Undergraduate Catalog Course Description

Career and graduate school preparation, and applications of clinical and translational research in healthcare.

Course Summary

This course is designed for senior students in the Health Sciences major. The course aims at bridging academia to career preparation through augmenting student learning through exploration of the recent advances in clinical research. At the same time, it facilitates student professional development by allowing them to showcase their educational gains and strengths and connecting that with their career and professional goals. In this class, two educational tools will be utilized: ePortfolios and Digital Storytelling. Career and graduate school preparation, and applications of clinical and translational research in health-care. This course is designated as a High Impact Learning Experience (HIP) – with focus on Integrative Learning Experience (IE). Assignments in this course are designed to emphasize integrative learning within your major and align your learning with your future career goals.

Textbook Requirements

No textbook is required or needed for HSC 4930.

Enrollment Requirements

Senior Standing and Health Sciences major.

*Some students may have senior standing because of transfer credits and this would also allow for enrollment.

Required Attendance Policy

Attendance in HSC 4930 is required and for grade with in-class work making up a majority of the total grade in this course. Students are required to attend the live lecture (no zoom option) and complete in-class assignments which will count for their HSC 4930 grade. Students that fail to follow the attendance policy may risk failure or a major deduction in their final grade. Daily attendance is taken using UCF Here and there is information below on how to upload the UCF Here app.

- Students are allowed a maximum of 4 total excused absences in HSC 4930 for the entire semester
- An excused absence is any absence when a student does not attend class prior to their 4 max days
- An unexcused absence is any absence (with/without medical documentation) after the 4 max days
- During an excused absence (<4 days) all in-class assignments will be excused for that student
- During an unexcused absence (>4 days) all in-class assignments will be counted as zero
- Student may not complete in-class assignment on excused/unexcused absent day
- Students will log all their absences in the **Absence Log** in the course modules
- In-class attendance will also be taken in class with UCF Here but not counted for grade
- Students must attend their clinical trial in-class presentation without exception
- Attendance for the ePortfolio showcase is part of that assignment's grading rubric
- Students attending the live lecture must complete in-class assignments that day
- It is **not necessary** for students to email the instructor about excused absences
- Any student expecting to miss more than 4 classes may consider withdrawal

7. Helping another violate academic behavior standards.
8. Soliciting assistance with academic coursework and/or degree requirements.

Plagiarism

In an instructional setting, plagiarism occurs when a writer deliberately uses someone else's language, ideas, or other original (not common-knowledge) material without acknowledging its source. This definition applies to texts published in print or on-line, to manuscripts, and to the work of other student writers" (Council of Writing Program Administrators, 2003).

Misuse of Sources

A student who attempts (even if clumsily) to identify and credit his or her source, but who misuses a specific citation format or incorrectly uses quotation marks or other forms of identifying material taken from other sources, has not plagiarized. Instead, such a student should be considered to have failed to cite and document sources appropriately" (Council of Writing Program Administrators, 2003).

Responses to Academic Dishonesty, Plagiarism, or Cheating

Students should also familiarize themselves with the procedures for academic misconduct in UCF's student handbook, [The Golden Rule](#). UCF faculty members have a responsibility for students' education and the value of a UCF degree, and so seek to prevent unethical behavior and respond to academic misconduct when necessary.

Penalties for violating rules, policies, and instructions within this course can range from a zero on the exercise to an "F" letter grade in the course. In addition, **an Academic Misconduct report could be filed with the Office of Student Conduct, which could lead to disciplinary warning, disciplinary probation, or deferred suspension or separation from the University through suspension, dismissal, or expulsion with the addition of a "Z" designation on one's transcript.**

No grade is worth compromising your integrity and moving your moral compass. Stay true to doing the right thing: take the zero, not a shortcut.
