The girls were Helen "Sook" Graham, Amanda Page, Nellie Mobley, and Johnnie Mae Jimerson. Our team won the intramural class tournament.

After basketball season ended, our thoughts turned to the final events of the school term. The Junior Class presented a play entitled "Going Places." It was a grand adventure staging a play for the first time. The Junior-Senior Prom was a booming success! We hitched our wagon to a star and took a trip into the "Wide Blue Yonder" to enjoy an evening of hilarious entertainment which was in night club style with an orchestra, singers, and comedians.

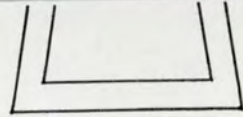

Our years at Emmett Scott High School have been very eventful; the many experiences we have had here will help us during decisive moments in years to come.

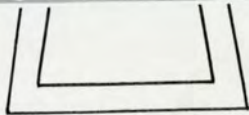
