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



Love Is Never Silent

Deaf people have been called a "silent minority" becautheir relationship with the hearing world has often been hindered by very real breakdowns in communication. Deaf persons have developed a variety of methods of communicating with each other but have had to rely upon interpreters to express themselves to the rest of society. One of the challenges facing both the deaf and the hearing communities is to learn a mutual respect for the various languages of communication.

On December 9, the Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation *Love Is Never Silent* was telecast on the NBC Television Network. This informative and engaging drama centers around the experiences of a hearing child of deaf parents whose fluent use of sign language enables her to be an ambassador between the worlds of the deaf and the hearing. Joseph Sargent directs from Darlene Craviotto's screenplay which is based on Joanne Greenberg's bestselling 1970 novel *In This Sign*, Mare Winningham, Sid Caesar, Phyllis Frelich, Ed Waterstreet, and Cloris Leachman star.

All the key non-hearing roles are played by deaf performers, many of whom are veterans of The National Theatre of the Deaf, including Phyllis Frelich who won a Tony Award for her performance in the Broadway play *Children of a Lesser God. Love Is Never Silent* was close-captioned for the hearing impaired by the National Captioning Institute.

In The Other Side of Silence: Sign Language and the Deaf Community in America, Arden Neisser writes: "Although the deaf live in a world without sound, it is the same world we inhabit. To the problems of living in the environment they bring the full range of human resourcefulness, intelligence, and ingenuity.

They have created for themselves a language that is not only comparable to all the world's great languages, but perfectly adapted to their lives and needs. The deaf perceive the world through skilled and practiced eyes; language is at their fingertips."

Love Is Never Silent provides an excellent opportunity for hearing persons to develop an appreciation for the language skills of deaf people. There are two populations of hearing impaired individuals — those who were born deaf and those who developed a hearing loss later in life. It has been estimated that of the more than 16 million hearing impaired people in the United States, approximately two million have a hearing loss so severe that they cannot hear or understand either speech or most of the sounds of the everyday environment, even with the help of a hearing aid.

The central characters in *Love Is Never Silent* fall into the latter category, but the problems they face in their attempts to communicate outside their own community will be familiar to other hearing impaired persons as well. The sources of deaf pride and dignity in a world in which they are equal yet often viewed as different come vividly to life. At the same time, the drama highlights the particular challenges faced by family and friends who are called upon to interpret for them to hearing people.

Love Is Never Silent, therefore, is a valuable film for discussion in language arts classes in schools as well as community and social organizations served by and serving deaf person

If you did not see this movie and are interested in seeing it, the Deaf Ministry Office has a copy of it. Give us a call and we can schedule an evening when we can view the movie and discuss it. It is an excellent movie.



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
