# Investigating the Social Change of Bob Dylan on a Song "The Times They are a Changing": A Case on Discourse Analysis

Discourse analysis frequently studies societal change by looking at how language use both causes and reflects these changes. A research technique for examining spoken or written language in connection to its social environment is discourse analysis. In several humanities and social science fields, such as linguistics, sociology, anthropology, psychology, and cultural studies, discourse analysis is a popular qualitative research technique (Gee, 2014)

A social change tends to reflect changes that occur in values, culture, structures and institutions in society. Social change has an impact on ways of thinking which then have an impact on the way of life, behaviour and social relationships of individuals with individuals and also groups.

We could begin utilizing discourse analysis to analyse social change by deciding which particular social issue we want to investigate. Then, we could gather information related to our study subject using spoken or written language collection. This could be in the form of speeches, interviews, news stories, posts on social media, or other conversations.

Lyrics are poems that represent several arrangements of words from a song written by someone which contains ideas or the contents of someone's feelings, therefore song lyrics are also called a painting of the feelings of the person who wrote them (Sudjiman, 1986; Tambunan et al, 2023). Literary works tend to have the word song, which interprets that lyrics are the product of a literary work, because they contain an arrangement of words that have meaning based on a person's feelings. A song can be used as an arrangement of music by adding lyrics or text that expresses the author's feelings and ideas in a general way (Sylado, 1983; Batubara et al., 2023; Hutajulu et al., 2023).

Song lyrics are an outpouring of the creator's personal feelings and ideas, as are the lyrics of -The Times They are A Changing created by Bob Dylan. This song was written by Dylan as a response to the social and political changes that occurred during the 60s. With strong and progressive lyrics, the song functions as a kind of hymn to the ongoing movement for change, demonstrating a passion for change and a desire for improvement. The lyrics to Bob Dylan's song "The Times They Are a-Changing" are in English. The language is simple and direct, but very effective in conveying the social and political messages of the time. Dylan uses powerful words and creates images that can stick with the audience.

It is intended that this study will inspire other scholars to examine song lyrics. It is the duty of literary and linguistic scholars, as previously stated, to examine or investigate song lyrics. Conducting study on song lyrics is an act of gratitude on the part of the researcher towards musicians, as it aims to communicate the meaning and intent that the songwriter intends to share with his audience.

# LITERATURE REVIEW

The lyrics are systematically analysed based on different aspects, such as meaning construction, reproduction and resistance, identity construction, power and ideology, and media and public opinion. Each aspect provides a lens through which the researcher explores how the language used in the song contributes to the discourse on social change.

#### A. Results

This research analyses song lyrics regarding social change. The song analyzed is Bob Dylan's song entitled *"Times They Are a Changing"*, below are the song lyrics.

- Accept change quickly: The lyric underscores the significance of embracing change promptly, warning against the consequences of resisting change. Change is depicted as inevitable and demanding active acceptance.
- Change as a challenge: Describing change as a challenge, the lyrics use swimming as a metaphor for the struggle required to overcome societal changes. It signifies the proactive effort needed to adapt to change.
- Changing times: This line suggests an acknowledgment that change is a continual part of the unfolding of time, emphasizing the importance of understanding change for progress.

# 2. Reproduction and Resistance

(Second Lyric)

- Reproduction (Writers and critics): The role of writers and critics is portrayed as one of reproducing perspectives and predicting social change through their written expressions.
- Resistance (Don't speak too soon): Lyrics advise against hasty decisions, resisting premature judgments, indicating that the situation is complex and still evolving.



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- Reproduction (Uncertainty and complexity): The lyrics replicate the uncertainty and complexity inherent in social change, emphasizing the challenge of predicting winners or losers.
- Resistance (Current defeats turning into future victories): Expresses resistance to immediate judgment, suggesting that current setbacks can transform into future successes, respecting the inevitability of change.

### **3. Identity Construction**

(Third Lyric)

- Placing responsibility on legislative leaders: The lyrics assign responsibility for social change to senators and congressmen, creating an identity linked to societal responsibility.
- Affirmation of ability to respond: The call for senators and congressmen to heed the call affirms their capacity and responsibility to respond to the societal call for change.
- Linking identities to consequences of inaction: The lyrics suggest that individuals link their identities to the consequences of inaction or resistance to social change, emphasizing the importance of taking action.
- Conveying identity as adaptable to change: The lyrics convey an identity that recognizes and is willing to adapt to societal change, reflecting a proactive approach to transformation.

### 4. Power and Ideology

# 5. Media and Public Opinion

This identity can encourage them to act in accordance with the call for change facing society.

This lyric of power and ideology analysis describes the desire for change, the shift in power from generation to generation, and the importance of recognizing and supporting those changes. The ideology underlying these lyrics also emphasizes the importance of actively participating in social change.

The lyric creates a narrative of change through discourse analysis in media and public opinion aspect, which shows social dynamics and a message about adapting to changing times. Song lyrics and other media can play an important role in shaping public opinion about social change.
