## Area businesses use underwriting to show support

When new members come to KVSC, often I find they have questions concerning the concept of underwriting and its importance to KVSC. Their questions usually deal with how the underwriting mentions you hear on non-commercial stations like KVSC differ from commercials on other radio stations. It's understandable since it is somewhat of a grey area that seperates underwriting from commercials.

The difference between underwriting on noncommercial stations and commercials on commercial stations is that underwriting mentions are restricted in their content and frequency.

Non-commercial stations get funding from other sources. In KVSC's case, other funding comes from the state, the university, and student activity fees. Even with these other sources of income, KVSC needs underwriting to bring you high quality programming and an effective training ground for those interested in radio.

The content of underwriting mentions differ from the content of commercials in that underwriting generally identifies a business and their type of products while commercials generally promote the business and their products.

Underwriting mentions on KVSC are less frequent than commercials on other stations. For the most part, KVSC runs no more than two underwriters per hour and our messages are generally more concise.

Even though there are some limitations to underwriting, it can nevertheless provide unique advantages over commercials.

Underwriting carries with it an image of public concern and involvement. In the case of KVSC, underwriting involvement shows that area businesses support educational radio, the university, and alternative radio programming.

Underwriting is also a good

way to target a message to a specific audience.

Again, in the case of KVSC, this targeting is done through sponsorship of our programs such as *Classic Rock, Frets*, and *Top 10*,. These and other shows can be uniquely tied to a business.

Underwriting mentions are spread so they have a tendency to stand out more than a commercial that is played among three or four others.

If you are a business owner, look into KVSC as a medium that can work for you. If you are a listener, I would like to urge you to support the fine businesses you hear mentioned on KVSC.

Underwriting helps KVSC to continue to improve our programming.

Team standings are reported hourly so participants as well as listeners can follow the progress of each team.


The reported standings help the teams to know where they stand among the competition. This also leads to teams challenging other teams for a specified amount of points.

The Figures

It was definitely a good year for the area in terms of quantity and quality. It was not exactly hard to find either


When speaking of quality it is difficult to choose one record that rises above the others. It is *The Gateway* from The Figures that comes as close as any

The Gateway is a record with ten tracks, all of them good, and all of them recorded by some of Minneapolis' more accomplished, yet lesser known artists.

At the core of The Figures are Steve Brantseg(ex Phone) and Jeff Wayran(Figures originator). They create a guitar duo reminiscent of Tom Verlaine and Richard Lloyd who helped to popularize the "new wave" guitar sound years ago with the band Television. Wayran's song writing, his arrangement and voice are also primary ingredients to the band's sounds which have improved since their last record, *In a Chalk Circle*, was released in 1984.

Bassist Steve Fjelstad, who's name appears on most records that come out of Minneapolis for his contributions as an engineer, exercises his talent on *The Gateway* as well. His bass playing is worth noting, although he is best known for his engineering skills

Perhaps one of the best reasons for this record's quality is the production. The album is produced by Anton Fier He is best known for his work with Syd Straw and The Golden Paliminos who's *Blast of Silence* was one of the best in 1986.



Stevie Ray Vaughan And Double Trouble

In reviewing Stevie Ray Vaughan's new album, I am faced with an interesting dilemma. I truly admire his studio albums and was more than impressed with his live performance last year at the Orpheum. Therefore, I was eagerly anticipating this live set. Upon many listenings, though, I came away unimpressed.

It is not that it is a bad album, it is just that it is adequate. According to some, Stevie Ray Vaughan is the "Reigning Crown Price" of Texas

blues rock. Yet on this album, most of his grandeur is missing.

Recorded in Texas and at the Montreaux Festival, this live set has Vaughan performing his trademarks like "Cold Shot" and "Say What." Some of it is quite good. The good stuff is filled with Stevie Ray Vaughan doing what he does best, playing his guitar with a sizzling ease. The majority, though, is merely routine.

A man and band with the stature and talent of Stevie Ray Vaughan can certainly do a lot better than this. To perform a great song like "Pride and Joy" and make it sound almost boring should be considered a crime.

I do not want you to think that this is a terrible album. It is just when an incredible band like this puts out a dissappointing live album, it is a real let down, especially when you know they can do a whole lot better Oh well, a new studio album should change my outlook of this fine band.



