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Building and Sharing Spatial Metaphors for the Catalogue of Oregon Marine and Coastal Information

ABSTRACT

Spatialization is an innovative way to expand searching capabilities for a marine/coastal reference database by using a metaphorical map framework to establish a sense of place for non-spatial information. Spatializing the Catalogue of Oregon Marine and Coastal Information (COMCI), a coastal reference database, enables the marine and coastal resource community to quickly access pertinent information in a dynamically changing marine environment that will aid them in making decisions on management, protection, and conservation. Geographic information systems, including ESRI's ArcGIS and ArcIMS, are used in conjunction with an Access database of non-geographic data to create visualizations that facilitate the use of an interactive search interface. Using a self organizing map (SOM) technique to spatialize the coastal database, a metaphorical information space was created and implemented into an interactive graphical display.

INTRODUCTION

Spatialization is a growing field in geographic information science intent on using geographic tools and principles for visualizing non-spatial data (e.g., Fabrikant and Battenfield, 2001; Skupin et al., 2002; Skupin and Fabrikant, 2003).

Constructing visualizations from spatial metaphors for a database allows users to see the entire database as they explore it, offering an effective alternative to searching based only on text keywords. As database visualizations become more effective and

popular, demand will increase for user access to them. Visualizations of databases using a map as a metaphor can be implemented into the World Wide Web by using mapping services already available for standard mapping projects, such as ArcIMS (Arc Internet Map Server), and Macromedia Flash. Web-based geographic information systems (GIS) extend desktop GIS tools that are usually expensive, making the Internet an economic conduit for reaching large audiences (Vassilopoulos and Evelpidou, 2003).

Visualization of a database aids in understanding the information contained within and the relationship between data objects. Information previously hiding in a high dimensional space or in a non-geospatial text format can be found and new knowledge constructed from relationships apparent in spatialization (Rauber, 1999). High volumes of information are transferred into knowledge using a spatial metaphor. Making such visualizations available through the World Wide Web and connecting the visualization directly to the database bridges the gap of transferring newly gained knowledge back into specific information. Information retrieval from graphic depictions of large databases based on the spatial metaphor is increasingly important in modern day data proliferation (Fabrikant, 2000).

SOMs (Self-Organizing Map) have been widely used in mapping non-spatial data due to their inherent 2-D output. A SOM can reduce high dimensional information clusters into 2-D representations ready for map interpretation (Skupin and Hagelman, 2003). Tobler's First Law of Geography, conferring that objects closer to one another are more related than objects further away, is evident in spatial clusters of data objects in a SOM (Skupin and Fabrikant, 2003). Experiments by Montello et al.

(2003) involved user testing of spatializations and validated the approach of basing similarity of data objects in a map metaphor based on distance from each other.

The objective of the present study is to build online interfaces that will allow coastal user groups to search the Catalogue of Oregon Marine and Coastal Information (COMCI) database using interactive maps. The design interface takes into account spatialization schemes allowing for human cognition and perception of spaces important for data exploration (Fabrikant, 2000). The maps include a map metaphor constructed from a SOM visualization and a geographic map with non-spatial components. The maps are appropriate for projecting multiple data items of a similar nature to one location on a map (Guo et al., 2005). Appropriate interfaces are needed to exploit the potential of spatialization routines and have them be used efficiently and effectively (Cartwright et al., 2001).

The visual representations were connected to the COMCI database using Active Server Pages (ASP) web technology, allowing retrieval of reference records. ASP is a dynamic web engine that uses JavaScript or VBScript within an HTML-like file to access databases. ASP web pages have scripts embedded in them that are executed at the server before the page is sent to the client. This allows dynamic interaction between the web maps and the database. ASP will allow portions of the database relevant to the user's interest area (portion of the map) to be pulled instantly for display, creating an efficiency between knowledge acquisition and research advance (Fabrikant and Buttenfield, 2001).

BACKGROUND

The COMCI is a non-spatial database of references intended for coastal user groups. COMCI was initiated as part of a graduate course at Oregon State University (OSU), taught by Jane Lubchenco and Jim Good, on the science and management of coastal and ocean resources. Students undertook a broad literature search about Oregon oceanography, ecology, and resource management, compiling into a database references to journal articles, conference proceedings, books, legal documents, internal state agency reports on habitat maps and economic statistics, and other related documents. Seeing the tremendous potential for such a resource, the database was further developed by a broader collaboration among the Partnership for Interdisciplinary Studies of the Coastal Oceans (PISCO), the Oregon Sea Grant, the OSU Departments of Zoology and Geosciences, the Northwest Alliance for Computational Science and Engineering (NACSE), and the Oregon Coastal Atlas project. At this stage the database was in text-only, but still a powerful resource for making information about Oregon's marine environment accessible, particularly with regard to adverse impacts on natural ecosystems and science-based management of natural resources. Ultimately, the goal of COMCI is to provide policymakers and resource managers with information needed to evaluate and reassess coastal and ocean management strategies. The provision of map metaphor for COMCI, and its placement within the framework of the Oregon Coastal Atlas web portal for coastal resource managers (<http://www.coastalatlus.net>), is the final stage of its evolution. The Oregon Coastal Atlas is an online infrastructure for data sharing, spatial analysis, resource

decision-making, and ocean policy-making (Wright et al., 2004, Haddad et al., in press).

Part of creating a successful policy for managing ocean and coastal resources involves use of the best available science. COMCI not only offers access to the best available science, but also incorporates information on coastal zone management in general and includes links to organizations involved in management. Coastal groups using COMCI can include a wide range of professionals, from GIS analysts to a concerned citizen, but experiments have indicated that regardless of GIS experience, map metaphor browsing can achieve similar results and that interaction with the map is an effective method of exploration (Fabrikant, 2001).

