




Principal

Under the leadership of our advisors, Miss Spigner and Mrs. Deaderry, we presented "THE LITTLE MINISTER." It was a hit for Broadway with our actors and actresses. Oh, the joy each of us had when May rolled around! The Junior-Senior Prom was one of the biggest affairs. Our class took great delight in decorating the gymnasium as an Oriental Garden. Each one felt the Oriental air and touch as he entered.

It seemed as if summer would never end. We worked hard during those long warm months. Finally, September 1952, arrived. How happy we were to know that thirty had entered for our last round up!

Especially were we thrilled to enter an immaculate, new modern building with new classrooms, a superb library, cafeteria, adequate home economics and science departments. We were grateful for all of this. This was one of our busiest years. Many of our moments were spent compiling an annual, The 1953 Rattler, preparing for a Senior Play, and engaging in many other activities.

The Senior play, "MY FRIEND IRMA," was thoroughly enjoyed by the audience. The cast showed unusual ability in depicting the characters.

With the latter part of our school come the excitement and thrills that are enjoyed by seniors--Bacculaureate sermon, Class Day exercise, and finally----GRADUATION!
