Paul Archer is attending Higgins' Classical Institute, Geraldine Hanscom is attending Brewer high school, Ada Hanscom is attending Bar Harbor high school. Your attention is called to the total expenditures which are only a very little higher than last year but the resources are smaller, consequently a smaller balance. It is expected that there will be a larger amount from the state next year and the school appropriation need not be increased.

## **NURSE'S REPORT**

To the Selectmen of the Town of Amherst:

I herein submit a brief report of services rendered the town of Amherst by the Hancock County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the year February 1, 1944, to February 1, 1945.

Pamphlet and posters emphasizing the Early Diagnosis Campaign for the prevention of tuberculosis were distributed through the schools and placed in public places. The slogan for this year was "Follow the Example of the Armed Forces, Get a Chest X-ray Now - In War, a Patriotic Duty - In Peace, Plain Common Sense."

Five visits have been made to the McKinley school during

the school year at which time classroom inspection was given and a check-up made of the Seven-Point pupils. Individual inspection was given those absent when the annual inspection was given.

The annual individual physical inspection was given the pupils on October 17, and consisted of the usual routine weighing and measuring, the Snellen test for vision, the whisper test for hearing, inspection of the teeth, throat and scalp, for postural defects, the skin for rashes and sores, for personal cleanliness as well as for infectious diseases. The results are as follows: Defective vision, 2; decayed teeth, 7; abnormal throat, 1; obstruction of nose, 1; 20 pounds or more overweight, 1; with swollen glands, 1.

Seven pupils have temporary decay and one permanent decay of the teeth. Of the twenty pupils inspected, fifteen were found with defects, and five were eligible for the Seven-Point Pin and Certificate. Since previous inspection, the following corrections have been made: Vision, 2; teeth, 6.

The Bureau of Health cooperated by providing a vaccination and Patch Test clinic. Dr. Crowe, assisted by the State nurse, vaccinated forty-two school pupils, pre-school and adults. The Tuberculin Patch Test was given to twenty-one pupils and adults; all proved to be negative reactors.

The service rendered the many towns of Hancock county is financed through the sale of Christmas Seals and by town appropriations. We wish to express our thanks and appreciation to all who have made the work possible.

## WARRANT

To A. C. MacDonald, a Constable of the Town of Amherst, in the County of Hancock, and the State of Maine,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Amherst, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on Monday, the twenty-sixth day of March, 1945, at one o'clock in the afternoon, and then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose a town clerk.
- 3 To see what action the town will take on the report of the selectmen.
- 4 To choose three or more selectmen and overseers of the poor.
- 5 To choose three or more assessors of taxes.
- 6 To choose a town treasurer.
- 7 To choose a collector of taxes and fix his compensation.
- 8 To choose a road commissioner and fix his compensation.
- 9 To choose one or more constables.
- 10 To choose one member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.
- 11 To choose a sexton.
- 12 To choose one or more surveyors of wood bark and lumber.
- 13 To choose a fire warden and fix his compensation.

- 14 To choose a sealer of weights and measures and fix his compensation.
- 15 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State--Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.
- 16 To see what sum of money the town will raise for town charges.
- 17 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of bridges.
- 18 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of highways.
- 19 to see if the town will vote to raise \$85.00 for third-class road maintenance.
- 20 To see what sum of money the town will raise for cutting bushes.
- 21 To see what sum of money the town will raise for road patrol.
- 22 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools.
- 23 To see what sum of money the town will raise for school repairs.
- 24 To see what sum of money the town will raise for superintendent of schools.
- 25 To see what sum of money the town will raise for snow removal.
- 26 To see what sum of money the town will raise for cemeteries.

- 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the Public Health Nurse.
- 28 To see what action the town will take regarding payment of note which was given by the town for the purpose of providing funds to pay for the cost of the forest fire.
- 29 To see what action the town will take in regards to number of hours and wages per day for labor on ways, highways and bridges, for men, teams and trucks.
- 30 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- 31 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.
- 32 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of chapter 5, section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- 33 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
- 34 To adjourn.
