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


Agreement between nursing home caregivers' observations of residents' depression, well-being and quality of life

Objective

To assess the agreement between caregivers' observations of depression, well-being and quality of life in nursing home residents with and without dementia

Estimates and confidence intervals



Background

- > Nursing home caregivers commonly act as proxies for resident outcomes
- Studies assessing the agreement between caregivers' observations are scarce
- Limited attention has been paid to reporting agreement indexes stratified by the level of residents' cognitive

No to mild cogn. decline (GDS 1-3), N=58 🔶 Moderate to severe cogn. decline (GDS 4-6), N=18 Total sample, N=81

functioning

Dataset

- Observer-reported scores for depression, well-being, and quality of life
- Two caregivers (registered) nurse or certified nurse assistant) evaluated 81 residents of 21 nursing homes

Agreement coefficients

- Items: Gwet's AC1 or AC2
- **Scales:** ICC(1,1) & ICC(1,2)
- > Classification: Altman's

NORD, Nijmegen Observer-Rated Depression scale for detection of depression in nursing home residents SWON, Social Well-being Of Nursing home residents scale

GDS, Global Deterioration Scale

N items per classification level

	Poor	Fair	Moderate	Good	Very good
Total sample	3	9	8	2	0
No to mild cogn. decline	3	7	9	3	0
Moderate to severe cogn. decline	13	5	3	1	0

Conclusion

- Limited agreement between caregivers' observations, especially concerning residents with moderate to severe cognitive decline
- Practitioners and researchers should be aware of these challenges when using

benchmark scale membership probabilities (Cum. Prob. of > .95)

and interpreting observer-reported outcomes

Future research should explore why observer-reported scores may differ between caregivers, especially concerning residents with dementia

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