In creating map metaphors for the COMCI database, basing proximity on document similarity allows a coastal user group to see groups of similar records with differing variables. A complete map metaphor of the database allows all the combinations of document groupings to be seen at once, effectively visualizing a multitude of database summaries. Creating visual information spaces using spatial metaphors will allow exploration of large databases for information retrieval and knowledge construction, as well as database summaries (Fabrikant and Buttenfield, 2001).

Self-Organizing Map

High-dimensional data sets can be presented in two-dimensional visualizations using simple space concepts constructed from Kohonen's "Self-Organizing Map algorithm (Kohonen, 2001)." These SOMs, also known as Kohonen networks, use

learned vector quantization that populates space with data clusters using competitive learning (Douglass, 2001). The SOM can further be visualized using the U-matrix method that uses a graphical display of a two-dimensional hexagonal grid space. Each hexagon that comprises part of the grid can be either a node hexagon (containing data items) or a distance hexagon (measure of dissimilarity) (Guo, et al., 2005). Kohonen describes the SOM “as a nonlinear, ordered, smooth mapping of high dimensional input data manifolds onto the elements of a regular, low-dimensional array (Kohonen, 2001).”

SOMs let high dimensional data sets form patterns that will self organize into a predefined output space, in this particular case, a two-dimensional lattice of hexagonal nodes. Transferring the input space of data patterns to the hexagonal grid using the SOM training method preserves topological relationships between initial input patterns and their display in the output space (Skupin, 2002; Bacao et. al., 2005). SOMs are based on the idea that systems such as a data set will naturally evolve (Lucas, 2005) to a preferred position which can be initiated and trained using learned vector quantization.

Learning vector quantization is a competitive learning method that creates stress among data set patterns, causing data objects to move towards an attractor. Each node in the output space has a reference vector that corresponds with the inputted data set. Vectors store the connection weights used in a training process to select a best matching unit (an output node) to map the data pattern onto by “calculating the distance between [the selected input pattern] and every unit in the network. (Bacao et. al., 2005).” Each neighboring node from the winning unit will be activated and

adapted from the input vector (Kohonen, 2001). Successful training of the SOM will result in an output space of populated nodes topologically similar to the initial input space of the data patterns (Bacao et al., 2005). This SOM method has a proclivity to form the data into clusters. Each of these clusters will be comprised of similar data objects.

The SOM needs to be connected back to the original data space so it can be used for interpreting the data set and the patterns it may contain. For visually depicting SOM output spaces, the typical hexagonal two-dimensional array of nodes is preferred for its unbiased directions (compared to a rectangle) (Kohonen, 2001). Furthermore, the U-matrix method is oftentimes utilized to aid in depicting and interpreting the resulting SOM. Representation of data items (COMCI records) in a node will take the form of a circle whose area is proportional to the number of items “clustered” into the particular node (Guo et al., 2005). The U-matrix method uses shades of grey to illustrate average distances in the input space as they relate to neighboring nodes in the output space, thus creating visual clusters. Lighter shades portray smaller distances between nodes and indicate a cluster of similar patterns (Kohonen, 2001; Bacao, 2005). Conversely, larger distances indicate separate clusters with fewer patterns and are represented by darker shades of grey.

The COMCI database used GeoVISTA Studio for implementing SOM construction and labeling to create a visual representation. GeoVista Studio is open source geo-visualization software available from Pennsylvania State University’s GeoVista Project at <http://www.geovista.psu.edu>. The SOM was constructed using a predefined hexagonal grid and the U-matrix method for visualizing the average

distances between neighboring SOM reference vectors. In addition, a SOM coloring component was used to assign similar colors to nearby SOM cells.

The emphasis of this research was to transform a standard output SOM to a visually pleasing interface for exploring the COMCI database. This experiment focused on creating a new search interface from a SOM more than creating the SOM itself. Where the SOM goes after initial creation is dependant on the creator's intent. SOMs have laid the foundation for various graphic depictions\metaphors ranging from sedimentary landscapes to urban developments.

METHODS

The core of COMCI is a semi-structured Microsoft Access database with a built in form for updating source data. Relationships were built into the database, tagging various descriptors to a citation, such as location, subject, and theme.

A web-based search interface using ASP allows users to search COMCI by keyword, author, location, topic group and major theme. There are six major topic groups contained in COMCI: coastal zone management, marine fisheries marine habitat, marine species, near shore and open ocean activities, and oceanography. Since most of the records of COMCI could be described as relating to a certain geographic scale and scope, site locations were added to each record. Major regions ranged from International to the state of Oregon. Though a database is focused on the coast of Oregon, several references focus on larger scales such as the entire Pacific coast and national or international arenas. These references contain information that can be applied to the state of Oregon (e.g. a book on Coastal Law) or include Oregon

in their study area. There even exist records with no reference to Oregon that are dubbed “general” because they might not relate to any specific area, but provide useful scientific information (e.g. an encyclopedia on fish). Within Oregon, smaller scale coastal locations were assigned based from coastal settings used in the Oregon Coastal Atlas. These settings include various estuaries, sandy shores, rocky shores, ocean areas, and watersheds of Oregon. Records that did not relate specifically to any geographic scope were assigned “general.” Each record could be assigned up to 3 locations.

ASP pages were built for communication between the COMCI database and a web server, allowing client-side access to COMCI via the Internet, for the query of locations assigned to individual COMCI records.

