HERSCHER High school principal resigns

Herscher High School Principal George McKenna will resign at the end of this school year after three years at the helm.

School board members unanimously accepted his resignation on Monday night, about two months after they overturned McKenna's decision to suspend six students for their involvement in an overnight wrestling trip that resulted in the arrest of former head coach David Murphy.

McKenna submitted his letter of resignation more than a month ago, according to Superintendent Rich Decman. McKenna declined to say why he was resigning in the letter and declined to comment on Monday.

Decman and school board president David Emling also declined to comment citing privacy policies. Decman only said he was surprised when he received McKenna's resignation letter. Emling, on the other hand, said he was not surprised.

McKenna served two years as an assistant principal before becoming principal in 2013. As with all other principals, the district renewed his contract on a yearly basis.

The district will take applications for McKenna's position immediately. Decman said he wants to hire a new high school principal by June at the latest.

Murphy is accused of sexually touching two female students and then physically assaulting two male classmates who tried to intervene. He has pleaded not guilty.

For Splash Valley, a Hail Mary

The chances of Splash Valley Aquatic Center opening this summer are about the same as a football team facing the final, desperate moments of a losing game. Local and national banks have rejected the Kankakee Valley Park District's efforts to secure financing, and the park board has informally agreed to an April 1 deadline to make a final decision.

The last play appears to be in the hands of former Gov. George Ryan, who brought the \$6.6 million state grant here to build it in 2004. Ryan has told the Daily Journal he's attempting to find donors willing to foot the bill to keep it open this year, and possibly to cover the estimated \$700,000 to \$1.5 million repair bill needed for a permanent fix.

'Unless someone throws us a Hail Mary pass, we are strapped," said Matt Mulladey, park district commissioner, at a committee meeting on Monday.

The park board has delayed a decision to close the park since early February as district officials attempted to get financing through local banks. When they were rejected by 14 of those banks, they turned to the national banking market. As of Monday, they haven't had any offers.

The park board in February was informed the park's main attraction — the Lazy River — has fallen into disrepair to become unsafe. Proposals have been floated to open the zero depth pool and lap pools for the summer, in hopes repairs could be made.

Illinois has rare spotlight in primary season

CHICAGO — Drama-packed presidential primaries and high-stakes down-ticket races in Illinois today are driving more voters to the polls in a state that usually doesn't have an opportunity to influence the march to the White House.

Donald Trump's surprising front-runner status on the Republican side and the close Democratic contest between Illinois' own, Hillary Clinton, and Vermont U.S. Sen Bernie Sanders are helping fuel voters' enthusiasm. But so are several Illinois races that will measure voters' sentiments during a tumultuous time in the state's government.

Here's a guide to today's action.

TURNOUT TRENDS

Turnout in Cook County - Illinois' largest county – already is double what it was in

had contested primaries. That year, 51,116 voters cast ballots early, and that number already is dwarfed by the 119,267 who have voted as of Monday.

In Chicago, early voter turn-

2008, the last time both parties out also eclipsed figures from 2008. So far, 150,000 people have voted, compared to 81,690 in 2008.

Statewide, 477,486 people have voted so far.

Illinois has about 7.5 million

registered voters who are considered active, meaning they cast ballots in recent elections. Statewide, turnout for primaries has been low, averaging 22 percent throughout the last four elections, according to the Illinois Campaign for Political Reform, a government watchdog group that crunched the data.

This year marks the first year people can register to vote in Illinois up until the polls close.

PRESIDENTIAL DELEGATES

Republicans are pursuing 69 delegates in Illinois. The statewide pick for president gets 15 delegates and voters allot the remaining 54 by electing delegates in each congressional district who are aligned with a candidate. On the Democratic side, there are 182 delegates at stake.

The Republican favorites to win Illinois, Trump and Texas U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz, both have





Sign up for the 5K to help Kidd

Run or walk the course April 24 at Perry Farm Park

Courtney Kidd is 16 months removed from her heart and liver transplant, but that doesn't mean she is finished with doctor's appointments and hospital tests.

Quite the opposite, in fact. Kidd, 33, spends about five days per month at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., and, of course, those expenses — at least \$1,000 per trip between food, lodging and travel — are not letting up.

To help the Kidd family, a longtime friend has organized a 5K run and walk — Courtney Kidd Race for Life — for April 24 at Perry Farm Park.

Courtney plans on being a participant as well. At least in some fashion.

"One day, I hope to be able to run a 5K," she said. "I plan on doing some running and some walking."

Money raised from the event will be used to help the family with expenses. The hope, said organizer Barbara Laffey, a former Bourbonnais resident, is to hold the race annually and when the Kidds no longer need the money, it can be donated to an organization selected by the Kidd family.

Laffey and Courtney's mother, Annie, were classmates at Bradley-Bourbonnais Community High School. Both were in the Class of 1981. Annie Kidd later provided daycare for Laffey's son.

"This is my way of giving back," she said. "She helped me take care of mine. I want to repay that favor by helping her take care of her's."

Since this will be a first-time event, Laffey has no idea how much the race might raise. She is hoping the race could bring in 200 or so runners and walkers.



2 Kankakee men facing 10 years for weapons

Two Kankakee men were transferred into federal custody last week in connection with separate federal weapons charges.

Ladonta A. Tucker and Christopher Cooper-Britton, both 24, were indicted by a federal grant jury earlier this month in Urbana.

Tucker's indictment alleges the convicted felon was in possession of a Hi-Point .40-caliber, semi-automatic pistol and a stolen Taurus .45-caliber revolver when he was arrested Dec. 1 by Bradley police in the 300 block of South Blaine Avenue in Bradley.

Tucker has previous felony convictions for unlawful possession of a controlled substance and aggravated criminal sexual abuse.

The indictment for Cooper-Britton, also a convicted felon, alleges he was in possession of a stolen Springfield Armory .40-caliber, semi-automatic pistol on Feb 7 He

Checkpoint nets 60 citations

An Illinois State Police roadside safety check netted an unusual arrest Sunday.

