Playwright's Note

When I was first given the option to write an author's statement, I wanted to submit a doodle of myself on a motorcycle with my middle finger up, popping a wheelie on Shakespeare's grave. I have a complicated relationship with "The Bard." I appreciate his verse, I admire his imagery and wordplay, but I think he (and other old, dead, white guys) are over-hyped in the theater canon. Additionally, as a queer actress of color, I never quite fit into his world. I could see myself as the awkward and forlorn Helena, the free-thinking yet manhandled Katherine, the (definitely) queer weirdo called Puck- but despite my Oberlin Shakespeare training, years of acting experience, and love of heightened language I have yet to book a classic Shakespeare gig. I suspect it's because I am too brown, too unwieldy, with hair that takes up too much space and a voice too deep for an ingénue. Instead, I found my home in indie theater. I found that I loved new works, and even landed roles in new translations and remixes of Shakespeare. Playwrights like Mfoniso Udofia and John Reed showed me that there were ways of tweaking and twisting and rewriting archaic plots into something new and different beasts. Productions of their works found ways of exploring systemic violence, minority ambition, and misogynoir- ways of giving power and voice to those previously chained and silenced.

I am a firm believer in writing the change you want to see in the world. I write for the people who don't see themselves in books, onstage, or on screen- I write characters that I hope will make them feel less alone. Ophelia is an interesting character- she's a bit of a cypher to both those in the play and those in the audience. She is the subject of derision, scorn, and admiration. She exists as a pawn, an object, a foil. She is subject to her father's ambition, her brother's bravado, Hamlet's scorn, and Gertrude's pity. She is emotional cannon fodder. I have tried to give her agency, yet I am handcuffed by the text- no matter how fiercely she may struggle, she must drown before the end. But I hope that, at least, I have given that struggle meaning.

This particular play was written with an Oberlin cast and audience in mind. It has been adapted to fit the needs of the Oberlin Theater Department, and will eventually morph into something with a larger cast. The play you are about to experience is an incubator production. The world premiere of Ophelia: A Prism will be held in New York City this summer, and I look forward to seeing what it will become. I extend my sincere love and gratitude to the cast, crew, and production team of Ophelia: A Prism. You have all made me and my work feel so welcome and supported. I hope that I have made you all feel the same.

She has also lent her voice to projects with Classical Theater of Harlem (*The Muck*), Pink Flamingo/Audible (*Alight*), and Scribd. Mieko's play *Dog* has been performed at the Gene Frankel Theatre, her play *Afterswarm* (co-written with Heather Harvey) has been performed at JACK, and her non-theatrical writing has been featured in Bustle, Buzzfeed, Oxygen, and Efniks.
