# BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPOINTS DR. SALME STEINBERG PRESIDENT EXTENDS CONTRACT THROUGH AUGUST, 1999

"We have an opportunity to work together to build a strong future for Northeastern students."

On Tuesday, February 20, 1996, the Northeastern Illinois University Board of Trustees announced that Dr. Salme H. Steinberg accepted a contractual appointment as President of the university through August, 1997. Steinberg had been Acting President since September 1, 1995.

The Board of Trustees called a special meeting on April 25, 1996 to obtain feedback from the university community regarding a proposed presidential search. Representatives from student, faculty and staff constituencies presented comments and asked questions about the possibility of extending President Steinberg's contract. The majority of the university constituencies were in favor of extending the contract.

As a result of the meeting, the board voted to forego the presidential search and to extend the contract of President Salme Steinberg through August, 1999.

Daniel Goodwin, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, commented, "This is an exciting time for Northeastern. I am delighted that Dr. Steinberg has accepted the appointment. I know my fellow trustees share my optimism and confidence in Northeastern's future."

President Steinberg said, "I am deeply grateful for the confidence of the Board of Trustees and the university community. We have an opportunity to work together to build a strong future for Northeastern students."

# Carole Einhorn Receives Prestigious National Certification



Carole Einhorn (B.A.-elementary education, 1966: M.A.-reading, 1994) received National Certification in Language Arts from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. Currently, there are only 91 nationally certified teachers in the U.S. Last year, two teachers from Illinois were certified.

The National Certification is a year long process in which the teacher develops a portfolio to showcase what they have accomplished by integrating reading, writing and listening into the classroom. The portfolio also includes video taping of the classroom, documenting how to teach various cultural and academic backgrounds, providing samples of their work and conducting a self-reflective analysis plus two days of written assessments.

The goal of National Certification is to establish standards for the teaching profession and to recognize the professional.

Einhorn expressed her gratitude to Northeastern's reading program. "The reason I was able to achieve this was due to the reading program's courses which focused me and

gave me the confidence to go through the certification process. The faculty at Northeastern are wonderful people to work with, and inspiring and stimulating in the classroom."




#### Gerrie Manning Named Ms. Senior Illinois

#### **ARTS AND SCIENCES**

- The College of Arts and Sciences touches every NEIU undergraduate through the General Education Program. Recently revised, the General Education Program is predicated on specific outcomes in four distribution areas: the arts, the humanities, the behavioral and social sciences, and the sciences. To assess our success in achieving these outcomes, we have launched a pilot effort of testing junior students and using the ACT's College Outcomes Measures Project test. Professors Lidia Filus (mathematics) and Jane Weintraub (art), working with Dean John Boni, are heading the project.
- Seismograph: Though we have long thought that much of what we do in Arts and Sciences is earth-shaking, we now can measure it. Thanks to the efforts of Professor Christopher Ledvina (Earth Science) and support from Vice President Donn Bichsel and Dean John Boni, Northeastern now has the only working seismograph in the Chicago area. It is on view to the public in the lobby of the Science Building.
- Environmental Issues: Northeastern is in the second year of an agreement with the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) thanks principally to Professor Barbara Winston (Geography and Environmental Studies) and Professor Laura Sanders (Earth Science). Students gain USEPA internship experience, including work on superfund cleanup sites, and faculty and USEPA personnel interact on teaching and research issues. Our agreement is one of approximately 12 in the nation.
- Sports: This year, Professors of History Steven Riess and Patrick Miller initiated the Chicago Seminars on Sport and Society. Professor Riess has published several books on the history of sports. Professor Miller, in his rookie year at NEIU, has a book on collegiate sports due from Oxford University Press.

## BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

- The College of Business and Management achieved a significant milestone when it was approved as a candidate for accreditation by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) in Fall, 1995. While candidacy is not synonymous with accreditation, it signals to all that our college has aligned itself with the highest standards of our industry and we have committed ourselves to the "best practices" in the conduct of business and management education. This is important information for current, prospective and past students and for employers who will hire our graduates. Accreditation will place Northeastern among the most highly rated colleges of business and management across the nation.
- This past fall, the college hosted its third annual MBA Orientation Dinner. It was noted that three recent MBA graduates had been accepted in Ph.D. business programs. They are: Robert Irons, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill studying production/operations management; Amrita Bhattacharyya, Purdue University's Krannert Graduate School of Management studying MIS/finance; and Sirapat Polwitoon, the University of Rhode Island studying finance.
- NEIU is collaborating with the Russian Ministry

- of Education in Moscow and the Urals State Pedagogical University in Ekaterinburg, Russia. In January/February 1996, the college hosted the second visit of our Russian colleagues. NEIU's College of Business and Management is providing this group of administrators with experiences and information that will assist them in establishing and operating a business school. The college is currently conducting tours, visits to Midwestern businesses, presentations by executives from a wide variety of businesses, attendance in business classes and club meetings, and discussions with business faculty and staff.
- In cooperation with Cambridge Educational Services, the college has implemented a GMAT (Graduate Management Admission Test) preparation course designed to prepare individuals who plan to sit for the GMAT. The five-session review course provides an opportunity to review sample test materials and to learn effective ways of performing well on the test.
- In selected courses in the College of Business and Management, students are offered an exciting opportunity to learn course material through the use of instructional technology which includes working with their own computers in designated "Smart Classrooms." The college also participates in distance learning technology by offering selected courses at Northeastern and at similar facilities on other campuses. Interactive education makes it possible to deliver quality education to students throughout the Chicago area.
- The NEIU student chapter of the American Production and Inventory Control Society (APICS) received the prized "Gold Award" for chapter management in June, 1995 at the Annual All-Branch Dinner Meeting of the Chicago Chapter of APICS. This represents the second consecutive year this chapter has received this recognition.
- The college received a grant from the Illinois CPA Society for innovation in accounting education. The college will use this new teaching approach to provide students with more active participation and training leadership, interpersonal skills, critical thinking and the ability to work in diverse environments.

#### **EDUCATION**

- This has been a very busy year for the College of Education. In July, the college began piloting a structural reorganization. The experimental reorganization was the culmination of two years of work exploring structural options that would best support achievement of the college's goals. The new structure is functionally based and includes three divisions: teacher education; professional support; and leadership, adult and community education, while continuing to support two centers: Chicago Teachers' Center (CTC, and the Center for Exercise Science and Cardiac Rehabilitation (CESCR).
- In addition to reviewing and restructuring its curriculum, the college is involved in a variety of innovative collaborative efforts to improve education at the K-12 level. One such effort is the 21st Century Community Learning Project (CLP). The project entails building a model for education that would reunite and redefine the function of the entire community in the learning process. A small discovery group representing interested faculty and staff from across the university has been meeting to discuss the various aspects

involved in undertaking the project, including identifying a community with which to work. Once that has been done, business and education leaders within that community will be invited to attend discussions regarding development of a specific model. British educator John Abbot, a noted proponent of community-based learning models, has been invited to speak at Northeastern as an integral part of getting the project underway.

#### **GRADUATE COLLEGE**

- The Graduate College has about 4,000 students pursuing master's degrees in the disciplines of Art and Sciences, Business Administration, and Education in 23 academic departments. Additionally, three undergraduate programs BOG\BA, UWW, and the University Honors Program also have an administrative reporting relationship to the Graduate College.
- Interest and enrollment in the Graduate College continues to increase each year, as 1,600 graduate degree students were enrolled in courses for Fall 1995 a nine percent increase over 1994.
- The Pew Charitable Trust, through the American Association of Colleges and Universities and the Council of Graduate Schools, awarded a grant to Northwestern University and its cluster affiliates -Northeastern Illinois University, Chicago State University, Lake Forest College, and Oakton Community College- to engage in "Preparing Future Faculty" (PFF). Doctoral students from Northwestern in the disciplines of chemistry, mathematics, English, physics, history and sociology work with faculty mentors from the cluster schools to experience and understand the life of a professor in different learning environments of participating institutions. In the 1994-95 academic year, four students were mentored by Professor Vicki Byard, English; Professor Gerri Hemmer, Mathematics; Professor Susan Stall, Sociology; and Professor Wayne Svoboda, Chemistry. Professor June Sochen of the History Department presented a lecture to the PFF group at Northwestern. The program is continuing for the 1996 academic year and is administered by the Graduate College.

