments on layaway is much better than making payments on a credit card account because:

1. The store keeps the items until they are paid in full. No debt is incurred.
2. There are no interest charges, although some stores have a small layaway service fee and a restocking fee if you cancel.
3. Typically, the customer is protected if the item goes on sale during the layaway period and the price of the time is reduced accordingly.
4. There is no legal obligation. If you change your mind, you get a refund.

To avoid misunderstandings, get specific information about a store’s layaway terms before you participate. Ask for a written description of the store’s plan and read it before you agree to a layaway purchase.

No matter how you choose to do your gift shopping in the coming year, make sure you start early. And pay as you go with cash or layaway, which remains just slightly more convenient than chickens.

Stuart's buzzer-beater gives Herscher a wild win

Tigers overcome Central in overtime

Herschher coach Ron Oloffson is hoping to establish a certain level of grit with his young, largely inexperienced basketball team. But this is getting ridiculous. The Tigers needed a 3-point basket from Tyler Stuart as time expired in the final seconds of overtime to capture a hard-fought 48-45 win in the opening round of play at the Kankakee Holiday Tournament on Monday. 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