Building an ArcIMS Site

ArcIMS was chosen to create an interactive and dynamic map that could assist in searching and accessing COMCI records. ArcIMS was initially chosen due to its availability and out-of-the-box functionality. Prior students working on the COMCI database have steered their work toward ArcIMS and have set up an Apache web server to host ArcIMS web mapping services. Shapefiles were created for the locations assigned to COMCI records ranging from the Pacific Northwest to Oregon’s coastal settings. The Oregon Coastal Atlas provided shapefiles that delineated all the coastal settings in Oregon that their web portal uses to organize and serve data. Each shapefile was attributed with a web address to an ASP page that searches the COMCI database for records with that particular location. A map service was created from the

shapefiles and hosted on the ArcIMS server. The map consisted of six data layers from which the user can search on, rocky shores, sandy shores, estuaries, ocean areas, watersheds, and regions that included British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California, and the Pacific Northwest.

A user-friendly web-site of the ArcIMS service was created using JavaScript and HTML. User-friendly navigation buttons were created to assist the user in searching the map for COMCI records. They included graphic icons along with titles to aid users unfamiliar with generic GIS functions. A table of contents is located to the right of the map area and displays the layers allowing the user to select an active layer for searching.

A “Find References” tool was created using the hot-linking capability of ArcIMS to query the COMCI database instantly using ASP. This tool allows users to click on any area of the map and retrieve a web page of COMCI records specific to that area.

A help page was created for the ArcIMS site using HTML and JavaScript. Here the user can obtain detailed information on how to use the various map components. Each button is described for the user detailing its function and use. Toggling between layers and the legend is also explained. There is a section regarding the finding reference button, describing its purpose along with an example and tips on how to use it. Finally, there is a browser informational check to see if the user’s browser is capable of running the ArcIMS site, which needs to support JavaScript and allow pop-ups.

Constructing a Self Organizing Map

While the ArcIMS interface aids in search and retrieval methods of database records, it falls short in encompassing the entire database. The interactive map fails to portray the records that do not specifically address geographic areas or are too large in geographic scale. Using spatialization techniques, all the records can be included and displayed using a map metaphor. This will allow users an innovative new way to access information and gain new knowledge by tapping into human's inherent ability for spatial reasoning (Fabrikant, 2000).

To visualize the entire COMCI database, including records with no spatial reference, a shift is made from map to map metaphor. The map metaphor gives meaning to physical distance between data objects (Jiang and Ormeling, 1997). The SOM method is used to create a 2-D space of the database records. The resulting SOM visualization will provide the basis for an interactive map that will allow users to search for records using ASP server technology. The SOM visualization used GeoVISTA Studio for construction and labeling.

The first step in constructing a SOM is to prepare the database for implementation of SOM techniques. Three variables were chosen for this experiment: major subject groups, major themes, and primary geographic scope. The records in each text field had to be converted to a number for SOM techniques. The major subject groups were numbered 1-6 and the major themes numbered from 1-100. The values for geographic scope represent increasing scale\generality and are shown in

Table 1. There were 168 different localized coastal settings in Oregon based from the Oregon Coastal Atlas.

To aid in comprehending and labeling of the SOM visualization, a shapefile as created in ArcGIS with vector polygons forming a grid. Each rectangle corresponds to a record in the database from 1-720. A table from the COMCI database with the converted text fields into numbers was exported and merged with the shapefile's database file. This database file was then converted to a comma delimited file using

Excel. The shapefile and its associated comma delimited file were loaded into GeoVista Studio's data-mining design.

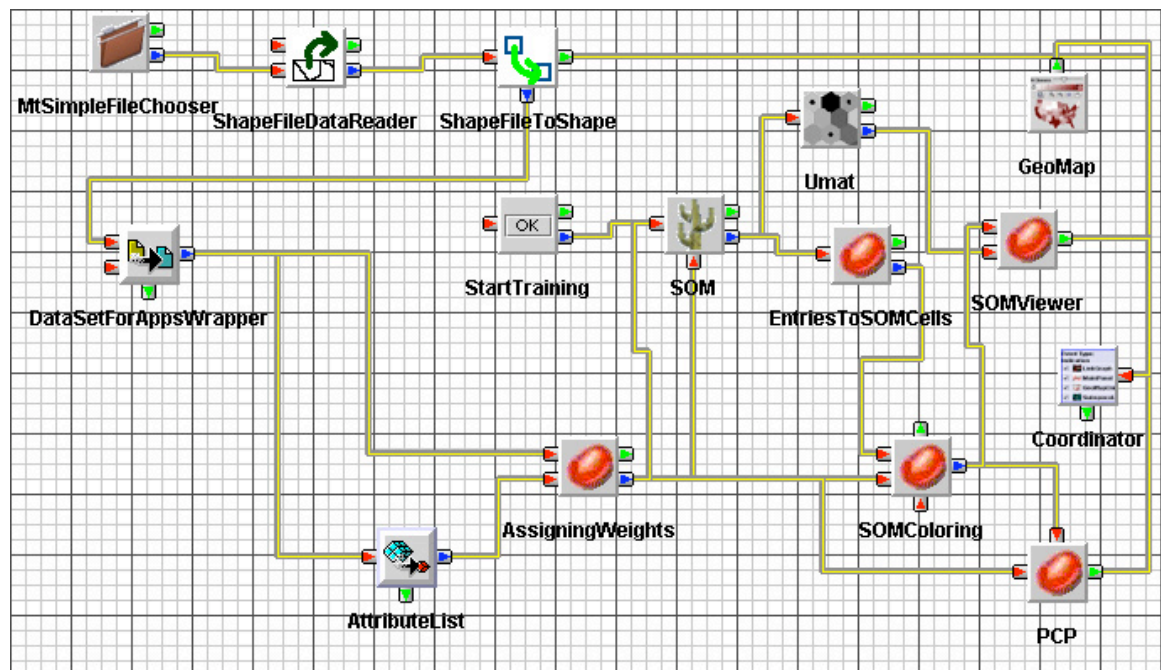


Figure 1. Components of GeoVista's data-mining design for constructing a SOM.

The GeoVista Studio's data mining design supports SOM components (Figure 1) in order to cluster the data records based on attributes selected to create a 2-D visual representation of the database. The shapefile and comma delimited file were loaded into the design. The design contains a geographic mapping component which is used in this experiment as a means of discerning SOM map distribution patterns.

This shapefile mapping component is coupled with a Parallel Coordinate Plot (PCP). Each string in the PCP corresponds to a unique SOM cell. The attributes of major group, theme, and geographic scope are selected for input in the SOM, but first pass through an assigning weights component. The theme, group, and geographic scope attributes were assigned weights of 3, 1, and 2 respectively. Theme was assigned the

highest weight to support higher levels of detail in the subsequent SOM map metaphor. Group was assigned the lowest weight due to its generality and it is expected that the six major groups will form six major regions on the SOM map. The data were adjusted to the weights and passed to the SOM construction components. The mapping output space is a hexagonal grid consisting of a 25 by 25 array of empty cells. The SOM was trained and used a SOMColoring component and the Umat component (constructs a U-matrix) to visualize the population of space. A SOM map was generated with colored circles of varying sizes populating the information space of a hexagonal grid. Circle size is proportional to document density. Coloring is a scale of document similarity. Most importantly, the SOM expresses document similarity by spatial proximity (Skupin, 2002).

SOM Labeling and Map Creation

Turning a 2-D SOM image of colored circles into an interactive map that queries the database involves interpretation and discernment. A SOM visualization by itself is meaningless until the features that comprise the image are interpreted and identified (Rauber, 1999). The shapefile was created to aid this task by linking it to the PCP visualization and SOM visualization. The SOM visualization could be read by highlighting strings in the PCP component and examining through the geographic mapping component which records belonged to each SOM circle.

In general, once the SOM visualization is interpreted through this process, cartographic techniques can be applied. Cartographic principles help solve issues such as graphic complexity, feature labeling, and overall map design (Skupin, 2000).

Major boundaries were delineated over the SOM map, finding six major regions corresponding to the six major groups. The SOM circles and boundaries were digitized into shapefiles and attributed for ArcIMS implementation, but Macromedia Flash was chosen to create the map to allow for more illustrative map elements. Layers were digitized in Flash and interactive symbols created. When trying to preserve high dimensional spatial relations, scale becomes an important factor (Wise, 1999). There were two main levels of detail for the Flash map, the main subject areas and smaller scaled theme areas.

Once every COMCI reference is given its own space, it can be hot-linked to an ASP page for that record. The SOM visualization was used as a base map for an online search interface that presented the COMCI database as a fishing environment where one could use a fishing pole to pull records from the database. This fishing metaphor relates to the existence of COMCI (fisheries is a major section of COMCI) and connects with the familiarity of a coastal user with the concept of fishing. Using graphical elements that have meaning for the user can aid in comprehending icon-based maps (Guo et al., 2005).

Each of the delineated major regions, coastal zone management, marine fisheries, marine habitats, marine species, oceanography, and near shore and open ocean activities were digitized in Flash and converted to individual “symbols” (type button) to allow streaming rollover functionality. Using action script in Flash, the mouse cursor was converted into a fishing pole. Every record in the database was given a space in the fishing environment based on the clustering results of implemented SOM. Each record space was converted into a button “symbol” that

contained rollover functionality for labeling and hot-linking. Using the fishing pole mouse cursor, the user can browse through the database bringing up various labeled themes by rolling over records (created buttons). Upon clicking the mouse cursor on a specific record, a short .wav file simulate the sound of a bobber hitting the water and a new browser window will open up with details of the “fished” record on a standard COMCI detailed results page. Finally, the Flash map based from the SOM visualization is put on a web server to provide users the ability to explore the COMCI database and retrieve records.

RESULTS

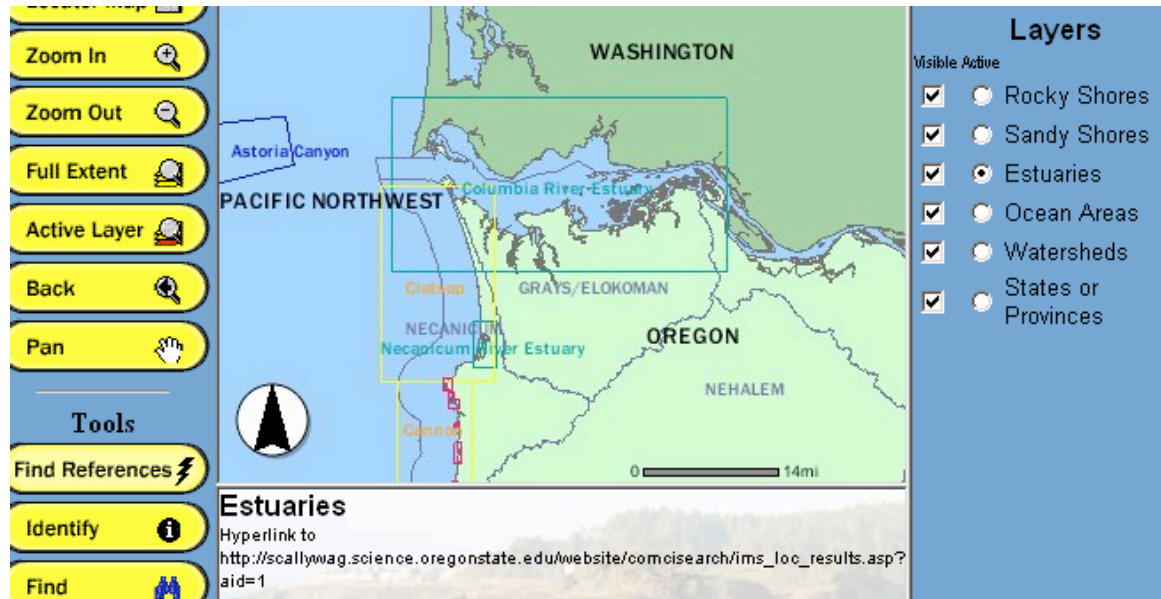


Figure 2. The ArcIMS web interface for searching COMCI.