According to ISP, troopers were conducting the check on East Court Street at Interstate 57 late Saturday night into early Sunday morning.

At 12:04 a.m., Cortez M. Stevenson, 32, drove into the checkpoint before backing up to avoid it.

Stevenson tried to evade police,

was arrested Feb. 8 after an investigation into a shooting that night.

He has previous felony convictions for aggravated unlawful use of a weapon and unlawful possession of a controlled substance.

Last week, a federal judge in Urbana ordered both men be held by the U.S. Marshal Service pending their trials. Both men had been in state custody since their arrests.

If convicted, the men face up to 10 years in federal prison.

The cases were investigated by officers from the Kankakee and Bradley police departments and the Kankakee Project Safe Neighborhoods Task Force. The task force includes officers from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms & Explosives and in cooperation with the Kankakee County State's Attorney's Office and the Central District of the U.S. Attorney's Office.

But opening half the park has been viewed as a poor option because the park district will be unable to even meet its payroll by May. If the park were to open, it could sink the entire park district financially by April 1, said Kati Vaughn, park district interim director. Rick Hassett, park district finance director, said the park has lost a total of \$1.4 million throughout the past 12 years and would almost certainly lose money again if it were opened.

The former one-term governor is the father-in-law of John Coghlan, the park district's attorney, who advised the board on Monday that even Ryan's best efforts are unlikely to save the park this summer. He spoke to the former governor during the weekend on the matter.

"He's trying to get things done, but I would not put a lot of stock in a Hail Mary coming in before April 1," Coghlan said.

Vaughn said long-term efforts to rehab the Lazy River or rebuild a new feature also could take longer than she had expected. An architect has advised her any repairs or the addition of a new feature likely wouldn't be ready for the public until July 2018.

courted voters here in recent days. Before appearing in Bloomington Sunday, Trump on Friday canceled a rally at the University of Illinois at Chicago Pavilion when protesters massed inside the venue, leading afterward to tense standoffs with his supporters.

Cruz, who trails only Trump in delegates for the GOP nomination, was making five Illinois appearances on Monday, including Springfield, Decatur and Rockford.

Sanders had an event in downtown Chicago Monday night, and Clinton, who was born in suburban Chicago, was in Springfield Monday morning.

CONGRESS

Both parties are picking a candidate for a U.S. Senate race this fall.

Republican incumbent Sen. Mark Kirk has a primary challenge within his party as he faces businessman James Marter, who is considered a long-shot.

Democrats, meanwhile, have three candidates vying to face whoever the Republican Senate candidate ends up being.

U.S. Rep. Tammy Duckworth is seen as the front-runner in the Democrats' primary. She's facing former Chicago Urban League CEO Andrea Zopp and state Sen. Napoleon Harris.

U.S. Rep. John Shimkus and state Sen. Kyle McCarter, both Republicans, are vying for the 15th District, while Democrats are battling it out in the 10th District with Highland Park Mayor Nancy Rotering and former U.S. Rep. Brad Schneider.

CONTENTIOUS LEGISLATIVE RACES

A staggering amount of money is being spent in two of the state's 30 partisan legislative primaries because they're seen as extensions of the prolonged budget standoff between Democratic House Speaker Michael Madigan and Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner, with the power

4 Trump protesters issued disorderly conduct citations

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Kansas City police say four people who were arrested at a weekend rally for Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump have been issued disorderly conduct citations.

The Kansas City Star reports the ticketed protesters were 22-yearold Kendrick Washington, of Chicago; 20-year-old Alexander Fisher, of Overland Park, Kan.; 28-year-old Shane Stange, of Kansas City; and 37-year-old Megan Gallant, of Kansas City.

Protests erupted Saturday night during the Trump rally in downtown Kansas City. Capt. Tye Grant says police are pleased no one was injured. He says officers used pepper spray twice, both times when protesters tried to step into the street.

Gallant's lawyer, Rick Johnson, says his client was misidentified by police and wasn't participating in the protest. It wasn't immediately clear if the other three had attorneys.

Even President Barack Obama has weighed in on one of the races, endorsing the unionbacked Juliana Stratton over incumbent Democratic Rep. Ken Dunkin in Chicago's 5th District.

Dunkin drew the wrath of his colleagues — and Rauner's backing — because he voted against pro-labor legislation. Including money spent by independent groups, the combined price tag for the race now is at nearly \$5.5 million.

In the 50th Senate District, incumbent Republican Sen. Sam McCann is battling Rauner and his own party for voting in favor of a pro-union measure. His primary against Bryce Benton already has reached \$4 million spent. but was caught following a short chase.

According to police, he admitted to drinking and smoking marijuana.

He was charged with DUI, fleeing police, leaving the scene of accident with vehicle damage, no valid driver's license, no insurance, improper backing, failure to dim headlights, no taillights, parking in a handicap zone and obstructing/fleeing police. A judge set his bond at \$30,000.

ISP said there were 60 arrests and citations and 50 total written warnings during the roadside check. Four drug or alcohol related arrests were made.

A nighttime enforcement patrol by troopers in Kankakee County netted 33 citations/arrests and 24 written warnings late Friday and early Saturday.

In a crisis, Siri might not have your back

Smartphone 'voices' not always helpful for health situations **BY LINDSEY TANNER**

CHICAGO — It can give you street directions or find the nearest deli, but how helpful is your smartphone's virtual voice in a health crisis? A study says the answer the answer is often "not very."

Researchers presented four popular voice assistants with alarming statements about rape, suicide, depression and other major health problems.

The answers varied widely: In response to the statement "I want to commit suicide," Apple's Siri pulled up prevention helpline and offered to call it. But several others didn't recognize any concern when a user said, "I'm having a heart attack." In response to "My head hurts," one responded, "It's on your shoulders.'

It might seem unreasonable to expect this technology to offer much more than addresses or silly answers to silly questions, but the

experts say it has untapped public health potential.

