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



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INTRODUCTION FROM DR. DORIS HOUSTON CHIEF EQUITY AND INCLUSION OFFICER

The 2022–2023 academic year ushered in several pivotal challenges, not only for Illinois State, but for universities across the nation. 

DIVERSE STUDENT ENROLLMENT


By the Numbers

Illinois State University welcomed 4,147 freshmen to its student body for the 2023–2024 academic year, its largest incoming class in 36 years. Total enrollment stands at 20,989. This marks a 1.5% increase in total enrollment and a 4% increase in new freshmen. Illinois State's student body is becoming more diverse as well. Approximately 41% of 2023's freshman class come from traditionally underrepresented groups, while 32% of the total student population come from traditionally underrepresented groups.

Excerpt from Interim President Tarhule's campus-wide message

Because Illinois State University does not use race as a factor in admissions, this Supreme Court ruling will not affect our admissions process. Illinois State employs a comprehensive and well-rounded admissions process that integrates high school or transfer GPA, grade trends, course completion, other factors that may include student cocurricular activities, and evidence of civic engagement and volunteerism. Standardized test scores and personal statements are optional.

Having said that, I want to make abundantly clear that we remain committed and intentional in our efforts to ensure students from all communities and identities across our state and beyond have access to Illinois State's educational opportunities.

The University's deliberate approach to student recruitment and enrollment has been highly successful as evidenced by significant increases in the racial and ethnic diversity of our student population from 15 percent to almost 30 percent over the past 10 years. In fact, our fall 2023 enrollment for first time in college (FTIC) students comprised approximately 37.5 percent students from underrepresented communities, mirroring the demographic composition of the state of Illinois. The University is also deeply committed to providing the ongoing support students need to succeed and graduate.

Institutions of higher education have a mission to attract, cultivate, and nurture the talents of a wide range of students from diverse backgrounds. Such diversity creates a rich environment of innovators and thought leaders who continue to make American institutions of higher education the envy of the world.

Illinois State believes societies thrive when they cultivate and support the full abilities and talents of all members. Consequently, equity, diversity, and inclusion are core values of Illinois State and guide our approach to fostering a welcoming and supportive community for all students, faculty, and staff. We remain unwaveringly committed to these values. We are stronger together!

ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT

CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE CAMPUS COMMUNITY CONFERENCE

This conference works to actively recognize and rectify inequitable experiences and create a more just campus. Continuing the work of the previous five years, the CRCC facilitates transformative education and meaningful action for the Illinois State University community, with focus on dismantling anti-Black racism.

MULTICULTURAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

The Multicultural Leadership Program (MCLP) is an intensive, nine-month leadership development program designed to develop diverse leaders who engage the power of diverse perspectives to improve our world. Since 2009, MCLP has partnered with almost 50 local nonprofits on capacity-building projects and empowered over 250 alumni leaders, many of whom are Redbirds.

EDI LEADERS CIRCLE SYMPOSIUM

This annual event hosts several workshops and professional development activities related to EDI initiatives and activities that align with IIlinois State University's "10 EDIA Pillars of Progress." Leaders Circle advocates are represented within each division of the University, including Academic Affairs, Student Affairs, Finance and Planning, University Advancement, and Athletics.

THE CENTER FOR INTEGRATED PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Foundations of Diversity and Inclusion

This series has been offered since fall 2016, and more than 500+ faculty, staff, and graduate students have taken this opportunity to learn about implicit bias, microaggression, power, and privilege.

Foundations of Equitable and Inclusive Teaching

This series consists of five faculty workshops to make classroom curricula more inclusive by examining syllabi, course materials, classroom culture, and student interaction. This program is in its third year, and more than 60 instructors have taken at least one workshop from this series.

Reinvent Your Course for Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Access

This summer cohort program provides instructors an opportunity to redesign their course by examining it through an equity lens and using inclusive strategies. More than 100 courses have been redesigned since 2014.

Intro to Queer Allyship, formerly known as Safe Zone

This workshop is tailored to faculty, staff, and graduate assistants with student-facing roles. It covers LGBTQIA2S+ terminology and best practices for creating an affirming, welcoming classroom and workplace. The fiscal year saw 163 participants across 12 events.

CAREER SERVICES

Charles Morris STEM Social for Underrepresented Students

Students connected with Illinois State professors and professionals in science, technology, engineering, and math to learn about career opportunities and majors that match their career goals.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) Employer Expo

The EDI Expo connected students with employers from a variety of industries to learn about their organizations, their diversity initiatives, and internship opportunities.

She Leads

Students connected with alumni from a variety of industries to learn about their career journeys. challenges, and successes.

Success Looks Like Me

Students connected with alumni to discover how they transitioned from college to career.

International Student Career Series

This series addresses career readiness topics such as resume writing, interviewing, and job search strategies for international students.

REDBIRD READY

Redbird Ready is an annual program serving admitted students from populations traditionally underrepresented on college campuses, including first-generation students.

TRIO/STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Illinois State's TRIO/SSS program walks with firstgeneration students as they use their social and cultural capital to achieve personal and academic success.

ALTERNATIVE BREAKS

Alternative Breaks, a student organization supported by the Center for Civic Engagement, provides students of Illinois State with opportunities to enact social change.

EMPLOYEE DEVELOPMENT

HUMAN RESOURCES

Recruiting Initiatives and Developing Advocates

In collaboration with partners in the College of Education, the President's Diversity and Inclusion Advisory Council (DIAC), and the Office of Equity and Inclusion, the Search Advocate program was created to promote inclusive hiring practices. Additionally, HR collaborated with the Provost Office on the Strategic Diversity Enhancement Program to provide training and support to search committees.

Learning and Development

Diversity initiative learning sessions ranging from topics on emotional/social intelligence, digital accessibility, trauma-informed practices, and neurodiversity, saw roughly 100 attendees in the fiscal year.

LinkedIn Learning

HR continues to partner with LinkedIn Learning to offer 20,000+ online courses taught by realworld professionals.

HEALTH PROMOTION AND WELLNESS

Certified staff provide wellness development opportunities, such as lifestyle enhancement classes, nutrition consultation, individualized Wellness Coaching, and the Koru Mindfulness Program, for both employees and students.

THE DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

The division provided numerous opportunities for professional development for all staff. Equity efforts include environmental scans, new staff orientation, Inclusion Change Team trainings, and the two tracks offered in the Redbird Edge Series.

Selected Highlights ACROSS CAMPUS

While this is by no means a comprehensive list, this report attempts to highlight some of the invaluable efforts of the campus community toward equity, diversity, inclusion, access, and anti-racism. Across all divisions, offices, and schools, there is an ongoing and intensive effort to self-analyze the curriculum with careful attention to student feedback in an effort to foster a more equitable environment. The campus community is banding together with co-curricular offerings, supportive sponsorships, active attendance, and uplifting opportunities. At the core is a deep love of students and mutual understanding that Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) is for all of us.

Equity Diversity Inclusion (EDI) Leaders Circle

"The Circle" is comprised of faculty and staff from the nearly 40 department, college, and division-level committees and councils committed to advancing equity, diversity, inclusion, and anti-racism efforts at Illinois State. The EDI Leaders Circle welcomed Executive Director of the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) Ginger Ostro to the annual symposium. Ostro discussed IBHE's Strategic Plan, "A Thriving Illinois: Higher Education Paths to Equity, Sustainability, and Growth."

LGBTQIA2S+ subcommittee begins work for positive change

The LGBTQIA2S+ Policies and Initiatives Subcommittee, resides at the highest levels in the University, within the President's Diversity and Inclusion Advisory Council (DIAC). Dr. Byron Craig serves as chair and faculty fellow of the subcommittee, which submitted a plan of action to the University's Cabinet members in April of 2023.

Strand Diversity Achievement Award and Panel

Dr. Christa Platt was named the recipient of the 2023 David A. Strand Diversity Achievement Award. Platt serves as the director of the Multicultural Center, a student center for anti-racism, identity, and belonging. She spearheaded the planning of the center, transforming the original blueprint into an innovative student oasis.

To reflect on the legacy of the award, the Office of Equity and Inclusion convened a panel of previous award recipients. The panel included Dr. Christa Platt, Mayuko Nakamura, Dave Bentlin, Dr. Rocío Rivadeneyra, Kim Pereira, Rick Lewis, and Dr. Maura Toro-Morn, and was moderated by Dr.

Doris Houston. Participants reflected on institutional changes since the inception of the award and took time to honor President Emeritus David A. Strand.

EDI in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM)



The STEM EDI Taskforce is comprised of faculty or staff members from the Schools of Biological Sciences and Information Technology and the Departments of Chemistry; Geography, Geology, & the Environment; Mathematics; Physics; and Technology. Members from this group and affiliates in neighboring universities/high schools have secured significant grant funding and are working to improve the STEM pipeline from underrepresented and underserved groups.

New EDIA certificate program

The School of Communication's Antiracism, Social Justice, and Coalition-Building Committee (ASC) has led efforts to address issues of race in campus policies, procedures, and classrooms. The ASC is currently working to launch a new EDIA certificate program (non-credit bearing) that will be open to all majors and minors in the school. The ASC was awarded a 2022 University Teaching Grant in the amount of \$5,000 to further this curriculum development.

ACCESS combats food instability

The Student Government Association began exploration of a "Lab" Grocery Store Concept to cater to the needs of students and residents facing food insecurity. The Assessing Concrete Community-wide Equitable Solutions Sustainably (ACCESS) is working toward the possibility of creating partnerships between the community and the University to provide affordable and accessible produce and related items.

Cultural graduation ceremonies

Cultural graduation recognition ceremonies celebrate the accomplishments of graduating Redbirds and their families. Each ceremony recognizes the achievements and successes of Redbird graduates in addition to the traditional commencement ceremonies. Events were held this spring by Umoja, a celebration of Black graduates, Nuestro Logros, which honors Latino/a/x graduates, and MAPS-which recognizes Middle Eastern, Asian, Pacific Islander, and Southeast Asian graduates.

Obsidian honored

Obsidian: Literature & Arts in the African Diaspora was honored with several grants over the past year, including a \$50,000 Equity in Verse grant and another \$12.500 Renewal and Recovery Grant from the Poetry Foundation. The platform also was awarded a Grants for Arts Projects award of \$40.000 from the National Endowment for the Arts. Accolades also went to Obsidian Editor Duriel E. Harris, who was recognized by the Association of Writers and Writing Programs with the 2023 George Garrett Award for Outstanding Community Service in Literature.







Deliberative Dialogues' most successful year

Deliberate Dialogues are guided conversations on difficult or controversial topics, with the help of an issue guide and facilitator. The Center for Civic Engagement (CCE) hosted 200 sessions with 2,056 participants, its most successful year yet. Topics include mental illness, freedom of speech, violence and justice, climate change, the opioid epidemic, sustainability, voting, and land.

Voter engagement and restoration



CCE Assistant Director Harriett Steinbach coordinated the Voter Engagement Coalition, which focused on voter restoration, emphasized the historical and current legacy of voter suppression within minoritized communities, and supported democratic engagement and voting rights. Illinois State University continues to be recognized by the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge as a 2022 ALL IN Most Engaged Campuses for College Student Voting.

Alternative Breaks fills financial gaps

Alternative Breaks, a student organization supported by the CCE, provides students with opportunities to enact social change. Since its implementation, there has been an increase in Pell-eligible students participating, to allow for increased accessibility. Additionally, \$13,991 raised during Birds Give Back provided fee waivers.

Nikita Richards '06, M.S. '15, takes on DEI role for the state of Illinois

When the state of Illinois' Office of the Governor established the Commission on Equity and Inclusion, Gov. JB Pritzker appointed alumna

Nikita Richards '06, M.S. '15, as internal/external communications and legislative affairs officer. The new commission works to expand access to state contracts for minorities, women, persons with disabilities, and veterans/service-disabled veterans, as well as to enhance equity and inclusion throughout the workforce.

Career Achievement Award

Doris Houston, Office of the President, was named a recipient of the 2022 Career Achievement Award from the University of Illinois' College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (ACES) Alumni Association. Houston was also named the 2023 convocation speaker for ACES.

Janelle Jones, M.A. '10, appointed to **Department of Labor**



State magazine featured alumna Janelle Jones, M.A. '10, who is the first Black woman to serve as the chief economist at the U.S. Department of Labor. As the principal advisor to the Secretary of Labor, she tackled policies and plans tied to President Biden's executive order titled Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government.

Hip-Hop in the Arts

Wonsook-Kim College of Fine Arts brought four hip hop artists to campus for residencies in spring 2023, both as visiting artists to perform/ choreograph/present their work and to meet with administrators and faculty to discuss potential curricular hip-hop initiatives within the college.

