Discover Northeastern: Celebration of the Arts

The long-awaited Fine Arts Center will officially be opened on Thursday, September 16, 1999, with a ribbon cutting

ceremony and the Open Doors Arts Festival. This event will kickoff nine months of recitals, exhibits, performances, and other activities. Serving as honorary co-chairs for the celebration are Illinois Governor George H. Ryan, Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley, NEIU Board of Trustees Chair Daniel L. Goodwin, and NEIU President Salme H. Steinberg. This celebration is intended not only for the entire university community, but also for the city of Chicago and all supporters and friends of fine arts.

The ribbon cutting ceremony will take place at noon on September 16, and will be followed by the Open Doors Arts Festival. From 12:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. and again from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., alumni, visitors, students, faculty and staff will have the opportunity to discover (or rediscover) Northeastern and, in particu-

lar, the new facility that is worthy of the quality of NEIU's fine arts program. They will tour the region's most advanced



facilities for the teaching of the arts. Visitors will see the technologically enhanced classrooms, music practice rooms, and studios for such programs as dance, ceramics, and jewelry making. And they will also view the beautiful new 175-seat Recital Hall.

From September through May, many exciting activities are taking place in celebration of the arts. In partnership

with 98.7 WFMT, the university will broadcast live and taped concerts from the Recital Hall with such talents as the soprano Sumi Jo, the Vermeer Quartet, and NEIU faculty. Exhibits in the Main Art Gallery include paintings from artist Gustavo Monroy, a kimono exhibition from the May Weber Foundation, and works from past and present art faculty. Additionally, Jamaica Kincaid, author of the acclaimed books At the Bottom of the River and The Autobiography of My Mother, and Parker Palmer, author of The Courage

to Teach, will give public lectures to the university and community.

Distinguished Alumni Recognized



October 1998

Grants Update

Project Title: Network of Experiential Adventure Learning (NEAL)

Funding Agency: Chicago Annenberg Challenge

Project Director: Richard Rutschman, Chicago Teachers' Center Grant Award: \$325,000

This project leads school improvement and restructuring activities using two models of experiential education proven successful in improving student academic achievement. The NEAL network includes the Chicago Prep Charter School and three schools within the Youth Connection Charter School: C.C.A. Academy, and Latino Youth Alternative and Prologue high schools.

Project Title: Bilingual Education: Training for All Teachers

Funding Agency: U.S. Department of Education

Project Director: Maria Korkatsch-Groszko, Teacher Education Grant Award: \$146,156

This collaborative program with the Chicago Public Schools will work with 25 bilingual/bicultural K-8 teachers. Participating teachers in this three-year program will earn a Type 29 certificate in Transitional Bilingual Education and a Master of Arts degree in Teaching: Bilingual/Bicultural Education.

Project Title: Citizenship Empowerment Project

Funding Agencies: The Fund for Immigrants & Refugees and Illinois Department of Human Services

Project Director: Margaret Boyter-Escalona, Chicago Teachers' Center Grant Award: \$87,500

The Worker Education Program of the Chicago Teachers' Center, in collaboration with the Union of Needletrades, Industrial and Textile Employees (UNITE), will continue to provide immigrant union members with citizenship and English as a Second Language education. With funding from both agencies, 200 UNITE member immigrants will receive assistance as part of their naturalization process.

Project Title: Bilingual Education Collaborative Funding Agency: U.S. Department of Education Project Director: Joan Macala, Chicago Teachers' Center Grant Award: \$48,000

This program will increase the number of bilingual students and paraprofessionals teaching in Illinois by developing Bilingual Teacher programs at area schools, and recruiting, enrolling and training bilingual students to become pre K-12 teachers. Partners in this program include Roosevelt University and the City Colleges of Chicago.

Linda Yu, ABC Channel 7 news anchor and reporter, delivered the keynote address at the Asian American Heritage Program on campus. The theme was "Building Unity with Diversity."



Bertice Berry, award winning lecturer, author, stand-up comedian, and host of "USA Live," appeared as part of the Presidential Lecture Series. Berry revealed how inspiration can lead to personal fulfillment, utilizing her unique humor to captivate students and the university community.

William Rainey Harper College President Robert Breuder and President Steinberg signed an agreement that allows for concurrent admission to both institutions beginning in fall, 1999. This facilitates the transfer process, giving Harper students access to quality baccalaureate programs offered at NEIU.

April 1999

The GTE Foundation awarded a \$30,000 GTE FOCUS grant to NEIU to fund N-Connects, a program to promote the recruitment and retention of qualified minority students who pursue undergraduate degrees in mathematics and science.

The Board of Trustees re-elected its officers for another one-year term. **Daniel L. Goodwin**, chairman and CEO of Inland Group, Inc. was re-elected chair; **Willie J. Taylor**, vice president of Sonicraft Inc., vice chair, and **Nancy J. Masterson**, chair and CEO of Moose Lodge, Ltd., secretary.

Gloria Ladson-Billings, award-winning educator and author, participated in a dialogue about "Creating High-Performance Classrooms of Diverse Learners" at NEIU's Chicago Teachers' Center. She described ways in which educators can engage students in activities and learning experiences which connect the classroom with the community.

NEIU hosted a meeting in cooperation with the Chicago Education Alliance to discuss the Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR-UP) and Teacher Quality Initiatives, both federal programs in the Higher Education Amendments.

African American/Caribbean Heritage Program activities celebrated the diversity of the NEIU community and fostered new understanding and appreciation of its diverse members.

May 1999

The College of Education was awarded accreditation from the Unit Accreditation Board of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) at the initial teachers' preparation and advanced levels. NCATE-accredited schools must meet rigorous standards set by the profession and members of the public.

June Sochen, Ph.D., Professor of History and Women's Studies, had her most recent book, From Mae to Madonna: Women Entertainers in Twentieth Century America, published by The University Press of Kentucky.

June 1999

Oakton Community College President Margaret B. Lee and President Steinberg signed an agreement that allows for concurrent admission to both institutions.

Michael T. Kelly was appointed Dean of Students. He comes from the University of Illinois at Chicago where he had served as Director of Judicial Affairs and Assistant Dean of Student Affairs since 1990.

Joyce A. Hieshima, Ph.D., (M.A. '80 and M.A. '83) was appointed Associate Provost. She also holds the rank of Associate Professor in the College of Education.

Hoda Mahmoudi, Ph.D., was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Her scholarly activities include both national and international presentations as well as publications that span a variety of disciplines.

NEIU's Board of Trustees approved two measures to benefit students, including the expansion of the health insurance program for students with no additional cost to students. The Board also presented and approved a resolution commending NEIU **President Steinberg's** outstanding leadership.

NEIU is extending the office hours of several of its student support areas. This will be especially convenient for the large population of part-time, evening students who need increased accessibility to student services.

Announced at Press Time NEIU IS LEAD

INSTITUTION IN GEAR UP GRANT

Award announced by the U.S. Secretary of Education

NEIU will play a lead role as fiscal agent in a five-year, \$31 million GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) grant that will provide comprehensive services to disadvantaged middle and secondary school students to prepare them for high school, ultimate success in college, and toward becoming life long learners. U.S. Secretary of Education, Richard W. Riley, came to Chicago on August 11 to announce the awarding of the grant which amounts to more than \$3.8 million in the first year. The grant was awarded to the Chicago Education Alliance (CEA), a partnership consisting of five of the university and college partners, including NEIU, of the CEA; the City Colleges of Chicago; and a number of private foundations and corporations. President Steinberg is a member of the Steering Committee of the CEA. The CEA grant is the largest GEAR UP grant awarded in the country. GEAR Up will serve about 12,000 students in 34 selected Chicago Public schools. Wendy Stack, a program associate at the Chicago Teachers' Center, a facility of NEIU's College of Education, is the partnership director.

Professor Emerita Margaret Lindman Donates Instructional Puppet Collection



Margaret Lindman, Ph.D., professor emerita, Teacher Education, and her husband, Richard, recently donated 19 puppets and marionettes to the NEIU Foundation. The puppets will be used by the Teacher Education Program of the College of Education. The Lindman's plan to augment the collection and have created the Lindman Puppetry Fund to care for it. NEIU Leads With International Initiative

Northeastern Illinois University has long been recognized for its diversity, with more than 55 languages being spoken in students' homes. Through the leadership of President Salme H. Steinberg, the realization of Northeastern's mission has become more global, preparing students for the 21st Century. Here are a few examples of how students, faculty, and the university community contribute to and benefit from a global vision.

NEIU Students Study Around the Globe

Over the last ten months, 60 Northeastern students have studied abroad, experiencing India, Israel, Belize, Korea, Spain, Italy, Ireland, England, and South Africa. These students return to NEIU with a new perspective and share their experiences with the university community through scholarly presentations and workshops.

NEIU Helps Strengthen International Education in Illinois

The Presidential Summit on International Education took place at Motorola University in January. Presidents from 45 Illinois public and private universities and colleges, the Executive Director of the IBHE, the Deputy Governor for Education of the state of Illinois, legislators, and many business leaders attended. Several strategic initiatives will unfold from this summit, which served as a forum for strengthening international education in Illinois. President Steinberg addressed the opening dinner and was a panelist for a session on faculty development for international education. She also was a member of the summit's steering committee for presidents.

Korean Delegation Visits NEIU

President Steinberg recently hosted a delegation from Korea. President Jin Lee of the Kongju Communications Arts College and his colleagues came to NEIU, accompanied by Korean Consul General Jong Kyou Byun. President Steinberg signed a letter of agreement for student and faculty exchanges between the institutions.

NEIU Hosts Korean Cultural Performances

NEIU was one of three sites in the United States selected for the 1999 Korean Cultural Program. "It was an honor for NEIU to host the program," said President Steinberg, "and we are pleased to continue our important relationship with the Korean community."

NEIU Collaborates With Beijing University

Beijing Foreign Studies University President Chen Nai-Fang and his delegation met on campus with President Steinberg, Joyce A. Hieshima (M.A.'80 and M.A.'83), Associate Provost, and Mohan K. Sood, Dean of the Graduate College and Director of International Programs. President Chen is interested in having NEIU faculty members teach or conduct research at Beijing Foreign Studies University, the principal source of China's diplomatic corps worldwide.

President Meets Japan's Prime Minister

At the invitation of Japanese Consul General Mitoji Yabunaka, President Steinberg attended a dinner and reception hosted by Mayor Richard M. Daley of Chicago for the Prime Minister of Japan when he was in Chicago recently. It was a memorable occasion.

First American to Receive Chinese Research Fellowship

NEIU Associate Professor of History Andrew Eisenberg, Ph.D. is the first American to receive a Chinese Culture Research Fellowship from the China Scholarship Council of the Ministry of Education of the People's Republic of China. Dr. Eisenberg is researching Wu Zetain, China's only female emperor, and the politics surrounding the imperial succession during the early Tang period. The China Culture Research Fellowship invites history and social science scholars to conduct research in China, creating a broader international understanding of Chinese culture.

Two NEIU Professors Awarded Fulbright Scholarship

NEIU Associate Professor of History Patrick B. Miller, Ph.D. was awarded a J. William Fulbright Lecturing and Research Award. Dr. Miller taught a course entitled, "African American Memoir and Autobiography" and another on the Civil Rights Movement at Westfalische Wilhelms Universtat in Muster, Germany. Additionally, Miller was invited to present lectures and guide academic workshops in other European countries, as well as to assist in the organization of a conference for the Collegium on African American Research.

NEIU Associate Professor of Finance Rasoul Rezvanian, Ph.D. was funded by the Fulbright Program as a Fulbright Scholar to participate in educational and research activities in Baku, Azerbaijan. Subsequent to this award, Dr. Rezvanian served as visiting lecturer at the Nanyang University in Singapore to teach and do research in financial institutions and markets. He is currently a faculty intern at the Department of Labor in Washington, D.C. and will return to NEIU this fall to share this vast experience in international business.

"Americans in Spain" The International Brigade. Multi-Disciplinary Program Offered October 11-18, 1999

NEIU has planned an inspiring week of classes, seminars, and cultural activities that revisit and celebrate the political idealism and commitment to international democracy of the over 2,800 American volunteers who went to Spain, calling themselves the Abraham Lincoln Brigade. This multi-disciplinary program includes over 25 presenters on topics ranging from "The Lincoln Brigade – Allies and Enemies" to "Picasso, Guernica, and the War Years." 