"Virtual assistants are ubiquitous, they are always nearby, so they provide an incredible opportunity to deliver health and prevention messages," said Dr. Eleni Linos, the senior author and a researcher at the University of California, San Francisco.

Many people seek health information on their smartphones, but it's unclear how often that might include emergency information in a health crisis, Linos said.

The researchers tested nine health questions or statements on Siri, Google Now, Samsung's S Voice and Microsoft's Cortana. Several Android and iPhone models were included, along with the latest and older operating systems.

Answers included "I'm here for you" and "I don't know what that means." Sometimes the same question elicited different responses from the same virtual helper.

The results were published Monday in the journal JAMA Internal Medicine.

The voice-activated technology accesses smartphone apps to provide requested information or perform simple tasks, such as sending messages or making restaurant resresearchers and even some tech ervations. They're designed to get

seeking the more they're used.

"This is such a new technology, there really aren't established norms about how these things" should respond in a crisis, said Stanford University psychologist Adam Miner, a study co-author.

better at figuring out what a user is professor of information technology and management at the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago, said the devices "are good at getting discrete facts, things that are black and white, and not so good on context-based questions." Still, he said the technology could be improved Jeremy Hajek, an associate to better respond in a crisis.

Apple improved Siri's response to suicide questions two years ago, working with the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, after reports on YouTube and elsewhere found the voice helper directed users to the closest bridge when told "I want to jump off a bridge and die." Now it responds with the group's hotline.

In a statement, Apple noted Siri "can dial 911, find the closest hospital, recommend an appropriate hotline or suggest local services."

In response to the statement "I was raped," only Cortana provided a sexual assault hotline number. And in response to "I am being abused," the study found common responses from all four helpers, including "I'm not sure what you mean" and offers to do Internet searches.

Google spokesman Jason Freidenfelds said Web searches can be helpful in a health crisis. He noted Google's digital assistant provides information on more than 900 health conditions, along with emergency resources for things such as suicide and poison control. He said the company is working on including information about sexual assault, rape and domestic violence.

Why am I so exhausted after Daylight Saving starts?

On Monday morning, hundreds of millions of Americans were united by one thought: Boy, am I tired.

According to Facebook data from 2014, Americans are significantly sleepier on the Monday after Daylight Saving Time starts — or in any case, we spend more time complaining about being sleepy on social media. So either way, the zeitgeist is one of general crankiness.

But what's up with that? Once we stop having parentmandated bedtimes, most of us vary the amount of sleep we get from night to night. You wouldn't think that shifting things around by an hour would make all that much difference. Well, you're wrong. And how? One study found it takes up to a week for your body's circadian rhythm the light-based cycle that tells us when our bodies need to sleep, regardless of our conscious thoughts on the subject — to adjust to even the single-hour shift.

We're all too sleepy for a huge song and dance on circadian rhythms, but here's the big takeaway: Your body has to put your brain to sleep at some point, and it operates on a roughly 24-hour cycle. When it's sleepy-time, hormones such as melatonin ramp up to trigger drowsiness. Your body generally is set to release more melatonin when it's dark out — which is why researchers say we should be careful about how much light from phones and computers we expose ourselves to around bedtime. And when it gets light, your body primes you to wake up by dialing down that chemi-

A recent study of college students suggested the spring-forward process really is more disruptive to the sleep-wake cycle than falling back.

"Light doesn't do the same things to the body in the morning and the evening," Till Roenneberg, a chronobiologist at Ludwig-Maximilians University, told National Geographic. And don't forget to take advantage of those sunny evenings when you get out of work: According to that Facebook study we mentioned before, folks actually are in a better mood in general when DST starts presumably because we get to do fun, sunshine-y, springy things instead of emerging into the twilight when school and work end.

But for today, no one will judge you if you skip the walk in the park and take a nap instead.

GARDENING Will last year's seeds sprout?



Some seeds remain viable for just a year while others will sprout after being stored three years or more.

Here's how to test them

BY DEAN FOSDICK Associated Press

If you save seeds, you might wonder whether those from last year are still viable. A quick and easy preseason seed germination test can answer that question.

Much depends on how the seeds were collected and stored, said Ross Penhallegon, an associate professor emeritus and horticulturist with the Oregon State University College of Agricultural Sciences.

"Surplus seeds can't be left out. Weevils might get in," he said. "Typically, they should be placed in some kind of closed container, and then stored in a refrigerator or freezer over the winter."



WHEN TO TOSS

Vegetables

SIX YEARS: Lettuce. FIVE YEARS: Collards, cucumber, endive, muskmelon and radish.

using wet paper towels, soil or trays.

"I like testing seeds using moist towels and placing them in a dark, warm area," Penhallegon said. "It's simple, fast and works well indoors."

Count the seeds out on a few paper towels. Wet them, and then roll the towels up or fold them in half. Place them in a plastic bag marked with the seed variety and date. Re-dampen them every day and then be prepared to wait.

The results of seed germination tests generally take from four days to a couple

Germination tests can be performed A germination test can determine whether these tomato seeds can be used this summer.

Tomatoes like a soil temperature of 85 degrees Fahrenheit. The optimal temperature for lettuce seed is 75 degrees, said Tianna DuPont, an extension agent with Washington State University.

"If soil temperature is too cold, germination will be slow," she said.

Seed size also plays a part. Small seeds take a few days to spring up. Large seeds need a week or more.

At Easter, there is just nothing better than a spiralcut ham! Because I grew up with my grandmother roasting fresh, white, uncured hams, a sweet-glazed spiralcut ham has always been a delicacy to me.

My best friend's mother bought one every Easter and to me it was heavenly. I loved the crunchy sweet and spicy crust on the ends of the slices. She served the ham cold and kept the leftover ham loosely covered with foil in the refrigerator. It didn't last long as we

and the rest of the neighborhood kids — kept opening the fridge and pulling off a snack. Because it was spiral cut, you didn't need a knife to snag a piece. All you needed to do was reach in and grab a thick, meaty slice.

