Accessibility Committee Column



The University Libraries Accessibility Committee will share and update some of their older columns to refresh our knowledge and share information with new staff and faculty at the Libraries. Here is their first ever column.

What is Accessibility?

So, what are we talking about when we refer to "accessibility?" The United Kingdom's Accessibility in Government blog summarized it nicely: accessibility is when "people are not excluded from using something on the basis of experiencing a disability." Accessibility, then, is intertwined with the concept of "disability." The CDC defines a disability as:

any condition of the body or mind (impairment) that makes it more difficult for the person with the condition to do certain activities (activity limitation) and interact with the world around them (participation restrictions).

So, a disability makes it harder for people to act and participate in life, while accessibility allows them to do so more easily.

There are <u>many types of disabilities</u>, including vision, mobility, auditory, neurological, cognitive, medical, and psychological. <u>A disability can also be temporary</u>, such as those caused by recoverable injuries, short-term illness, and some medical procedures. All these affect people's ability to do activities and

interact with the world around them. <u>19% of undergraduate students report having a disability</u>. Many students never report their disability to their school.

Accessibility empowers people with disabilities by ensuring that when they try to do an activity it can be done in a comparable amount of time and effort as it would take someone without a disability. Because of the wide varieties of disability, accessibility is not a "yes or no" situation. What is accessible to one person might be inaccessible to someone with a different disability. The UofM's Office of Institutional Equity identified three major areas for eliminating barriers to accessibility: in physical access, in information and materials, and on the web.