Herbie Hancock

Can I say enough good stuff about this album? I don't think so. This has got to be one of the best traditional jazz records to be released in recent years. If this is not Grammy material, I do not know what is!

Herbie Hancock has gone back to producing traditional jazz and has gathered the greatest jazz musicians together to record some old standards - "'Round Midnight," "Body and Soul" and "Rhythm-a-ning" - and some new compositions - "Still Time," "Berangere's Nightmare" and "Chan's Song" (co-written by Stevie Wonder). Some of the artists on this album include Dexter Gordon (who also stars in the movie, 'Round Midnight), Wayne Shorter, Chet Baker, Freddie Hubbard, Bobby McFerrin, John McLaughlin, Cedar Walton, Ron Carter and Tony Williams.

It simply does not get any better than this. If you like jazz music, buy this album. It is great.



# Program Guide

## KVSC's Dr. Aiko presents top 10 albums of 1986

#### 1. Paul Simon: Graceland

1986 has been termed the 'the year of the comeback'. The foremost of these supposed comebacks was certainly Paul Simon. His Graceland LP was more than just an album, it was a masterpiece. Simon went to South Africa and gathered up some of the finest musicians that troubled country had to offer. He then included some great North Americans like Los Lobos and Adrian Belew and recorded the best album of the year. This fine album is one that will prove itself to be a classic. If you have the chance, check out the compact disc of Graceland. It proves why C.D.'s are such a good investment.

#### 2. Stan Ridgeway: The Big Heat

Stan Ridgeway was the former leader of Wall of Voodoo. As a solo performer he has been given the opportunity to record much more intriguing music than his old band did. The Big Heat is an excellant piece. Ridgeway's eerie voice blends in with the soulful music creating a subtle and mystifying sound. He is not content to be just witty like the Wall of Voodoo. He instead creates an atmosphere in which the listener is forced to listen closely and let their mind work. In a year where mindless music like Madonna and friends were so successful, that is quite an achievement.

#### 3. 'Round Midnight: The Soundtrack

What happens when you combine the likes of Herbie Hancock, Dexter Gordon, Ron Carter, Bobby McFerrin and a host of other jazz greats? You get an incredible album, that's what! This soundtrack to one of the great films of the year is quite excellent. The producers decided to take a risk and record the whole thing live on the set of the film. Their gamble paid off in bundles. Hancock, taking a breather from the annoying "Future Shock" type stuff, is in rare form playing the type of jazz he gained his original fame from. Hopefully, this album has signaled a return to those fine roots. This is a prime album for the jazz lover or newcomer.

#### 4. Jane Siberry: The Speckless Sky

Jane Siberry's Speckless Sky was a welcome follow up to her U.S.A. debut No Borders Here. Ms. Siberry writes and performs music that is different in that it is so very fresh. Her odd lyrics and intricate music grow upon you until it is like an addiction. When this L.P. came out, I found myself listening to this religiously. Her intense vocal range only adds to the fine quality work that went into producing this album. This will ultimately be considered early masterpiece from an artist destined to be making superior music for many years.

#### 5. UB40: Rat In The Kitchen

Birmingham England's UB40 has been one of my favorite reggae bands for some time now. Their 1986 release Rat In The Kitchen proves to the rest of the world why. On this album they finally achieve the perfect mix of reggae, jazz and rock. The highlite of this album is the stirring antiapartheid anthem Sing Our Own Song. They sing a political song the same way they do love songs. A tasty trumpet solo form Herb Alpert adds a nice

touch to this album, which is a nice introduction to the music of UB40.

#### 6. REM: Lifes Rich Pageant

Until the release of this album, I had not been a great fan of REM. I saw them open up for the Gang of Four in 1980 and was duly unimpressed. Their albums in the ensuing years had some great moments but lacked a cohesiveness I desired. With this album, REM has finally come of age. The best produced and written album of their career. Lifes Rich Pageant proves REM has what it takes. This record gets my walkman album of the year because of the forceful sound and unified structure.


#### 7. Peter Case: Peter Case

This former Plimsoul released his first solo venture in 1986. The album, a collection of folk and rock tunes, is a delightful surprise. In place of the sometimes pretentious ramblings of his former band are down to earth ballads and songs. He was helped in the production by ace studio men like T-Bone Burnett and Mitchell Froom. His singing and guitar picking are superb as are his gaggle of celebrity back up musicians. All around, an excellent effort.