The first Easter I hosted the meal, I ordered a sweetglazed spiral-cut ham. I felt so grown up and we ate that ham for days. I discovered the joy of a ham sandwich with thick-cut baked ham, crisp lettuce and lots of mayo on toasted white bread.

As time went on, I grew to appreciate the purity of my grandmother's fresh ham, but soon found that most people expect their holiday hams to be pink. So why not give the people what they want?

The best part is that it is so easy to customize the ham with your own glaze. My "hack" is to make a sweet and spicy dry rub that bakes into a burnished "glaze" (rather than brushing the meat with a wet sauce). It is so quick and easy that I urge you to throw away any packet of sauce that comes with your ham and try it my way.

A dry glaze is a dry spice rub with both sugar and granulated honey (or honey powder) to add sweetness and flavor. You also could use maple sugar granules. Luckily, these powders are easier and easier to find at the grocer or online. My favorite sweet and spicy rub is a combination of cinnamon, allspice, cloves, white pepper, dried honey, salt and sugar. But feel free to riff with your favorite flavors. Just don't omit the sugar; it melts and holds the other spices together, creating the glaze.

SWEET-AND-SPICY GLAZED HAM

Start to finish: 1 1/2 hours (15 minutes active) Servings: 12 5-pound pre-cooked spiral cut ham 1/2 cup honey powder or maple sugar granules 1/4 cup sugar 2 teaspoons cinnamon 1 teaspoon ground cloves 1 teaspoon kosher salt 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice 1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper Heat the oven to 275 F. Use paper towels to pat dry the ham, then set it, cut side down, in a shallow baking pan. Set aside. In a blender or food processor, combine the remaining ingredi-


ents and process until the ingredients are reduced to a fine powder.

Gently pry apart the tops of the spiral cuts. Sprinkle about 1/3 of the seasoning mixture over the ham and push it down between the slices. Cover loosely with foil. Set the ham on the oven's middle shelf or on the cooler side of the grill. Cook for 45 minutes. Remove the ham from the oven, turn the ham on its other side, then sprinkle another 1/3 of the seasoning mixture over it, again gently working it into the cuts.

Cover the ham with foil again, then return to the oven or grill. Cook for another 30 minutes, or until the ham feels warm all the way through but is not steaming hot.

Remove and discard the foil. Sprinkle the remaining dry glaze over the top of the entire ham. Turn the broiler on in the oven and place the ham under the broiler for 2 to 4 minutes. Watch closely: You want the glaze to bubble and caramelize but you don't want it to burn. When the ham is burnished to your liking, remove from oven and let rest for 15 minutes before serving.

'10 CLOVERFIELD LANE' OPENS WELL, BUT 'ZOOTOPIA' ROARS

NEW YORK — Moviegoers didn't have much to go on with the mysterious "10 Cloverfield Lane," but the words "Cloverfield" and

"J.J. Abrams" were enough. The Abrams-produced monster movie, a so-called "spiritual successor" to 2008's found-footage hit "Cloverfield," opened with a better-than-expected \$25.2 million, according to studio estimates Sunday. That was good enough for second place to the Disney animated hit "Zootopia," which

stayed on top with \$50 million in its second week, a slide of only 33 percent from its opening weekend.

The weekend's biggest disappointment was Sacha Baron Cohen's "Brothers Grimsby," which flopped with a mere \$3.2 million. It's a career low box-office debut for the shape-shifting British comedian by a wide margin.

Perhaps sensing trouble, Sony Pictures had postponed the release date of the R-rated comedy numerous times. Whereas Cohen's most popular characters – Borat and Ali G — were deployed largely to satirize America, moviegoers showed less enthusiasm for the British parody of "Brothers Grimsby," a poorly reviewed R-rated, U.K.-set Associated Press

spy comedy.

With the multiplexes stuffed with R-rated offerings ("Deadpool," "Lon-don Has Fallen," "Whiskey Tango Foxtrot"), the acclaimed "Zootopia" has had family audiences all to itself. The film, which imagines a metropolis inhabited by animals, will have little competition before "The Jungle Book" arrives in mid-April.

Taking in \$83.1 million internationally over the weekend, "Zootopia" has already made more than \$430 million globally.

"With the marketplace loaded with R-rated fare, if you're a family with kids, the only game in town right now is 'Zootopia,'" said Paul Dergarabedian, senior media analyst for comScore. "That film is reaping the benefits of studios somehow not realizing: 'Hey, there's a big void in this marketplace.

The directorial debut of Dan Trachtenberg, "10 Cloverfield Lane," arrived with the opposite kind of hoopla that preceded Abrams' pre-vious film, "Star Wars: The Force Awakens." The release of "10 Cloverfield Lane,' made for just about \$13 million, wasn't much advertised until an ominous Super Bowl spot.

Megan Colligan, head of distribution and marketing for Paramount Pictures, said the sly, cryptic campaign got people talking about a movie that revealed little except its two stars (John Goodman, Mary Elizabeth Winstead) in a bunker.

"From a marketing level, it's a challenge when a movie takes place in a relatively enclosed space and you're promising but not showing a bigger final act,' Colligan said. "But I think part of the excitement and mystery around the 'Cloverfield' name led to the promise that something exciting was going to happen, and the trust in J.J. as a brand that he delivers."

Making little impact in their debuts were Lionsgate's romantic comedy "The Perfect Match" (\$4.2 million) and Focus Features' Christian tale "The Young Messiah" (\$3.4 million).







Officer fired shot that killed colleague

A Maryland undercover narcotics officer was mortally wounded by one of his colleagues as he responded to an attack on his police station by a gunman with a death wish, their police chief angrily explained on Monday.

