My current body of work is a group of paintings dealing specifically with a support material along with a structural arrangement and paint, itself, as the integral components whose sum total comprises the form and content of my work. The paintings are divided into three groups; canvas, lattice, and corners. All are interrelated by the fact that they are all paintings about painting, dealing with the basic formal elements of shape, color, space, texture, scale, and second level elements of composition, unity, and proportion.

The constant addition of new materials and ideas allows my work to go beyond the merely decorative to a more aesthetic realm of thought and form.

The canvas paintings deal with illusion and space by the use of vertical, horizontal, and diagonal lines that form colored shapes that function as foreground or background, within a square inner framing format. The lattice pieces are paintings made up of four structures that are interrelated by tangible space and line. The wall between the structures as well as the wall enclosed by the actual structure is joined to the piece by the use of shadows. The corner paintings deal with a structure that interrelates with tangible space accentuated with line and color. The line and color gives the pieces a linear tempo that slows and accelerates movement around the pieces.

It is very important to me to keep making additions to my work with new materials and ideas, while keeping them within the context of painting about painting. The paint added to the total structure, is not in any sense flat, nor does it simply contain color but the color functions to enhance spacial qualities. Secondary colors add effective small accents in their subordinate place and help to keep assertive colors under control. The color I use in the lines is used with maximum intensity to make the line more dynamic. The areas of shape are formed by the use of dominant colors and line. These shapes are put together to give the illusion of movement and space in a static design. The use of the intense color, line, illusion, and simple shape, helps one become more involved with the contemplation of the paintings within a sort of hypnotic presense.