#### 8. Bruce Cockburn: W*orld of Wonders*

Bruce Cockburn has long been known as a folk singer with a purpose. In recent years, though, he





# the SPECIAL GUESTS

The life of a new band in the ever changing world of rock and roll is certainly a hard one. These bands have to get noticed and still make enough money to survive. One of the brightest new bands around, the Special Guests, are no exception. I recently had the chance to sit down and talk with Tom Meltzer, one of the founders of this talented band. Here is an excerpt from that interview:

KVSC: We haven't heard a lot from the Special Guests since the early 1986 release of the single "Cezanne." What has been happening with the band?

TOM: We semi-officially broke up. Our lead guitarist went to law school at Duke. Then our saxophonist, Jenny, and our keyboard player, Mark, were having a baby. They have split to form their own family band. The other somewhat embarrassing reason for breaking up was that the only bars we had steady gigs at closed down. The death of the Blue Rose and The Dive was rather difficult for us.

KVSC: What made you get back together?

TOM: We took time off and collected our thoughts and realized that it was time to get back together. When we got back from our respective summer chores, we got a call to perform at a performance arts place called The Franklin Furnace. We played with some really cool people and had an excellent gig. It was then that we realized that we shouldn't be sitting around when we could be playing rock and roll.

KVSC: I was watching MTV one evening and saw the video for "Cezanne" on the Basement Tupes competition. What has the response been to the video? TOM. Really amazing! It was considered a couple of weeks ago by Billboard magazine as one of the top five independent videos of 1986. It didn't win so you won't be reading about it. It is like when you go to the Academy awards and sit there when they announce your name, hoping that you will win. Then you don't and you try to look noble. We didn't win the MTV deal either. We came in second or third. We lost to a video about skiing. Elsewhere the video has gotten better response. The clip was on U-68 once a day for six months. U-68 was the video channel here in New York until this past October when it was bought and turned into Home Shopping Network. We are also on "Night Flight" on USA network once a month.

KVSC: Has the response been limited to video channels?

TOM: No, as a matter of fact our video was bought by the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. So now we have a side business going where we thought, "Hey, they're paying lots of money and all we have to do is make a copy of this tape." Now our manager is trying to sell the video to museums around the country. We figured were not stupid. These museums are paying a lot more money for the video than our parents would.

KVSC: What are these museums using the video for?

TOM. The Museum of Modern Art has programmed it with the New York City high schools, who are trying to introduce kids to art.

KVSC: Who influence you?

TOM: Johnathan Richman, Elvis Costello, Bob Dylan and The Replacements.

KVSC: Tell us a little about your history. What did

you do before joining the Special Guests?

TOM: The first band I was in was called The Booze Brothers and the 57th Street Band in which Dr. Aiko was the vocalist! That bizarre experience made me realize that I wanted to play rock and roll in front of people. Then I went to college in New York and got involved in a country-western band. It was then that I actually wrote "Cezanne." The next summer Wally and I and a few friends from Columbia University, where we were students, formed the Special Guests. The rest is history.

KVSC: Your first real sucess came with the single "Cezanne." How did that go?

TOM: The college stations that we sent the single to picked up on it really well. The response has been basically what happened at KVSC. You know, lots of requests, lots of positive response. We also had some critical acclaim. It was limited but very gratifying. Robert Christgau, critic for the Village Voice picked it as one of the top 25 singles of the year.

KVSC: That sounds pretty good. What's next for you guys?

TOM: We have a new single coming out called "I'm In Love With You." We're going to try to use college support from that single when we go back on tour. We're also adding a few new members to replace the ones we've lost along the way. So, we're gearing up for another Special Guests winter. I'm looking forward to it. Hopefully, we'll play a lot of hip colleges like, maybe, St. Cloud.

KVSC: That would be great. We'll be looking forward to it.

# Not a newcomer to radio; Campus news emphasized

The news director job in-



Johnsons musical style is a mixture of different kinds of music; jazz, blues, rock n' roll and country with a superb classical influence.


"It's hard to classify my music because I feel that at some point all kinds of music run together," Johnson said. "It's just stuff that sounds good on classical guitar."