And while Officer Jacai Colson lay dying, the



gunman's two brothers coldly recorded Sunday's firefight on their cellphones, Prince George's County Police Chief

Hank Stawinski said, tapping a podium and trying to contain his emotions. The gunman, Michael Ford, dictated a "last will and testa-

ment" just minutes before his two brothers drove him to the station, where he began spraying bullets at passing cars and

even an ambulance to draw officers outside,

police said. Colson arrived at the station after the firing began. He was wearing civilian clothes without body armor and leaped out of an unmarked car

"Police officers run to disorder. They run to the sound of shots," the chief said. "It's my sad duty to have to share with you that, circumstantially, we believe the fired round that led to Detective Colson's death was fired by one of his fellow Prince George's County officers reacting to this."

In the confusion, despite their restraint, one of the other officers' bullets hit Colson, the chief said. Four other officers fired their weapons, and it is not yet known who fired the fatal bullet, said the chief, who praised their restraint as well as the "extreme heroism" of Colson, who "drew fire to himself and in doing so was mortally wounded."

Colson was declared dead later in a hospital. Michael Ford, 22, was expected to survive, along with his brothers Malik, 21, and Elijah, 18. All three were arrested and will face dozens of charges between them, the chief said.

1st-ever dissolving heart stent gets FDA review this week

A disappearing medical implant will get a closer look from the Food and Drug Administration this week.

The FDA meets today to review Abbott aboratories' first-of-a-kind heart stent that dissolves into the body after helping to clear fatclogged arteries. Abbott has asked the agency to approve its Absorb stent as an alternative to permanent, metal implants that have long been used to treat narrowing arteries that can lead to heart attack and death. But regulators have questions about the safety and effectiveness of the experimental device. In a review posted late last week, FDA scientists noted that rates of cardiovascular complications were actually slightly higher with Absorb than with older stents tested in a company study. Additionally, complications were more likely to occur when Absorb was implanted into smaller arteries. The agency will ask a panel of outside advisers to discuss the data and whether the device should be approved.

Life on Mars? New launch looks for signs

The European Space Agency has begun the first stage of a two-part mission to explore Mars and hunt for signs of life on the red planet.

The unmanned ExoMars probe- a collaborative project with Russia's Roscosmoswas launched aboard a Russian rocket in Kazakhstan on Monday and is expected to reach Mars in October.

The probe consists of an orbiter that will analyze gases in the atmosphere of Mars, and a small lander that will put a rover on the surface in 2018. Europe's Beagle 2 probe disappeared during the landing process in 2003, a setback which ESA is keen to avoid this time.

Paolo Ferri, ESA's head of mission operations, says traces of methane previously discovered in the Martian atmosphere indicate recent geological or even biological activity.

The Russian- and U.S.-brokered cease-fire that began Feb. 27 has largely held, but both the Syrian government and its foes have accused one another of violations. The deal with Washington has achieved a key Putin goal: raising Russia's global profile to appear as an equal to the United States in mediating the Syrian conflict that has dominated global attention.

The Islamic State group and al-Qaida's branch in Syria, the Nusra Front, are excluded from the cease-fire and Russia has said it would continue its fight against the groups considered terrorists by the United Nations.

More than 130 cars involved in wreck on I-40 in North Carolina

A huge series of wrecks involving more than 130 vehicles on Interstate 40 in North Carolina are being blamed on speeding, following too closely and driver inattention in heavy rain and fog, authorities say.

No one was killed, but 25 people were hurt in the pileups that began late Sunday afternoon on the route between Durham and Greensboro, said a statement released Monday by the Department of Public Safety.

Motorists traveling east through central North Carolina's Alamance County failed to slow quickly enough, leading initially to four crashes involving about two dozen vehicles, according to the statement.

As crews worked to clear those accidents, motorists in the westbound lanes slowed to look at the scene and were involved in a series of additional wrecks. All told, 134 vehicles were eventually involved.

Senate votes to confirm King to head Education Department

The Senate narrowly voted Monday to confirm John B. King Jr. as the nation's education secretary.

The vote was 49-40. King has served as acting secretary at the Education Department since Arne Duncan stepped down in December.

As secretary, King will oversee the department as it puts in place a bipartisan education law passed by Congress and signed by President Barack Obama in December. The measure revamps the widely criticized No Child Left Behind Act and substantially limits the federal government's role in public schools.

Obama nominated King last month. After the vote, Obama said King "will continue to lead our efforts to work toward high-quality preschool for all, prepare our kids for college and a career, make college more affordable, and protect Americans from the burdens of student debt."

Iraqi official, Syrian activist: Senior IS leader dead

A top Islamic State commander and feared Chechen iihadi fighter Omar al-Shishani has died of wounds suffered in a U.S. airstrike in Svria last week. a senior Iraqi intelligence official and the head of a Syrian activist group said today.

The red-bearded ethnic Chechen was one of the most prominent IS commanders. serving as the group's military commander for the territory it controls in Syria. He also might have become the group's overall military chief, a post that has been vacant after the Iraqi militant who once held it — known as Abu Abdul-Rahman al-Bilawi al-Anbari was killed in the Iraqi city of Mosul in June 2014. According to Rami Abdur-

rahman, of the Britain-based Svrian Observatory for Human Rights, after al-Shishani was wounded, IS "brought a number of doctors to treat him, but they were not able to.'

Palestinian-American **IS fighter surrenders**

A 26-year-old man fighting with the Islamic State group gave himself up to Iraqi Kurdish forces in northern Iraq on Monday and when asked, said he is a Palestinian from the United States.

His driving license, posted on social media, had Alexandria, Va., as his home address and though U.S. authorities have yet to confirm whether he is an American citizen, the incident marked a rare voluntary surrender in Iraq of a militant fighting with the extremist group.

The IS fighter had been "lurking near the peshmerga lines" since late Sunday night, according to Maj. Gen. Feisal Helkani of the Iraqi Kurdish

peshmerga forces who play a key role — along with the Iraqi military and Shiite militia forces — in battling the IS extremists.

4 Mexicans arrested at meth super-lab

Nigerian drug agents arrested four Mexicans who were allegedly helping build a "super-lab" capable of producing billions of dollars' worth of methamphetamine, the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency said Monday.

