A Short Story of My Life

I was born in a little village in a poor country. My mother was a peasant woman. I grew up in a different village, where I worked in a carpenter shop until I was thirty. Then for three years I was a traveling preacher. I never wrote a book, I never became president, I never got married or owned a house. I did not go to college. I never visited a big city. I never traveled two hundred miles from the place where I was born. I never did anything that most people think is great. I did not have any Master Charge or Penney's or Prange's credit cards. I just had myself.

I was only thirty-three when things began to change. My enemies did not like my way of living. They hated to listen to my preaching. It made them very angry when other people loved and followed me. My enemies captured me and had a false trial for me. Then they made my carry a heavy cross. They nailed me to a cross between two thieves. Also most of my friends ran away because they were afraid. While I was dying, the soldiers gambled for my clothes, the only things that I owned. When I was



dead, I was laid in a borrowed grave. A friend pitied me.

Nineteen hundred years have come and gone, and today I am the most important person who ever lived. I am the leader of the human race. All the kings and presidents, and great men and women who have ever lived, have not affected the lives of people like I have. DO YOU REALLY KNOW WHO I AM?

HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE

None of us like to think of income tax. But it is the price we pay for living in a wonderful country! This year the Internal Revenue Service has a toll free TTY number we can call if we have any questions about taxes. It is 800-428-4732. The people there can help you with all your income tax problems. You can call them any time all year.

Here are some questions you may want to ask:

How much money can I subtract because I have a wife and/or —— children?

If I earn less than \$8,000 a year, what credit or money can I subtract?

What do I do about late refund checks?

How much money can I take off for cost of: TTY equipment

hearing aid

sending deaf children to special schools

The people at this office can also answer your questions about bills or other notices. You may ask them any question you wish. Call any week day — Monday through Friday, between 7:30 a.m.-5:45 p.m. Good Luck!