Using ASP for connecting the web applications to the COMCI database appears to be a fast and efficient method of querying and retrieval. The server technology allows new data entry into COMCI without the need to modify ASP pages or the ArcIMS web interface. The ArcIMS website allows COMCI users to gather records based on spatial location. Figure 2 displays a COMCI user ready to retrieve records for the Columbia River Estuary.

The Finding References tool is the main retrieval method of searching the COMCI database. Each record in the database has been assigned to geographical areas to which it pertains. Every feature has a link in its information table that connects it to the COMCI database (Figure 2). Any record could have up to three locations assigned to it using three fields (site1, site2, and site3) in the database. Every record is assigned a site1 value whereas site2 and site3 are lower priorities and do not need to be filled in. The Finding References tool retrieves and lists records for a location based on this priority. Thus a record that focuses on Oregon's coastal programs but also mentions Washington would be assigned 'Oregon' as site1 and 'Washington' as site2. When retrieving records for Washington, records with 'Washington' in the site1 field will be listed before records that list 'Washington' in site2. Using an interactive map interface allows the user to focus in on his/her interest area, while at the same time being able to see what areas are in the proximity and the

scope of the area itself. Using sites from the Oregon Coastal Atlas gives a connection to what spatial data is available for the same area from where the user is obtaining non-spatial information. Using the Finding References tool will pop up a standard ASP results page displaying all the records for the selected area (Figure 3). From this page, the user can link to a detailed page of individual records (Figure 4).

SOM visualization

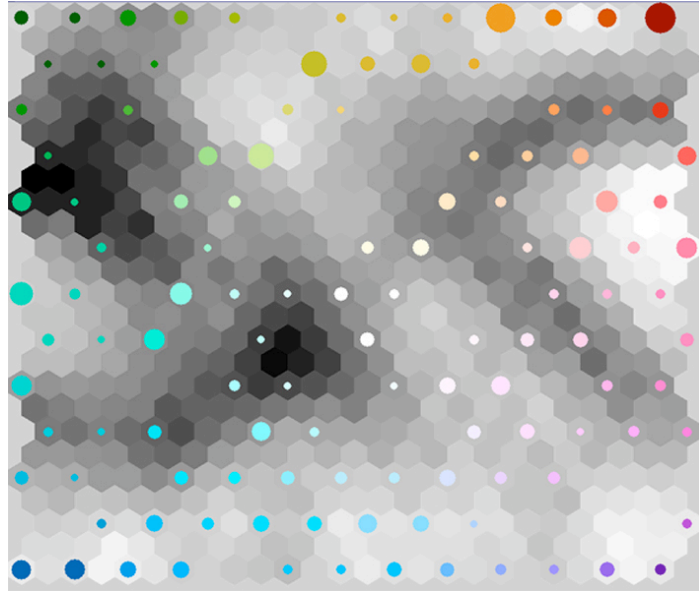


Figure 5. SOM visualization of the COMCI database based on subject group, theme, and scope.

Inputting the shapefile and its associated comma delimited file of COMCI records into GeoVista Studio's data mining design enabled features to be selected for SOM visualization. Selecting the three fields and weighting them before SOM construction resulted in a 2-D representation shown in Figure 5.