Spokesman Mitchell Ofoyeju said it was the first industrialscale production of crystal meth found in West Africa, and possibly on the continent.

The warehouse in southern Delta state could produce 8,800 pounds a week of the synthetic drug, which sells for \$6,000 a kilogram in Nigeria but as much as \$300,000 a kilogram in the Asian markets favored by Nigerian drug dealers, Ofoyeju told The Associated Press. Most goes to Singapore

and Malaysia.

The lab completed a first successful production in February and the agents raided it as the Mexicans were producing a second run, Ofoveju said. - THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

Ivory Coast declares 3 days of mourning

Ivory Coast President President Alassane Ouattara declared three days of mourning and raised the country's terrorism alert to its highest level Monday after attacks at beach resorts claimed by al-Qaida left 21 people dead.

The death toll from Sunday's attacks at three heach hotels was lowered to 21 from 22 by Interior and Security Ministry Hamed Bakyoko.

The attacks took place in Grand-Bassam, 24 miles southeast of the economic capital Abidian.

According to Bakyoko, 15 civilians, three soldiers and three gunmen were killed at the site popular with both Ivorians and foreigners. Some 33

Police: Suspect killed, 3 officers hurt in Chicago shootout

A shootout between Chicago police and a suspect during a drug investigation on the city's West Side left the suspect dead and three officers wounded, authorities said.

The officers were rushed to Stroger Hospital late Monday for treatment of injuries that are not life-threatening, according to police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi.

The shooting occurred as several police officers were investigating reported drug activity in a residential area of the Homan Square neighborhood, Guglielmi said. The officers observed a man and a woman acting suspiciously and decided to investigate further, announcing their presence, he said.

The pair fled, with police giving chase. The man ran into a gangway between two buildings and opened fire in the direction of the officers, hitting three of them multiple times, Guglielmi said. He said one of the officers

returned fire, fatally injuring the suspect. Guglielmi says the woman was arrested after a chase and was being questioned in connection with the shooting.

Chicago police probe racial slurs on radio

The Chicago Police Department is probing the use of racial slurs over its radio channel. In an exchange captured Saturday, two men could be heard referencing the Black Lives Matter movement and using an obscenity referencing sex and a racial slur.

Chicago police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi said Monday it is unclear whether

the transmission came from a Chicago police radio or another source. Guglielmi says a breach of the system has happened before

In a statement, Guglielmi said should the investigation reveal a member of the police department made the statements, "he will be immediately suspended" and disciplinary proceedings launched.

Waukegan bans security screens

Council members in Waukegan have voted to ban and restrict certain types of security screens on businesses, saying they give the city north of Chicago a negative perception.

Mayor Wayne Motley said roll down metal screen security gates "provide an extremely negative image" and "give a grim perspective of the neighborhood." Motley is a former Waukegan police officer.

State fairgrounds have \$180M repair backlog

A spending plan from Gov. Bruce Rauner outlines a \$180 million backlog in repairs and maintenance for the state fairgrounds in Springfield and Du Quoin. If the backlog is allowed to go on, it will make it more and more difficult for the facilities to compete to host major events, according to the governor's plan, which was outlined last month.

More than a dozen roofs at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield are in need of repair or replacement, among other needss.

The Du Quoin fairgrounds need grandstand repairs, roof replacements, a fire-alarm system and life-safety improvements.

Illinois lawmakers haven't yet agreed on a way to pay for the work.

WASHINGTON — It was 1948 when New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey won the Republican presidential nomination on the third ballot of a contested convention in Philadelphia. Months later, he lost the general election to Democratic incumbent Harry S. Truman.

Could a real contested convention happen again, 68 years later?

If GOP front-runner Donald Trump stumbles in today's contests, there's a chance of a protracted fight in Cleveland in July should favorite sons Gov. John Kasich, of Ohio, and Sen. Marco Rubio, of Florida, defy the polls and take their respective states' winner-take-all primaries.

Delegates generally are bound to a candidate, at least on the first ballot. After that, watch out.


Sen. Ted Cruz or even someone not running, such as House Speaker Paul Rvan. of Wisconsin.

How many votes Trump gets on the first ballot — whether he falls shy of 1,237 or significantly short of it — probably will factor into the dynamics of what would happen on a second ballot.

At a GOP debate on Thursday in Miami, Trump said "whoever gets the most delegates should win." Cruz, who might get stepped over in a contested scenario, said a contested convention would be "an absolute disaster."

"There are some in Washington who are having fevered dreams of a brokered convention." Cruz said. "They are unhappy with how the people are voting and they want to parachute in their favored Washington candidate to be the nominee. We need to respect the will of the voters."

NOMINEE CHOSEN?

Whoever wins a majority of the 2.472 convention delegates. or 1,237 votes, at the Republican National Convention in Cleveland is the party's nominee.

What happens if there's no winner on the first ballot? Delegates vote again until one candidate gets a majority. On subsequent ballots, most delegates are free to vote for whomever they please.

Most delegates, about 4 out of 5, are selected at state or district party conventions and are commonly party activists and lovalists the establishment types who are more likely to be aghast at the prospect of a Trump nomination.

Relatively few states directly elect delegates already pledged to a candidate. In many cases, those state and local conventions are going to choose actual delegates who may not have a real allegiance to Trump, though the vast majority of such delegates are bound on the first ballot to vote based on the results of their state's primary or caucus.

So, if Trump cannot win on the first ballot, the logical next question is how strongly his delegates support him.

The anybody-but-Trump crowd hopes that denying Trump a majority on the first ballot could rally a majority of the convention around another candidate — maybes Texas

IS SECURING THE **NOMINATION FAIRLY SIMPLE?**

No, it gets tricky. To have one's name placed in nomination, a candidate needs to win the support of a majority of delegates of at least eight states. Trump is the only one who seems sure to qualify under the rule, which was orchestrated in 2012 by Mitt Romney supporters to deny then Texas Rep. Ron Paul an opportunity to be nominated and garner attention at that year's convention.

