Local level stakeholder initiative

- Industrial policy in Norway has since the 1980s moved from having strong corporative elements towards increased liberalization
- One policy measure, though, has proven challenging to remove: the industry-owned trawlers land-lock obligations
- How can local authorities contribute to the removal of a regulatory failure?

Modernization through industrialization

- In the post-war period, there was a need and opportunity - to rebuild and modernize Northern Norway
- Heavy investments were made in private and (semi-) state-owned fish processing facilities
- Highly uneven seasonal distribution meant the industry was given permission to own trawlers

Good intentions pave the way...

- With great power comes great responsibility: introducing the land-lock obligation regime
- Industry-owned trawlers were given an obligation to land their catch in specified municipalities or facilities
- Obligations to process the catch, and obligations to maintain industrial activity were later introduced

A regulatory regime under pressure

Competitive export industry



Guarantor of employment and settlement

- Small adjustments rather than a major overhaul
- Strong expectations, but a weakened tool

Municipal response

Six municipalities have responded with two different strategies –
appealing to the judicial system, and dialog with industry actors





Municipal response

 Gamvik municipality attempted legal action against the trawler company and the state

The outcome:

- The government was not responsible for ensuring that obligations were fulfilled
- The obligation was between the trawler and the processing facility
- Municipalities were deemed not a party



Municipal response

- Hasvik opted for dialog with the trawler company and the processing industry
- For a compensatory fee, the trawler was exempted from the land-lock obligations
- Four municipalities have attempted similar agreements, with differing results



Cutting the Gordian knot

 When the state has stepped back, the municipalities have filled the vacant role

- Innovative actions by local authorities have provided central authorities with a way out, all the while avoiding the political cost...
- ... with the consequence of partly abdicating in an important policy area