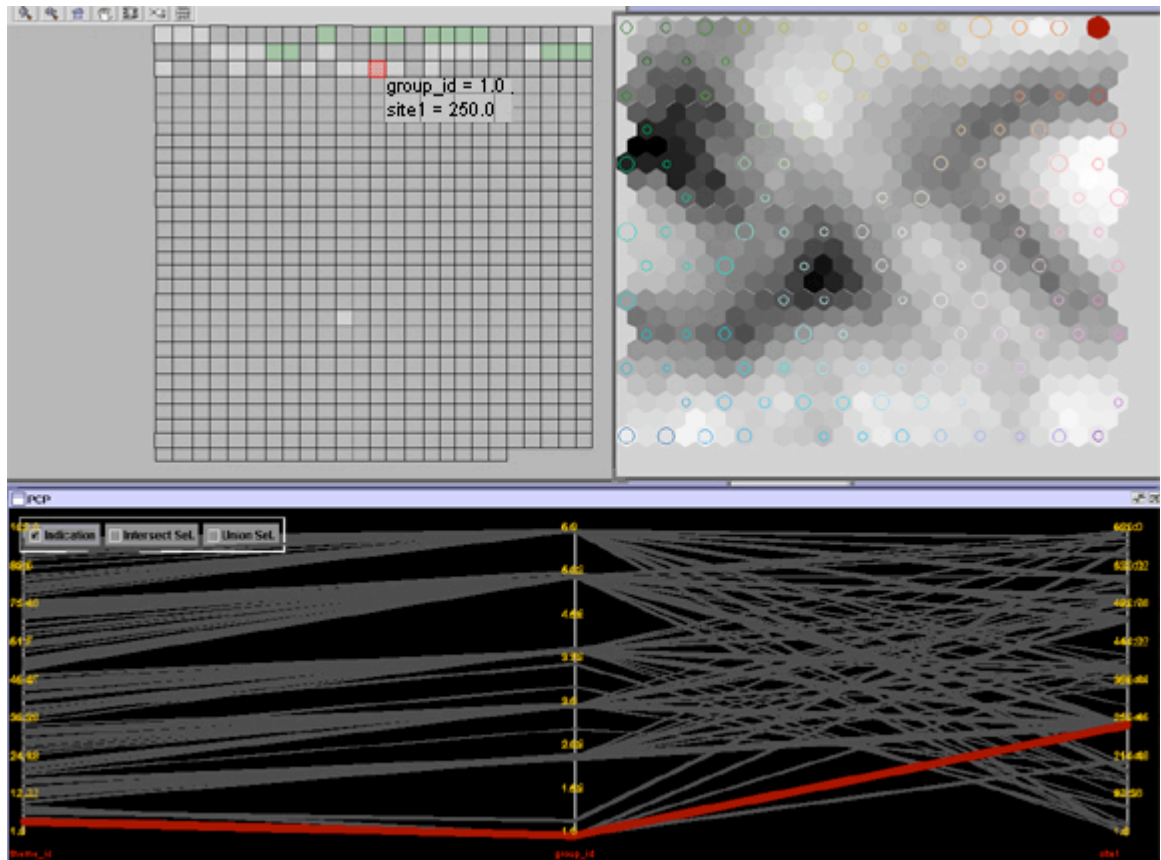


Figure 6. Interpreting the SOM visualization through PCP analysis.

The SOM visualization resulted in populating 117 SOM nodes with data objects, i.e. the circles. To determine what the SOM circles represented, manual interaction between the PCP component and the mapped shapefile was conducted. The largest cluster of COMCI records is the upper right red circle. This circle represents records dealing with coastal zone management in Oregon and its interpretation can be seen in Figure 6.

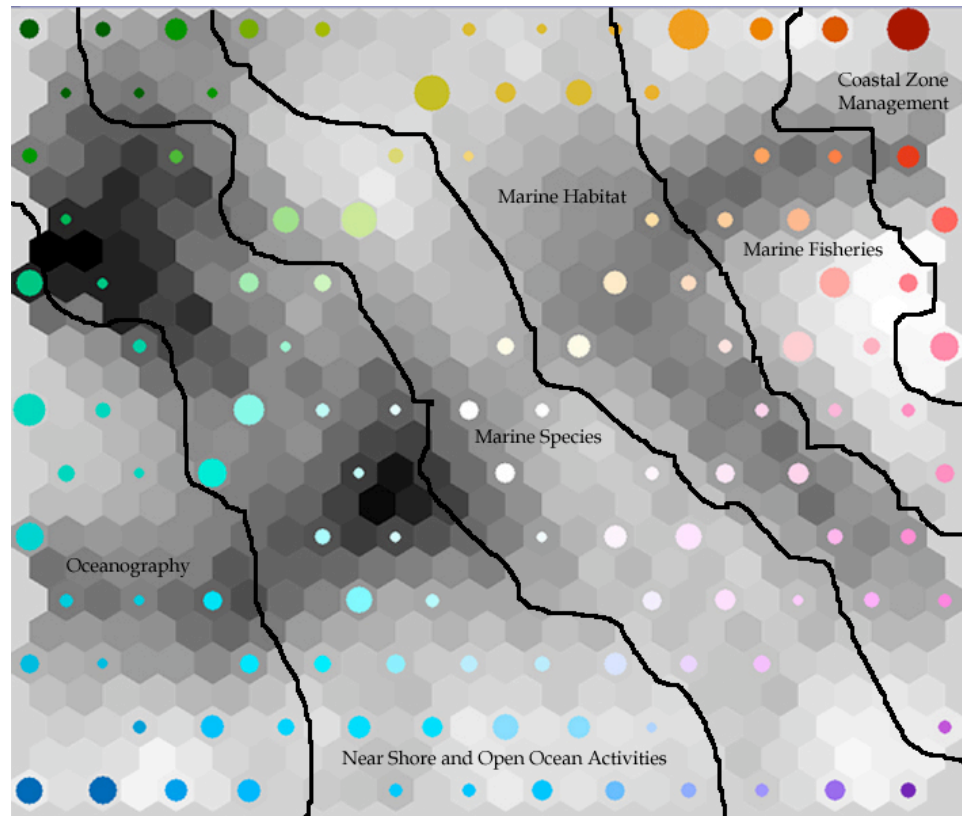


Figure 7. Six major subject areas of the SOM map.

After all the circles were categorized, boundaries were delineated between groups based on differing subject groups between circles and the size of the circle. Six major areas representing the subject groups were formed across the SOM visualization. The largest area was the subject near shore and open ocean activities and can be seen in Figure 7.