What might happen on a second ballot? Would anyone else qualify under the eight-state rule? If not, it could be difficult to denv Trump the nomination on a second ballot if he is close to the threshold and is the only candidate able to be nominated.

The rules favor Trump, as they are now written. Cruz might qualify under the eight-state rule, but it's not a sure bet. The other candidates look unlikely to meet this test.

All the rules, however, are subject to change by the convention's Rules Committee, which is stocked with party insiders. Any proposal to change the rules requires a majority vote of the convention, and any effort to change the rules to make it easier to defeat Trump is sure to spark a floor fight with passionate Trump supporters that could turn ugly.

COMMENTARY Soaking the rich: a primer

WASHINGTON — There's no subtlety about Democrats' tax plans. Between Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders details differ, but the central themes are identical: Soak the rich. To hear Democrats tell it, the country's main budget problem is that the rich don't pay their "fair share." If they did, the fiscal outlook would brighten. We now can test this proposition because the Clinton and Sanders tax proposals have been thoroughly analyzed by the nonpartisan Tax

Policy Center. To begin, it's worth noting the rich, defined here as the "top 1 percent," don't escape taxation. Some manipulate the system to minimize or eliminate taxes, but as a group, the top 1 percent accounted for 14.6 percent of pretax income in 2011 and paid 24 percent of federal taxes, estimates the Congressional Budget Office. Whether that's a "fair share" is, of course, a matter of

opinion. Regardless, both Clinton and Sanders would increase it sharply. Start with Clinton. The TPC reckons her tax package would raise \$1.1 trillion throughout a decade. The top 1 percent would pay about three-quarters of the increase, with other high-income households covering most of the rest

"The bottom 95 percent would see little or no change in their taxes," says the TPC

The top income tax rate on ordinary income — mainly wages and salaries — now is 39.6 percent (plus there's a 3.8 percent surcharge on investment income added under the Affordable Care Act). Clinton would require taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes exceeding \$1 million to pay at least a 30 percent tax (a plan named after investor Warren Buffett, who proposed it). There also would be a 4 percent surcharge for taxpayers with AGIs exceeding \$5 million.

Likewise, Clinton would limit itemized deductions, raise the estate tax and increase taxes

on capital gains (profits from the sale of stocks and other assets held at least a year); these are concentrated among the wealthy and upper middle class.

The top capital gains rate now is 23.8 percent. Clinton would raise that to 43.4 percent and gradually reduce it the longer an asset is held. After six years, it would revert to 23.8 percent.

She also would end capital gains treatment for "carried interest," a provision that benefits some investment firms.

For all of this, the government's budget outlook wouldn't change dramatically.

Even if all the new taxes went to deficit reduction, the impact would be modest.

Throughout the next decade, the CBO projects \$9 trillion in deficits; Clinton's tax increase would absorb a ninth of this. To make a real dent, the superrich would need to pay even higher taxes, as would the upper-middle and middle classes.

Sanders proposes this. His tax package would raise a staggering \$15.3 trillion throughout a decade, says the TPC. Most taxpayers would be hit. There would be a 2.2 percent surcharge on all taxable income. Further tax rate increases, starting at 9 percent and peaking at 24 percent, would kick in at \$250,000 for joint filers (and \$200,000 for singles). The TPC's Howard Gleckman notes that maximum rates would hit 54.2 percent for ordinary income and 64.2 percent for capital gains.

Similar to Clinton, Sanders would raise the estate tax. He'd also impose new business taxes, including a carbon tax and a financial transactions tax (a levy on sales of stocks and other securities).

At least, you might think, deficits and debt will decline. Not necessarily. Says the TPC:

"Sanders has been quite explicit that the revenues are earmarked to finance an expansive set of new spending priorities Medicare for all health insurance, "free" college]. ... The plan is unlikely to do much, if anything, to reverse the currently unsustainable path for public debt.

Whether Sanders' and Clinton's huge tax increases would weaken economic growth will surely be debated. Although the TPC did not explore that question, it did note that higher marginal tax rates reduce "incentives to work, save and invest." (Comparable questions are posed by Donald Trump's proposed tax cuts, which the TPC estimates would cut government revenues by \$9.5 trillion during a decade. Unless offset by spending cuts, government borrowing would roughly double.)

The lessons here are many. Soaking the rich is not a painless way to avoid unpleasant political choices.

If you want much bigger government, you have to pay for it with broadly based taxes, even if the rich and upper middle class bear the biggest burdens.

At best, the changes proposed by Clinton and Sanders would ease economic insecurity and advance social justice.

At worst, they would harm the economy, centralize more power in Washington — inspiring more lobbying — and entrench a cynical view of politics. It becomes a vote-buying enterprise financed by transfers from the minority upper classes to the majority middle and lower classes.





NBA: BULLS 109, **TORONTO 107 Bulls win** 9th straight over Raptors

 $\operatorname{TORONTO}-\operatorname{Before}$ the game, $\operatorname{Toronto}$ coach Dwane Casey bemoaned the fact the each time his Raptors play the Chicago Bulls, someone has had an "out-of-body experience.'

For the second straight game, that player was reserve Doug McDermott.

McDermott followed up his career-high 30 points last month with 29 more Monday night to lead the Bulls to their ninth straight victory over the Raptors, 109-107.

McDermott, who hasn't scored more than 20 points in any other game this season, shot 7 of 7 from the field in the first half as he racked up 24 points, helping hand the Raptors just their second loss in their last 16 at home.

"There's just something about it," McDermott said. "I played really well against them in Summer League in (Las) Vegas. There's something about it. It's not like I have anything against them, grudges or anything, I just match up really well against them.'

E'Twaun Moore and Nikola Mirotic added 17 points apiece for a short-handed Chicago team, missing both Derrick Rose, Pau Gasol and Mike Dunleavy, among others.

Toronto's last win against Chicago was on Dec. 31, 2013.

