According to the 1970 vehicle regulations, fines will be as follows: \$5 for failure to register a vehicle used on University p perty plus mandatory registration; \$15 in falsification of registration or unauthorised transfer of a decal; \$2 for improper decat display; \$5 for failure to heed a stop sign; \$1 for University parking violations if paid within 72 hours, thereafter increased to \$4. Driving on lawns and walkways will bring a fine of \$10, payment of damages and possible cancellation of the registration decal. Students with unpaid fines or penalties will not be permitted to re-enroll, graduate or t: ansfer records.