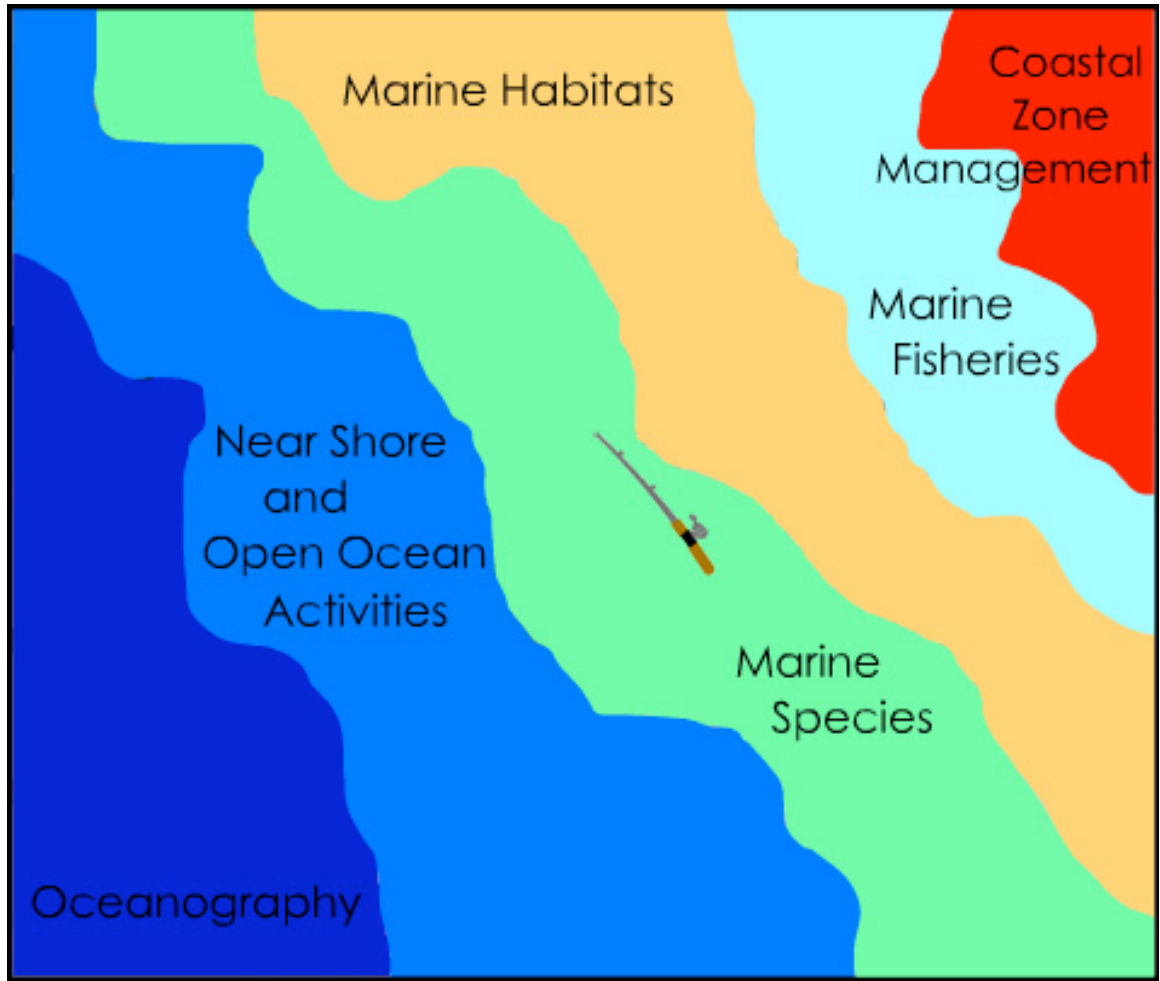


Figure 8. The COMCI database displayed as a Flash map based on a SOM.

The SOM visualization was used to create an information space in a Flash web-based application. Labels and graphics were added to the map in Flash, making it a searchable interface for the COMCI database. Behaviors were added to the Flash map that allowed ASP hyper-linking to retrieve individual records. Rollovers were also used as a means to facilitate browsing and enhance map communication. A “fishing for records” metaphor was used to create an interactive environment for searching the database based on the created SOM (Figure 8). The Flash environment enables aesthetic map elements to be designed in a highly interactive and graphical atmosphere, important to increasing the map interface’s usability (Skupin, 2000).

The resulting SOM map used for the Flash visualization created clusters of data that formed in major subject groups. In each major region (Figure 8) the scope of the clustered records increase in scale, progressing from the upper left to lower right. Thus records specific records relating to Oregon's coastal settings can be found near the tops of each region, while international and general records are found near the bottom. A texture pattern increases in size along this gradient to represent this in the Flash map (Figure 9 upcoming).

DISCUSSION

There is a myriad of spatialization methods one can use for creating information spaces of databases ranging from multidimensional scaling, spring models, pathfinder network scaling, tree maps, and SOMs (Skupin and Fabrikant, 2003). The selected method depends on the user's intent and purpose of the database. Data sets can be viewed in multiple ways, each leading to new perspectives or insights to the data (Kraak, 2003). ASP proved to be an efficient retrieval mechanism for database records from online interactive maps. COMCI is a text-based database with inherently few numbered attributes. Linking to ASP pages outside of a map service allows records to be displayed fully, escaping the confines of standard shapefiles' database file. A group of records can be retrieved at one time with the ability to display detailed textual information of each individual record. Traditional map services such as ArcIMS, Flash, and Internet Map Server prove to be efficient means of disseminating the end product of map metaphors via the World Wide Web. The SOM map is easily transferred into one of these web services.

The SOM method was selected for spatializing the COMCI database because its inherent 2-D grid-like structure can be transferred directly into a geographic visualization (Skupin and Hagelman, 2003). The SOM map was constructed in GeoVista studio because of the program's accessibility and operability. Interpreting the SOM visualization required tedious manual interaction which was achieved due to COMCI's relatively small amount of records. Mechanisms for deciphering a SOM representation need to be developed using automated techniques, especially in regards

to large volume databases. Duplicating this experiment would not be easy with large databases.

Using the Flash environment to create a searchable interface allows for illustrative displays and accommodates natural interaction as a priority, which can lead to a more user-accepted product (Cartwright et al, 2001). SOMs offer a new medium for displaying and searching data. They arrange data sets in a logical fashion on a two dimensional plane whose spatial metaphorical representation can be used as a base for depicting data sets in innovative displays. Imagination is the limit for what metaphors that can be built from SOM data structuring. Graphical displays such as the fishing for records display can keep Tobler's Law intact regarding space and similarity from the SOM structure and incorporate characteristics of the user group into the display (such as tailoring the COMCI database toward coastal and marine mindset by using the fishing concept).