#### **OUTSTANDING STUDENTS!**

BOG/BA student **Julie Sass** received the Women's Studies Award for her work in a Life Span, for being a founding member of the Minority Information Referral Center, and for her community work on the issues of low-income housing. She has also been a speaker for family planning and a fundraiser for non-profit agencies.

Linda Kelly was the first recipient of the 1995 Robert A. Pringle Memorial Scholarship. Linda received \$500 towards her education.

Sidney Lancaster, Kyung-nan Yu and Kevin West received minority internships for the Spring 1996 semester.

Mary Friedl, 1994 graduate, was featured in a recent issue of PIONEER PRESS in the section "Evanston Personality." Mary, who has multiple sclerosis and is a quadriplegic, is an activist and advocate for Evanston residents with mobility disabilities. She is currently a graduate student in the Political Science program.

University Honors Program students Edith Giamberduca, Christina Perez and Debra Townson presented papers at the Association of Humanist Sociology meeting, October 26-29, 1995, in Columbus, Ohio.

#### ■ Impacting Mathematics Curriculum with Graphing Calculators

Seventh and eighth grade teachers will be taught to use technology to enhance their mathematics teaching.

#### ■ Lakeview Education and Arts Partnership

Award: \$150,000

**Grantor:** Chicago Annenberg Challenge **Project Director:** Jackie Murphy

This program will employ the arts as a catalyst to restructure schools and engage the community in education at three elementary schools in the lakeview community.

#### ■ A Standards and Performance Oriented Program of Interactive Teaching and Learning

Award: \$356,000

**Grantor:** Chicago Public Schools **Project Director:** Jerry Olson

Faculty, staff and education students will join with teachers, administrators and parents of five low scoring Chicago schools to engage in standardssetting, curriculum assessment, instructional improvement and policy making.

#### ■ A Randomized, Multiple-Dose, Double Blind Efficacy Comparison of Naprozen Sodium, Acetaminophen, and Placebo in the Treatment of Muscle Pain and Stiffness Resulting from Exercise-Induced Overexertion

Award: \$301,661

**Grantor:** Procter and Gamble Company **Project Director:** Lucille Smith

This study will follow the onset of muscle pain and stiffness from exercise overexertion to determine the relative efficacy of naprozen sodium compared to acetaminophen and placebo.

Four middle schools will develop a five-year plan for restructuring their middle grades with emphasis on isolation of the school from the home and community, providing personalized experiences for students, and providing teachers with common planning times.

Award: \$10,000



# Golden Eagle Baseball Team Our First Conference Champions! Earn Spot in the NCAA National Tournament



The NEIU baseball team captured the Mid-Continent Conference title and then defeated the Midwestern Conference Champion, Northern Illinois University in a play in series for the NCAA Division I Championship Tournament.

Head Coach Jim Hawrysko, in his ninth year at Northeastern commented, "I knew this team had the potential to win the Conference Championship and to be in a place to compete for the NCAA Tournament Automatic bid. This is an exciting opportunity for us and I am especially happy for the seniors who have worked hard these past four years."

The Golden Eagles, the sixth seed in the Western Region Tournament, traveled to Palo Alto, CA and played the number one seed Florida State University at Stanford University. The Golden Eagles (31-29) were eliminated by the eventual West Region Champion Florida State University and runner-up Cal State Northridge.

It was NEIU's first ever NCAA Division I regional competition in any sport, and closed an outstanding season in which Coach Jim Hawrysko's team set 15 new single season and nine individual career records.
