Madonna College Asks Building Aid

Madonna College in Livonia has raised almost half of the donations needed to pay for a \$523,000 campus expansion pro-

The college is asking for further help from the public in raising the remaining money.

The plans calls for an addition to the Livonia campus, which will provide three additional classrooms, 13 new faculty offices and an elevator for handicapped persons. It will also house a men's locker and shower room, something the school failed to add when it became co-educational five years ago.

"We decided the extra space was needed because of our drastic enrollment growth," Sr. Franceline said. "Enrollment has increased by 300 per cent in the last five years and we are starting to get a bit crowded."

Madonna presently has a student population of 3,011, and is attracting more students each year because of its "career oriented" liberal arts program designed to make liberal arts graduates more employable, Sr. Franceline said.

The new classrooms will be used primarily to house a special program to train people to become interpreters for the deaf, the largest four year interpreting program in the nation. Eighty-five students are enrolled in the program.

The students also serve as classroom interpreters for 50 deaf students at Madonna

"We would like to have all the money by August, when the construction is completed," said Sister M. Franceline, Madonna College president. "But our fund-raising drive will continue until June of 1980."

Brown County Census Report

To date, in the Deaf census for Brown County, 144 people have been contacted. This includes 81 males and 63 females, ranging in age from 2 years to 83 years. On the last question listed on the census form, "comments regarding needs of the Deaf in Brown County," 70 people did not respond, but of the number who did, the following needs appeared:
