We also welcomed a delegation of headmasters from Oxford, England for an opportunity to build closer ties and new friendships, and we hosted Dr. Max McGee, Executive Director of the Illinois State Board of Education at that time. Furthermore, NEIU was the site of the annual Chicago Area Golden Apple Scholars Orientation. Having over 500 prospective Golden Apple scholars and their parents on site gave us the chance to show off our university to students, their families, and their teachers. And as the site of their regular meeting, we welcomed a record number of attendees to the Illinois Board of Higher Education meeting. They shared positive comments with me on many things, including the graciousness of every NEIU employee they encountered. ### Rally at NEIU Kicks Off Chicago GEAR UP

"Gear Up!" "Kids at Hope!" echoed throughout the Physical Education Complex and beyond. On November 18, more than 1,500 fifth and sixth grade Chicago Public School children filled the gym for a rally and kick-off of the Chicago GEAR UP Alliance. GEAR UP, or Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs, is a partnership of several universities, private foundations, and corporations designed to provide students, parents, and teachers assistance in guiding students successfully through high school and college.

As fiscal agent for the grant, **Northeastern Illinois University** will play a lead role in the five-year, \$31 million partnership grant awarded to the Chicago Education Alliance (CEA), a consortium of Chicago area universities and educational organizations working to improve the Chicago Public School system. **Dr. Teryl ann Rosch** is the executive director of the CEA. The U.S. Department of Education awarded \$120 million for 185 new grants under the GEAR UP project, with the CEA partnership award

the largest in the nation. The Partnership Director, **Wendy Stack**, is a program director from the Chicago Teachers' Center, a facility of NEIU's Department of Education.

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## Worth Repeating

Another Dual Admission Agreement has been signed, this time with the City Colleges of Chicago (CCC). President Salme H. Steinberg and CCC Chancellor Wayne Watson signed the agreement on November 3 at a regularly scheduled CCC Board of Trustees meeting. It will be effective on January 1, 2000. Dual admission is available to CCC students who plan to complete their baccalaureate degrees at NEIU. Students who wish to participate must meet admissions requirements of both institutions. NEIU now has dual admissions agreements with the College of Lake County, William Rainey Harper College, Oakton Community College, and the City Colleges of Chicago.

NEIU served as host for the annual conference of the Illinois Committee on Black Concerns in Higher Education (ICBCHE) on October 27-29. The conference, targeted to African American graduate students and educational professionals, featured nationally prominent speakers, workshops, and a job fair with representatives from many Illinois higher education institutions. The keynote speaker was Dr. Julianne Malveaux, noted economist and syndicated columnist for King Features. Melvin C. Terrell, NEIU's Vice President for Student Affairs/Public Affairs, is concluding his four-year term as Chair of the ICBCHE. Since 1982, the ICBCHE has assisted black professionals and students in higher education by offering programs to enhance professional and academic development. President Salme H. Steinberg said it was a "privilege" to host the ICBCHE conference and noted that "the ICBCHE has long been in the forefront in addressing issues concerning the status of minorities in Illinois higher education."

**Northeastern also played host** for some 400 Chicago Public School students, teachers, and parents who came to participate in this year's Science Fair Central in the Science Building, September 18, 25, and October 2. Over the past four years, the science and mathematics departments have hosted Saturday morning workshops attracting close to 1,000 participants.

**Some 500 prospective Golden Apple Scholars** and their parents attended the annual Chicago Area Scholars Orientation held at Northeastern. The 100 students who are chosen will receive yearly scholarships of \$5000 and summer institutes designed for future teachers. Tours of the campus provided an opportunity to show off the university to interested students and their parents. Currently, NEIU has five Golden Apple Scholars in residence.

Lula Ford, John Jursa, John Mazurek, and JoAnn Percel - all NEIU alumni - were among a select group chosen by the Chicago Public Schools, Chicago Principals and Administrators Association, and LaSalle Bank N.A. to receive the 1999 Outstanding Leadership Award for their dedication to academic excellence and accomplishments in improving student achievement. Ford, assistant superintendent, Department of Funded Programs, Chicago Public Schools, earned her M.A. in Inner City Studies. Jursa earned his M.S. in Mathematics and is principal of Prosser Career Academy. Mazurek received his M.A. in Elementary School Counseling and is principal at Casals. Percel earned her M.A. in Teaching Children with Learning Disabilities and is assistant principal at Courtenay Language Arts Center, one of only two assistant principals to receive this award.

**Two NEIU sophomore students**, Jemina Noonoo and Scott Plencner, have been selected to represent NEIU in the "Pursuit of the Presidency 2000 Program" sponsored by the Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars. After attending a workshop in Washington, D.C., the students will attend either the Democratic or Republican Convention and, then, the Presidential Inaugural Ceremony in January 2001.

### New Aid for Less-Than-Half-Time Students

Through a new state program, **Northeastern's Financial Aid** office is now offering financial assistance to students who apply for financial assistance but are enrolled for a less-than-half-time load.

NEIU was one of 83 Illinois schools invited to apply for participation in this program, and also one of the 40 selected by the **Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC)** to participate in its first year the 1999-2000 academic year — as its Demonstration Project for Aid to Less-Than-Half-Time Students.

Changing demographics and economic conditions have altered the make-up of the student body in Illinois institutions of higher learning. An increasing number of students are enrolling on a less-than-halftime basis and the ISAC Demonstration Project is a first attempt for state aid to address this problem.

Less-than-half-time enrollment is defined as at least three credit hours but less than six credit hours. As part of the state's **Monetary Award Program (MAP)**, aid awarded under the Demonstration Project will be 25 percent of the MAP term amount *but not to exceed tuition and mandatory fees.* For example, a student enrolling at less-than-half-time could apply for Demonstration Project money to cover some or most of tuition and fees and Pell Grant (the only other assistance previously available for less-than-half-time students) money to cover other costs.



### Templeton Guide Names NEIU a National Leader

One of Northeastern's academic programs has recently been selected as one of the best in the nation and is highlighted in *The Templeton Guide: Colleges That Encourage Character Development*, published by the John Templeton Foundation.

The book, designed for students, parents, and educators interested in personal growth at the collegiate level, praises **NEIU's Curriculum Infusion program** for the way it brings information about the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse into the classroom. Drug prevention content is made a part of the course work in courses across the curriculum. For example, a business management course may address ways in which alcohol and drug use by employees negatively affects workers and greatly increases business costs. A sociology course may study the impact of alcohol advertisements that target college students. Or, a chemistry course may include a unit on fetal alcohol syndrome.

This federally-funded project, under the guidance of NEIU Sociology Professor **Ron Glick**, one of the founders of Curriculum Infusion, was piloted at Northeastern and has since been developed nationally with successful programs at such campuses as Colorado State, DePaul, Roosevelt, North Park, and Shenandoah Universities.

The agency that supports the national presence is the **Network for Dissemination of Curriculum Infusion** (NDCI), based at Northeastern. Key NEIU faculty and staff members, in addition to the director of NDCI, Ron Glick, include **Bruce Joleaud**, Teacher Education Project Coordinator; **Hamid Akbari**, NDCI Consultant to Faculty and Management Teams; **Mary Ann Schwartz**, NDCI Consultant to Faculty and Management Teams; **James Lockwood**, NDCI Coordinator of Evaluation; **Sharon McNeely**, NEIU Teacher Education Faculty Coordinator, and **Kenneth Addison**, NDCI Consultant on Diversity.

Another, more recent, focus of the program prepares future teachers to integrate prevention strategy into the middle- and high-school classes they will teach. "This work," Glick says, "is a natural extension of our work in higher education...to impact a growing problem that interferes with learning in Chicago-area middle and high schools."

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# Rally at NEIU Kicks Off Chicago GEAR UP

DJ Tim Schommer from radio station B96, serving as master of ceremonies for the rally, introduced NEIU President **Salme H**. **Steinberg.** The president welcomed the honored guests, students, teachers, and parents to the rally and said, "Education makes a person good, useful, and powerful, and that's why we are gearing up."

The Chicago GEAR UP Alliance consists of Northeastern Illinois University, DePaul University, Loyola University Chicago, Roosevelt University, Truman College, the City Colleges of Chicago, plus a number of corporations and private foundations, such as Working in the Schools and the I Have a Dream Foundation. It will serve approximately 12,000 students in 34 selected Chicago public schools.

The purpose of the program is to **Support** early college preparation and awareness activities at the local and state levels. GEAR UP awards multi-year grants to locallydesigned partnerships among colleges and middle schools, plus at least two other partners – community organizations, businesses, state education agencies, parent groups, or non-profits – to increase college entry rates.

Student academic improvement needs "improved classroom instruction, after school enrichment and summer enhancement programs, and teacher development services," according to the grant. "Besides mentoring, tutoring, and college counseling, the project will offer President Steinberg and Rick Miller, founder of Kids at Hope.

education enhancement and computer courses for parents, leading to the creation of a project web site and tapping into the Chicago Cable Access Network for instruction, teacher development, and student interaction, including bilingual services."



During the first year of the program, Chicago GEAR UP will work with fifth, sixth, and seventh grade students. Its services will include tutoring, mentoring, and team building. **There will also be partnership programs for parents**, such as information about financial assistance for college; and for teacher and curriculum development. The next year, students in fifth-eighth grades will participate; then fifth through ninth, until the first year's seventh grades graduate from high school.

All of the 'kids at hope' at the rally were assured that they are all capable of success. Speaking on behalf of the Ronald McDonald House Charities, which sponsored the rally, NEIU alumna **Virginia Ojeda** said, "We are very excited to be supporting the Kids at Hope/Gear Up program." Ojeda, who owns and operates two McDonald's restaurants on the northwest side of Chicago, told the students about her own childhood when she "didn't have much" except for the support of her family to succeed. "It's important to find your inner talents and use them to help you succeed." Ojeda drew a cheer when she said, "I graduated from college, and I graduated from **this** university."

In addition, Chicago Police Superintendent, Terry Hillard; Miss Illinois, Jade Small; and the founder of Kids at Hope, Rick Miller, each addressed the audience with the message of success into college. Joining them were Benny the Bull, Ronald McDonald, the Happiness Club singers, and magician Tom Boz, who provided inspiration and entertainment.

GEAR UP, based on the experiences of other programs, will provide a key to the future for many young students across the country.

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