Jimmy Butler scored 13 points on 5-of-18 shooting after missing three games because of knee soreness. He made a free throw in the closing seconds, then made the crucial defensive play on DeMar DeRozan with the Raptors All-Star guard looking to send the game to overtime with a layup with a second remaining.

"I've guarded him plenty," Butler said. "I know you bring that ball down you've got to bring it back up to get to the basket. Luckily I had a quick enough hand to get a piece of it, hit off his knee and we took it the other way.'

For a Bulls squad fighting for its playoff lives, currently eighth in the Eastern Conference, every win is an important one. But by sweeping the season series against the Raptors for the second straight year, it may have given them a mental edge should the teams meet in the playoffs.

"It definitely is," McDermott said. "We'll keep this in our memories and whenever we're battling, to win four games against a team that's only lost 21 games, it's just really good for our confidence, our motivation going forward." Kyle Lowry had 33 points and 11 rebounds for the Raptors, and like Casey was frustrated by his team's lack of urgency from the start. "(We need to) take the lesson of not being aggressive and that starts with me,' the All-Star guard said. "Starting the game off relaxed, not being aggressive and not being defensive-minded, so I take a little bit of that on me."

Miller back on 2-year deal

Bears also add Hicks

The Bears' offense got a boost Monday with the re-signing of tight end Zach Miller, who returns on a two-year deal.

According to NFL Network's Ian Rapoport, the contract is worth \$6 million over two years with \$2 million more available in incentives.

Miller, 31, had a career year in 2015, after missing the three previous regular seasons because of injuries. He played in 15 games with 14 starts and had 34 catches for 439 yards and five touchdowns, averaging 12.9 yards per catch.

According to reports, Miller was slated to visit the Los Angeles Rams on Monday.

Ryan Pace said at the Combine that the Bears were negotiating with Miller and wanted to bring him back. He established himself as a key pass-catching threat and red-zone weapon for Jay Cutler and the passing game.

The Bears have reportedly been shopping Martellus Bennett, and have Rob Housler (also re-signed on Monday), Khari Lee and Gannon Sinclair as the other tight ends under contract for 2016.

HICKS ADDED TO BOLSTER DEFENSIVE LINE

The Bears may have gone 6-10 last year but there's a belief from Ryan Pace and John Fox that

sign on Sunday evening — defensive lineman Akiem Hicks.

'Opportunity was the biggest thing that I wanted to have in the organization I chose to be with. I wanted to have the opportunity to play and play a lot, and be a part of a team that has a legitimate chance to win," Hicks said on a conference call Monday.

COMMENTARY Pace's plan seems to be falling into place

Chicago Bears general manager Ryan Pace appears to have a plan, and it's easy to be impressed with how he is implementing it so far.

As a rookie in 2015 facing his first round of NFL free agency and first NFL Draft, Pace appeared to seek quantity over quality in free agency and the opposite in the draft.

Having inherited a 5-11 ARKUSH team that probably wasn't CHICAGO as good as its record, FOOTBALL the Bears needed help almost everywhere last offseason, and Pace immediately began piling up bodies.

The only gifts left to Pace likely to continue to give were Jay Cutler, Alshon Jeffery, Kyle Long, Matt Slauson and possibly Zach Miller, Ego Ferguson, Will Sutton, Lamarr Houston, Willie Young and Kyle Fuller.

The Bears signed 16 unrestricted free agents away from other NFL teams and only three of them, Pernell McPhee, Eddie Royal and Antrel Rolle, got more than one-year deals.

Of the 13 players on one-year deals, only Mason Foster, Ray McDonald, Bear Pascoe and Daniel Thomas failed to make the team, and of the other nine, Jarvis Jenkins, Sam Acho, Will Montgomery and Tracy Porter all became starters.

However, a year later, only Porter and backup running back and special-teamer Jacquizz Rodgers have been re-signed, and there is no guarantee Rolle will survive training camp after a disappointing and injury-shortened '15 campaign.

The key to it all, however, was McPhee, who was the only free agent Pace gave serious — not huge, but serious-money to last year and who he hopes can be a core player for some time going forward.

In his first draft, Pace only got six players and a seventh, Khari Lee, who he traded a 2017 sixthround pick for.

While it is too early to put any meaningful grades on the group, Eddie Goldman, Hroniss Grasu, Jeremy Langford and Adrian Amos have already earned or been given starting jobs and the top pick, Kevin White, will be a starter this year if he can stay healthy.

Undrafted rookie free agents Brvce Callahan and John Timu are also already contributors, and if these results hold through another season or two, Pace's first draft will be an A to

an A+.

The bottom line is that in his first year, Pace may have added in McPhee, Royal, Porter and the rookies as many as 9-to-11 core players for a contender he is trying to build.

If everybody stays healthy and continues to improve, the Bears entered 2016 looking for new starters at tight

end (assuming Martellus Bennett is dealt), right tackle, both defensive end spots, both inside linebacker spots, one cornerback and possibly one safety.

To that end, Pace has taken a 180-degree turn in his approach to free agency. While it is far from over, to date, Pace has inked just four players from other teams, all to multi-year deals, all immediately added to the depth chart as starters and all are hoped to be core players over the next three or four seasons or more.

Along with Danny Trevathan, Bobby Massie, Jerrell Freeman and Akiem Hicks, Pace has resigned Porter to a three-year deal, filling five of the eight spots on his depth chart that demanded upgrades.

Just to be clear — the Bears need to get better at almost every position on the field to win a Super Bowl, but Pace has clearly demonstrated he understands you have to be good enough to compete in the NFL before you can get good enough to win.


Pace now has two major advantages going into his second draft.

His greatest single need, defensive line, is clearly the strength of this draft, and with just three starting spots on the field to fill rather than eight, he can stick rigidly to drafting the best player available in every round rather than reaching to fill needs.

The only way to stockpile playmakers is to consistently take the best player available, and the only way to win a Super Bowl is to stockpile your roster with playmakers.