The importance of database planning surfaced during the spatialization of the COMCI database. This can take the form of building behind the scenes data structures in the database formatted solely for spatialization routines. Setting the database up for spatialization helped create more text based search filters using ASP. The SOM map constructed for COMCI did not take into account data summaries for each reference\record, save for collecting information on the geographic scope of the reference. Interpreting the SOM map requires cartographic and geographic intuition but, the user needs to realize they are searching an artificial space created by a spatial metaphor. Map metaphors are not absolute in their positioning and the user must be aware of the map layout's dependency on the spatialization routine used. How the

SOM was trained will determine how and where data object clusters are formed, making it difficult to determine the importance of a relationship or pattern (Guo, 2003).

CONCLUSION

The map metaphor constructed from a SOM visualization for the COMCI database was successfully implemented into a web mapping service. New exploratory capabilities were achieved enabling fuller use of the database for coastal user groups. Visual maps and representations of databases allow the user to see the entire database at once. A map display of a database inherently visualizes database summaries including summaries not thought of yet by the user. Standard word searches and database summaries are geared toward the user knowing for what they are looking. Visualizing databases based on spatial metaphors take a step forward and allow the user to browse the entire database for previously unseen relationships. The visualization can uncover these new relationships to the user, aiding knowledge construction. The spatialization schemes used and the search interfaces built for COMCI are not meant to replace standard word searches, rather to enable the user to view the database from a new perspective. Building graphical search interfaces like the COMCI fishing map can serve to draw interest to the database. Graphical metaphors can play on the user's interests to draw them into the database.

To further study this research, the searching techniques and design interfaces developed here should be tested for its usefulness and effectiveness. The originators of COMCI, the students and researchers of PISCO, should test out the effectiveness of

the map metaphor and whether it really can be used for practical resource management and decision-making. The project is available to the general public to use at <http://scallywag.science.oregonstate.edu/website/comcisearch/comci.asp>.

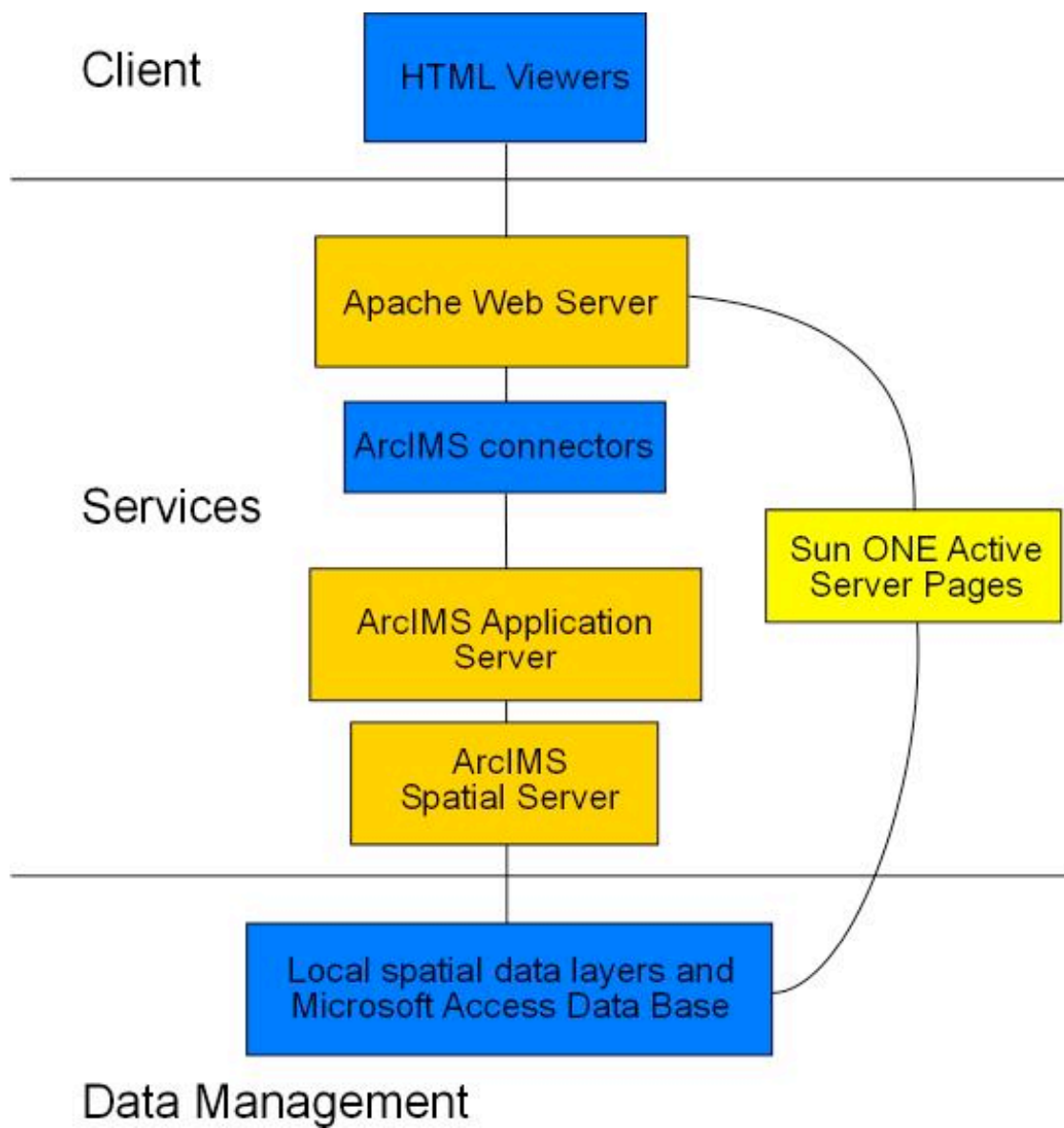
Serving spatial visualizations over the World Wide Web by way of map services increases access to advanced exploratory techniques like SOM maps. Connecting the graphical representation of databases to the actual database using server technologies such as ASP allows users to go beyond the surface and dig (or fish!) into the database.