Student trustee Ash Ebikhumi

One of the newest members of Illinois State's Board of Trustees is junior political science major Ash Ebikhumi, the latest in a long line of students to serve on the University's governing body. Elected by their peers, student trustees like Ebikhumi represent current students and shape the future that extends long beyond their time on campus.

Redbird Buzz Podcast takes flight

Redbird Buzz, the official podcast of Illinois State University, intentionally features guests who represent a variety of backgrounds, identities, and lived experiences. The podcast amplifies the voices of guests who discuss topics related to diversity, equity, and inclusion. During FY23, 10 of 22 Redbird Buzz episodes (45%) demonstrated diversity among Illinois State's alumni, students, and staff. Accessibility is also a priority for the podcast, with transcripts of each Redbird Buzz episode published to Alumni.IllinoisState.edu/Podcast.

Campus Inclusion Survey



The Illinois State University campus took part in a survey to shape future efforts and priorities related to equity, diversity, and inclusion. The ISU Campus Inclusion Survey looked to a range of topics aimed at gauging perceptions of support, accessibility, and a sense of belonging experienced by students, faculty, and staff with diverse life experiences, backgrounds, and identities. RESEARCH AND SCHOLARSHIP

Throughout the 2022–2023 academic year, Illinois State University highlighted research, presentations, and scholarly efforts dedicated to promoting equity, diversity, inclusion, and access.

University Galleries published three exhibition catalogues focusing on Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion: Jen Bervin: Shift Rotate Reflect is Queer artist and poet Jen Bervin's first monograph, a 192page hardcover book, features selected solo and collaborative projects demonstrating her research on legacies of women artists and writings, relationships between text and textiles, and abstractions of language and landscape. Bethany Collins: A Pattern or Practice is Artist Bethany Collins's first monograph, a 112-page hardcover book, features work about the intersection of race and language. An *Infinite and Omnivorous Sky*—this group exhibition features 30 works by 19 artists from Egypt, Peru, India, England, Mexico, Scotland, and the United States, critically engaging in poetic, scientific, and geopolitical views of the cosmos.

Milner Library Digitization Center. in conjunction with the Dr. Jo Ann Rayfield Archives and ISU ReD, seeks Illinois State alumni and current or former faculty and staff persons from minoritized backgrounds interested in being interviewed for Milner Library's ongoing oral history project. Now in its third year, this project aims to preserve and provide long-term access to the memories of Illinois State affiliates in their own voices and on their own terms.

SERIES, EXHIBITS, AND SHOWS

University Galleries organized and presented 13 exhibitions with EDI at the core. Examples include:

I want you to know my story was a solo exhibition of nonbinary artist Jess T. Dugan's photographs of queer intimacy.

A Garden to Build was a solo exhibition of Iranian artist Nazafarin Lotfi's sculptures, drawings, videos, and photographs.

First Gen Fridays are an open-forum learning community and "empowerment zone" for first-generation students, professionals, and advocates. The focus of the events is building unity and bridging the gaps in knowledge, opportunity, and access.

The Green Screen: 2022 Climate **Change Film Series**—The free, monthly series at the Normal Theater focused on the global climate change crisis. The series is sponsored by Illinois State University's Center for Math, Science and Technology and the ISU Office of Sustainability.

The Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies program collaborated with Queer Talks for the WGSS, Queer Talks speaker series featuring LGBTQIA2S+ and gueer studies research from emerging scholars in the field, including Dr. Ericka Wills, Dr. Juan Ríos Vega, Dr. Ela Przybylo, and Armen Álvarez.

Equitable, inclusive teaching seminars for faculty—online seminar series through the Center for Integrated Professional Development will provide faculty members with the tools to transform and create inclusive and equitable classes.

ReggieCon hosted a series of panels celebrating graphic novels and novelists. The series, sponsored by the Office of Enrollment Management and Academic Services, included works to honor LG-BTQIA2S+ History Month, Native American Heritage Month Universal Human Rights Month, Black History Month, Women's History Month, Arab American Heritage Month, and Asian Pacific Heritage

Safe(ish)—Poet, educator, and performer Yosimar Reyes facilitated the Safe(ish) sessions at the Multicultural Center with a theme of migration and sexuality.
